ATTENDANTS' BOOTHS.

The weekly meeting of the Joint Committee of Management of this institution was held on Monday, the 10th inst. The R.M.S. Dr. O'Connell, Bishop of the Diocese, present were: Rev. Dean Flynn, P.P.; Sir William G. D. Goff, Bart.; the City High Sheriff (Mr. James O'Connell); Messrs. William Walsh, J.P., Board of Guardians, John Kieney (Kilnashinna), and Capt. William O'Connell, J.P. (Drogheda).

Dr. O'Connell—This is the hospital nurse I have appointed. She has tendered her resignation to-day. I am afraid you will not be able to get a suitable person at the salary you have fixed. If you would like to raise the salary to £58, and give her in lieu of rations an allowance in money, it would raise her salary above the salary of the ordinary attendants, and would improve the position and give more variety in the way of food.

Dr. O'Connell—She has a sole house to herself down there. Where is she from? Dr. O'Connell—She is from Queen's County. The nurse to be appointed should have a certificate from the Medical Psychological Association or the certificate of the Local Government Board.

Dr. O'Connell—But would the former certificate be sufficient? Dr. O'Connell—It would. Dr. O'Connell—That is a specialised form of nursing. Dr. O'Connell—Yes, but they must pass in general nursing also. Dr. O'Connell—Have they sufficient knowledge as general nurses to deal with the cases they come down here?

Dr. O'Connell—They have. Dr. O'Connell—You will get a trained nurse for £30 a year, and a nurse in lieu of rations. Dr. O'Connell—Certain. Dr. O'Connell—You will give her the cost of her rations would be to the institution. 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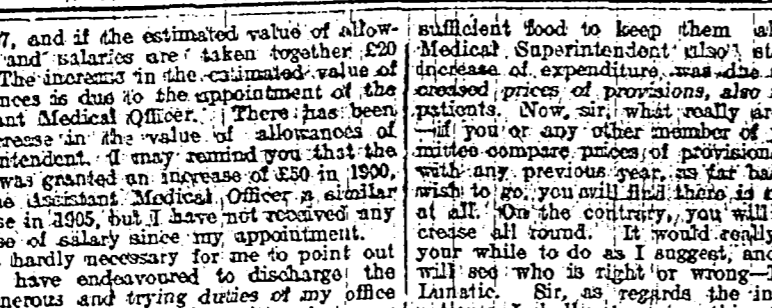

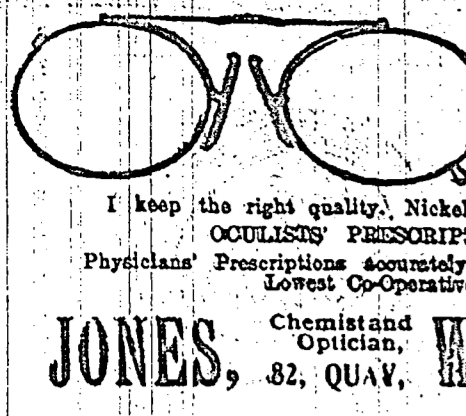
