## CATTLE TESTING STATION

The Board of Agriculture has erected a cattle testing station at Purbright, in Surrey. The immediate object is for the purpose of accumulating cattle destined for export to South Africa which renders them immune from foot-and-mouth disease, the great scourge to South African cattle. It is hoped that such arrangements are made with foreign governments the station may be used for tuberculin testing. The farm attached to the station covers 100 acres. The value of the land and equipment cost £20,000, which was granted by the Development Commission. The cattle boxes are arranged in two parallel rows of eight each. Each row extends to about 60 feet, which allows about 12 square feet to each animal. A tramway has been installed which has a fall of 1 foot to facilitate the conveyance of food from the mixing room. The corners of the boxes are rounded and there is an independent supply of water for each of them derived from tanks on water towers. The feeding troughs are of plated earthenware and detachable, the troughs are 12 feet long and 12 inches wide. Between the two sets of boxes there is a considerable space which will be used as an open-air paddock for the animals. It will have a separate yard so that animals may be exercised singly if thought necessary. The sewage is conveyed to filter beds and there is a separate yard for the boxes is 12 feet 6 inches to the apex and the doors have an observation hole on top.

## THE FARM IN MARCH.

March is in a special degree a month of progress. Next Move With Unionists. No Further Concessions. Important Article by Mr. T. P. O'Connor. Mr. T. P. O'Connor, M.P., in an article in "Roywood's Newspaper" this week says:— I never thought that the "Tory Party" would accept any concession from the Government however wide and generous they were. It is not their interest, it is not their desire, it is not their purpose to give the House of Lords any power in its old omnipotence—and the shouting for another generation of all the hopes of the people. Are not the concessions of the Government great, broad, generous? If anything, do they not in the eyes of every true British democrat and every true Irish nationalist, give us more than we deserve? If it were not for the confidence of Liberals in the judgment of Mr. Asquith and Mr. Balfour in the House of Commons, the Government would have found it difficult to get these concessions accepted by Liberal and Irishmen. But the concessions have been accepted, belittled, almost scornfully thrown back in the face of the Government. Sir Edward Carson thinks that the House of Lords should be submitted to his, his Cabinet, and his subjects in Orange Ulster.

A NEW SET OF DEMANDS.

What is worse is that they have been made the starting point for a new set of demands, and even if these new demands were accepted, they should be made by another new set of demands. Indeed, within a few hours of Sir Edward Carson's saying that he would submit popularly accepted demands to meet the "Tory" case, the Bill with these new demands was introduced in the House of Commons. All Lord Carson ever said, "Give us a new set of demands, and we will accept them," is now being used to justify the second reading, but they must be free to transform it in Committee.

SICK OF INSOLENCE AND ARROGANCE.

We think it is time to tell these gentlemen that we are growing sick of their insolence and their arrogance. They have the concessions of the Government, and they are still asking for more. If they don't take them the Bill will pass as it stands, and if these gentlemen refuse to carry out the threats they have made and do not accept the order must be preserved against Peers and Privy Counsellors, just as it is preserved against common clay and Syndicates and stockholders.
