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## Death of Miss J. Curran, Kilrush, Dungarvan

The sincerest sympathy of the entire community has been extended to Mr and Mrs Curran and family Kilrush, Dungarvan on the very tragic death of their 13-year-old daughter Josephine which occurred rather suddenly after a brief illness at her home on Monday night last. Death at any time is sad but it is truly tragic when one so young is called away so early on in life. She was sister of Mr Tom Curran, a popular member of last year's County Senior Hurling team and an outstanding man on Dungarvan Senior teams for many years back.

Up to a few weeks ago she attended school at the Presentation Convent, and a touching tribute was paid to her memory by her former classmates when they marched in procession at the funeral and burial.

The remains were removed to St Marys Parish Church on Tuesday evening accompanied by a very large cortege and the burial took place on Wednesday in the new cemetery adjoining Rev T B Walsh B.A. C.C. met the remains on Tuesday and recited the last prayers at the graveside.

ANOTHER OUTRAGE
