Katural Causes Verdict Returned

Di. D. T. McCarthy, Coroner for West Waterford held an in-quest at Clashmore, on Friday February 19th, into the circumstances surrounding the death of Declan O Neill 72-year-old farmer of Too North, Clash-

Strong suspicions that de-ceased had met a forcible death were allayed by the evidence of Dr McGrath State Pathologist and a verdict of death from natural causes was returned Dr John McGrath State Pathologist stated that on the 19th February 1943 acting on the instructions of the Coroner and under Section 12 of the and under Section 12 of the Coroner's Amendment Act Coroner's Amendment Act (1927), he performed a post-mortem examination on the body of Dec'an O Neill at Clashmore Garda Station He was assisted by Di James F Ronayne Clashmore The body was identified to him by Garda Patrick Ryan, Clashmore The body was first seen in a coffin from which it was removed There were scrapes on the left knee and on the lobe of the left There was a wound about the bridge of the nose and another small wound on the left through smoke-filled corndors nestril. The rusal bones were were choked by the fumes and fractured. The height of the body was 5 feet 11 inches, and the weight was about 12 to 13 There was some rigor stones still present The brain was normal except for slight congestion The lungs were normal. The heart was dilated and flabby The abdominal cavity contained free blood. There was massive massive hæmorhage around the left kindney and behind the peritoneum on the left side

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Dr James Ronayne Medical Officer Clash nore, stated that Ring he assisted Di McGrath, at the Des post-mortem examination and he agreed that the cause of death was extensive hæmorrhage into the abdominal cavity, due to the rupture of an aneurism of the left iliac artery. Trapped in an inferno of flame and smoke thirty-six children and a woman aged 87 lost their ives in a fire which plactically destroyed the Poor Clares Girls' Orphanage at Cavan early on Wednesday morning last Out of the 85 children living in the fastitution 50 were saved though some are injured and detained n hos-Frantic with terror the children crowded the windows crying to the people below to

The fire swept the dormitories with territying rapidity Some of the children jumped from windows and were injured Others in a wildly frightened condition, ran out into the fields adjoining the town. The Poor Clares' Convent which adjoins the orphanage, was saved by firemen who cut away part of the roof to prevent the spread of the flames
