This Party was succeeded in 1932 by the Government of Fianna Fall At first this party under pressure from the Labour and Trade Union Movement, introduced a number of popular reforms, widows' pensions, un-employment assistance, relief works, paid holidays, in order to placate popular demand. The policy of Flanna Fall was however a policy of assisting and creating monopolies, this once revolutionary party has ended

Blight is a disease which is particularly dreaded by the Irish people ever since the devasta-tion ruin, and famine which it caused in the black years of 46 and 47 The terrible lesson to be learned from the dire consequences of those years should not be forgotten Blight is now the No 1 enemy of the nation as it is out to destroy our main food and therefore farmers, plotholders and gardeners are strongly advised to fight it by spraying their crops immediately and thoroughly

The weather conditions of the part for weaks are all in favour

past few weeks are all in favour of general development of blight and the rapidity with which it has spread in some areas where many crops are now practically without foliage is alarming Main crop potatoes are in very real danger of becoming affected and all growers should guard against a possible calamity

We cannot impress too strongly on all concerned the grave need there is to look after the potato crop We are now totally dependent on our own food production to feed the people of the nation and if there should be a failure of pota-toes the consequences would be almost worse than those of the dreaded famine years
Therefore we again urge on

all who have crops of potatoes to make all haste to have them sprayed and so ensure that the disease will be checked and destroyed, and by careful attention make certain of a plentiful harvest
