A feature of the election was the support given to all the Ministers who in the majority of cases headed the Polls in their constituencies. In Waterford Mr P J Little, Minister for Posts and Telegraphs was returned at the head of the Poll with 7,824 first preferences

In Waterford, the Party first preferences in this election with those of 1938 in brackets are as follows: Fianna Fail 18,294 (22,542); Fine Gael 10,119 (16,594); Labour 5,282 (2,323); Farmers 5,028 (—); Ailfin Na h-Aiseirghe 926 (—).

The number on the Register was 52,164, the total valid Poll was 39,649 and the Quota was 7,929

After the first count Mr C S Dunlin Fine Gael Agent requested a recount which resulted as above, the previous result showing Little 7,824, Heskin 2,875, Morrissey 6,196, Norris 2,154, O'Connor 2,920, with the others as stated.

"O'Dochartaigh" was eliminated and the second count saw P J Little with 7,974 elected, and the other candidates as follows—Butler 2,372, Goulding 4,331, Guiry 2,426, Heskin 2,916, Morrissey 6,409, Norris 2,191, O'Connor 3,063, Redmond 7,801.

Norris was then eliminated and the 3rd count resulted as follows—Butler 2,468, Goulding 4,333, Guiry 2,456, Heskin 4,523, Morrissey 6,524, O'Connor 3,102, Mrs. Redmond 8,017.

Mrs Redmond was declared elected and her surplus distributed leaving the 4th count—Butler 2,492, Goulding 4,436, Guiry 2,458, Heskin 4,575, Morrissey 6,528, O'Connor 3,105.

The 5th count saw the elimination of Jerome Guiry (Lab) with 2,459, Butler 2,493, Goulding 4,456, Heskin 4,576, Morrissey 6,548 and O'Connor 3,107 kept up the running.

John Butler next went out in the 6th count having 2,654, with Goulding 4,524, Heskin 4,736, Morrissey 6,827 and O'Connor 3,281.

At the seventh count with 2 seats still to fill the count stood Heskin 5,695, Morrissey 7,246, O'Connor 5,126 and Goulding 4,765.

Sean Goulding was then eliminated and the eighth count resulted—Heskin 6,092, Morrissey 10,873 and O'Connor 5,320.

A surplus of 2,944 from Mr Morrissey was then distributed and the ninth count showed the two candidates still fighting

Mr Heskin got 220 leaving him with 6,312 and Mr O'Connor getting 493 totalled 5,813. Mr O'Connor was then eliminated and Mr Heskin was declared elected. This completed the count and the elected candidates are as follows—

Death Of Mrs. Curran, Glenmore

We regret to announce the death of Mrs. Mary Curran, Glenmore, which occurred on Sunday morning, June 20th, after a brief illness and fortified by the rites of the Holy Catholic Church. The deceased enjoyed widespread esteem in the locality, where she was very popular with all classes. Member of a well-known and highly-respected family, she made many friends by her kind and amiable disposition, her good humour, and goodness of heart. She was a true-hearted Irish woman and during the years of Ireland's struggle for freedom her home was always open to the "boys on the run" while she, herself, never failed to give them a hearty Cead Mile Failte, and to provide them with all the comforts which it was in her power to give. Three of her sons took an active part in both wars for Independence.

Widespread sympathy is extended to her husband and family (four of whom are Nuns) in their sorrow and loss.

The remains were removed to St. Mary's Church, Dungarvan, on Monday evening and were received by Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F. Dungarvan, and Rev P Farrell, C.C., do.

The funeral was one of the largest seen in the district for many years. On Tuesday morning Office and High Mass were celebrated for the repose of her soul and the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery where she was reverently laid to rest in the presence of innumerable relatives, friends, and sympathisers and amid many manifestations of profound sorrow.

Appreciation of work done for Farmers

A departmental letter conveyed the appreciation of the Minister of the work carried out by Mr T Maher, Rural Science teacher, in conducting the testing of seeds for farmers.

Tributes were also paid by members to the great service rendered to the farmers of the county by Mr Maher.

Ardmore Course

A discussion on the forthcoming Irish course for teachers to be held at Ardmore took place and final arrangements were made.

The Annual Congress

Other matters having been adjourned the C.E.O. gave a report on the Annual Congress held at Dunlaoghaire, which was attended by Mr Harty, Fear Mór and himself. Amongst the resolutions passed was that proposed at a previous meeting by Mr Harty, to have a special course in veterinary instruction for farmers' sons included in the curriculum.

Mr Harty then spoke and said that he was told on good authority that a loss on cattle, sheep and pigs amounting to £12 million was suffered by the farmers annually. In his experience and from what veterinary surgeons told him most cases were reported 24 hours too late and nothing could be done. He instanced the prevalence of mastitis and garget in cattle and the damaging effects it has and said that all farmers should know the rudiments of veterinary first-aid.

After further discussion a resolution was proposed by Mr Harty, and seconded by Mr McGrath and passed, that veterinary surgeons be selected to lecture about the county on first-aid treatment to livestock.

"The many friends and acquaintances of the very popular Brooklynite Daniel F Colbert will share his joy at the news of

the Ordination to the Holy Priesthood of his son Daniel F Colbert junr, on Tuesday, April 27th, 1943.

"The newly-ordained Daniel F. Colbert will say his first Solemn Mass at 11 o'clock on Sunday morning, May 2nd in St Brendan's Church Avenue O and East 12th Street, in his native Borough of Brooklyn.

The numerous friends of the Colbert's will be there to honour one of Brooklyn's oldest Irish-American families with their presence on the holy occasion.

"Daniel F Colbert, senr, is a native of the picturesque town of Cappoquin, better known as the "Old Cornerstone" in Co Waterford Ireland. He came to the United States fifty-three years ago and raised his family here.

On the proposition of Mr D McCarthy, seconded by Mr R Grant, Mr P Elliott, acted as Secretary to the meeting in the absence of Mr D Good, Co Board Secretary. The Secretary and Registrar of the Eastern Board defended the Eastern Board in appeals brought by Clonea and Ballyduff Clubs.
