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## Death Of Patrick Mansfield, Ballintlea, Old Parish.

Sincere and widespread regret has been occasioned in many districts at the death, which occurred at his residence on Saturday last, Sept 4th, of Mr. Patrick Mansfield, Ballintlea, Old Parish. Deceased was a member of one of the best known and most highly respected families in the West Waterford area, many of whom gave outstanding service in the fight for Irish Independence. He was a farmer of expert ability and his large farm at Old Parish gave evidence of his wide knowledge of this. The great esteem in which he and his estimable family were held was evidenced by the large funeral that attended the removal of his remains to Grange Parish Church on Sunday and again at the interment which took place after the celebration of Requiem High Mass for the repose of his soul on Monday. To his bereaved wife, family and relatives sincerest sympathy is extended.

**ALL READY FOR SUNDAY'S RECORD SPORTS—**

All the preliminary arrangements have now been completed for next Sunday's record sports meeting here, and with our long experience of Sports extending back to 1896 47 years ago, we can truthfully state that never before have we seen such patient, painstaking and thorough preparations for any event than have been made for Sunday's important fixture.

For the past couple of weeks the entire Sportsfield grounds and more particularly the Cycle racing track, have been receiving the closest attention while twilight lasted each evening, so with several lawn mowers cutting the grass as closely as possible, and heavy rollers used regularly to ensure a smooth and level surface we are not exaggerating when we say that one of the best and fastest grass tracks in Ireland will be found here on Sunday (weather permitting).

Great credit is due to Mr M J Sargent one of the Hon Secs for the close and regular attention which he has devoted to this work every evening, and the general lay-out of the spacious and picturesque grounds is a distinct credit to him and all the others associated with him in this good work.

The cycling events, five in number, which are always the most popular features with the public, should provide some rare and exciting sport as the half-mile cycling championship of Ireland will be competed for by most of Ireland's Premier cyclists, including M Anderson, Bohernmeen, Sean Donnelly, Dublin T F Quinn do S, E O'Reilly, do F J Baird do V Lyons, do J J Pender New Ross, Sean Meighan Cork the Condon Bros, Mitchelstown, and our local champion Jimmy Foley, so that this should easily prove the best and most exciting event of the day.

Further keen contests between the same brilliant riders will be witnessed in the one mile cycling handicap, two miles cycle (scratch), three miles cycle handicap, and the five miles challenge short-limit cycling handicap, so that these five events alone should constitute a wonderful days' sport for all.

But the Athletic events, will be equally brilliant, because the entries in this department include such famous athletes as Bryan Downey, J McGuinness, Fergus Flynn, D D Guiney, Maurice Curtin and Florrie O'Mahony, (brother of Dan O'Mahony, the famous wrestler) beside a host of others, and whether these are seen in the 100 yards 220, 440 880 one mile flat, the high jump, pole vault, long jump, the 50lbs or the 16lb shot, all will be at their best, and can be relied on to provide some spectacular and thrilling displays in the various contests.

A special treat will be the presence of a first-class Military Band which will discourse a stirring programme of select music on the grounds during the afternoon, while running commentaries and the names of the winners and placed men in each event will be given by Mr O'Shea, Fermoy, throughout the entire programme for the benefit of the public.

For the convenience of cyclists attending the Sports the members of the Cappoquin Lawn Tennis Club have kindly agreed to convert their enclosed Tennis Courts beside the Sportsfield into a cycle park where all bicycles will be carefully parked and safely looked after for the moderate fee of 3d each so this should relieve cyclists of all anxiety and enable them to enjoy the sports without any distraction during the evening.

Messrs M J Sargent (DSO 1), and M F Walsh, (DSO 3) are the efficient and popular hon secs of the sports, and with the able assistance of a large staff of capable and courteous officials, all the arrangements will be carried out by them in the smoothest and most punctual manner, and the entire programme will start sharp at 2.30 (S.T.)

**GRAND DANCE ON SPORTS NIGHT—**

As an appropriate wind-up to the great days enjoyment in the Sportsfield a grand All-Night Dance will be held in the Grand Boathouse Hall on Sunday night commencing at 10 o'clock and continuing until 4 a.m.

A delightful programme of specially selected music will be provided by the popular "Blackwater Serenaders" Band, Cappoquin, under the able leadership of Mr James Glasse while excellent catering arrangements

will be carried out by that courteous and experienced caterer, Mrs Kelly Chapel St, Lismore, which will add greatly to the happiness and enjoyment of all.

As at the competitors at the sports from practically all over the country will be present, this should prove a special attraction for the young ladies while a further attraction will be a grand drawing for £5 note in aid of the L.S.F. tickets for which will be on sale at the dance at the modest price of 3d each!

**COLLECTION IN AID OF THE SPORTSFIELD—**

### AILTIRI NA h-AISEIRGHE

In last week's LEADER I pointed out the good work which Ailtiri na h-Aiseirghe are doing in Dúngarbhán to help the Gaelic Language and to make the people "Nation-conscious". During some recent reading I came across the following which was written by one of Ireland's greatest literary figures (even though he did write in English) Tomás Debhlin. It shows that the reasons for the founding of Ailtiri na h-Aiseirghe are not "new-fangled" reasons but that they are the ideas cherished by generations of Irishmen who wished and still wish to see Eire, Gaedhealach agus Eire Saor.

Men are ever valued most for peculiar and original qualities. A man who can only talk commonplace, and act according to routine, has little weight to speak, and do what your own soul from its depths orders you are credentials of greatness which all men understand and acknowledge. Such a man's dictum has more influence than the reasoning of an imitative or common-place man. He fills his circle with confidence. He is self-possessed, firm accurate and daring. Such men are pioneers of civilization and the rulers of the human heart.

Why should not nations be judged thus? Is not a full indulgence of its natural tendencies essential to people's greatness?

The language which grows up with a people is conformed to their organs, descriptive of their climate, constitution and manners, mingled inseparably with their history and their soil fitted beyond any other language to express their prevalent thoughts. It is the most natural and efficient way.

To impose another language on a people is to send their history adrift among the accidents of translation. 'tis to tear their identity from all places—'tis to substitute arbitrary signs for picturesque and suggestive names—'tis to cut off the entail of feeling, and separate the people from their forefathers by a deep gulf—'tis to corrupt their very organs and abridge their power of expression.

The language of a nation's youth is the only easy and full speech of its manhood and for its age. And when the language of its cradle goes itself craves a tomb.

A people without a language of its own is only half a nation. A nation should guard its language more than its territories—'tis a surer barrier and more important frontier than fortress or river.

While in writing that, saw the whole truth—saw our people so blind that they cannot see it too. "Gaelic and Free and also Christian" must be our watchword in the future.

Cumann Dúngarbhán in their drive to popularise Irish dances will have a Ceilidhe for Cumann members at next Saturday night's meeting and we hope to see all the callini as well as the buacailín present. A grand Ceilidhe Mór will be held in the Town Hall on Sunday night week Sept 19th, when a big crowd is also expected. Readers also make a note of Sept 26th, on which day an Aeridheacht will be held but more about that later.

**EXPORT OF RABBITS**

An Order was made by the Minister for Agriculture last April the effect of which was to prohibit the storage and export of rabbits during the period commencing on the 1st May and ending on the 31st August, 1943. A further Order has now been made by the Minister continuing the prohibition of storage and export of rabbits for the period commencing on the 1st September and ending on the 30th September, 1943.

Less Reticence And More Co-operation

THE Managerial System of Local Government which came into operation at the end of last year has, during latter months come in for a great deal of criticism from various public bodies all over the country. The Act, as everyone knows by this, transferred the duties of County Councils, Urban District Councils, Public Assistance and Mental Hospital Boards, and of all other local elective bodies, to County Managers appointed by the State. The change was revolutionary and at its passing a storm of protests were issued. The opponents of the system took every opportunity of pointing out that such a scheme "was opposed to all public interests while those who favoured it could only say—Wait for a year and give it a trial!" Many, indeed did not at first realise the far-reaching effects the New Act would have, and a certain amount of confusion, such as was to be expected, reigned during the first months. Now, however that the Act in all its meaning has been thoroughly understood by all, the public bodies are taking up the cudgel and are calling for its abolition. The system was inaugurated in order to expedite the business of Local Government. The Managers were given all the main powers termed "executive" such as the appointment and dismissal of officials, the placing of contracts, and for all decisions of an executive nature which leaves the duly-elected representatives of the people with virtually no power at all. They are just what one Councilor aptly called "Glorified Parish Councils".

In Waterford, the Managerial system has been working fairly smoothly and with the exception of a few occasions a good measure of harmony exists between the Manager and the Public Bodies. One of the big faults of the system is the obligation entailed on the Manager to deal with detailed business of a big number of local bodies. In such circumstances the Manager finds himself unable to attend the many meetings of the different bodies the members of which feel slighted and then accordingly begin to immediately find fault with the Act. The only remedy for this is to reduce the areas of administration for the Managers or else to abolish a number of the Boards which now find themselves with little or nothing to do. The latter seems to be inadvisable as it would kill public representation and the only liaison between the public and the Manager is the public representative. At present, the fact, whether the Committee under the Diseases of Animals Acts in this county is affected by the Act or not is being strongly disputed. The Committee are responsible to the Department of Agriculture but the County Council Solicitor said that the Committee as a subsidiary body of the County Council comes under the Act. The Department of Local Government endorsed this opinion, but Mr David Coghlan, who champions the view that no mention of the Committee is made in the Act claims that the Diseases of Animals Committee is a full blown body with all powers vested in the Chairman and members. The dispute is still unsettled and Counsel's opinion on the matter is being obtained. If the Managerial system is to survive the Managers will have to be less reticent about the decisions affecting the public interests, and will have to be prepared to take the representatives of the people more into their confidence. If such could be carried out we are sure that it would be for the common good, because then Managers and Councils could work as a perfect team and not, as in many instances at present be at loggerheads.
