## WEDDING - BELLS

### Smart And Stylish Wedding At Abbeyside

### Marriage Of Mr. M. O. Nagle and Miss Nancy Norris.

(From Our Cappoquin Correspondent)

A very smart and stylish wedding took place in the pretty Parish Church at Abbeyside at 9 o'clock on Tuesday morning 12th inst., when Mr Michael C Nagle, eldest son of Mr John B and Mrs Nagle Abbeyside, was married to Miss Nancy Norris, daughter of Mr James and Mrs Norris "Cairbre House," Abbeyside, in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends which proved the widespread popularity of the contracting parties throughout an extensive area of West Waterford.

The bridegroom belongs to an old and highly-esteemed Co Kerry family and after he and his respected parents and the other members of the family came to reside in Dungarvan several years ago he became one of the most brilliant students in the Christian Brothers' College for many years.

He was a noted athlete during this period and was remarkably successful in the 220 yards event, in which he broke the Irish record in the All-Ireland Schools Sports held in Croke Park Dublin in 1935.

He continued to maintain his unbeaten record in this event against the best competitors from all the leading schools in Ireland until he unfortunately, sustained a rather serious accident to his knee which compelled him to reluctantly retire from all forms of athletics just when he had reached the peak of his form.

A young gentleman of splendid education and very high intellectual attainments, he was appointed Editor of the 'Dungarvan Leader' when this welcome addition to the public life of Dungarvan was founded by his father and another enterprising gentleman about five years ago and while he has occupied the Editorial Chair, he has always displayed the highest literary ability and the soundest efficiency in the discharge of his important duties while he has shown the same high qualities in the management of the Commercial side of the business and has been mainly responsible for the successful and prominent position which the 'Leader' now occupies amongst the principal Provincial newspapers in Munster.

Of a quiet retiring and unassuming disposition he is a warm supporter of all forms of social activities in the town of his adoption and is, deservedly held in the highest respect by all sections of the leading people in the "Old Borough".

The Bride and her family are well known in the City and throughout the County of Waterford and are related to the Dempsey family Shandon Dungarvan. They have resided in Dungarvan for a considerable time and have always been held in the highest regard since their

advent to Capital of West Waterford. A young lady of most attractive appearance, and a charming and refined manner Miss Norris has conducted a most successful Ladies Hairdressing Establishment in Grattan Square for several years, where her highly artistic work, and her extremely courteous and obliging manner have attracted lady clients from all parts of the County.

There was a happy and brilliant scene in the Church when the Wedding Ceremony (with Nuptial Mass) was performed by Rev John Roche, P.P. Abbeyside before a large and representative attendance of the relatives and friends of the contracting parties and big numbers of the parishioners.

The Bride who was given away by her father looked a picture of loveliness in an Orchis Pink two-piece with Plum Accessories wore a beautiful bouquet of Pink Roses and Maidenhair Fern. She was attended by her sister Miss "Breed" Norris, as Bridesmaid who also looked charming in a Pale Hyacinth two-piece, with Plum Accessories, etc.

The Best Man was Mr P J Nagle, Department of Defence Dublin (brother of the Bridegroom).

The music during the ceremony was beautifully performed by Miss Rosaleen Foley, who presided at the organ.

At the conclusion of the interesting ceremony, the Wedding Breakfast was held at "Cairbre House" Abbeyside, the residence of the Bride's parents, where a large and select party was hospitably entertained for hours. After the blessing of the wedding cake by Rev Father Roche, P.P., the Toast of the Health of the Bride and Bridegroom was appropriately honoured in felicitous speeches, interspersed with songs dancing and rare musical selections on the violin and piano-accordion, and later in the day the happy pair left for Dublin where the honeymoon is being spent.

Both looked radiantly happy as they took their departure amidst the heartiest congratulations and best wishes of all for a long and unclouded life of health, wealth and happiness in the years before them.

### Adjourned Case of Assault

The Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr Sean Troy, DJ at the Courthouse Dungarvan, on Tuesday last.

Mr T C Williams solr., applied on behalf of Mrs Nora Monahan, for a special exemption order to enable her to open the bar at Ocean View, between 12.5 am and 4 am on the 18th Oct during the holding of a dance. The application was granted.

Messrs Farrell and Morrissey, Solrs applied for a dance licence for Mr James Mansfield on behalf of the Dungarvan Carnival Committee in respect of the Marquee at Bohereenatra, during the Carnival period.

**Lights On Vehicles**  
Guard J O'Keefe, Ring, v Ml Walsh, Ring. There was no appearance by the complainant.

Mrs Wright in reply to Mr Morrissey solr., said that she was in her kitchen on the 28th of August when she heard shouting. She could not be sure if Molly Walsh saw her or not. She heard Molly Walsh say that she was the leavings of half the men of the town and that when she (defendant) would get married she would get a decent man. Complainant also stated that she never annoyed or provoked Molly Walsh in anyway.

In reply to cross-examination by Mr Lanigan Mrs Wright denied that she said to Molly Walsh on the street on that date—'I suppose you will get a man tonight.' She said she had been in court four times previously but she was being persecuted by these people.

Mr Lanigan, pleaded that the charge was a trivial one and asked that the case be with drawn.

The Justice said it was a serious matter to be attacking people's character in such a manner and bound defendant to the peace for 12 months.

### Larceny of a Bicycle

The Attorney-General of Eire at the suit of Supt P O'Mahony Dungarvan, charged Philip Dunne, Fair Lane Dungarvan that on October 18th, 1941, he did feloniously steal, take and carry away a gent's bicycle value £5 and a dynamo lighting set value 25 the property of Detective-Guard Tom Barry Dungarvan.

Supt O'Mahony, applied for an adjournment until the next Court as they were investigating other alleged charges against defendant.

Mr A R. Farrell, (Messrs Farrell and Morrissey) solrs., who appeared for defendant applied for an adjournment until the second court in November as at that time he would be in a position to bring forward evidence which would be helpful to the defendant in this case. Supt O'Mahoney agreed and the Justice accordingly adjourned the case until Nov 23rd.

The original right-of-way which was down by the river bank has been removed.

This was a great convenience to people up in the Shandon areas who used the way to get to the station creamery, and pictures. We are here to represent all the people and not any individuals and we should look into this matter.

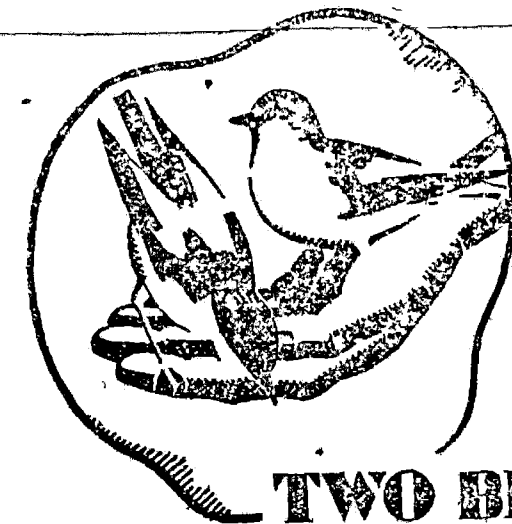

**ACTION—NOT WORDS**

WE all know the old rhyme which was contained in the old school book of primary school days—"A man of words and not of deeds is like a garden full of weeds." It does not need a big lot of intelligence to understand the meaning of this. It could not be plainer. The saying came back to us forcibly last week when we read about the controversy that broke out as a result of the statement on the Irish Language of Mr de Valera at the Flanna Fail Ard-Fheis and the views on the subject of a daily paper printed in Dublin. Mr de Valera has for years told us that there is the direst need for the revival of the National Language. We are in thorough agreement with him. Granted that the need for the Resurrection is so great and urgent—can nothing better than a series of statements on the subject be done?

There are, no doubt, great obstacles to be overcome and there are many people who would rather see the Irish Language die out than again become the flourishing tongue of every Irishman and woman. But these obstacles and contraries will have to be smashed and broken down. Our geographical position is a great drawback, for situated as we are in the shadow of a country which has been dominating practically the entire world there is bound to be a great deal of inferiority complex. But if we reflect and think that other small nations situate in the heart of the European continent contended with—and overcame

these same obstacles we will get new vigour for the campaign. So bad was the position in Czechoslovakia that the national party there had to submit to the stigma of doing their publicity for the revival of their tongue in a foreign language!

In Eire we have a much better start. Practically everyone has a little of the language and the majority of the younger generation are very proficient and provided with the proper facilities they will gladly continue to flourish and use Irish. It is the old generation who are responsible for the slow growth of Gaelic—those who did not learn it when young and who do not now want to face the discomfort (!) of learning the language of our forefathers.

Until such time as Eire has a people speaking their own National language we cannot claim that we are a separate nation free in every sense of the word.

Therefore we hope, that a definite vigorous drive will be started and never relented until the Language is in its proper place—on the tongues of the entire population who will be using it in business on the streets and in the homes. Any movement which has as one of its avowed aims the restoration of Irish as a living full language should get every support from all true Irishmen and women.

We hope to see then, that the time of words and statements is past and that from now on vigorous action will be the watchword of the Language Revival.

**Means For Raising Funds**

**Chairman—What did the scheme cost last year?**
