"Turf Only Bags Of Dirt"

Deelish Dam—"Who Is Going To Pay For Its Numerous Repairs?"

Mr T McCarthy, Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council held at the Town Hall on Friday night, Nov 27. Also present were Messrs Morrissey T.D., J McGrath, A Kyne, J Dahill and L A Dale.

Mr Michael O'Meara Acting Town Clerk, attended. A cheque for Children's Health Committee.

Mr C-J Murphy Secretary of the Council forwarded a cheque to above of £26 17s 3d being the Committee's share of the Carnival proceeds run jointly by the Parish Council and Children's Health Committee.

"Turf Only Bags Of Dirt"

Miss Mary Attridge Cathal Trugha St in the course of a letter to the Council condemning the turf being issued to the recipients of free turf said that recently she got a bag of turf under the scheme and there was about 1 1/2 stone of turf in the bag, the rest being dirt. She made a complaint to the supplier and was told "to take it or dump it in the yard". She continued "what's the use of having the name of getting free turf if we get a bag of dirt fit only for the garden. I think it's a shame that someone responsible does not inspect what the poor people are getting and what is being paid for."

Mr Morrissey—Is there any check kept on the quality of the turf being issued to these people?

Chairman—All I know is that they get their tickets here and collect the turf. There is no doubt but that an inspection should be made.

Mr Morrissey—According to a statement made during the week by the Minister for Supplies only the best quality turf could be available for these people. An inspection should be carried out and it is unfair that they get other turf than the best. It is being paid for from public monies and the merchants are expected to give the best and there is no reason why they should not.

Chairman—It is a shame the treatment these poor people get. They get it wet sods and it is thrown to them like you'd throw stuff to dogs. It is not fair as there are people who can get the good turf, but these unfortunates just get anything.

Mr Dahill—We all get the same.

Chairman—We do not Mr Dahill, and I can prove it.

Mr Dahill—The turf could not be dried this year.

Chairman—They could and would dry it.

Mr Dahill—It was a very bad season.

Mr Morrissey—I suggest that a letter be sent to the Co-Manager with a recommendation that periodic inspections be held.

Chairman—I am sure you will all agree with that?

This was agreed, Mr Kyne stating that the inspection should be carried out by a person sympathetic to the poor. His opinion was that the scheme as a whole was a good one.

The Prices Of Turf And Potatoes

In reply to the Council's recent protest concerning the high prices charged for turf and potatoes in Dungarvan the Department stated that these matters are at present under consideration.

Mr Kyne—That is something good they might do something for us now. The mistake was that this was ever declared a turf area.

The Deelish Dam And Its Numerous Repairs

Mr J Bowen, BS in a report on the Deelish Dam stated that he had discussed the various matters with Mr Maconchy. The position appears to be much improved and he is quite hopeful that the dam will soon be all right and watertight. He does not anticipate any serious difficulty following after the completion of the works outlined by the consulting engineers and he thought it best to reserve observations until these matters have been dealt with.

Messrs Delap and Waller, Consulting Engineers, reported that they had again examined the dam and filter plant at Deelish the agreed period of 6 months from the time the water was raised in the reservoir behind the dam having expired.

We find that the dam is holding water well, there being a small but steady decrease in the various springs downstream. The interior of the tunnel was definitely in better condition than when inspected a couple of months ago, various weeps having taken up, and there are now only 3 points on which further observation appears to be required, these being: The roof at the upstream end near its joint with the tower, the east wall half way down from the tower to the centre of the dam, and a slight weep at what is known as haircrack F—immediately below the puddle core, this latter has decreased in volume, and the indications are that the silt deposit in reservoir is doing good work in sealing the dam.

From records of the water levels, it appears that the leakage through the crack F only occurs when the water is within 4-6 feet of high level, and, when the crest of the dam which was affected by the slip, is being repaired, the Contractor may be able to discover and seal the point at which the water must be getting through.

We have drawn up a complete list of works for the completion of the contract, both for what is required at the dam and at the filter plant, where two points of leakage were discovered, and we have asked the Contractor to put the work of the filter plant in hand at earliest. The mechanical part of the plant was not completed by the makers at the time as they required the reservoir to be full, and unfortunately they are engaged on war work other than waterworks and have had to close down the department concerned with the latter so that they cannot now send over an expert to complete the plant. We have therefore listed out what is required for Messrs Fitzpatrick to put in hand including the cleaning of existing and supply of fresh, sand so that when the various items have been completed we will be able to start dosing of the water in order to afford the town a clear supply. We have been promised full detail instructions with regard to this by the makers of the plant, but even if these do not arrive we expect to be able to set it going ourselves.

With regard to the repairs to the crest of the dam we think it would be unwise to have the work done in bad weather, the chance might be seized of undertaking it should a definite spell of fine weather appear to set in or otherwise it should be postponed until after next spring. Such postponement will not interfere with the completion of the work at the filters and it will in fact give a further period for observation of the improvement of which may continue to develop.

We have sent a full list of the works to be completed to the Borough Surveyor for his information.

The following is a list of the works to be completed—

- 1 Remove strutting in tunnel piece by piece using a deflectometer to watch effect on roof
- 2 Leave tunnel under observation for another month or two if it appears to be 'taking up' if roof at "A" and east wall at

ARE WE INTERESTED IN OUR BAND?

Some time ago we asked where the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band once the pride of the Old Boro', had disappeared to. On Sunday last that question was answered when we were the guest of the Committee at the Bandroom, Cross Bridge Street, where we attended a very enthusiastic practice by the newly-formed band.

Amongst those present were Mr Michael Clancy, UDC who is the worthy President of the Committee Rev P Farrell, C.C. the Vice-President who has done such great work in the reorganising the band, Mr James Dunne veteran member of the Committee Mr James Patterson, Mr P J Walsh, and Mr M J McHugh, Bandmaster, who has rendered such sterling services to the band for a long number of years. It gave us great pleasure to see so many older members of the band, and so many new young members present.

In a short address to the members Mr. Clancy said that there was no reason why Dungarvan should not boast of a band as good if not better than those of other centres in Ireland. There was plenty of talent in the town and a great tradition behind the band which had won the coveted Gilburne Silver Cup for Brass Bands some years ago. He appealed to the members to attend their practices regularly and to become as proficient as possible.

Rev Fr Farrell in his address said that his time was almost fully occupied in other activities but still he found time to look after the band and if he was able to do this he saw no reason why the members should not be able to find the time to attend their practices. They had reorganised the band and had two classes going for younger members some of whom were almost ready to take their places in the band. He said that the radio and Cinema had proved to be adverse elements in the organising of local bands. Years ago towns took a particular pride in their brass bands, but that did not seem to be the case now which was to be regretted. He made a strong appeal to the members to come along as often as possible to practice and to help the committee which were doing so much to bring the band before the public as good as it was in the old days if not better.

In a few words we referred to the fact that the Band would be celebrating its Golden Jubilee in a few years time and appealed to the older and younger band members to help the Committee who were doing so much in providing such a fine musical education to be had for the taking. Some of the present committee were veteran members who were present when the band was started nearly fifty years ago and it said a lot for their enthusiasm and their loyalty to the cause of music that they had interested themselves throughout all these years. We also said that it was a pity that our people were not more musically-minded, but it was up to the band to do this by providing good recitals in our Park and Town Hall. It was a pleasure to see so many youngsters interesting themselves and we concluded by saying that we hoped that in a short time the young boys of the town would flock in such numbers to join the band and avail themselves of a fine free musical education that a waiting list would have to be opened.

Other items which we learned about during our visit were the thorough training imparted by Bandmaster McHugh to his young proteges, the very high cost entailed in repairing and maintaining instruments, and the necessity for full and regular attendances at practices. We also learned that the Committee hopes to have the band ready for a series of recitals during next summer.

CO COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1942

WHEREAS It is enacted by sub-section (1) of section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930) that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the application of the council of a county or a county borough prohibit for reasons stated in such application the taking or destroying either generally or in any particular parts or part thereof of the eggs of any wild bird or any particular kinds or kind of wild bird

AND WHEREAS Mr Commissioner Moynihan acting as the Council of the County of Waterford has applied to the Minister for Justice to make an order prohibiting in each of the years 1943 1944 1945 1946 and 1947 in the County of Waterford the taking or destroying of the eggs of the following wild birds that is to say—

—though peregrine falcon owls (all kinds) goldfinch siskin crossbill raven kingfisher nightjar and turtle dove for the reason that the said wild birds are owing to the great increase in the number of egg collectors, subject to great persecution

NOW I Gerald Boland Minister for Justice in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930 (No 16 of 1930) and of every other power me in this behalf enabling for the reason that the said wild birds are owing to the great increase in the number of egg collectors subject to great persecution, do hereby order as follows—

- 1 This order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order, 1942
- 2 The Interpretation Act 1937 (No 38 of 1937) applies to the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Oireachtas
- 3 No person shall in any part of the County of Waterford take or destroy in any of the years 1943 1944 1945, 1946 and 1947 the eggs of any of the following wild birds that is to say—though peregrine falcon owls (all kinds) goldfinch, siskin crossbill raven, kingfisher nightjar and turtle dove

Not Impossible

SOME years ago if you were to tell our farmers that this country would soon be producing almost 700 000 acres of wheat half that amount of potatoes 200 000 acres of barley and 938 000 acres of oats, they would tell you that you were having a flight of fancy as no such thing could be done. It was pronounced an impossibility then but present results show us that this has been achieved with aims for larger yields in potatoes oats and barley for 1944

Farmers have undoubtedly performed a magnificent service to the Nation and their efforts cannot be too highly appreciated by the metropolitan and urban dweller. But farmers now as ever love to have their grouse as practically every other branch of trade and industry does. Allowing for this there is no gain-saying that the majority of them have done their bit and we are sure will continue to stand by the country and its needs until the emergency passes

The necessity for being self-sufficient as far as food requirements go cannot be too strongly or too often reiterated. Whatever available shipping space there is for imports from outside countries is very badly needed to bring in raw materials to keep our industries going and as can be seen from past events there is no surety that a ship leaving a foreign port with a cargo for this country will ever arrive

Therefore no chances can be taken if we are to keep the spectre of want and hunger—which unfortunately stalks rampant in other countries—from hovering in our midsts. Problems and difficulties of production can be surmounted and the required amount produced and it is far better to make the sacrifices now no matter how great, than to be sorry afterwards when it is too late

This is the beginning of a series of six lectures arranged by the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee in conjunction with the Royal Dublin Society's Extension Lecture Scheme to be given throughout the County during the present Session

The lecture which was illustrated by lantern slides, dealt in a straightforward and non-technical manner with the various types of modern seed mixtures for new and improved strains of grasses and clovers the effects on yields and quality of pasture of soil and manuring management including grazing resting mowing, cultivation, etc

At the conclusion of the lecture the Professor answered questions put by his audience on the interesting points he had raised

It was interesting to note how anxiously those with individual problems discussed ways and means with the Professor after the lecture

The next lecture in this series will be given by Dr McKay D Sc who will lecture on 'Common Diseases of the Potato Crop' at Dungarvan and Cappoquin Technical Schools on 15th and 16th inst
