DEATH OF REV. J CROTTY, PP., KILROSSANTÝ

The news of the unexpected death of Rev John Crotty, PP Kilrossanty which oc curred at the Parochial House on Sunday December 5th came as a severe shock not only to his parishioners but to the people of the whole Diocese of Waterford and Lismore

The late Father Crotty was a most revered Pastor loved by all his flock for his devout and all his flock for his devout and amiable priestly qualities. Born in 1881 in Lismore he was ordained at St Johns Waterford, from where he went to serve at curate on the Liverpool Mission. During the last world war he served as Chaplain in the British Army and on heing the British Army and on being the British Army and on being recalled he was appointed successively as curate at Dunhill Cappoquin and Clogheen
In 1937 his great capabilities as a priest were recognised when he was appointed Parish Priest

he was appointed Parish Priest of Kilrossanty During the past six years his method of admin istering to the spiritual needs of his flock endeared him to all who resided within the bounds of his parish and his death coming so unexpectedly in his sixty-second year, has been a sore blow to them and to the Diocese

He was brother-in-law to Professor John Marcus O Sullivan Killarney former Minister for Education and a cousin of Very Rev M C Canon Crotty PP VF Cahir (former PP of Abbeyside), and to these and the other relatives of the deceased Priest—we offer our sincerest sympathy.

On Monday evening the mortal on Monday evening the mortal remains of a priest, revered and loved by his parishioners were accompanied by a cortege representative of practically every family in the parish and drawn from neighbouring parishes also when they were removed from when they were removed from his late residence to the Palish Church of Kilrossanty and on Tuesday morning they all gathered once more to pay their final tributes as he was laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery. The attendance testified to the high esteem in which the late The attendance testified to the high esteem in which the late Father Crotty wis held in all districts. On all sides nothing could be heard but expressions of sorrow for the parishioners at the passing of their beloved pastor.

CO COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1942

WHEREAS it is enacted by sub-section (1) of section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act. 1930 (No 16 of 1930) that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the application of the council of a county or a county borough, prohibit for reasons stated in such application the taking or destroying either generally or in any particular parts or part thereof of the eggs of any wild bird or any parti-cular kinds or kind of wild bird

AND WHEREAS Mr Commissioner Moynihan acting as the Council of the County of Waterford has applied to the Minister for Justice to make an order prohibiting in each of the years 1943, 1944, 1945, 1946 and 1947, in the County of Waterford the taking or destroying of the eggs of the following wild birds that is to say—chough. birds that is to say —chough, peregrine falcon owls (all kinds), goldfinch siskin crossbill raven kingfisher nightjar and turtle-dove for the reason that the said wild birds are owing to the great increase in the number of egg collectors sub-

1 This order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order 1942

2 The Interpretation Act, 1937 (No 38 of 1937 applies to the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies to in like manner as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Olreachtas

3 No person shall in any part of the County of Water-ford take or destroy in any of the years 1943, 1944 1945 1946 and 1947 the eggs of any of the following wild birds, that is to say —chough personne following the personne follo say —chough, peregrine fal-con owls (all kinds) goldfinch siskin crossbill raven, king-fisher, nightjar, and turtle-

Having been recalled from the English Mission, and served for a period as Curate in Dunhill, Father Crotty, was translated to Cappoquin as CC, where he remained for about 9½ years, before being sent to Clogheen, from where he was promoted. from where he was promoted P.P. of Kilrossanty about six years ago

During his long period of nearly 10 years in Cappoquin he enjoyed wonderful popularity with all classes of the parishioners Of a kind, genial and most affectionate disposition, he was always easily approachable, more especially by the poor, to whom he was ever a ready and sympathetic benefactor

His great zeal and sanctity as his unbridled spirit of generosity and charity, which knew no and charity, which knew no bounds in the case of the poor and needy. He was surely, one of those who loved to do good by stealth and blushed to find it fame but the ever-flowing fountain of his generosity was well-known to all, and he was, assuredly, one of the most esteemed and beloved Priests known in Cappoguin for many known in Cappoquin for many vears

MARGARET O'SULLIVAN—
The decision of the High Court
in this claim was given in favour of the plaintiff on Wednesday last 8th inst The plaintiff was given judgment for £298 12s and her costs. The proceedings were a claim by the plaintiff for 12 years wages against the Estate of the late Alice Draper deceased The late Alice Draper was the proprietress of the Commercial Hotel Dungarvan The case for the plaintiff was that since the year 1926 she had only been paid small sums amounting to about £46 on account of her wages and that there were due to her 12 years wages at the rate of £50 per year to-gether with interest on all such

The defendants case was that no such wages were in fact due The case had a very lengthy hearing. The Judge in the course of his summing up said that he was satisfied that the plaintiff had been a good and faithful servant to her late employer but that the courts were bound to investigate all such claims to the very fullest extent It is necessary in order to succeed to have corroboration for every detail of the plaintiff s claim and as in this case there was no corroboration that the deceased agreed to pay £52 a year but there was corroboration that she was owed a considerable sum of money and that

MOLONEY V HILLIARD AND THE OCEAN ACCIDENT & GUARANTEE CORPORATION

A settlement in the above pro-A settlement in the above proceedings was made a rule of the High Court on 6th inst. In these proceedings Mrs. Catherine Moloney of Lisfennel Dungarvan was the plaintiff and Miss Mary Catherine Hilliard Friary Street.— Dungarvan—and The Ocean Insurance Company the defendants. defendants

The defendants the Ocean Insurance Company agreed to pay without admission of liability a sum of £330 to cover damages and £200 to cover costs and expenses to the plaintiff The proceedings plaintiff The proceedings arose out of an accident at Mitchel Street Dungarvan on the 3rd of October 1940 Plaintiff tiff was cycling home and while crossing the road to the shop of Mr Michael Ryan she was knocked off her bicycle by a car driven by the defendant, Miss Hilliard Proceedings were first instituted against Miss Hilliard The Insurance Company repudiated liability on the grounds that Miss Hilliard's car was only insured for pleasure purposes but was being used for business purposes at the time of the accident Proceedings were first commenced against Miss Hilallowed judgment to be given against her by default It then became necessary to take separate proceedings against the Insurance Company under the Insurance Company under the Provisions of the Road Traffic Act 1933 to make them liable on foot of the policy This was one of the first cases in which such a point was raised in the High Court Ultimately the Insurance Company agreed to the foregoing settlement without any admission of liability so that the legal point raised has not so far been tested in the High Court
