Death Of Mrs. Bridget Boyle, Dungarvan

ACTING COUNTY SECRETARY BEREAVED

Sincere and widespread regret has been occasioned by the death of Mrs. Bridget Boyle which occurred at her residence O'Connell St. Dungarvan early on Thursday morning last, Dec 9th. By her death another one of the old and true stock of our town and county has been removed.

Deceased was relict of the late John F. Boyle who was formerly Secretary of the Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture and Technical Instruction, and also County Accountant. She was an outstanding Nationalist and was a descendant of the famous Clann Buidhes—the McGrath family of Boulavouinteen. During the troubled times in Ireland her house was ever open to the gallant fighters on the run and was used as a headquarters by the IRA. Subsequent to the Burgery ambush, hers was one of the four houses which the Black-and-Tans raided and smashed up because she refused to pay the levy of £100 imposed by the British regime at the time.

The late Mrs. Boyle who had reached the fine age of ninety years was mother of our Acting County Council Secretary Mr. T. B. Boyle of Mr. John Boyle, New York Miss Hannah Boyle Newsagent O'Connell St. and organist at St. Marys Parish Church Mrs. Mansfield wife of Mr. Jim Mansfield District Leader L.D.F. St. Garvans Tee and of Mrs. John O'Donnell Summerhill Waterford.

Her family connections are spread all over the county and reside in many parts of the world and to these and to the Hanrahan families of Caherbrack and Ballinamult (nieces and nephews) Mrs. M. A. Power Touraneena Messrs. Emmett and Jack Power Mrs. Power Ballinacoush The Kirwan families (late of Kilclooney) and of Ballyduff Kilmeaden and Mrs. McConville and family Caherbrack, Ballinamult sincere sympathy is now extended. The remains will be removed to St. Marys Parish Church on today (Friday) at 4 p.m., and the interment will be made after Requiem Office and High Mass at 10.31 a.m. on Saturday Solas na bhFlaitheas d'a h-anam

LATE LORY DWYER, O'CONNELL STREET, DUNGARVAN

As announced in our last issue deaths heavy hand fell unexpectedly on one of Dungarvan's most popular and esteemed inhabitants last week, when Mr. Laurence (Lory) Dwyer O'Connell St. Dungarvan, was called to his eternal reward on Wednesday Dec 1st.

Lory was a gentleman and a sportsman to his finger-tips, and his grand characteristics as such, earned for him a high place in the esteem of all those whose pleasure it was to know him. He was a member of the Dungarvan Commercial Club where his company was ever sought and in the realms of sport he was an ardent follower of the long-tails and was one of the pillars of the Dungarvan Coursing Club.

He was a member of the firm of Dwyer Murphy and Flynn Victuallers O'Connell Street, Dungarvan and in the course of his business as a cattle dealer and pig-buyer, he travelled all over Munster and was a well-known figure at all the principle fairs and markets.

Lory was beloved of all who knew him and his warm handshake and hearty manner made him the dove of many hearts. His charity knew no bounds and he was ever ready to help the lame dog over the stile. This he did without ostentation but with a sincere willingness Rich and poor young and old alike all had a love and respect for him above the ordinary.

On Thursday evening Dec 2nd his mortal remains were removed from his late residence to St. Marys Parish Church and were accompanied by a cortege drawn from every locality in town and from many of the surrounding areas and representative of all section of the community.

Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien P.P. V.F., assisted by Rev. D. McGrath and Rev. Fr. M. O'Meara, C.C. Kilgobinet, met and blessed the coffin.

CO COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1942

WHEREAS it is enacted by sub-section (1) of section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930 (No 16 of 1930) that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the application of the council of a county or a county borough, prohibit for reasons stated in such application the taking or destroying either generally or in any particular parts or part thereof of the eggs of any wild bird or any particular kinds or kind of wild bird AND WHEREAS Mr Commissioner Moynihan acting as the Council of the County of Waterford has applied to the Minister for Justice to make an order prohibiting in each of the years 1943 1944, 1945, 1946 and 1947, in the County of Waterford the taking or destroying of the eggs of the following wild birds that is to say—chough, peregrine falcon owls (all kinds), goldfinch siskin crossbill raven kingfisher nightjar and turtle-dove for the reason that the said wild birds are owing to the great increase in the number of egg collectors subject to great persecution

NOW, I Gerald Boland, Minister for Justice in exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 7 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930), and of every any other power me in this behalf enabling for the reason that the said wild birds are owing to the great increase in the number of egg collectors subject to great persecution, do hereby order as follows—
1 This order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order 1942
2 The Interpretation Act, 1937 (No 38 of 1937) applies to the interpretation of this Order in like manner as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of the Oireachtas
3 No person shall in any part of the County of Waterford take or destroy in any of the years 1943, 1944 1945 1946 and 1947 the eggs of any of the following wild birds, that is to say—chough, peregrine falcon owls (all kinds) goldfinch siskin crossbill raven, kingfisher, nightjar, and turtle-dove

THE DEATH OF FATHER JOHN CROTTY, PP

The sad news of the sudden death of Rev John Crotty PP Kilrossanty, caused a painful shock to all classes of the townspeople here when it became known on Sunday.

Deceased was son of the late Mr John Crotty Draper, Lismore who was a noted sportsman in his time, and was President of the famous Blackwater Ramblers Football team, Lismore when they were in their prime between 40 and 50 years ago. Father Crotty was therefore, first cousin of the Very Rev

Michael C Canon Crotty, PP, VF, Cahir, (formerly of Abbey-side), and of Mr Thos Crotty, Chairman of Lismore Town Commissioners, and was also related to Mrs Drohan, Gas Works Lismore, Mrs P Ormonde, Tallow, and other well-known West Waterford families, and was brother-in-law of Professor O'Sullivan, Killarney, who was Minister for Education in the Cosgrave Government.

Having been recalled from the English Mission, and served for a period as Curate in Dunhill, Father Crotty, was translated to Cappoquin as C.C., where he remained for about 9 1/2 years, before being sent to Clogheen, from where he was promoted P.P., of Kilrossanty about six years ago.

During his long period of nearly 10 years in Cappoquin he enjoyed wonderful popularity with all classes of the parishioners. Of a kind, genial and most affectionate disposition, he was always easily approachable, more especially by the poor, to whom he was ever a ready and sympathetic benefactor.

His great zeal and sanctity as a Priest were only equalled by his unbridled spirit of generosity and charity, which knew no bounds in the case of the poor and needy. He was surely, one of those who loved to do good by stealth and blushed to find it fame but the ever-flowing fountain of his generosity was well-known to all, and he was, assuredly, one of the most esteemed and beloved Priests known in Cappoquin for many years.

He loved the people here, too, (Continued on Page Four)

The case for the plaintiff was that since the year 1926 she had only been paid small sums amounting to about £46 on account of her wages and that there were due to her 12 years wages at the rate of £50 per year together with interest on all such arrears. The defendant's case was that no such wages were in fact due. The case had a very lengthy hearing. The Judge in the course of his summing up said that he was satisfied that the plaintiff had been a good and faithful servant to her late employer but that the courts were bound to investigate all such claims to the very fullest extent. It is necessary in order to succeed to have corroboration for every detail of the plaintiff's claim and as in this case there was no corroboration that the deceased agreed to pay £52 a year but there was corroboration that she was owed a considerable sum of money and that she had been paid at the rate of £30 per year up to 1923 he gave judgment for the amount aforesaid with costs.

MOLONEY V HILLIARD AND THE OCEAN ACCIDENT & GUARANTEE CORPORATION LTD

A settlement in the above proceedings was made a rule of the High Court on 6th inst. In these proceedings Mrs Catherine Moloney of Lisfennel, Dungarvan was the plaintiff and Miss Mary Catherine Hilliard Friary Street, Dungarvan and The Ocean Insurance Company the defendants.

The defendants the Ocean Insurance Company agreed to pay without admission of liability a sum of £330 to cover damages and £200 to cover costs and expenses to the plaintiff. The proceedings arose out of an accident at Mitchell Street, Dungarvan on the 3rd of October 1940. Plaintiff was cycling home and while crossing the road to the shop of Mr Michael Ryan she was knocked off her bicycle by a car driven by the defendant, Miss Hilliard. Proceedings were first instituted against Miss Hilliard. The Insurance Company repudiated liability on the grounds that Miss Hilliard's car was only insured for pleasure purposes but was being used for business purposes at the time of the accident. Proceedings were first commenced against Miss Hilliard who allowed judgment to be given against her by default. It then became necessary to take separate proceedings against the Insurance Company under the Provisions of the Road Traffic Act 1933 to make them liable on foot of the policy. This was one of the first cases in which such a point was raised in the High Court. Ultimately the Insurance Company agreed to the foregoing settlement without any admission of liability so that the legal point raised has not so far been tested in the High Court.

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Irish Tourist Association HOLIDAY SAVINGS JOINT COMMITTEE FORMED

A Holiday Savings Joint Committee composed of representatives of Employers, Trade Unions and Railways has been formed in Dublin in furtherance of the Irish Tourist Association's Scheme for the promotion of Holiday Savings Clubs in Industrial and Commercial Concerns. The Committee is as follows: D. Barry, Secretary, Irish Tourist Association, A. M. Summerfield, President, Federation of Irish Manufacturers, J. O'Brien, Secretary, Federated Employers Ltd, M. A. Foley, Traffic Superintendent, Great Northern Railways, F. Robinson, Great Southern Railways, Cathal O'Shannon, Secretary, Irish Trade Union Congress, F. Robins, Secretary, Dublin District Council, I.T.G.W. Union, J. Collins, Irish Union of Distributive Workers and Clerks, P. Cairns, General Secretary, Civil Service Clerical Association, J. Kiernan, Organiser, Irish Tourist Association.

The Committee in co-operation with the Irish Tourist Association will act in an advisory capacity and contribute suggestions towards the greater expansion of the Scheme through the organisations they represent. They will further co-operate in the preparation of plans for the 'Staggering of Holidays' in Industries, so that the difficulties experienced by Holiday Makers in the peak months will be solved by special reduced tariffs offered to Holiday Clubs and general traffic by caterers during the months of May, June and September. The Railway Companies will also be asked to co-operate in this matter. Suitable propaganda will be undertaken towards that end and employers will be asked to provide opportunities to the I.T.A. to address their employees and present them with Film Shows covering Holiday Savings Club Organisation, the attractions offered by Ireland's seaside and other resorts.

In the latter respect the I.T.A. Film Unit is available free of charge to all groups of Employees throughout the country.

Copies of the Irish Tourist Association Holiday Savings Club Scheme are available on demand. The Schemes are designed to meet the needs of Irish Industry generally, the main objectives being to encourage workers to save regularly for their Annual Holidays and ultimately to secure for them all possible concessions in the matter of charges for accommodation, transport and facilities at Irish Resorts.

The Irish Tourist Association takes this opportunity to request Firms who are operating a Holiday Savings Club to send the Association full details.

NOTICE OF CHANGE IN COUPON CHANGES

One of the resolutions passed at the recent Convention of R.G.D.A.T.A. (The Retail Grocery Dairy and Allied Trades Association) has already borne fruit. Mr Cathal Loughney, General Secretary of the

Association has now been officially informed by the Department of Supplies that the Minister has agreed to the Association's request for longer notice of changes in the coupon pages from time to time. At present three or four days notice is given but in future an announcement will normally be made at least two weeks in advance. The Minister's decision will be particularly welcomed in the provinces where country customers were often unaware of the changes until they came to town for their week's rations. County Traders will now be able to advise such customers a week in advance.

PRICES FOR RYE-GRASS SEED

The Minister for Agriculture has by Order fixed maximum and minimum prices for home-produced unmaimed rye-grass seed.

For perennial rye-grass seed the maximum price is 42/6 per cwt and the minimum 35/6 per cwt. For mixed perennial and Italian rye-grass seed the maximum is 45/- a cwt and the minimum 35/6 per cwt.

The prices apply irrespective of whether the seed is sold or bought at grower's farm or at nearest market or free on rail or at machiner's warehouse.
