**Urban Council Dwellers Cause**  
Tresspass  
Mr Farrell, solicitor acting for Mr P. Ryan, Mitchell St, Dungarvan against Wm Crotty Senior Loughmore, and Thomas Mooney Cathal Brugha Place said that his client had suffered more trespass from the Urban Council dwellers up there. The trespasses occurred on Oct 12th and 28th.

Mr M. Ryan proved the offences and the Justice fined Crotty 2/- with 20/- costs, and Mooney 1/-, with 20/- costs.

**Marked Sods Tell A Tale**  
Thomas Cotter Curraun, Kilrossanty was charged by Supt O'Mahony with stealing turf,

valued at 7/- from Denis Cleary, Boolattin on Nov 7th last

Clearly in evidence said he was a farmer and had turf stored in some of his farm. He missed one of the turf and made a complaint to the Guards.

Sergt Tierney said that as a result of the complaint he went to the house where the turf was and marked some sods by inserting strands of wire into them. Later he then went to defendant's house where he found some of the marked sods. He questioned defendant who then admitted taking 2 bags.

Defendant said that the weather was bad and the turf he had himself was wet and no good.

Justice—And you thought to take this man's turf?

Defendant—No.

Justice—You just took it on loan I suppose (laughter).

Defendant—The weather was bad.

To the Justice the Sergt described defendant as a casual labourer married and with four children.

Justice—I should really send you to jail and if I put a big fine on you it is the children will suffer. I will adjourn the case until January and in the meantime you must pay back 4/-.

### A Cock That Wandered

Mary Walsh 12 Loughmore was charged with the larceny of a fowl valued at 7/- the property of Michael Whelan a neighbour living at 18, Loughmore.

M. P. J. Morrissey solicitor for defendant admitted the offence and said that the money for the fowl was lodged in court. He said that defendant was a married woman and the cock came into her yard and she took it and sold it for 5/3 which was its market value at a local poultry shop.

Supt O'Mahony who prosecuted agreed that this was the value of the cock.

M. Whelan gave evidence and the Justice addressing him said "You'll get your 5/3 and you see what happens when your fowl trespass. Be sure and keep them at home in future (laughter)."

### Noxious Weeds

The Minister for Agriculture at the suit of Mr L. F. Lanigan solicitor acting for the State, prosecuted Wm Donovan Kilmolash, Dungarvan, M. Tobin Balmalinda Cappagh, M. Ryan Lauragh John Sullivan, Ballyguiry M. Ronayne, Coolcormac Kate Morrissey, Ballymacmae Catherine Moloney Lisfenell M. Slatery Ballygagh Laurence Curran Bawolnahorna John Beresford Kilmolash N. Beresford, Coolinahorna N. Beresford Skeachrine and Patk Hogan Ballinacourt, under the Noxious Weeds Act.

An appearance for each defendant was put in except for Mr N. Beresford, Skeachrine and pleas put forward that due to heavy harvest operations weeds had been neglected.

The Justice said that he agreed it was a very hard year on farmers who in the circumstances, did very well and he marked all the cases P.O.A. except that of N. Beresford, Skeachrine who was an old offender and whom he would fine 40/-.

Costs were allowed in all cases. A laugh was caused when the Justice questioning Mr M. Ronayne Coolcormac asked if he had done his tillage.

Defendant—Oh I did, if I didn't I'd catch it.

**No Evidence of Receiving To Convict**  
In the case of Supt. O'Mahony against Philip Dunne Fair Lane Dungarvan for the larceny of Detective Officer Barry's bicycle, and six bags of cement from the UDC Mr Farrell solicitor applied for a further adjournment to enable accused to complete his payments.

Supt Mahony said that the case was hanging fire long enough.

Justice—When the money is paid he needn't think he can walk out scot free and the sooner he gets that out of his head the better.

The case was again adjourned to the January Court.

## UNEXPECTED DEATH OF MR. JOHN J. MORRISSEY, O'CONNELL STREET

### Imposing Funeral Cortège

Since noon on Friday last December 10th, Dungarvan, and indeed many parts of the county, have mourned the death of Mr. John J. Morrissey well-known farmer, and victualler, of 88, O'Connell St. Dungarvan.

He had been ailing for some time but his death came like a thief in the night, and as a result we have lost a noted and brilliant sportsman, a true Irish gentleman, and one of the best-liked of a great Catholic family, which has made its mark in the County for generations.

Son of the late Mr. Patrick Morrissey who predeceased him by only two years John Morrissey was born in the old homestead at Killosera 61 years ago. Showing early initiative which proved such a successful factor all through his life he went to Ballymacmae where he farmed for himself and from that time forward he never looked back. In 1915 he started as a victualler in Dungarvan and again his great judgment and foresight proved an outstanding asset to him—and since then and up to the time of his lamented death all his projects and undertakings went from success to success.

Sprung from such an honourable family he had connections all over the county and was related to the late Rev. David Morrissey the late Rev. Francis O'Brien P.P. Dungarvan, and the late Rev. Henry P. P. P. Modest, who was his cousin, the illustrious Dr. Hennebery one of the founders of Ring College.

As a young boy in the calm and peaceful atmosphere of the family homestead at Killosera he learned the first lessons which later helped him to develop into one of the leading sportsmen of the County.

He loved a good day's shooting and was a sound judge of all classes of game dogs which made a name for him at contests in many parts of Ireland. But his sporting activities were not confined to this as he was also a very keen horseman. His pride was a good horse properly groomed and cared for and his great ability in training horses was proved by the fact that on 6 successive occasions at the Dungarvan Show he won the driving competition with six different horses. He was a beating the horse which he had entered the previous year.

He travelled far and wide and everywhere he went he became a firm favourite which was a great tribute to his personality and probity. A democrat to his fingers tips he met rich man and poor high and low with the same hearty handshake and smile and he never allowed the extraordinary success which attended all his deals and which made him a man of wealth to change him. A feature of his character was his loyalty to his employees who loved him for what he was. One of these, Mr. Tommy Hanrahan has been with him for close on half a century.

John Morrissey was a man who loved the company of men who preferred nothing better than the open country and a good day's sport and later in life when he was not well the hardest part of his illness was the fact that he could not be about and moving with the vigour that his healthy mind demanded.

He was an ardent follower of our Gaelic games and was loved by all true Gaels in this county. He was an honourable member of the Dungarvan Hurling and Football Club ever since his association with the games of the Gael.

A man who did well by himself and others it is difficult to realize that he has gone from amongst us. Let us pray that he has gone to the reward which his good actions in this life so richly-merited for him.

On Saturday evening last his mortal remains were removed to St. Mary's Mortuary Chapel followed by a cortege of immense proportions among whom were

people of all stations in life.

Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P. V.F. Rev. Frs. Farrell, Corbett, Law and O'Meara, received the coffin, Knocknower, on Sunday morning all that remained of John Morrissey was conveyed from the Mortuary by his four sons and reverently laid in their last resting place beside his father who was buried there in February 1941. The Churchyard was thronged with capacity with mourning relatives and friends. Canon O'Brien recited the last prayers. To his bereaved widow sons and other relatives our sincere sympathy is extended in their great loss and sad bereavement.

On Monday morning Requiem Office and Solemn High Mass was celebrated for the happy repose of his soul.

In 1920 he returned to Ireland and was appointed to Bray Parish Co Wicklow

In the year 1923 soon after the formation of the Army he was appointed Chaplain and for many years won the esteem and affection of large numbers of Army personnel from Dungarvan and Waterford areas. In 1940 he was appointed Head Chaplain a position which he occupies at present

sols produced witnesses from Messrs M Moloney and M Cummins to prove that 6 bags of cement had been purchased by the Daltons

Justice—On the evidence before me it would not be right or fair to convict on what is a very serious charge

Future Offenders Warned Mrs Eileen Conway Sheares St Abbesside Mrs Hick do and Mrs S Griffin Friary St Dungarvan were charged with entering and removing timber value at 10/- from the wood at Cloncoskane on Nov 26th

Mr Morrissey solr, was for defendants and said that clients did not appear in court due to a family bereavement

As there was no timber to be got in town they went out and cut a bough of a tree which they divided He denied that they took 10/- worth

Supt O'Mahony conducting the prosecution said that there were 5 cwt of a chestnut tree and something should be done to stop it as it was very annoying to Miss Nugent and the authorities

Miss Nugent was not the owner of the wood and was only a trustee placed there by the High Court and some day will have to render an account of her stewardship

He said that when these people go to the wood they are not satisfied to take the bracken or even to cut what is near the ground but will only cut the wood at a convenient height in order not to over exert themselves

As a result many trees had been destroyed Miss Nugent who was in the court said she would be satisfied if people would stay away altogether

The Justice adjourned the case generally for 3 months with the right to re-enter He praised Miss Nugent for having been so generous to the poor of the town and issued a strong warning to anyone caught cutting trees there without permission or destroying the demense wall stating that they would be dealt with severely

Unlicensed Bull John Dunphy, Klossera, was fined 20/- with 2 costs for having an unlicensed Friesian bull Mr L F Lanigan solr prosecuted on behalf of the State Solr and Farrell and Morrissey solrs defended

Bookshot at Plough Costs £4 Supt P O'Mahony summoned John Wright Loughmore with causing malicious damage to a plough, the property of Mr P Ryan Mitchell St Dungarvan Damage to the extent of 31/6 was done

Mr J F Kenny, solr appeared for Wright Supt O'Mahony stated that defendant was charged by Mr Ryan with trespassing on his field and last Saturday the Guards got a decree to execute but then defendant had not the money to pay and promised to pay by instalments

That evening defendant went to Mr Ryan's field and with a stone broke the board of a plough Mr Kenny—We did break the plough and we admit the act, but we deny it was malicious

Wright was putting in a horse to the field knowing it was a trespass It was a moonlight night and when he was coming back he took a bookshot at the plough with the intention of breaking it but as the result of a thoughtless urge

Messrs Farrell and Morrissey solrs for Mr Ryan said that not alone did his client suffer the loss of the plough but also two days ploughing Mr Kenny—We had no reason for malice

Justice—I wouldn't believe that as there was malice sticking out I'm considering whether I should send him to jail Mr Kenny—I would ask your wisdom to deal with him leniently on account of his wife

Justice—This is a very serious offence especially now when farm implements are so scarce Wright said he couldn't help it as he just fired the stone

Justice—And it went to the plough itself—Why don't you tell the truth There's no use in lying All those men up there are a nuisance

Justice to defendant—How long will it take you to pay £4 Defendant—I could pay 4/- a week

Supt O'Mahony—He is earning 15/- a day with his horse Justice—I will adjourn the case until the second court in January and you must have the £4 paid by then It won't be easy on you but I don't want to be and if I paid I'll take it into account when dealing with you then The farther away you keep from Ryan's field in future the better

What It Might Have Been The Attorney General at the suit of Supt O'Mahony charged John Dunphy Klossera, and John Dunphy Mitchell St Dungarvan that on Dec 2nd, at Mitchell Street Dungarvan, they did (1) assault Guard T Burke in the execution of his duties by striking him with their fists (2) Rescue the head of cattle which had been taken in execution of a court order and (3) resist obstruct or impede court messenger J Breen in the lawful execution of a court order

to defendant's lands to execute a decree Instead of seizing the cattle at once as they could have done, they agreed to wait until 4 p.m. to give Dunphy a chance of raising the money to pay the decree

At 4.30 p.m. there was no sign of Dunphy or the money so they proceeded to town with the 11 head of cattle to put them in the pound /At Mitchell Street they met the Dunphys who started to drive the cattle back in which they were successful

The elder Dunphy hit the Guard in the chest 'The State forces reorganised and went after the cattle which they came on about half-a-mile on the road from town and brought them back He also stated that defendant came several times to the barrack since apologising for his actions He was not vicious in any way and was a respectable man

Mr Farrell solr said that Dunphy's attempt to hit the Guard was very feeble The day of the seizure he came to town to raise money and failed but got fighting drunk He went to a funeral and unfortunately saw his cattle coming down Mitchell Street and went to drive them back

On the whole he is a decent man who is highly excitable and not at all stable when drunk Mr Lanigan solr for the younger Dunphy said that unfortunately his client got drunk that day and did not realise what he was doing

Justice—He is very lucky that the Supt speaks of him as he does otherwise he would be going off to spend Christmas in Limerick It is a serious thing to obstruct a Court Messenger and if defendants were arraigned before the Circuit Court they would be liable to fines of £100 or 12 months hard labour or both

The maximum penalty of 6 months or £50 and or 6 months so that from these it can be seen how serious the charge is

Stating that defendants were getting out easily he fined them 40/- each and allowed 11/- costs Mr Farrell guaranteed the fines

Lyng Like A Trooper "Michael Carleton (16) of 12 St. Egidie's Ice, Dungarvan was charged by Supt O'Mahony that on April 2nd last he did steal from John Bransfield Publican O'Connell St. 1 bottle of whisky at £1 1 bottle of Port Wine at 7 6 six candles at 1/6 1 doz empty stout bottles at 2/-

(2) 2 coats for hanging at Road he did steal a pump at 12/6 property of Miss B Christopher Stella Maris" and (3) In Oct or Nov at Convent Road he did steal a pump at 17/6 the property of Miss Sim

Messrs Farrell & Morrissey solrs for the defendant stated that they admitted stealing the 2 pumps but denied taking the whiskey and said that their client made a statement saying he did take it at the Garda Station because he was frightened

Mr John Bransfield in evidence said that on April 2nd last whiskey and wine valued at 23/- was taken off shelves inside the counter of his bar

Sergt Teahan said that he questioned Carleton about the whiskey at the barracks He did not interfere with him in any way Witness read a statement made by Carleton admitting taking the bottles of whiskey and wine and taking the counter to the back of Convent's forge He made those statements voluntarily which agreed with the evidence of Mr Bransfield

Mr Farrell—He was questioned about a pump?—Yes How long was he in the barracks?—I was not there 3 or 4 hours?—I don't think so

How many Guards were around him?—There were 5 or 6 in the room He broke down?—Yes Did a 1/2p threat to put him in the cells?—No not to my knowledge

Were you there all the time?—No Wasn't it peculiar that he should say this?—I would not mind what he said Sergt didn't you suggest to Bransfield's?—No Didn't he deny it at first?—Yes

And you kept at him for a long time?—I questioned him for a while And you tried to make him assert that he had taken a parcel from a bicycle outside about that

Wasn't he asked about the alleged larceny of £100 from a man named Murphy too?—Yes Supt—Even though he was asked about these others he was not charged

Sergt Liddane in evidence said that defendant was very frightened and nervous when he came in and while he was in the station his mother was left in to see him While he was in the barrack no one interfered with him in anyway There was no pressure brought to make him admit stealing from Bransfield's as to the way defendant was treated in the barracks

Carleton in the box admitted taking the pumps but denied going next or near Bransfield's He said he admitted doing it when he was forced into it at the barracks

Supt—Do you know O'Neill's Pub in Mary St?—Yes Were you ever in there?—Yes Weren't you inside the counter?—No Weren't you warned by Mr O'Neill?—No

Mr Farrell objected to this question Did you run away from Det-Guard Barry in O'Connell St when he met you?—I went home

What were you questioned about at the Barracks?—About Murphy's and about a parcel of meat And you were not charged with these?—No

What about the empty bottles?—I told them a pack of lies to get out of the barracks Justice—Did Sergt Teahan bully you?—Yes

And they frightened the life out of you?—Yes Justice—It is quite evident he is lying like a trooper

Mr Farrell—His father is in England and he is coming home soon and he will be able to get the boy a position in England and on that account I would ask your worship not to send him away

Justice—He would not be such a terrible loss if he could get employment away he thieves all round him and lies and swears into the bargain

Defendant—Give me a chance sir The Justice adjourned the case to the 1st Court in January and to defendant—"You must have stolen all these things with which you are charged and it would be far better for all if you can get away You will want to mind yourself between this and then"

Defendant was ordered to pay 25/6 to Mr Bransfield before the next Court

School Attendance Guard Giblin v Margaret Burns Loughmore fined 2/6 Same v W Fitzgerald P.O.A Guard Deasy v Michael Norris Coolinsmeary, P.O.A Guard Burke v R Power Cush-cam P.O.A Same v Ed Flynn, Clonea P.O.A

Longer Danes For Town Hall Messrs J F Williams and Solr Solicitors for Dungarvan UDC applied to have the existing dance license for the Town Hall amended so as to allow dancing from 8 p.m. to 3 a.m. on one night each week during the continuance of the license

There was no objection and the application was granted Traffic Obstruction Guard Giblin summoned P Sheehan Modeligo for causing obstruction at Main Street Dungarvan by allowing his horse to remain tied to a pole A fine of 7 6 was imposed

Unlicensed Dog Daniel Stokes Killongford was summoned by Guard Giblin for keeping an unlicensed dog and a fine of 100/- mitigated to 10/- was imposed

Death Of Mrs Eileen Mulcahy, Cappoquin

POPULAR MELLERAY PROFESSOR BEAVED

A very painful shock was caused in Cappoquin on Thursday week, 9th inst, when the sad news was announced of the unexpected death of Mrs Eileen Mulcahy the beloved wife of Mr Patrick Mulcahy, B.A. one of the most popular Professors on the Teaching Staff of Mount Mellerau Seminary, Cappoquin.

Deceased was a member of an old and intellectual O Limerick family being daughter of the late Mr F Burke B.A. Kill-finnane, Co Limerick and was trained as a Teacher in Southampton England and later was a most successful Teacher in Leeds for five or six years

Returning to Ireland in 1926 she married Mr P Mulcahy B.A. after which she took up her residence in Cappoquin and quickly became one of the most esteemed young ladies in the town She shortly afterwards started a big shop business and Lending Library in the centre of the Main Street where her great business capacity and her charming and enterprising disposition won her hosts of patrons from far and near

A keen lover of sport and a lady of most attractive appearance and of a jovial and breezy manner she was one of the most popular and beloved ladies in the high place in the esteem of all during her seven years residence in the "Cornerstone"

She had enjoyed her usual good health and buoyant spirits up to Sunday night week when she contracted a chill which quickly developed into influenza and robust to her usually strong effects were feared and her recovery was being confidently looked forward to in the course of a few days so that the news of her unexpected death created a great gloom over the town on Thursday week

An ideal and exemplary Catholic all her life and a most devoted and loving wife and mother, her premature death at such an early age has now proved a severe blow to her respected husband and four children all of whom the deepest sympathy is now extended in their great loss

On Friday evening her remains were removed from her late residence to St Mary's Parish Church, Cappoquin when there was an unusually large attendance of the general public to pay a fitting mark of respect to her revered memory

The coffin was received at the Church by Rev T Dunphy C.C. and was borne by a number of Professors and Students from Mount Mellerau Seminary, and also by a number of the most prominent people of Cappoquin

On Saturday morning Solemn Requiem Mass was offered for the repose of deceased soul before a very large congregation the celebrant of the Mass being Rev T Dunphy C.C. Cappoquin the other clergymen assisting being—Very Rev M Canon Walsh P.P. F.F. Lismore Rev T Fitzgerald P.P. Cappoquin Rev P Ahearne C.C. Lismore and Rev P Hennebery, C.C. do

At 1.30 pm on that day the funeral took place to St Declan's cemetery Dromore, when there was another large and representative attendance of all classes of the public from Cappoquin, Mellerau Monalour and adjoining districts as well as mourning relatives from Killfennane Roscommon, Doneraile and various other parts of Eire, which proved the widespread regret felt over the death of this popular young lady as well as showing the deep sympathy felt for her bereaved husband and children in their great sorrow

The coffin was borne alternately around the town by a number of the Professors and Students of Mount Mellerau Seminary as a special mark of respect to their bereaved colleague the Professors present included Messrs Joseph Barry B.A. Senior Professor James O'Flanagan, B.A. M Ferrer B.A. J McCarthy B.A. H.Dip Ed, Sean Curran B.A. and Thomas F Olden while the Students were under the charge of Messrs Henry Hall, and Thos Condon Fitzgerald, P.P. and Rev T Dunphy C.C. headed the imposing cortege, the final prayers at the graveside being recited by Father Dunphy assisted by Father Fitzgerald
