The Fuel Problem

What is A 'Major Emergency'?

Mr D Coghlan Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Waterford Board of Public Assistance held at the Courthouse Dungarvan on Monday last Messrs G Torpey J Cosgrave W Kenneally Ml McGrath, and Senator J Butler were present

Mr Ml Flynn, Secretary, attended

The Ferrybank Dispensary
Arising out of the minutes concerning the dispensary at Ferrybank Mr Kenneally said that the position now was that it was "semi-open" but that this was not yet satisfactory. There is only one room being used and the patients have to stay out in the street while the doctor carries out his individual examinations inside.

Chairman—That's very unsatisfactory

Mr Kenneally—It is a fine house

Secretary—It is one of those buildings that we pay rent to the caretaker who lives there. It is surprising that there is only one room as I am sure that the old Waterford Board of Guardians would have made better arrangements than this. The letting agreement must have been made fifty years ago. Of course we can make further inquiries.

Mr Kenneally—Some regulations must be made to facilitate the 1700 people living in Ferrybank who have been going to Peter Street all along having been under the impression that the dispensary there had been closed down.

Chairman—It is an extraordinary situation that the people should not know that the dispensary was being held.

Mr Kenneally—I think that what has been will have to be forgotten but the situation must be remedied from now on. A notice advertising the days and hours must be put up.

Secretary—Mr Jephson the engineer has been instructed to have a notice board erected there.

Mr Kenneally—Another drawback is that there is no warden in the district and the people have to go to Mr McGrath.

Secretary—If my memory serves me rightly I think the caretaker is a warden.

Mr Kenneally—You would want one at Sallypark and one at Ferrybank.

Secretary—There is a warden at Ston Row Ferrybank.

Mr Kenneally—A warden should be appointed where all the new houses are.

Secretary—If you make some suggestions I will bring them to the Manager's notice.

Mr Kenneally then submitted names of persons residing at Ferrybank and Sallypark who would be suitable as wardens.

Department Of Supplies Won't Release Fuel
Referring to the resolution

passed at last meeting requesting Fuel Importers Ltd, Waterford to release some timber from the big dump at Waterford. Mr Morris wrote stating that when the Mayor and Assistant City Manager approached him on the same subject he had written to the Department of Supplies who govern all operations of Fuel Importers but they stated that the timber could not be released as it had been accumulated as an iron ration in the event of a major emergency.

Chairman—The timber there is stored in the open and won't be worth twopence if it is left there much longer.

Mr Cosgrave—What I would like to know is what is a major emergency. For the last two years the poor people have been starving and are frozen and that timber is there. It must be rotten already.

Mr Kenneally—There is something like twenty or thirty thousand tons there and they have been cutting it up for the last twelve months.

Chairman—It is absolute waste.

Mr Cosgrave—We have four TDs here—is it for fun we have them or are they anxious to do anything for the people of the city and county. They should be asked to move in the matter. The poor and the middle classes are in a terrible way. I know I find it impossible to get timber and sometimes it might be dinner time before I would get my breakfast.

Mr Kenneally—There are dumps all over the country and if the fuel is released in Waterford the same order holds good for the other centres.

Mr Cosgrave—I'm listening to that term—a major emergency—for the last four years, and I yet don't know what it means.

Mr McGrath—I suppose it means being actually involved in the war.

It was finally decided that the TDs be asked to use their influence in the matter.

Knockanore Dispensary

Mr Butler stating that Mr Heskin was unavoidably absent from the meeting asked if any communication had been received from the Department about the Knockanore Dispensary since the last meeting.

Secretary—No. Sure Mr Heskin was informed the last day that it was a matter on which he should see the Manager.

Mr Butler—There was no letter from the owner?

Secretary—No.

Hospital Sites Should Be Developed

Mr Butler—Another matter discussed the last day was the need for the development of the sites for the new hospitals and the matter was to be brought to the notice of the Manager. Material for this work is available and the work could go on and grants from the Hospitals Sweeps would make it possible. I wonder has the Manager thought anything about it?

Secretary—He has been very busy recently and has been engaged in Kilkenny all last week with the Mental Hospital Inquiry.

Mr Butler—The preliminary work should go on so that everything will be ready for the superstructure later. The costs of this work will be the same and I would like if the Secretary

would get the Manager to move on the matter.
Secretary—I will bring the matter to the Manager's notice again.

Correspondence

A letter from the Department stated that the Loan Collection of Paintings will be available for exhibition by the Committee at Cappoquin from January 31st to February 3rd next.

An Fear Mor said that this exhibition was a great chance for Dungarvan and Cappoquin, and should be fully availed of. He advised that it be well advertised and suggested that a man with a knowledge of art should be got for the opening of the exhibition at Dungarvan in order to enlighten the people concerning the great detail of each exhibit.

Mr Lanigan stating that Mr Burke, Art Master Central Technical Institute, Waterford, was an exhibitor said he might be able to come.

It was agreed that Mr Burke be asked.

Co Operation

Another letter approved of the appointment of substitute part-time Irish teachers and the Department also forwarded copies of a memorandum arising out of a conference between members of the ITEA and Officers of the Departments of Agriculture and Education. It indicated the possible lines of co-operation between the staffs and committees of Agricultural and Co Vocational Education Committees.

Paragraph 3 of the memorandum reads—

The work of the day vocational schools can be furthered by the officers of the County Committees of Agriculture in certain ways. For example, demonstration plots can be laid down in the neighbourhood of the school area by the County Agricultural Instructor and these plots can be visited by the Rural Science Instructor and students from time to time. Joint visits conducted by the Rural Science Instructor and the Agricultural Instructor would be of definite advantage. Visits of this kind will help to emphasise the relationship between what is studied in the school and what is happening on the farm. The County Horticultural Instructor can give occasional lectures in the vocational school as well as demonstrations in the school garden. Short courses of in-

Hotel Cookery

A letter from the Department referred to scholarships offered by the I.T.A. and the Federation of Hoteliers for training in Hotel Cookery. Eight scholarships value £30 for courses lasting 20 weeks would be offered to candidates from the 26 counties. The Committee had power to supplement the scholarship by a sum not greater than £20. The Department stated that the best age for applicants would be 25 years.

It was decided to advertise the scholarship.

Pigs were dear at £4 to £6 while sheep were scarce, making from £4 to £6 also.

PREMIUMS TO BULLS, 1944

The County Waterford Committee of Agriculture invite applications from persons intending to compete for Premiums to Bulls under the conditions set forth in the Department's Scheme for encouraging improvement in the breeds of cattle 1944 and who are prepared to purchase such animals at any of the Spring Shows or Sales approved by the Department In making selections the Committee shall have regard to the need for securing the location of an adequate number of Bulls of the Shorthorn (including Dairy Shorthorn) breed

Towards this end the Committee shall allocate at least two-fifths of the available premiums for Bulls of that breed but of the total number of Premium Bulls of all ages to stand in the County for 1944 the proportion of Shorthorn (including Dairy Shorthorn) Bulls must not be less than the corresponding proportion in the year 1943

The Committee shall if necessary take other special steps as they may deem most effective to secure that at least this proportion of premiums is fully availed of

Cow-Testing Associations and Co Operative Societies can compete for those Premiums

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary

JANUARY 21st 1919 was a memorable day in the history of the Irish Nation but how many of us who now reap the benefits which sprung from the hearts-blood of the heroes who gave their all in Easter Week 1916 stop to think of this. We have our bank holidays and our other free days but Irish Independence Day is not recognised in any way much as it deserves to be. America always celebrates in an outstanding fashion the 4th of July while the Orange men of the North thump their drums and persecute the Catholics with more vigour on the 'Twelfth' but Irish Independence Day is passed over and treated as just another day. Having such a significance for the country this is almost unbelievable but the Governments who have ruled the country since 1921 have never utilised one of their greatest weapons of modern times to justify the existing wrongs with which we are faced. No system of general propaganda was ever put in motion and this is but another job in which those who have the reins of Government have fallen down. Large sums are voted for this that and the other thing—fat salaries are handed out but a service which could be of supreme benefit to the nation lies unexploited.

But maybe these times are passing. The old political machines seem to be cracking up and these must give way to a more vigorous and up and doing organisation. To see and sense this is to know that there is still hope.

News of The Town And Round About

GAELIC LEAGUE COMMEMORATION HANDBOOK

Many changes have taken place in Ireland since the Gaelic League's first meeting at 9 Lower O'Connell St Dublin on July 23rd 1893. Not least of these being the great progress of the National Language, especially in our schools and among the younger generation. From this foundation laid half a century ago many kindred organisations have found their source and the history of some of these is traced in the new handbook published by the League to celebrate its Golden Jubilee.

Many eminent sgríbhneoirí such as Fr F O'Brien OFM, Prof Daniel Corkery 'Torna', C'allachan MacCarthaigh and Padraig MacConmidhe have contributed many interesting and scholarly articles. Peadar o h'Annrachain of Dungarvan connection another well-known Gaelic author who was one of the first organisers and teachers to work under the league gives a history of the work performed by these pioneers at the time among whom are mentioned several Waterford Gaelic enthusiasts.

Two messages from 'An Craobhin' first Uachtaran of the league and from An Taoiseach Uachtaran of an t'Ard Craobh are included. The publication which is bilingual can be got for 2/- through any Gaelic League Branch or direct from Headquarters Parnell Square Dublin.
