The Co Council And Excise License

Mr J Maguire BL (instructed by Mr M Hally solr) for the Waterford County Council in the name of Mr T B Boyle Acting Secretary applied to have portion of the premises lately acquired by the Council

for Offices licensed Mr Maguire stated that the premises commonly known as the Commercial Hotel had been purchased on June 17th Bidding had been very high and the purchase price had been 10 There was a license attached to the premises already but repairs had been carried out and as the old bar and two other rooms were not needed it was decided to let it as a bar in order to re-coup, the ratepayers in some way for the large sum ex pended The proposed bar pre-mises are to be completely cut off from the main building and the work was almost completed Judge—This is a very unusual

A map showing a plan of the premises was produced and gone over in detail by Counsel

Dr Counihan State Solr for the Authorities said that this was a proposal by the Sanitary Au nority to let a bar and as far as they were concerned they thought that sanitary arrangements for both sexes should be provided whereas there were avatories for men only erected The bar premises had not in fact been totally cut off from the main building as two large windows connecting had open-ings at the top A door had not been blocked up and a small window off a recess had only been papered over

ing evidence said that the repairs were estimated at £1 000 and were being carried on by him If the Superintendent wished the windows mentioned which were provided to give light and ventilation to lava-tories on the other side of the wall could be completely closed up and a grating put in. The door had not been closed up as work was not yet finished and it was more convenient for the men to allow it open until very end when it could be

A Special Meeting of the Waterford County Council to dis cuss the estimate for roads was held in Dungarvan on Monday last Senator John Butler, Chairman presiding Messrs J Quirke M Keating, D Coghlan M F Walsh, D Heskin TD, MI Harty Mi McGrath G Torpey D Foran M Morrissey TD M ORyan L A Veale W Dower, W Terry N Sheehan and P R Power were present. Mr S J Moynihan, County

Secretary and P de Buitleir, ttended Deputation From Ballyduff

Parish Council Quirke introduced Dr Lahiff and Mr Goleman a deputation from Ballyduff Par-

ish Council
Dr Lahiff MO addressing the meeting said that the purpose of their visit was to draw attention to the urgent need for repairs required to the Station road from Ballyduff Bridge to Waterpark As this was a very important roadway he thought it should be treated with prior-ity as it carries all the traffic to and from the station. It really has the status of a main road Dealing with the use of the road by pedestrians he said that children use it going to school and due to its terrible condition Mr L F Lanigan Solr was they usually arrive in school for plaintiff and Messrs Farrell during the winter months literally covered with mud as the road is like a river He gave one instance of a child who on the way to school was passed by a lorry and was splashed to such an extent that she had to re turn home and charge all her

Mr Coleman gave the tonnage figures of the merchandise handled at the Ballyduff station all of which passes over the road There are 780 tons inward, 2 173 tons outward and 1 000 tons of beet making a total of 3 953 tons altogether He said that when the children see a lorry coming on the road now they run for cover the same as if it were a panzer division. After a case of Influenza thorough washing and cleansing of rooms and of washable rticles therein together with bedding and wearing apparel is necessary As fresh air dilutes dissipates infective material the sick room should at all times be thoroughly ventilated-both during and after the

attack

In dealing with Influenza the necessity for the early isolation of the case and for the protection of those in attendance on or in contact with the patient cannot be over-emphasised Where the patient is being nursed at home he should be accommodated in a separate room Persons coming in contact with the case or who enter the sick room should be careful to avoid becoming infected The danger may be materially diminished by avoiding inhalation of the patient's breath, and in addition the use of a simple antiseptic gargle may help to ward off infection The last-mentioned preventive measure is useful but its value as a safeguard must not be over-estimated gargle can be made by adding enough permanganate of potash to a tumbler of water to give it a faint pink colour (1 part of permanganate in 5 000) A small pinch of common salt should be added to this solution, which in addition to being used as a

gargle should be drawn up through the nostrils and ejected by the mouth Among general preventive measures it is well to mention thorough ventilation of each occupled living room and bedroom the avoidance of overcrowding in dwellings and in places of public resort the frequent spray-ing of Picture Theatres and schools with disinfectant the observance of strict cleanliness in the person, the home and the workshop abstension from in discriminate spitting, and the active realisation by persons suffering from Influenza or catarrh that they may convey
