Mr M O Connor Dungarvan (the new Chairman) presided there being also present—Mr T A Kyne Secretary Mr D O Sullivan Vice-Chairman Mr Thomas O Mahony Treasurer and Messrs Willie Barron P Ryan and John Fives Representatives on the Co Board...

On comparing the number of Clubs affiliated for this year it was found there was a slight decline on last year's number when the affiliated Clubs were 57 representing 74 teams while this year's total was 49 clubs representing 65 teams...

Application For Expenses The Secretary read an application from Tourin HC for payment of £11 expenses incurred in travelling for the final of the Co Championship last year and the matter was referred to the County Board...

A Green Cross Fund Match In connection with the match for the Green Cross Fund between Dungarvan and Brickey Rangers for which the latter team had failed to travel, Mr Willie Barron said Dungarvan did not wish to play the match and were perfectly willing to have it re-fixed in view of the deserving object for which it had been arranged...

Diseases Of Animals Committee

Manager May Delegate Full Power Mr P R Power Chairman presided at a meeting of the Diseases of Animals Committee on Monday at the Court-house, Dungarvan...

Mr S J Moylanh County Manager Mr M M Hally Co Council soilder and Mr M Kyne Clerk attended The Chairman said that it was a long time since the Committee had met but they had been called together to discuss with the solicitor the case to be put to Counsel concerning their powers under the County Managerial Act

Mr Walsh—I thought the order had already been made to get it Chairman—The case will go from this meeting I got a letter from the Manager on Feb 2nd asking for my observations on the matter, and I thought it better that the Committee should come together and discuss it

Mr Hally—I drew up the draft case myself putting in the points of view of the Manager on the one hand and those of the Committee on the other, but under the Act the Manager himself can delegate his own power to the Committee with the sanction of the Minister, and he is considering doing this which will enable the Committee to make its own appointments and to work untrammelled as it did before the enforcement of the Act But in case this is not done it is just as well to make other arrangements—The Committee's choice of Counsel will also be the Manager's

Minister for Agriculture some time ago pointing out that the powers of this Committee should be embodied in the Co Committee of Agriculture as the business of both is similar and the same members constitute both Committees The reply I received was that there was no general demand to do so and if it were done it would mean a big variation and amendment of the Act and the Minister for Local Government would have to be consulted I suggest that we get other counties to move in the same line and this would save the expense of getting an opinion

Mr Hally—The sanction will have to be got from the Minister for Local Government Mr Coghlan—The Diseases of Animals Committee was set up by the Act of 1894 and was in being before the Co Council Mr O'Ryan—if this is being done just for the sake of making appointments I'm against it and will vote against it I hold that no public committee should make such appointments They are a matter for the Manager Mr Hally then proceeded to read the draft of the case he had prepared Mr Heskin—if the Manager considers delegating the powers subject to the Minister's sanction there is no need getting a counsel Mr O'Ryan—if the Manager delegates the power I think he should reserve the right to make appointments Mr Sheehy—that is only an expression of opinion, Mr Ryan Mr O'Ryan—When a committee is making such an appointment the members will only vote for the person who did them a good turn something and it usually happens that the appointed person may not be the most competent Mr Coghlan as chief protagonist of the cause for the Committee and Mr Hally soilder then argued the legal points of the case Mr Walsh—if the Manager's prepared to delegate his powers there is no need for an opinion Mr O'Ryan—We should get the other counties to move and have the powers embodied in the Co Committee of Agriculture
