ĻIFE, Life is man's most treasured possession The ordinary human being will sacrifice riches honours and pleasures and undergo the most painful medical treatment if he can thereby prolong the life of his body for even a few years. The most dreaded punishment for an offence is to deprive a man of his life

God is the Creator of all life We can destroy life but we can-not give it back. Thus, for example we can shoot the pheasant but we cannot restore the life once destroyed It is only by the creative act of the Most High that a human soul can come into existence and it is only by the constant preserva tive activity of the Almighty that a human being is able to continue in existence However in the creation and preservation of life God makes use of secondary causes The parents collaborate towards the formation of the infant body into which the Creator then infuses a human

Even if God gave us no more than natural life we would have reason to be supremely grateful For the soul which animates man's body is an immortal spirit destined by its very nature to an endless existence beyond the grave But God has deigned to confer on His human creatures another and higher kind of life This new form of life bears an intimate resemb-ance to the life of God Himself and is called "the supernatural life that is the life above the natural life. It is also called the life of grace because its basic constituent is Sanctifying grace And every human sou which leaves this world in the possession of supernatural life will enjoy for all eternity a share of the happiness proper to God Himself

Our Lord proclaims that He is the Life and that He is come that we might have Life and it more abundantly 10 10) This life (John 10 10) This life of which Our Lord speaks is That true life of the soul is called Sanctifying
It is a higher kind of life than the other three kinds with which we are familiar viz plant life animal life and ordinary human life And God intends that every human soul should possess this supernatural life of Sanctifying Grace in addition to all other activities of

mind and body We know from experience how sometimes a child is adopted taken into a home made one or the family treated as a son or daughter and even given a right to inherit all that belongs to those who have thus bestow-

Now God has done this for each of us in Baptism by admitting us into the family of the Blessed Trinity Our sonship in the family of the Blessed Trinity raises us even higher because God makes us in a true and wonderful way childby blood For Sanctifying Grace is a positive spiritual reality infused into the soul of each of us at Baptism by which we are made to share the divine life "to be partakers of the divine nature (2 Peter 14) At once we see the difference between our position as adopted sons of God and the sonship of those who are adopted by human law This human adoption may be an act of wonderful love and condescension and it may bring many blessings with it but the adopted son remains of different blood with the physical characteristics which the child inherited from his real parents It is their blood that flows in his veins their features that are copied in his face and


