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SAFETY OF THE HOLY FATHER

Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan's Request For Prayers

Reference to the present difficult position of the Pope, and the peril of destruction which overhangs Rome was made by the Most Rev. Dr. Cohalan Bishop of Waterford and Lismore when laying the foundation stone of the new Irish Christian Brothers' Schools at Mount Sion Waterford on Tuesday last.

His Lordship said "May I avail of this occasion to give expression to the anxious thought which is uppermost in the minds of all of us at the present time I refer to the delicate, difficult, and even dangerous position of our Holy Father the Pope, and the peril of destruction which overhangs the City of Rome. Every Catholic is in a sense a citizen of that city. The Pope has spent himself in the interests of peace and now the horrors of war have already been felt in the Vatican City."

Dr. Cohalan quoted the Pope's plea in an address to the Lenten Preachers in Rome on Shrove Tuesday that Rome should be spared for cultural and historical reasons as in the cases of Athens and Cairo, and went on to say that Catholics were concerned in a special way with the fate of Rome. He asked the priests and faithful of the diocese to offer up their prayers at the Lenten devotions, in all churches and chapels for the safety of the Holy Father and the preservation of Rome.

THE CHRISTIAN BROTHERS

He recalled how in 1802 the late Bishop Hussey laid the foundation stone of the Waterford Monastery of the Irish Christian Brothers at Mount Sion Waterford and that the school buildings were opened in 1804 by Bishop John Power. Mount Sion he said, was the cradle and the mother house of the Irish Christian Brothers and the site had been chosen by Edmund Ignatius Rice, founder of the Order who had spent the entire proceeds of his business life in the instruction of Catholic youth. The Act of Parliament establishing National Schools in Ireland Dr. Cohalan said, was not passed until thirty years after the death of Ignatius Rice which occurred in 1844. During the period to which he referred Catholic schools had no endowment and they rightly honoured those nameless heroes who in humble hedge schools carried on their tradition of Irish Catholic education during the dark ages of persecution. The Christian Brothers had now worked for one hundred years in the education of Catholic youth. In thanking the Bishop for

his address and tribute to their founder Very Rev. Brother J. P. Noonan Superior of the Order referred to the Education Bill now before the British House of Commons and said, we, Catholics have misgivings in regard to that Bill and I hope it will not have as disastrous an effect as the Bill of 1870, which meant that Catholic schools in England laboured under the same religious disabilities as we suffered here under the National School system until we got our own Government."

Dr. Cohalan was assisted during the ceremony by Ven. Archdeacon Kelleher P.P. V.G. STL Ballybricken and Very Rev. Canon Patrick Power John's Hill.

The new schools are estimated to cover an area of two acres and the contractors are John Hearne and Sons, Waterford.

Secretary's Annual Report

Mr Sean Bell, Hon Sec submitted the following interesting report—

I have great pleasure in submitting the following report for the year just ended.

During the year our athletes competed at 18 Sports Meetings embracing venues all over Munster and Leinster.

They competed with outstanding success in counties Tipperary Waterford, Cork, Carlow Louth, Kilkenny Wexford and Dublin. These successes include two Munster Championships one County Championship, and runner-up for 7000 metres Cycling Championship of Ireland. The "Thompson Cup" for cycling value £30 was won outright by J. J. Foley, with M. J. Sargent, Junr, just a wheel behind for second place.

In the all-round Championships held in Dublin, one of our members got fourth place which, in normal times would ensure his inclusion in the Olympic team and another member ran into seventh place which, I am sure you will consider an outstanding accomplishment for a small club such as ours. In all our members have to their credit during the season the grand total of 24 firsts and 30 seconds. All these were won at open meetings on track and road against the best athletes in the country.

These great victories have brought before the public the sterling qualities of our local sportsmen and a striking proof of the esteem in which our club is held is amply demonstrated by the selection of Cappoquin as the venue for the Munster Championships for this year.

Now that the season is on us once more I trust that our athletes will go seriously into training, and that the older ones will give every help encouragement and advice to those new members who make their debut on track and road in the coming season. It is only by strict training and solid team work we can hope not alone to retain our high standard of the past but to surpass it in the future.

As you will see by our Treasurer's report and balance sheet, we had a fairly successful year financially and the best thanks of the club are due to our friends in town and country who so generously supported us throughout the past year. A special word of praise is due to our athletes for the great enthusiasm they displayed by attending so many sports meetings particularly when we consider the great difficulties of transport and the enormous expense which they entail. I hope that when our next Annual General Meeting is held we will be able to chronicle not only County and Provincial Champions amongst our members but All-Ireland Champions, also.

Treasurer's Report

Mr J. J. Foley, Treasurer next submitted his report and balance sheet which gave full details of all receipts and expenditure during the past season which showed the Club to have a credit balance of £23 9s 9d to carry forward for this year.

On the motion of Mr J. Regan seconded by Mr P. Morrissey both the Secretary's and Treasurer's Reports were unanimously adopted both members paying high tributes to Messrs Bell and Foley for their able statements and expressing their great satisfaction at the highly satisfactory financial condition of the Club their remarks being endorsed by the President, Chairman and all the members present.

On the motion of Mr A. J. Sargent all the outgoing officers were re-elected in globo as follows—

It was decided on the motion of Mr Bell seconded by the Chairman to have a Committee of ten members, including the three officials and the following seven members were then unanimously elected—

The Munster Championship Sports

The Chairman referred to the great honour paid to the Cappoquin club by having the Munster Championship Sports for this year fixed for Cappoquin, and said the date of the event would be fixed by the Munster Council. This club would, however, be responsible for making all the necessary arrangements for the Sports and he hoped the members would fully carry out their duties in the matter.

Mr Bell said that there would be very heavy work to do in preparing the Sportsfield for this important fixture and they would require the fullest efforts of all their members in order to ensure that such work would be properly done.

Mr J. J. Foley said Cappoquin had beaten Tipperary by only one vote at the Munster Council meeting and as Tipperary had guaranteed a perfect field and free Hall for a Benefit Dance on Sports Night it was up to this club now to have the most elaborate arrangements made for the occasion.

A rather long discussion then followed as regards the re-action of the hoarding around the Sportsfield, which had been blown down during some of the winter storms and after several suggestions had been made as to the responsibility for the expense of this work Mr E. Longergan suggested that three delegates from this club and three from the G.A.A. should meet the members of the Sportsfield Committee and arrange definite terms as regards the proportion of expense to be borne by each, and this having been agreed to Messrs O'Leary Bell and Sergt Browne were appointed to act for the Athletic Club and they were urged to get the work in hands at the earliest possible moment as the galvanised sheets were now lying in a heap in the Sportsfield.

Sergt Browne gave an interesting account of the proceedings at the Annual County Convention of the Waterford Board, N.A. & C.A. held in Waterford and said that all the delegates present were proud of the achievements of the Cappoquin cyclists and athletes last year and warmly congratulated them on their successes while the various motions on the Agenda from the Cappoquin Club were also unanimously agreed to which showed the great respect in which this club was held by the Co. Board.

He also referred to the great honour paid to the Club by having the Munster Championships fixed for Cappoquin this year and he hoped they would prove worthy of the honour by having perfect arrangements made for the event.

Mr Bell said although the Championship Sports would not mean any financial gain to this club they would still mean a big financial benefit to the townspeople and it was for their sake that this Club had agreed to take the Championships this year so it would be necessary for every member to do his individual bit in making all the necessary preparations and he asked those present who were prepared to do so to hold up their hands when all present did so and Mr Bell said this was very encouraging so far and he hoped they would all keep their promise in the matter.

Sports For Schoolboys

Sergt Browne referred to a matter which had been discussed at the County Board Convention in Waterford this being the holding of Sports for Schoolboys from the various schools in the County Waterford and said a valuable cup costing £10 would be offered by the County Board for the best individual athletic performance by any schoolboy this year.

As the boys of today would be the men of tomorrow he thought this was a grand idea which should be supported by all the schools in the County and he was sure that Mr O'Leary would fully co-operate with them in developing this project during the coming season.

It was proposed to have the athletic events confined to two grades of schoolboys, one under 14 years and the other under 11 years and as medals would be given for the first and second in each event this should be a great inducement for the boys to compete.

Sergt Browne then submitted a draft programme of 11 events which had been prepared by some of the members of this club which was approved of by the meeting with the addition of two races for girls under the ages of 14 and 11 years respectively.

The Chairman said he welcomed the proposal which he would be happy to support and he promised to bring the matter before the Annual Meeting of the I.N.T.O. of the County Waterford to be held shortly, when he would do his utmost to get all the Teachers in the County to co-operate and he was confident they would be able to get plenty of competitors from amongst the various schools in the County.

Sergt Browne thanked Mr O'Leary for his promised support and said it was very encouraging to see so many young members from the country districts present that night to all of whom he tendered a cordial welcome.

Mr Bell endorsed Sergeant Browne's remarks in this respect and also thanked the country members for their attendance and said while we have such loyal support from these sporting young men the position of the Cappoquin Club would be secure.

Sweepstake In Aid of Club

Mr J. J. Foley referred to the success of the Sweepstake which they had held for the Club last year and suggested that another Sweep be held in connection with the Grand National race this year.

It having been stated that the L.D.F. was already running a Sweepstake for the same race, it was then decided to hold a Sweepstake in connection with the Phoenix Handicap, to be run in May and the prizes for same were fixed as follows—First, £3 second £2 Third £1.

It was also decided to hold an All-Night Dance in the Boathouse Hall in aid of the Club on the night of the Championship Sports provided the Hall is available and all the details in connection with same were left in the hands of the Officials and Committee.

This concluded a rather lengthy agenda and Mr Bell then proposed a vote of thanks to the local Press for the great assistance and publicity which had been given to their Club within the past year, which was passed nem con.

Mr John F. Ryan (who was the only Pressman present) thanked Mr Bell for his kind remarks and said that every branch of sport, particularly Athletics and the G.A.A. would always find in him a warm and consistent supporter so long as God gave him power to wield either a pencil or a pen.

This terminated a most successful and harmonious meeting, the entire business of which was disposed of in little more than an hour.

Louth, curtailed his visit and travelled specially to Mount Mellerey to officiate at the obsequies which took place on Tuesday with all the solemn ritual associated with the austere Cistercian Order, after which the interment took place in the pretty Community cemetery, where many more members of this saintly and distinguished Order are now sleeping their last sleep almost beneath the shadow of the stately and majestic New Church—R.I.P.

A remarkable tribute to the people of Cappoquin was paid on last Sunday when the Rev. T. IRISH-AUSTRALIAN BISHOP BEREAVED.

Death Of Mr. William Coleman, Melleray, Cappoquin.

In the fullness of years and honours, and after a long and unblemished life, the death took place on last Friday at his residence Melleray, Cappoquin, of Mr William Coleman, who had attained the ripe age of 85 years.

Deceased had reared a remarkably brilliant family, several of which are an ornament to the Catholic Church today.

One of his sons is the Most Rev Dr John Coleman, Bishop of Armidale Australia, another is the Very Rev Patrick Coleman, PP Brisbane Australia, while one of his daughters is the Rev Mother-General of the Dominican Convent, Cape Town, South Africa. He was also father of Mrs Hayden, Melleray, and Mrs Coffey, do, and also of Mrs Sheehan and Mr Daniel Coleman, both of whom have been in San Francisco, U.S.A., for many years.

An expert and able blacksmith, the late Mr Coleman held a responsible position in the smithy attached to Mount Melleray Abbey for a long number of years where his long and faithful service and his great efficiency and honesty were deeply appreciated by the various Lords Abbot under whom he had the honour to serve.

His son, John, became a student of the famous Mount Melleray Seminary at an early age, and having soon displayed a vocation for the Priesthood, he completed his studies in Theology and Philosophy there, being eventually ordained to the Priesthood and later sent on the Australian Mission to the important Diocese of Armidale, which was then presided over by another brilliant Irishman, the late Most Rev Dr O'Connor, as Bishop.

Father Coleman's high qualities as Priest and his untiring zeal in the performance of his important spiritual duties soon marked him out for distinction in his sacred calling, with the happy result that he was later appointed Co-Adjutor Bishop to Dr O'Connor, and on the latter's death he was appointed Bishop of Armidale an exalted position which he has since filled with all the dignity and zeal associated with such an honoured rank in the Catholic Church.

The news of his elevation as Bishop over such an extensive and important Diocese as Armidale was hailed with the greatest pride and delight of the then Lord Abbot and the entire Community in Mount Melleray, as he was the first student to bring such a high honour on his Alma Mater which has produced hundreds of Priests who have attained the next highest ranks in the Irish Priesthood in

almost all parts of the world today.

Most Rev Dr Coleman came home for a holiday about 14 years ago when he was practically lionised by the Clstercian Community at Mount Melleray as well as by his hundreds of lay friends and admirers in Cappoquin and the adjoining districts all of whom felt it a privilege to honour a local man who had brought such high distinction and lustre on his native parish.

Before going back to Australia he informed the writer that he hoped to return home for another visit to his parents in about 8 or 9 years, but the war having started in the meantime he was unable to realise his cherished hope and as both his mother and father are now dead the sacred ties which had bound him to his native Melleray have also been cruelly severed but we still hope to see him coming back on a visit to his beloved sisters when travelling facilities will permit and when peace reigns once more over the war-torn and distracted world of today.

The late Mr Coleman was a staunch and outstanding Constitutional Irish Nationalist all his life. As a young man he was an enthusiastic follower of Parnell and the Irish Parliamentary Party then fighting the battle of Ireland in the British House of Commons and after Parnell's death he continued to follow John Redmond and his party, and for many years he was one of the most faithful and generous members of the branch of the United Irish League which flourished in Cappoquin at the time.

No sacrifice was too much for him to make in the Cause of Irish Freedom and he and the gallant band of "Old Campaigners" then associated with him helped to keep Cappoquin in the picture as one of the most active and virile strongholds of Nationality in the Co Waterford for many stirring years.

Despite the distinguished family which he had reared he was always most modest and unassuming, and being of a kindly and genial disposition he was a particular favourite with all.

His death at such a ripe age has now removed the last of the "Old Campaigners" from the Melleray district, a historic district which had always been prolific in producing stalwart sons whenever they were required in the Cause of Church or Country.

Solemn Requiem High Mass was offered up for the eternal repose of deceased's soul in Mount Melleray on Saturday morning the celebrant being Rev Father Canice O'Clis, Prior (in the absence of the Lord Abbot), who was assisted by most of the members of the Community.

A Requiem Mass was also celebrated by the Rev T Dunphy CC, Cappoquin in deceased late residence on Saturday morning and on that evening the remains were removed to St Mary's Catholic Church Cappoquin where there was a very large attendance of the general public from Melleray Cappoquin and all the adjoining districts. The coffin was received at the Church by the Rev. T Dunphy CC, and at 3 o'clock on Sunday the funeral took place to St Declan's Cemetery, Diomroe where there was a striking manifestation of public respect for the memory of the deceased. The Rev Father Dunphy headed the cortege and an unusual tribute of respect was paid owing to the presence in front of the hearse of the Rev Father Ailbe O'Clis sub Prior and the Rev Father Malachy O'Clis Dean of Studies who specially represented the Lord Abbot and Community of Mount Melleray and travelled the entire journey to the Cemetery where they assisted the Rev Father Dunphy in reading the final prayers at the graveside.

The chief mourners included—Mrs Hayden and Mrs Coffey (daughters) Alice Hayden, Thomas Joan William Mary and John Coffey (grandchildren), Michael O'Leary Glenafalla (nephew) Mrs Tobin, Monalour (niece) James John Joe, Michael and Thomas Tobin (grand-nephews) Bridget Tobin (grand-niece) Patrick and Mrs Coffey Melleray Matt Coffey, do Mrs M Mason Cappoquin and several other cousins and relatives.

A pretty wreath was laid on the grave inscribed "In loving memory of our Grand Dad from his sorrowing Grand-children while Mass cards were sent as follows—Mrs and Alice Hayden Mrs Coffey and family Thomas Tobin and family Michael O'Leary Patrick Coffey and family Mrs M Mason and

family, Paddy and Martha Walsh, etc.

The beautiful panellid elm coffin was supplied and all funeral arrangements most satisfactorily carried out by the Reps of the late Mr M Mason, Undertakers Cappoquin.

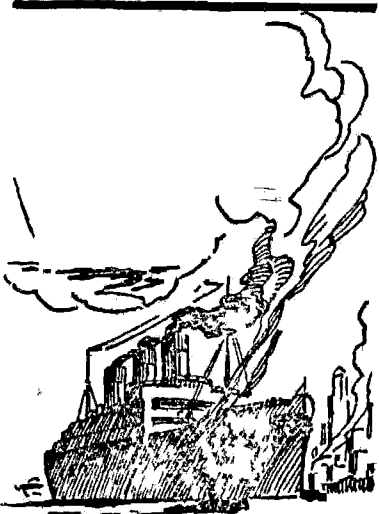

IT seems strange that the majority of the people in these districts know little or nothing about the activities of the Green Cross Organisation It is about time that something was done to rectify this and the formation of a Committee in town will go a long way to enlighten the people as to the great work which is pursued by this very worthy National body

The plight of the Catholics and of all Irishmen with true National aspirations in the Six Counties is a very precarious one under the legislation of the Unionist Government of which Sir Basil Brooke is the Premier Time and time again the members of that Government have avowed their strong intentions of persecuting and annihilating the Catholic population of the North and the Orange Terror under which these unfortunate Irishmen and women live and labour is the method being used to carry out these intentions of the Orange Government

Good-living Catholic Irishmen are everyday being arrested on the flimsiest excuses and interned without being charged or tried They are put into prison and left there while their wives and families starve They do not benefit by unemployment or home assistance measures so that their lot is an unhappy one

People of the South whose toleration in religious matters is practised cannot realise the terrible persecution which our Catholic brethren are subjected to in the North For the first time an opportunity has been given to get first-hand information on the state of affairs there by the publication by the Capuchin Fathers of Uitch's "Orange Terror" with commentaries by leading church dignitaries and others The reading in this booklet is almost incredible but every statement is authenticated

The position being such something had to be done to help the dependents of these internees and the Green Cross Organisation was formed The result was that big measures of help were given but as yet the Organisation is very little known in these areas and a great deal has yet to be done

By helping this Organisation and by subscribing towards it you will be doing more than your part to do away with the border behind which our brother Irishmen and women are suffering and which has been a curse to the Nation ever since it came into existence

Sixteen Points Of Aiseirighe Expounded

REAMH FHOCAI (Ar Lean)

We spoke in brief in our last article of the meaning of the Aiseirighe transformatory revolution and of the first stage which may be termed "the organisational stage" in which those who will guide the organisation are being selected and trained and sent forth to spread the doctrine of Aiseirighe. When this task has been accomplished the revolution will enter on its second stage which will be "the stage of planning." This will be certainly the most important stage for now it is not the building up of cumainn or the criticising of opponents or the preaching of a doctrine which shall engage the attention of the leaders of Aiseirighe but the planning of the broad structure of the Christian Gaelic State. Things which will have to be considered carefully then are

(1) The relation of the National Party to the State as the party must have legally defined public rights and functions. Its rules and regulations will have to be prescribed by the law of the land that is in their main outline. Being an integral part of the structure of the Gaelic State, unlike present political groups it cannot depend on slipshod methods of organisation or procedure etc.

(2) The setting up of corporations and the planning of a system in which those elected to the National Council by Vocational bodies cannot become small unfriendly groups with a vocational bias or represent altogether a set of hard-headed businessmen who might ultimately by banding together—even if unofficially—come into conflict with the more patriotic minded and idealistic National Party to create a second "party" in reality. To maintain a proper balance between them will not be so easy at first and indeed we see the need for constantly maintaining a slight balance in favour of those who represent National sentiment in the National Council.

(3) The manifold problems which will arise from an Aiseirighe Government coming into power. We cannot expect of course that the aims and objects of Aiseirighe will be realised or the Gaelic State set up overnight, but undoubtedly the Constitution of the Republic will have to be soon introduced by the new Government. Existing law and order cannot be changed overnight of course but the political reactions within Eire and outside at this very juncture will create a very delicate situation indeed for the new administration especially if this should occur at a critical period in the international conflict. Therefore all possibilities and eventualities must be carefully considered by the leaders and all plans for this period carefully thought out long before Aiseirighe takes over the reins of Government. If, however, this critical period can be passed without any intervention from hostile quarters, and if the young Government can once firmly establish itself we are most confident that it will if its leaders are coolheaded and crafty as well as courageous—and personally I see no other way to meet British State craft but by Irish tact as in 1918-1921—be able to carry out the third and final stage of the National Gaelic revolution. This third and final stage cannot be limited to a certain number of years. It will take an indefinite period to fully realise the complete programme set out in "Aiseirighe Says." Indeed it is not too much to say that this revolution will shape the destiny of Eire for a thousand years to come perhaps. Neither will it be all smooth sailing in the early part of this stage and not until then will the qualities of the leaders of Aiseirighe be tested. With the reins of Government in their hands, with the power of vested interests to be fought with the lure and temptation of luxury and a soft life to be fought against and iron justice to be enacted often against close friends and even relatives numerous post-war problems to be faced with hostile neighbours to be reckoned with one may be sure that the task of those who must then guide the destiny of Eire will not be an enviable one. But however, with all the forces of the State and the resources of the country at their disposal there is no reason why a truly National minded Government which depends for its existence on continual Nationalist enthusiasm rather than on the goodwill votes of selfish cliques and classes could

not in our time free and Gaelicise Eire and establish once more a truly Gaelic and Christian order of society.

Indeed there are plenty signs already that Aiseirighe is making an impression even on the politicians. Leaves are being stolen by them out of the Aiseirighe book and we feel sure more shall. Because even if Altiri na hAiseirighe never gained power their philosophy would ultimately of necessity be the guide of any Government daring to claim to be National. The great fundamental difference however between Aiseirighe and other movements in this country claiming to be National is that ours is a spiritual movement and does not seek a remedy for all our ills in the purely material and technical plane while all other movements such as Fine Gael and Flanna Fail etc are purely materialistic and seek—in so far as they do—only the material welfare of the people.

Their basic philosophy is that if you can make a country materially prosperous even at the cost of sacrificing principle that that nation will then become contented virtuous and great. The Aiseirighe philosophy is that if you can inspire a people with a love for high ideals and a love of justice, and a desire never to sacrifice principle that that people though rolling in material wealth can be most contented. Let us judge from the lessons of history.
