On Easter Sunday morning a band of cyclists comprising members of the Old Comrades LR A and Ailtiri na hAiseirighe set out from Dungarvan They headed out Abbeyside and their first stop was at the Burgery monument where Pat Keating and Sean Fitzgerald herocially gave their lives in defence of

Poblacht na h-Eireann in 1921 Two wreaths were placed on the monument one by the old generation and one by the new A decade of the rosary was recited in Irish and the cyclists again mounted and continued

a grand. was fresh spring morning and it was de-lightful to be out Within a short period the squadron again dismounted and this time it was in the picturesque village of Cill Rosanta where the people were hurrying along to Mass in their beautiful Church
When Mass was over the crowd streamed out and joined

the members already standing about the Republican Plot where five Irish heroes sleep their last sleep and whose memories were being honoured Patsy Lynch of Durrow again recited a decade of the rosary in Irish as he has done on each occasion down through the years since these Irish warnlors were first laid to rest in Kilrossanty's graveyard The Last Post was then sounded The Last Post was then sounded by Mr Mick Terry after which Mr Pax Whelan Chairman of the Old Comrades I R A addressed the crowd He said it was no time for speeches but they had gathered to do honour to the great men who in every generation had died to fiee Ireland and especially the men who rested in Kilrossanty Plot With Ireland still divided their dream had yet to be realised but he hoped that the present generation would see this last wrong rectified in their time He concluded by reading the Proclamation of 1916 after which the Reveille was sounded and the ceremon; concluded

FATAL FALL FROM TRAP

Ardmore Farmer's Death

Dr D T McCarthy Coroner for West Waterford held an inquest at the Courthouse Dungarvan into the circumstances surrounding the death of Pat-rick McCarthy (73), farmer of Ballinamertha Ardmore who died at 2 am on the morning of Saturday April 8th last at the District Hospital Dungar-van The inquest was held on Saturday evening the 8th inst at 5 pm

The following jury was sworn Messrs D McGrath Mary St (foreman) Ml Kyne Park Tce J O Carroll Square, Wm Mor-rissey do Patrick Crotty Mit-chel St P J Walsh Friary St Medical Evidence

Dr Rita McCarthy-Mullen said that she first examined deceased on March 17th and last saw him on April 7th He was suffering from a fracture of the base of the skull and from abrasions of the left elbow joint There were no other marks and in her opinion death was due to

Feli From Trap

Mrs Margaret McCarthy stated that she was widow of the deceased man She had seen the remains and had identified them as those or her husband

On St Patrick's Day they set out together to go to 1130 a m Mass at Ardmore They were travelling in a pony trap So far as she knew the pony was strange to the trap On the way they stopped to give a lift to a boy named Maurice Mahony When they were passing by Curragh a pony inside the ditch suddenly lifted his head and cated she saw her husband lying on the road in an unconscious condition He was later remove it ed to the District Hospital Du getgarvan where he had been ev since

Supt O Mahony, GS conducting the inquest said that was all the evidence he proposed all the evidence he proposed calling as it was one of those unfortunate accidents which are liable to happen any day of the week

Dr McCarthy said that it was clear that death was due to a fracture of the skull caused by an accidental fall from a car

The jury accordingly returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence

Dr McCarthy then tendered sincerest sympathy to Mrs Mc-Carthy and Mr McGrath on be-half of the jury associated himself with the expression Supt O Mahony on his own behalf and especially on behalf of the




