With the object of reserving a proportion of the limited available supply of shotgun cart-ridges for farmers for the proection of their crops and poultry against vermin the Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order entitled Emergency Powers (Retail Distribu-tion of Shotgun Cartridges) Order 1944 under which a peron who holds a limited firearm certificate may purchase not more than 12 cartridges during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 31st July 1944 A person who holds a £2 fire-

arm certificate may purchase not more than 22 cartridges and such cartridges may be purchased during the month of July 1944 only Special attention is directed to the fact that a registered firearms dealer may not sell cartridges to the holder of a £2 firearm certificate at any time unless he has sold to every holder of a limited firearm certificate who has applied to him for cartridges during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 30th June 1944, the number of cart-ridges which he is entitled to

receive under the Order

The horrid gaps in the booksellers shelves which I observed when visiting Dublin lately were more eloquent of a truly desperate crisis in the booktrade than the reading of a

thousand pamphlets on paper shortage and under-production Where formerly a bountiful supply of stoutly bound volumes flaunted their gaily coloured jackets there now appeared a parsimonious sprinkling of thin anaemic shadowy formats, which as if conscious of their shameful appearance, seemed to huddle together shrinkingly in the dim recesses of the shelving

On the thin weak spine of these novels impertinent and clamorous the figures shricked exorbitantly 8/6, 9/6 10/6 like a mounting crescendo of some satanic orchestration

My friend the bookseller regarded me with a calm despair which verged on the heroic Impelled by dire necessity I made my selection with what fortitude I could muster while through these horrid gaps in the shelves a chill wind of foreboding and coming disaster seemed to blow Would this were a fairy tale

or a nightmare which a sunny May morning would dispel Alas it is a true tale with a moral intended for the instruction of the groom is second son of Mr and borrowing public and is addressed to them with the fervent hope that they will take it to

If they still desire to find re laxation and recreation available on their Library shelves they must handle books as if they were Sevres China Many publishers are ceasing to publish novels so serious is the position
