Best Rate Collection in Twelve Years
Rate Collector's Vacancy
Department's Letter

Senator John Butler Chairman presided at the Quarterly meeting of the Waterford County Council at Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs Michael O'Ryan, Sean Goulding, G. Torpey, M. Butler, D. Power, M. Terry, M. McGrath, D. Coghlan, W. Terry, N. Sheehan, W. Dower, R. Harney, T. Power, P. R. Power, J. Kirwan, M. Morrissey, J. Quirk, D. Heskin, T. Duggan, and L. A. Veale were also present.

Mr S. J. Moynihan Co. Manager Mr J. Bowen Co. Surveyor and Mr T. B. Boyle Acting Secretary attended.

Annual Meeting Date
It was agreed that the date for the annual meeting be Monday, June 28th next.

Best Rate Collection in Twelve Years
The Secretary submitted a report on the rate collection for 1943/44 and said that out of a warrant of £138,048 7s 0d at the end of April £128,525 0s 7d had been collected which showed a general average of 93 1/2%.

Mr Coghlan—That is very good.
Chairman—It is a splendid collection and one on which we should compliment all the rate collectors and assessors.

Senator Goulding—It is due to the good financial position of the ratepayers.

A Pack of Shoneens
Dealing with the filling of the vacancy for rate collector in the Kilmacthomas District to which Mr Michael Connors, Park Stradbally was appointed by the Council at the last meeting the Department wrote on March 4th asking the examiner to answer "yes or no" as to the capacity of each candidate examined to conduct the business through Irish. The examiner marked the meaning no after number 1 and 8. Number 1 was Mr Connors. On April 8th the Minister wrote pointing out that with reference to the point in the qualifying paragraph covering the position of the appointed candidate did not qualify, and he directed the Council to refill the vacancy from the remaining qualified candidates.

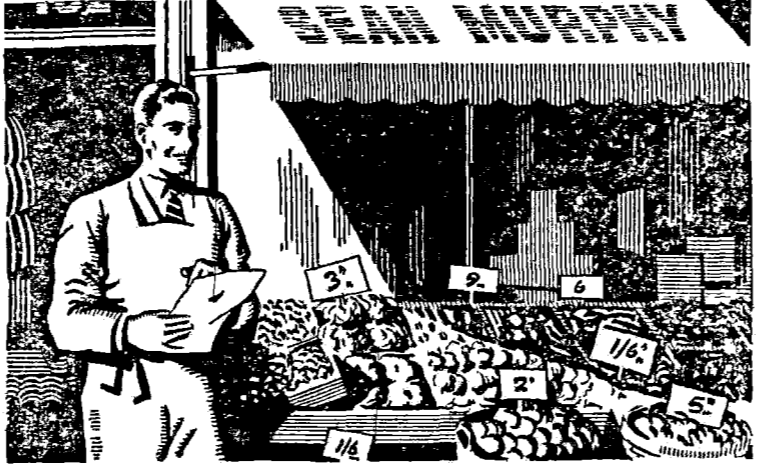
[The percentage for a pass in the examination was 50%.]
Mr Coghlan—What is the usual percentage for a pass?
The Chairman—The Council fixed 40% which is the usual standard.

Mr O'Ryan—What did the advertisement say?
Secretary—That the candidate possess adequate knowledge of Irish to enable him to conduct his business in it.
Mr Coghlan—A pass in any subject is 40% and why should it be 50% in this?
Mr Sheehan—The terms of the advertisement don't lay down any percentage.
Mr O'Ryan—The examiner's report is decisive and it doesn't stand on percentages. He states the man has not enough Irish to qualify.
Mr Sheehan—It may be decisive for the examiner but it is not for the Council.
Mr O'Ryan—Mr Sheehan's point is illogical.
Mr Terry—It's illogical in the point that no Irish is used in this job.
Mr Sheehan—This action won't bring about a love for Irish or foster it.
Mr Terry—Moving it down people's throats.
Chairman—The Council's opinion is that a man with 40% standard in the language is well enough versed.
Mr Heskin—Why not point out to the Department this opinion. The examiner probably didn't know what standard of Irish was needed.
Mr O'Ryan—That's an extraordinary statement.
Chairman—The report of the rate collection in the Stradbally area which was carried out by Mr Connors shows a collection of 95 3/4% and he appears as the fourth best collector in the county. That proves he is able to collect the rates anyway.
Mr Coghlan—I know that area and I can say that 99% of the people don't know Irish.
Mr O'Ryan—The Council's advertisement lays down that the candidate must be capable of transacting business in Irish. This is the best case I know of to prove that all appointments should be made by the Manager. Chairman—The fact is that he is a good rate collector.
Mr O'Ryan—That's sidetracking the issue and the chairman knows it.
Mr Harney—The Council made the mistake the first day in not laying down a percentage, and then the examiner was also the

Mr O'Ryan—According to what has been said a Frenchman is just as qualified to collect the rates.
Mr Veale—You can go on arguing all day on this subject. I suggest that you make a temporary appointment for the time being.
Senator Goulding—That won't solve the problem—that's only postponing it.
Chairman—This appointment is within the power of the Council to make and it has already decided what the appointment should be.
Mr Terry—It's a test to find out if it is worth our while coming in here or not.
Mr O'Ryan—It's unfair to say that the examiner dictated to the Council as was said.
Mr Sheehan—It's a sad state of affairs when an appointment made at the wish of the majority of the Council should be turned down. We are only mere puppets here.
Mr O'Ryan—The Council stultified itself and as a member of the public body I resent that remark. It is contended that Michael O'Connell, a noted Irish scholar cannot say whether a candidate is competent or not in the Irish language. Those who have done so have only the greatest contempt for the language and are only a pack of shoneens.
Mr Terry—We'd be a laughing stock if we were in any other country.
Mr Harney—The mistake was made by the Council in the first place in not stating the percentage and it is unfair to blame the examiner. As far as I know 33 and one-third is a pass in Irish.
Mr O'Ryan—When there are qualified candidates for the job it would point to the appointment of a non-qualified man. I don't care about any particular one but we all know what is behind this.
Mr Veale again suggested a temporary appointment as a solution.
Mr Morrissey—Such a resolution will not be accepted by the Department. Has asked that an appointment be made from the other four candidates.
Chairman—The Council are within their rights in making this appointment and can do what they like.
Mr Morrissey—Subject to the Minister's sanction and if he is not satisfied he can force you to make an appointment.
Mr Butler—They can not force us but they may abolish us.
Mr O'Ryan—Those who get 33 and one-third per cent we know have only La Breagh Irish.
Mr Heskin—Money is the whole trouble and he has collected a big percentage of the rates.
Mr Sheehan referred to rumours that were in Waterford city three weeks before the Council met. The appointment to the effect that a certain man was the likely man for the job.
Mr Quirk—You'll always find those rumours out.
Mr Veale then again proposed that the present rate collector Michael Connors be provided with an opportunity to present himself for another examination to test his proficiency in Irish at the end of 12 months as he has proved a good rate collector and that he be appointed temporarily for 12 months.
Mr Terry—That would show weakness on our part. We decided 40% was the standard and I don't think we have anything to ask from the Department.
Mr O'Ryan—Well the examiner should know his job.
Mr Harney—He probably did know his job.
Mr O'Ryan—That's a foul blow and one unworthy of a member of the County Council. The man is not present to defend himself and I call it the act of a coward.
Mr O'Ryan—Here stated that in view of the remark he wanted to make it clear that the examiner was working on numbers only and not on names.
Mr O'Ryan—Now you should withdraw your remark Mr Harney.
The discussion during the whole period was inclined to wander at times several councillors were speaking at the same time.
Finally Mr Duggan seconded Mr Veale's proposition and it was passed.

Rate Collector Resigns
Mr Justin Condon Youghal Rate Collector for that district for the past 46 years formally tendered his resignation. He thanked the Manager in his letter also the Council and said he was resigning due to illness.
The resignation was accepted with regret.
The question of the new appointment then arose and Messrs Dower and Terry said that it would be well to advertise the position and also to inform the Department that 40% Irish would be sufficient standard.
Senator Goulding—I can't agree with that.
Mr Heskin—I think you should round up all the collectors and examine their Irish.
It was stated that the area was small and that if no appli-

Damage And Abuse
Claim Adjourned
Damage To E.S.B. Power Station

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr Sean Troy, D.J. on Tuesday last.

Examination Order Refused
Messrs Farrell & Morrissey Solicitors on behalf of David Riordan Shandon applied for an examination order against James Butler plasterer Congress Villas.

Mr Farrell said that the claim arose out of a decree given against defendant and Patrick Humble for £250 18s including costs on Nov 27th 1940 as a result of a trade union dispute. To date a sum of £15 had been paid.

Jas Butler in evidence said that he had been before the Court several times over this case. He had been in England but came home on Nov 28th last year.

Mr Farrell—What were your earnings in England?
Defendant—The basic wage was £3 12s with a subsistence allowance of 4s 6 for my wife. I used to work overtime. If I worked on Sundays which I did occasionally I got 27s 6 extra. There was no overtime during week-days.

Although you were earning this and have only a wife and two children you made no effort to pay anything to Riordan?
None.

Did you save anything?
When I came home I had £2 in my pockets.

Witness further stated that in January he worked 10 days for the Urban Council and on March 33rd he went to work at the new Cinema for Mr John McGrath for whom he received £4 4s 11d per week.

Mr Farrell—Are you going to pay anything now?
Defendant—How can I with pence so dear?
If you got £10 a week would you pay off the debt?
The Justice stated that he was satisfied defendant had been in a bad position and is unable to pay anything and he accordingly refused the application.

A similar application on behalf of Mary Ateridge Cathal Brugha Place against a neighbour Mary Nagle was also refused when his worship held there were no assets.

Mr L. P. Lanigan, Solr on behalf of Dungarvan Golf Club with a view to an extension of bar hours for a dance on May 28th.

School Attendance Acts
Guard Farrell had summonses against John Kiely Loughmore under above and he was fined 2/6. Bridget Flynn do fined 1/- and Mary Moynan Cathal Brugha Place 6/-.

Drunks and Vagrants
A fine of 5/- was imposed on John Healy Thomas Terrace who was summoned by Guard Deasy for being drunk.
Guard Giblin had a similar charge against Mary Moynan Cathal Brugha Place. In reply to the Justice the Guard said that she was an intolerable nuisance in town lately. She was warned and a fine of 5/- was imposed.

A number of boys from Shandon and Kilrush were charged with damaging the E.S.B. power station at Shandon by firing stones from catapults. The damage was estimated at 34/-.

The Justice warned the youths of the terrible destruction including loss of life which could result from their actions. He adjourned the charges to next court to allow each to pay 5/6 compensation.

CROTTY EMERGENCY POWERS (RETAIL DISTRIBUTION OF SHOTGUN CARTRIDGES) ORDER With the object of reserving a proportion of the limited available supply of shotgun cartridges for farmers for the protection of their crops and poultry against vermin the Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order entitled Emergency Powers (Retail Distribution of Shotgun Cartridges) Order 1944 under which a person who holds a limited firearm certificate may purchase not more than 12 cartridges during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 31st July 1944. A person who holds a £2 firearm certificate may purchase not more than 22 cartridges and such cartridges may be purchased during the month of July 1944 only. Special attention is directed to the fact that a registered firearms dealer may not sell cartridges to the holder of a £2 firearm certificate at any time unless he has sold to the holder of a limited firearm certificate who has applied to him for cartridges during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 30th June 1944, the number of cartridges which he is entitled to receive under the Order. Registered firearms dealers should note that while cartridges may be sold to the holder of a limited firearm certificate at any time during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 31st July 1944, cartridges may not be sold under any condition to the holder of a £2 firearm certificate during the period commencing on the 23rd May 1944 and ending on the 30th June 1944. An announcement as to the distribution of cartridges subsequent to the 31st July will be made later in the light of the prevailing supply position.
