Traffic Obstruction AT the Dungarvan District Court on Tuesday last two convictions against defendants who were charged with obstructing traffic by tying their horse and carts to electric light and telegraph standards were recorded. Superintendent P. O'Mahony pointed out that this class of offence was becoming very widespread and warned future offenders. We have seen accidents occurring frequently as a result of this action. Two and even more horses are tied to each pole and often the animals start fighting and cause carts and their contents to be upset in the streets. At times traffic is congested enough without these obstructions which cause blocks on busy occasions. Farmers and cart-owners should realise the danger of allowing their horses to be tied in such a manner and left unattended in the one position for hours. We hope that the Superintendent's warning will be taken to heart by all those for whom it is intended and that no future offences will have to be dealt with under this head.
