I am a nurse in the County Home Dungarvan An Tuesday morning I was called to the bed-side of deceased shortly after 8 a m I found the deceased in a shocked condition covered with dust and mortar with a wound on the right side of her forehead She was partly sitting up at the time but she then fainted I laid her back on the hed and put a pillow under her head I gave her a stimulant and she became conscious I and she became conscious I sasked her to have some more but she said she was alright and had enough She was subsefuently attended by Dr Mc-Carthy The deceased was admitted to the Co Home about She was in poor physical condition and was about 60 years old I was present when she died and I identify her as Margaret Power and believe she is unmarried I never noticed anything wrong with the ceiling

of her room

Medical Evidence

Dr D T McCuthy in his de position said I examined the deceased Margaret Power, sub sequent to her admission to the Co Home from the Cottage Hos pital Youghal, where she had heen a patient Prior to her ad mission she had suffered from severe internal bleeding. On ad mission she was in a very en feebled state of health suffering from advanced disease of the heart due to chronic inflammation of the heart muscle and bloodlessness I examined her on Tuesday morning at 8 45 a m and she was then dying There was a jagged wound on the right side of her forehead an inch in

length and about 1½ inches above the centre of the right eye brow There were no other wounds or signs of injury In my opinion death was due to cardiac failure accellerated by the shock due to the accident I visit this ward regularly and




