WATERFORD CO. COUNCIL

Councillors Protest Against Action Of Local Appointments Commissioners

KILMACKTHOMAS RATE COLLECTORSHIP

Senator J. Butler, Chairman of the Waterford Co. Council held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs Michael O'Ryan, L. Veale, T. Duggan, Michael Butler, W. Dowgan, M. F. Walsh, D. Coghlan, Michael McGrath, M. Hart, M. Keating, D. Foran, T. Power, Senator S. Goulding, G. Torpey, N. Sheehan and M. Morrissey, T.D., were present.

Mr. S. J. Moynihan, Co. Manager, T. B. Boyle, Acting Secretary and J. Ormond, B.E., Acting Co. Surveyor attended.

Overdraft
Resolutions were passed requesting the Munster & Leinster Bank, to grant overdraft accommodation of £30,000 on the general account and £20,000 on the turf account to December 31st next.

In reply to Mr. O'Ryan the acting Co. Surveyor said that this year's turf production exceeded the quantity of output over last year by 3,000 tons.

Re-appointments
The acting members on the Infirmary Board were unanimously re-appointed.

The vacancy on the Board of Assistance caused by the disqualification of Mr. Veale for non-attendance was filled by his re-appointment.

The Tramway Development Association wrote concerning the filling of the vacancy caused by the resignation of Rev. T. B. Walsh, B.A., P.P. from the Vocational Education Committee and requested that the vacancy be filled by a representative from the Tramway area.

The Acting Secretary said that he had received no official notification of the resignation from the Vocational Education Committee.

Chairman—We can do nothing so the matter was adjourned to the next meeting.

Slaughter House Bye Laws
The next matter was the adoption of bye-laws in respect of slaughter houses and copies were circulated among the members.

Mr. Coghlan—Must those already in business now comply with these regulations when they come into force?

Chairman—Yes.

Manager—They must all conform with the regulations and a Veterinary Surgeon will inspect each premises.

Mr. Coghlan—It is generally thought that those who are already licensed need not apply again?

Chairman—They must all apply again.

Manager—It will be a great protection for the public to have these bye laws passed.

Mr. O'Ryan suggested adjourning the matter until next meeting in order to give the members a chance of studying them and this was agreed.

Kilmackthomas Rate Collectors

The Manager said that with regard to the resolution passed at the last meeting that Michael Connors, Park Stradbally, be again examined in Irish the Department had replied stating that they were not prepared to deviate from their previous decision that the position should be filled from the existing qualified candidates.

The Manager then said that in accordance with the Managerial Act he carried out the wishes of the Council and Connors was examined on August 19th by the same examiner. The examiner's report stated that he was now able to conduct the business of the position in Irish and that he has improved very much since the last examination.

The Manager said that having done this any further action on the matter was up to the Co. Council.

Chairman—The only thing we can do is to send the result of that examination to the Department.

Senator Goulding—Yes that is all you can do until you get a reply to that.

A resolution was then passed requesting the Manager to send the certificate of the examinee to the Department as Michael Connors has now fully qualified himself to conduct the duties in Irish.

The Acting Secretary then read out the conditions for a similar vacancy in the Templemichael district.

It was decided to issue advertisements and to hold a meeting in three weeks to deal with the filling of both vacancies.

The Chairman drew attention to the clause concerning Irish and pointed out that the Council had passed a resolution to the effect that 40% should be sufficient. He asked if the Department had replied to that resolution and Mr. Boyle said no.

Mr. O'Ryan—That matter should be left to the examiner.

If the Irish language is to come into its own all must qualify to conduct their business in Irish. A lot of spouting has been done about the language but very little has been done. We here in Waterford with a Gaeltacht and a breac-Ghaeltacht should give a lead and demand that a good knowledge of Irish be required in all positions.

Mr. Morrissey—In order to avoid all further disputes in this matter I think the examiner should be asked to inform the Council as to whether a candidate can or cannot do the business in Irish. The use of percentages is misleading.

This was agreed to.

Kilmackthomas And Turf
The Department wrote stating that they are not prepared to determine the whole county in the scheduled turf area. It was further stated that no turf goes to Kilmackthomas direct as there are no facilities there for weighing wagons.

Mr. Coghlan said that since the beginning of the war the Government had encouraged Parish Councils to cut turf and Kilmackthomas Parish Council did and distributed it to the poor for 34/- to 39/- per ton. Now the Government say they can't cut there and the poor people have to pay 64/- a ton plus carriage from Waterford from Fuel Importers. This was a great hardship, especially when turf could be cut only a few miles from Kilmackthomas. It was also impossible to purchase Co. Council turf.

Mr. Goulding—That's an extraordinary situation especially when Parish Councils are non-profit making bodies.

Mr. Coghlan—It looks as if the people are being fleeced so that Fuel Importers can charge 64/- a ton for the turf.

Mr. O'Ryan—The county representatives and Senators should go to the Department and thresh out this appalling situation.

Chairman—The Department's letter says that existing arrangements do not involve any extra cost to local merchants. This is obviously wrong.

Mr. Hart—It is a false statement.

It was decided to write for an appointment with the Minister to receive a deputation on the matter. The deputation to consist of T.D.'s Senators and Mr. Coghlan.

Bad Roads
Mr. Walsh drew the Acting Co. Surveyor's attention to the bad state of the Tourin road and Mr. Goulding said that Tourin school suffers from flooding as the road level is higher than the school.

Mr. Ormond said he would attend to the matters.

Miscellaneous
The Department replied that existing arrangements for the sale of turf were more satisfactory than sale by cubic capacity as proposed by the Council.

Concerning the allotting of lorries for transport of turf it was stated that the G.S.R. were doing as much as possible.

A reply on the resolution concerning agricultural footwear stated that every possible effort was being made to afford an adequate supply.

A resolution from Dungarvan Old Age Pensions Committee that a 50% increase be granted, and that the means test be amended was adopted.

On Mr. Ryan's suggestion it was decided to request the Minister to add the townland of Knockanarinn to Clonmel R.D.

Western Divisional Board meeting held at CYMS Cappoquin on Sunday Aug. 20th at 8.15 p.m.

Mr M Connors Chairman presided. Also present Vice-Chairman P Ryan, Co Board and T A Kyne, Secretary. Mr M V O'Donoghue Co. Board Chairman was also present. A good number of delegates from clubs attended.

The minutes were taken as read on proposal of P Ryan, seconded by T Flives.

Mr P Moloney raised the question of referees report made on last match at Aghlish. After a short discussion the matter dropped. The Chairman remarking that referees were expected to report on the stewarding and general conditions at venues.

A patch of ground outside Mr Draper's house is the nucleus of the present world famed Irish College at Ring. On that patch of ground forty two years ago a

dozen visitors to Ring was conducted by Archbishop Sheehan, (then Dr Sheehan of Maynooth College). Archbishop McGrath was one of that group, he was then an ecclesiastical student.

Since he became a priest and twice as Bishop of Menavia and once as Archbishop of Cardiff Archbishop McGrath has visited Mr Draper at Ballinagoul, where he spent some hours in the room he occupied there forty years ago and called upon those who survived of the folk from whose store of Irish lore he filled many a notebook during his student days at Ring.

The Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr Sean Troy DJ, at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Tuesday last.

Civil Bills

A number of undefended civil bills were dealt with, and decrees given in all cases.

Ejectment Order

Mrs Bridget Moloney, Durrrow, sought an ejectment order against Mrs Bridget Quill. The Pike in respect of a house owned by Mrs Moloney, and tenanted by Mrs Quill.

Mr Kenny solr was for Mrs Moloney, and Mr Williams, solr, defended.

It will be remembered that this issue was tried at the last Circuit Court when Judge Sealy found in favour of defendant. The evidence given in the case was similar to that at the Circuit Court.

Mr Kenny solr, said that Mrs Quill, had two premises at the Pike one a licensed premises and the other a private house which was the cause of the present dispute. There is good accommodation in the licensed premises, but Mrs Quill resides here alone, while her husband and family live in the other house owned by Mrs Moloney. His client has to reside with her aunt at Durrrow which is nine miles from where her husband works while this second house occupied by Mrs Quill, is only about 200 yards from his place of employment.

Mr Ml Hassett, BE proved a map of the licensed premises occupied by Mrs Quill, and said that with slight alterations there would be five bedrooms in the house which in his opinion would be ample space for a family of ten.

To Mr Williams—The witness agreed that materials for such alterations would be very difficult to get.

Michael Moloney said that he married Miss Bridget Cummins last June. He is a farrier by occupation and works with his father at Ballymacmague. His wife lives in Durrrow nine miles away, and sometimes he is unable to get home at night being too tired after a hard day's work to cycle the distance. It is impossible to get a house anywhere in the locality or even in Dungarvan.

Mr Williams, questioned witness as to the number of people living in his father's house before witness got married, and Mr Moloney replied that there were six boys but the limited space did them no harm as they were all over six feet.

Mrs Quill, defendant said she was the owner of a public house at the Pike and was the tenant of the other house a couple of hundred yards away at 4/- per week. She has a family of eleven ranging in ages from 25 years to six. There are eight—four boys and four girls permanently at home and the others are away. She sleeps in the licensed premises with two of the children and the rest of the family live in the other house where they all have their meals.

The Justice cross-examined Mrs Quill as to the accommodation in the licensed premises and stated that with some alterations there should be ample room for all.

The issue as to which party suffered the greater hardship was then argued, and the Justice said that if he refused the application Mrs Moloney and her husband would suffer a hardship to which there was no solution as the latter would have to cycle nine miles in all weather to his work. If he gave the application Mrs Quill and her family would be upset but she can solve her problem by having a few alterations carried out at the licensed premises and then be quite comfortable. He thought that the greater hardship was on the Moloney's and on that account he gave an order for possession and allowed a stay of two months in the execution of the order.

Exemptions

On the application of Mr Williams, solr exemptions were granted to Clonea Hotel and Egah's Hotel while an application by Mr Farrell solr for a dance licence for an L.D.F. dance at Coolnasmear on August 27th was also granted.

Publican Fined

Supt P O'Mahony summoned a local publican for a breach of the licensing laws on August 6th last. Four men found on the premises were also charged.

Mr Kenny solr appeared for all the defendants and pleaded guilty and said the case was a trivial one.

Guard Farrell gave evidence of having been on duty with Guard Deasy on Sunday Aug 6th and at 4.35 p.m. they called at Cooney's and found four men on the premises adjoining Mrs Cooney's. When questioned they

admitted having been in the public house.

The Justice imposed a penalty of £2 on the publican and fined the men found on the premises 2/6 each.

Solicitor Claims Bye-Laws Defective

S J Moynihan, Co. Manager, acting for Dungarvan UDC summoned Mrs Kathleen Morrissey 88 O'Connell St, that on June 20th 1944, and divers dates she did use and occupy a premises in 88, O'Connell St, as a slaughter house without first having a license for it in accordance with the bye-laws.

Mr Williams, solr, prosecuted and Mr Morrissey solr, defended. A similar case was brought against Mr Michael Brennock victualler Grattan Square for whom Mr Kenny, solr, appeared and both cases were taken together.

Mr Williams said that Mrs Morrissey applied for a license to the UDC and the plaintiffs then instructed Mr Byrne their Veterinary Inspector to inspect the premises and he reported that unless certain alterations were carried out the license could not be granted. Mrs Morrissey was notified of this but did nothing and continued to use the premises.

Mr Michael O'Meara in evidence said he was the Acting Town Clerk and defendant applied for a license. He was informed to instruct the Veterinary Inspector to inspect the place as a result of which he informed Mrs Morrissey that unless the alterations recommended were carried out the license could not be granted. The license had not since been granted as the alterations have not been carried out to meet the Veterinary Inspectors requirements.

Mr R P Byrne V.S. said that he was the Veterinary Inspector for Dungarvan Urban District Council and he was instructed to inspect Mrs Morrissey's Slaughterhouse. He did so and found it was not suitable and reported the matter. He suggested some alterations and when he visited the premises some months later he found nothing done.

Mr Morrissey—There is nothing in the bye-laws to give you authority to compel these alterations being carried out before granting a license.

Mr Byrne—No.

Mr Morrissey—Isn't the slaughter house well kept?

Mr Byrne—It is kept clean. Mr Morrissey then went on to quote the law on the matter and stated that the bye laws were not clear and to the point as required by the Town's Improvement Act. He also stated that the Council could be compelled by a certiorari from the High Court to grant the licence.

Justice—You say in short that the bye-laws are no good?

Mr Morrissey—They are defective.

Mr Kenny solr at this point said that his argument on the law of the case was the same as Mr Morrissey's.

Mr Williams—Mrs Morrissey has broken the Town's Improvement Act by using a slaughter house without a license.

Justice—That fact is the Urban Council's fault.

Mr Morrissey—Yes they put us in a false position.

Mr Williams—Two wrongs do not make a right. These defendants should have licenses, and while using their premises now they are breaking the statute. The bye laws adopted by the Urban District Council are in the usual form as used all over the country and are sanctioned by the Minister.

Mr Byrne recalled said the great fault with Mrs Morrissey's slaughter house is that it is too small and is open to contamination.

Justice—Section 126 of the Towns Improvement Act gives the defendants no authority to use the premises without licenses and an offence has been committed. As to whether the

council are right in refusing the license is another days work. Mr Morrissey said that the slaughter house of Mrs Morrissey was clean and well kept and the refusal to grant a license was unjust.

Justice—I will impose a nominal fine of 10/- in each case and that will give you the chance of taking any course you may take in the Circuit Court.

Larceny Of Timber

Four young boys from Abbey side were charged by Supt O'Mahony with the larceny of timber from the land managed by Mr Roger Hayes at Tournore.

Mr Hayes said that much damage to gaps and fences had been done by trespassers cutting the trees and he said that the amount of timber taken would be about £2.

Detective Guard Gordon gave evidence of investigating the case.

The Justice imposed fines of 2/6 on each defendant and ordered them to refund 10/- compensation in each case.

Larceny

Supt O'Mahony charged Margaret Crotty a girl under 16 years from Killrossanty with the larceny of various sums of money.

The Supt said that defendant did odd jobs for neighbours and in February while working in Mr Powers shop she took some money. Mr Powers missed £3 or £4 but the girl says she only took 18/6 in all.

She also took £2 from Mr Whelan last June and 11/- or 12/- from Mr Walsh, but all this has been paid back. The 18/6 was also proffered but was declined.

The defendant said she bought sweets with the money she took. When defendant's father paid the 18/6 into Court the Justice gave her the benefit of the P.O.A.

CARRICK NEWS

The Late Dr W H Bowen, Enniscorthy—The news of the death following a very brief illness of Dr Wm H Bowen Enniscorthy Co Wexford came as a great shock to his many friends all over Ireland.

The late Dr Bowen was a brother of Mr John Bowen BE Ballinparka, Dungarvan, Waterford's efficient and highly-respected Co Surveyor and of Mr James Bowen the popular and highly capable Manager of the Provincial Bank of Ireland Dungarvan. Mr Vincent Bowen Midleton Co Cork and the late Mr Richard Bowen BE Co Surveyor Kilkenny and City Surveyor for Kilkenny Corporation. He was son of the late Mr Patk Bowen Ballyvargan House Monkstown Co Cork who was for a number of years Chairman of Co Cork Farmers' Union and one of the leading agriculturalists and stock-breeders in that county and was a very prominent figure as a judge in the horse and cattle sections at Agricultural Shows.

Dr Bowen was qualified in 1913 at UCC. He took up position in December of that year in Enniscorthy. The following year he was appointed a Medical Officer to the Co Home Enniscorthy. He had a very large practice in Co Wexford where he was greatly esteemed and respected for his many fine qualities. In 1926 he married Dr Pauline McGrath daughter of the late Mr Thomas McGrath and Mrs McGrath Main Street Carrick-on-Suir. Deep sympathy is felt for his bereaved widow his four children and for his brothers and sisters and the other relatives.

The late Dr Bowen was an enthusiastic sportsman. He was a director of the Enniscorthy Greyhound Coursing Company, and Chairman of Enniscorthy Branch of the Irish Red Cross Society. The interment took place on Saturday last at Enniscorthy after Office and High Mass.

Waterford Camogie County Board.

IMPORTANT MEETING IN CAPPOQUIN.

An important meeting of the Waterford Camogie County Board was held in Conways Hotel, Cappoquin on last Sunday night.

Rev Wm Flynn P.P. Knockanore, President presided and other officials present being Miss Galt Flynn B.A. Com, Dungarvan Chairman, Miss M Montagne, Knockanore, Hon Sec and Miss M Cronin Lismore Hon Registrar.

There was a large attendance of delegates nine out of the twelve affiliated clubs being represented by two delegates each the recently formed Cappoquin being represented by Miss Biddy McCarthy, Captain and Miss Maureen Keating, Hon Sec.

Venue For The Tipperary v Waterford Match

The Rev Chairman said that although the Munster Council had originally fixed Clonmel as the venue for the Tipperary v Waterford match both Miss Flynn Chairman and Miss Montagne, Hon Sec had since got into touch with Mr Dynan Sec Munster Council and as a result of their efforts Mr Dynan had now agreed that the venue be changed to the Co Waterford.

Mr L Condon, Dungarvan asked if the venue could be in any part of the Co Waterford and the Chairman said it could not as the match must be played either in Cappoquin or Lismore so it was a matter for the Board to fix the venue now.

Before they came to this point he wished to state that he had been approached on the matter by Mr Lineen Lismore that evening who gave him a guarantee that if the match was fixed for Lismore they would give the Gaelic field free and have it carefully lined and prepared absolutely free of all charge and since then he had received a similar guarantee on behalf of the Cappoquin Sportsfield where they had been playing their test matches so far. It was now for the delegates to decide which field would be their choice and he was now prepared to take any propositions which may be made in the matter.

Miss M Noonan Lismore then proposed that the match be played in Lismore and this was seconded by Miss McGrath Aglish.

Miss Munsfield Clashmore proposed the Cappoquin Sportsfield and this was seconded by Miss C Flynn Dungarvan.

A poll by ballot was then taken, when Lismore received 11 votes and Cappoquin 8 so that Lismore was declared the venue and Miss Noonan thanked all the delegates who had voted for Lismore.

Attention having been called to the fact that there was no railing around the Lismore field now and that it would be impossible to charge for side-line seats, Miss Noonan gave a guarantee that this defect would be remedied and that all the arrangements would be perfect for the fixture.

The date of the match was then fixed for Sunday Sept 3rd at 5 o'clock (S.T.) and on the motion of Mr L Condon seconded by Miss Noonan Mr David Maher Aidfinnan Co Tipperary was appointed referee on the suggestion of the chairman who said it was only fair that they should have a Co Tipperary referee.

For the position of four goal umpires and two linesmen it was decided to have three from Lismore and three from Tipperary while the members of the Lismore hurling club will be responsible for the appointment of collectors at the gates and also for the general stewarding of the field.

It was decided to hold a Ceilidhe on that night in Scannlan's Hall from 10 to 3 a.m. the Lismore delegates to engage the Hill and a Ceilidhe Band of 5 performers for the occasion.

It was also decided to have both the match and ceilidhe advertised in both Dungarvan papers this week and next and Miss Montagne Sec said she would attend to this matter.

Arrangements were next made for the transport of the various members of the team to Lismore for the match and it was decided that all members should report at the Hotel in Lismore at 4 o'clock an hour previous to the match.

The Rev Chairman then read out the names of the various players who had been selected for the team which showed the team of 12 to be represented as follows—Dungarvan 5, Clashmore 2, Ballyduff 2, Knocka 2 and Cappoquin 1 the latter being Miss B. McCarthy Capt. Cappoquin team who has been selected for the centre field position.

The chairman thanked the members of the Selection committee for the great trouble they had gone to in selecting the best possible team available and he wished the players every success in their match against the pick of Tipperary on Sunday week.

Draw For the County Championship

Before proceeding with the draw for the Co Championship, the Sec said she had not yet received the affiliation fee from the Cappoquin club.

Mr John F Ryan Cappoquin said that at the meeting on the previous Monday night, when the Cappoquin club was formed, Mr P Cunningham Hon Sec, hurlings club promised to have the club affiliated when he was in Dungarvan the next day, and he understood that this had been done.

Mr L Condon said that Paddy Cunningham had called on him on Tuesday and offered him the affiliation fee for the Cappoquin club but he had told him to hold the money and hand it in at the meeting here tonight.

Mr Ryan said that Mr Cunningham was attending a meeting of the Western Divisional Board which was being held in the C Y M S Hall simultaneously with this meeting otherwise he would have been present now to hand in the money. Mr Joe O'Donnell Cappoquin then went down to Mr Cunningham and returned immediately with the necessary affiliation fee after which the Cappoquin Club was declared duly affiliated and included in the Draw.

It was unanimously decided to accept the set of medals and the best thanks of the Board were voted to Father Morrissey for his generous and sporting offer which was only in keeping with his past record while he was the only one in keeping with his past record while he was the popular pastor of Knockanore.

Captain Of The County Team

It was unanimously decided that Miss Biddy McGrath Dungarvan act as Captain of the Waterford team in the match against Tipperary and it was also decided that the colours of the Knockanore Club be worn by the Waterford team on the occasion.

Thanks To The Press

Several other matters having been disposed of the Rev Chairman said he wished to express his best thanks to the Press for being present that night, and also for the great assistance which it was giving to the Camogie Association in general to which Mr John F Ryan "Leader" Correspondent, Cappoquin suitably replied, which concluded a most harmonious and business-like meeting.

CO WATERFORD PRIEST IN NEW YORK DIOCESE APPOINTED DOMESTIC PRELATE—The "Catholic News" of New York Diocese in a recent issue

just received in this country announces that His Holiness, Pope Pius XII has been pleased to appoint the Rev Patrick J O'Donnell Ph.D. to the dignity of Domestic Prelate. He is Pastor of St Jerome's Church, Bronx, New York City.

Monsignor O'Donnell was born at Lismore Co Waterford on Sept 2nd 1876 and was ordained in New York on June 21st 1901. After serving as a curate at St Joseph's Church Bronx New York and at Holy Innocents Church and St Francis de Sales Church New York he was appointed Pastor of the Immaculate Conception Church, Tompkins Cove, New York on October 1st 1920. In the month of Nov 1925 he was appointed Pastor of the Church of St Charles Borromeo. Assigned to the Pastorate of St Gregory's Church New York City in August 27th 1929 he remained in charge of this large Parish for 14 years. On Nov 11th 1943, His Grace The Most Rev Dr Spellman Archbishop of New York appointed Monsignor O'Donnell to one of the largest Parishes in the Diocese namely St Jerome's Parish, Bronx New York City.

Before going to the United States Monsignor O'Donnell studied at Maynooth College and received the degrees of Bachelor of Canon Law and Bachelor of Divinity. Later after post graduate work at Columbia University New York he received the degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy.

For many years Monsignor O'Donnell has been deeply interested in Ireland and has visited this country regularly. He has been Chaplain of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and from his earliest years has taken a prominent part in the St Patrick's Day Parade in the City of New York.

LATE MR MAURICE O'BRIEN, ABBEYSIDE—Very deep and sincere regret was caused by the death of Mr Maurice O'Brien Sarsfield St. Abbeyside, which occurred at his home in the early hours of Monday morning last August 21st after a brief illness, and despite the careful attentions of Dr D T McCarthy. His death has removed one of the old landmarks from the village and his cheery salutations and homely voice will be missed by all.

In his young days with his twin brother Gusto he followed the calling of the sea and sailed in many old schooners. He was also brother of Mr Patrick O'Brien now domiciled in Wales who was formerly Captain of the famous "Harvey". Later when they had retired from active sailing they were always familiar figures on the quayside. At the old Patterns of Abbeyside their whistling and singing of sea-shanties was always a feature as many of the older inhabitants will well remember.

We all mourn his passing and pray God may rest his soul.

The remains were removed to Abbeyside Church on Tuesday evening accompanied by a very large cortege and were received by Rev M Power CC, who also read the last prayers at the burial in the adjoining graveyard on Wednesday.

A large number of Mass cards were received and a beautiful wreath in the form of an anchor was laid on the coffin by Mrs Carey Sarsfield St.

The chief mourners were—Gusto (twin-brother), Michael and Patrick (brothers), and Miss Margaret O'Brien (sister) Mrs M O'Brien (sister-in-law), Miss May O'Brien and Mrs J Daly, (nieces) Messrs M Seamus and Sean O'Brien (nephews), etc etc.

Waterford Co. Board G. A. A.

A special meeting of the Waterford Co Board, G.A.A. was held in the CYMS Hall, Mary St., Dungarvan, on Tuesday, night, August 22nd.

Mr M V O'Donoghue BE presided. Also present—Messrs T. A. Kyne M O'Connor, P Ryan, W Barron J Fives M McCarthy, P. Duggan P Donnelly, P Kenneally, (proxy for C Ware), Rev Fr Kelleher (proxy for P J O'Sullivan NT), Sean Murphy, Treasurer, and D Guid, Runaidhe.

The following clubs were represented—Dungarvan—P J Kelliher T O'Mahony Stradbally—K Wheilan Kilrossanty—P J Lynch, Portlaw—W Harney, M Hickey, Erin's Own—J Murphy.

The main item on the agenda was the Board's enquiry into the failure of the senior football fixture Kilrossanty v Army which was billed to take place at Clonea, on Sunday August 6th.

The following report by the Co Secretary, on the matter was read—

To the Chairman and Members, Waterford Co Board G.A.A.—On Sunday, August 6th, 1944, I arrived at Clonea-Power to supervise and referee the senior football Co Championship match Kilrossanty v Army on arrival at 3 p.m. (ST) I was informed by a member of the Kilrossanty club that there was going to be no match as there was a notice up in the field "Trespassers will be prosecuted." I proceeded to the house of P J O'Sullivan NT, and County Board member, whose wife informed me that he had left half an hour ago and he was gone in the direction of Carrick I then returned to the Cross adjacent to the field where a large crowd had gathered anticipating that a match would be played. Accompanied by Garda M Moloney Leamybrien, I went to the house of Mr C Power owner of the field where we met the man in question. He seemed not anxious to discuss the matter at all, but said he was approached by the hurlers and he could not go against their wishes, he however eventually explained the fact that there was going to be no match played in the field. When questioned about notice "Trespassers will be prosecuted" he said he did not put up the notice in the field, and said I suppose the hurlers put that up themselves. In my opinion, which confirms that of Garda Moloney, he seemed to be afraid to have anything to do with the fixture. Before leaving him he again assured us that there was no match going to be played in the field. We then returned to the boreen leading to the playing field, the gate of the field was closed against us (stapled) and with Garda Moloney, I took note of the notice which was pinned to a post and stuck in the ground. "Notice Trespassers will be prosecuted By order C Power" I then approached the waiting crowd and explained the position to them, and that there was going to be no match played in the field. I said it was most unfair to the majority of the Kilrossanty team and all the army players who had cycled such a long distance to fulfil the engagement and I regretted under the circumstances that there would be no match played. When portion of the crowd had dispersed I had an interview with David Shanahan Secretary Clonea Club, and I asked him what was the cause of the field not being available for the fixture. He informed me that they had a meeting of the club during the week and at the

meeting it was agreed that everything should go on the same as usual. On Saturday backed by club co-operation he made arrangements to prepare the field for the match even though by this time the whole parish was against them. The field was mowed and lined and general arrangements completed but then there seemed to be a difference of opinion about carrying out the fixture, and during the night the goal posts were taken up and bits scattered all over the road. He had no idea who was to blame and it came as a surprise to him when he was informed of what had happened during the night. Along with the goal posts being scattered there was slogans white-washed on the roads and I took a note of same, not all and they are as follows—

- 1 Hurling dies where it was born? Why
- 2 Up Clonea (with hurleys crossed)
- 3 Until justice is restored hurling is dead
- 4 What about our 1929 medals

The general opinion was that the attitude of the locals was a kind of reprisal against the suspension of the Clonea Chairman P Power by the Co Board and to this alone may be attributed the fact that the fixture failed to materialise.

This, my report on the matter is made in all fairness to all concerned and the facts contained therein are true and correct and I warrant the accuracy of my report which is now before you for your most careful consideration—Mise, Deuglan Guid, Runaidhe.

D Shanahan and P Flynn Clonea, came before the Board and said they had nothing further to add, as the Co Secretary had covered the matter in full in his report.

After a lengthy discussion the Board decided on the following on the proposition of Mr Kyne—

"That the Board postpone disciplinary action until the next Board meeting pending re-organisation of Clonea club under chairmanship of Rev Fr Kelleher, and on condition of a public repudiation on Press of what happened on August 6th at Clonea and that a fine of £5 be imposed to meet expenses incurred by abortive fixture."

The Board decided that until the above order is carried out Clonea club cannot participate in Eastern Championships.

Mr McGrath drew attention to the very bad supply of domestic water in several areas due to the dry spell and councillors were instructed to send in lists to the Acting Co Surveyor.

On the proposal of Mr Sheehan who said the time was now opportune a resolution was passed asking the Minister for Defence to remove road barriers.

Protest Against Local Appointments Commissioners

Mr Harty dealing with the appointment of a Secretary to the Co Council said that he had heard a day or two before that Mr Boyle Acting Secretary was not appointed permanently to the position. A very large number of people throughout the county had been upset and disappointed at the news. Mr Boyle had been an official of the Council since 1912 and the Manager or the Council had not been asked as to his efficiency, neither had the Chairman but four or five men in Dublin after an interview of one hour formed their opinion of a gentleman who has 28 years sound experience and one of the best officials in Ireland. Mr Harty further stated that present legislation is dictatorial and bureaucratic, and he said the Council should strongly oppose and resent the attitude of the Local Appointments Commissioners and the Minister in appointing a man to supersede Mr Boyle. In taking this action they would have the backing of everyone in Waterford.

Mr Veale—There was surprise and disappointment at the news and this method of appointment will kill all incentive as there will be no chance of promotion and I know that no better official could come here than Mr Boyle.

Mr O'Ryan—No one would be more glad to see Mr Boyle appointed than myself but I don't agree with Mr Harty's remarks on the Appointments Commissioners.

Mr McGrath—Who are they?

Mr O'Ryan—The Chairman of the Dail Mr Fahy and two others with various panels for selection purposes.

Mr Gouling—I agree that a more efficient official could not be found to fill the position. I have long experience of Mr Boyle's good work but the Appointments Commissioners are an established body and we must abide by their decisions even though they may not always suit.

Mr Veale—The rotten thing I see about the Commissioners is that promotion is killed by their method of appointment.

Mr Coghlan—Practical experience should count more than anything else.

Mr Morrissey—We all regret the position and I agree with matters as generally expressed but I also believe in the Appointments Commissioners. Tommy Boyle is one of the best officials that could be found but our hands are tied and we are powerless.

Mr Butler—I have served on the Co Council for 24 years and know the splendid work of Mr Boyle which has given entire

satisfaction to all and his non-appointment is a great disappointment to us.

Mr Gouling—As no official appointment has been notified yet why not make an appeal to have the post filled by promotion from the existing staff.

A resolution to this effect was proposed by Senator Gouling and seconded by Mr Morrissey, TD and passed unanimously.

Mr Boyle thanked the members for their kind remarks and consideration.
