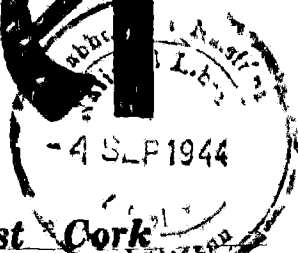

WATERFORD HONOURS MEMORY OF BROTHER RICE

Pope's Message Of Praise To Brothers

With a dignity befitting the city where he planted the first seeds of his enterprise Waterford on Sunday last celebrated the first centenary of the death of Rev Brother Edmund Ignatius Rice founder of the Irish Christian Brothers, at the Cathedral of the Most Holy Trinity His Lordship Most Rev Dr Cohalan, Bishop of Waterford and Lismore presided at Solemn High Mass, which was attended by An Taoiseach Mr de Valera Mr P J Little, Minister for Posts and Telegraphs Mr T Derrig Minister for Education members of the Dail and Senate clergy and members of religious communities from all parts of the Diocese, the Mayor (Councillor B Cunningham) members and officials of Waterford Corporation as well as representatives of public bodies and various organisations of the City and County There was a particularly strong representation of Christian Brothers from the different Houses of the Order which was led by Very Rev Brother Noonan LLD Superior-General

The Army Garda Siochana the Maritime Inspection and other Voluntary Defence Services as well as the Red Cross and the Knights of Malta, also had their representatives in the impressively large congregation The centenary sermon was preached by Rev P Canon Power D Litt MRIA the distinguished historian and archaeologist and one of the oldest surviving pupils of Mount Sion

In the afternoon a public religious procession took place from Mount Sion to the historic hill of Ballybricken where the Te Deum was chanted and the Bishop officiated at Benediction at an open-air altar Six bands took part in the procession which was most impressive That the citizens entered fully into the spirit of the great occasion was in evidence both in the striking numbers in which they attended the sacred ceremonies and also in the profusion of bunting with which the city was decorated

In the interval between the High Mass and the procession the Bishop An Taoiseach and the Ministers were guests of honour at a luncheon given by the Centenary Committee, A military guard of honour was drawn up before the Cathedral, and on Mr de Valera's arrival the large crowd in the precincts accorded him a hearty reception Having inspected the guard of honour, he was received at the Cathedral entrance by Rev J O'Connor Adm

The music of the High Mass was sung by the Rice Centenary Choir, under the conductorship of Rev Bro P G Carbery Mount Sion Mr M J Bowman MA B Mus, presided at the organ The accompaniments of the Credo and Hallelujah Chorus were specially written by Mr Bowman for the Centenary Mass

Previous to the sermon Very Rev Canon Power read the following message addressed to Very Rev Brother Noonan from the Holy Father

The Supreme Pontiff learns with paternal satisfaction of the worthy commemorative celebration of the first centenary of the passing away of your beloved founder Brother Edmund Ignatius Rice The immense services rendered to the Catholic Church by the Christian Schools in all parts of the world evoke the deepest gratitude to the memory of that great pioneer in the cause of Catholic education in Ireland, while his heroic example should incite his religious Brothers to ever greater efforts in the fulfilment of their sublime mission transmitted to them by his venerated founder The Holy Father deeply convinced of the necessity of ever wider diffusion of Christian teaching felicitates the Brothers on the admirable results of their founder's life-work and wishing

Regrettable Occurrence In Dungarvan

YOUNG SOLDIER KILLED

On Wednesday night last August 30th an occurrence which shocked the entire town took place when 22-year-old Private C Daly a native of Raheen Clara Co Offaly, and a member of the Defence Forces in this area met his death as the result of an attack at the passage leading from the Square to the Quay outside the sawmills of Messrs Sheehan Ryan & Co The occurrence took place at 9.45 pm in almost complete darkness

Private Daly was accompanied by a Corporal, who also suffered injuries in the fray and before they could be apprehended the attackers made off

Intense Garda activity was visible throughout Thursday and several young men were brought to the Garda Barracks for questioning

The remains of the young soldier as we go to Press lie in the District Hospital Dungarvan The State Pathologist Dr McGrath and Dr D T McCarthy Coroner for West Waterford will we understand perform a post-mortem examination this (Friday) morning and an inquest will later be held

Investigations are proceeding under Chief Supt M A J O'Reilly Waterford Supt P O'Mahony Dungarvan and members of the CID

The people of the town stand aghast at the tragedy and have voiced deep protest against the action and hope that the culprits will soon be brought to justice by the Authorities

Carrick-on-Suir Monastery and Schools of the Christian Brothers were established in 1805—Carrick was the second foundation in Ireland

Well Known Suir Fisherman's Death—Suir Anglers attended in large numbers on Sunday at the funeral of Mr Michael Power, Tracey Park Carrick-on-Suir Deceased was known to scores of anglers for his skill as a fisherman and his pleasant companionship He was known to his hosts of friends as 'John O' In the April number of 'The Bell' a Dublin priest who visits Carrick for fishing and was very friendly with 'John O' wrote a poem 'A Lament For John O' who had gone to work in England He returned to Carrick in May of this year suffering from heart trouble He died following a heart attack on Friday night last 26th August

It yet more abundant fruits paternally imparts from the fullness of his heart his Apostolic Benediction on all the participants of the centenary celebrations

The message was signed by Mons Montini

Dungarvan Celebrations

Centenary celebrations to commemorate the death of Rev Edmund Ignatius Rice illustrious founder of the Christian Brothers Order will be held in Dungarvan on Sunday the 17th of September. Solemn High Mass will be celebrated by Very Rev Canon O'Brien P.P. V.F. at 11.30 a.m. at which Rev. Mce O'Meara C.C. Kilgobinet will preach a special sermon. A lecture on the life and work of Rev Edmund Ignatius Rice to which the public will be admitted free will be delivered at 8.30 p.m. in the Town Hall by Rev Brother Fitzpatrick Superior Waterpark College Waterford and special items will be contributed by local artists and the pupils of the Dungarvan Christian Brothers Schools.

The local Committee desire to draw the attention of the public to the proposal to erect a fitting Memorial to commemorate the Centenary of the death of the Founder of the Order. OBITUARIES

MR TOM O'BRIEN, DYRICK.
We regret to record the death of Mr Tom O'Brien Dyrick which occurred recently. Tom was a well known IRA man and was O.C. of Dyrick Coy in the period 1916 to 1923. He was a member of West Waterford Brigade Flying Column and was through many hard fight during the War of Independence. His health suffered as a result of his activities in active service, and was no doubt the cause of his death at an early age.

Prominent IRA men from all parts of West Waterford were among the large attendance at the funeral and burial at Touraneena.

CAPPOQUIN NEWS

THE NEW CINEMA PROJECT "GOING STRONG"

When the first exclusive announcement about the opening of a New Cinema in Cappoquin appeared in the Leader a couple of months ago it gave the greatest satisfaction to all classes of the people here and throughout the surrounding districts but as nothing further had been published about it in the meantime and there was no outward sign of the building being started many persons began to think that the project was still-born and that nothing more would be heard about it.

Those of us who had thought differently had our confidence fully justified on last Monday when an advertisement appeared in the Dublin Papers from Messrs Farrell & Morrissey Solrs Dungarvan inviting tenders from experienced contractors for the erection of a New Cinema in Cappoquin. Plans and specifications of the new building can be obtained from Messrs Farrell & Morrissey, solrs and as tenders must be lodged with them not later than Sept 9th it looks as if no time will be lost in starting the work so that everything points to the new Cinema being completed in time to be open to the public before we have gone far into the dark and desolate nights of winter.

It has long been a matter for reproach that no effort had been made to provide suitable entertainment for the townspeople or the hundreds of picture-lovers residing in the thickly-populated country districts around Cappoquin and great credit is now due to Mr W J McCarthy general merchant and those associated with him for having at last so pluckily embarked on this important project which we hope will be attended with every success as a reward for their great courage and enterprise in the matter.

MINOR HURLING MATCH FALLS THROUGH

The minor hurling match between Tourin and Cappoquin which had been fixed for the Sportsfield here on last Sunday did not come off as Tourin had previously notified Cappoquin that they would be unable to field a team and were withdrawing altogether from the championships this year.

This means that Cappoquin has now got a 'walk over' in the minor grade the same as has happened in the junior hurling grade owing to the failure of Fourmilewater to travel to Dungarvan to play them a few weeks ago. We hope other teams in the Western Division will meet their fixtures in future as the Cappoquin Gaels both junior and minor would far prefer to win their matches on their merits to being awarded 'bloodless victories' like these.

This meant that last Sunday was a 'blank day' in Cappoquin and as next Sunday will be also 'blank' here, two valuable Sundays will have been wasted and there is bound to be a great scramble later on in order to have the championships completed before winter sets in.

We are glad to know that the 'blank' period for the Sportsfield will end on next Sunday because on Sunday week 10th inst we will have two important matches here which should amply compensate us for any recent disappointments.

Camphire and Lismore after their brilliant game a few weeks ago which was won by Camphire by one point (3-1 to 2-3) will be meeting for the re-play mutually agreed on and in view of the splendid form displayed by both teams in the first meeting their second encounter promises to be a 'star turn' and will attract hundreds of hurling 'fans' from all parts of West Waterford.

Prior to the big match an exciting 'curtain raiser' will be provided by Geosh Emmetts and St Michaels (Ballyduff) in minor hurling and owing to the splendid records enjoyed by both teams this match should provide almost as many thrills as the Camphire v Lismore game is bound to do afterwards.

These two high-class fixtures certainly constitute a splendid programme for the one day in Cappoquin and the crowds in town on this day should easily eclipse the huge attendance here on the occasion of the first meeting between Camphire and Lismore although the attendance then had beaten all previous records.

The local Gaels are fully alive to the importance of these two matches and will have the Sportsfield specially prepared for the day in a manner never before seen here.

Land without ruins suits this ruin-sprinkled historical land of ours so we thought we would give the poem with its foreword for the benefit of our readers. Here it is—

A land without ruins is a land without memories a land without history. A land that wears a laurel crown may be fair to see but twine a few sad cypress leaves round the brow of any land and be that land barren beautiful and bleak it becomes lovely in its consecrated coronet of sorrow and it wins the sympathy of the heart and of history. Crowns of roses fade, crowns of thorns endure. Calvaries and crucifixions take deepest hold of humanity the triumphs of might are transient they pass and are forgotten the sufferings of right are graven deepest on the chronicle of nations.

On this account we find most of our professions overcrowded and the majority of our boys or girls who have concluded their secondary education with an honours certificate with nothing to do. If there could be a more even balance matters would be much better for all.

A skilled tradesman can always find employment and likewise the girl whose ambition is a career and who is qualified in commercial subjects. For the latter the training offered in our Vocational Schools is ideal.

In Co Waterford we have every facility for the furtherance of Vocational training. Highly-trained teachers with all the necessary equipment are available and only too eager to impart their knowledge to willing subjects.

For many people whose means do not allow it it is foolish to keep their children too long at school in the off chance that they may gain some post in competitive examination. The better thing to do is to have them trained in some trade or qualified in commercial subjects or domestic economy.

The facilities as we have said are there and the people should avail of them and treat Vocational Education with the importance it deserves.

A meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council was held in the Council Chambers on last Friday night August 25th Mr T McCarthy, Chairman, presiding Also present—Messrs T A Kyne J Dahill, and Ml Morrissey TD

Mr Michael O'Meara Acting Town Clerk was in attendance

Extra Week's Holidays Mr W O Mahony, Scavenger, wrote for an extra week's holidays as he had to go away to have his eyes attended to He had been suffering with his eyes of late due to dust, etc getting into them during his work

The Council recommended that he be granted an extra week under the circumstances

Resolution From Pension Sub-Committee A resolution from the Old Age Pensions Sub-Committee asking that representations be made to the Government for the amendment of the Old Age Pensions Act so as to effect an increase of at least 50 per cent on existing pensions and also objecting to the means test was passed unanimously

Increase in Water Charges The Acting Clerk read correspondence from the Dickens Leather Co, and a reply thereto from the Co Manager in connection with recent increases of 2d per 1,000 gallons in the water charge for supply to the factory

The Company's letter protested against the increase and stated it was not justified

The Co Manager in his reply pointed out that the new rate of 8d per 1,000 gallons was much lower than similar charges for metered water in other towns

Mr Dahill—When this factory started first they got water for 4d per 1,000 gallons, so as to give them every chance, and that was after they tried to sink a pump themselves but found the water unsuitable He considered the charge reasonable as the factory was now a prosperous concern

Mr Morrissey said at the start the factory got water at a very low rate although at the time the Council had figures before them from other centres which showed a much higher price and now that the factory is such a successful concern 8d per 1,000 gallons is a reasonable charge

We want to give the factory every encouragement on account of the great employment it is giving and that was the reason such a low rate was charged in the first instance

Mr Kyne—They are in a position to pay now as they doubled their profits last year

Mr Morrissey said he knew some other people who were very hard hit by the recent revision charges, and he wondered if the Council were going to do anything in the matter

The Chairman said he agreed with the part of the Company's letter concerning the installation of meters Meters should be put on all large consumers as ordered by the Council years ago The factory deserved a fair crack of the whip as they were giving good employment but it was his opinion that 8d per 1,000 gallons was not excessive

Bus Service The Traffic Supt Omnibus Section GSR wrote stating that as the service at present operating via Ardmore is necessary to meet the requirements of persons in the area it was not possible to provide an additional bus on the Clashmore route The matter will not be lost sight of if the position improves

Diphtheria Immunisation Scheme The Clerk stated that as provided for in the estimates for year 1944-45 it was the intention of the Co Manager to raise a loan of £200-£250 to meet cost of the Diphtheria Immunisation Scheme, and the formal approval of the Council was necessary before obtaining sanction from the Department

The following resolution was proposed by Mr Morrissey seconded by Mr Kyne, and passed unanimously

"That we, the Dungarvan Urban District Council approve of the County Manager's proposal to raise a loan of £200-£250 to meet cost of carrying out the Diphtheria Immunisation Scheme in the Urban District Loan to be repaid in five years in half-yearly instalments with interest, and to be obtained from the Council's Treasurers—Munster and Leinster Bank"

Reports From Acting BS The following reports from the Acting Borough Surveyor were referred by the Manager to the Council

Water shortage at Church St—Both houses of Miss Dunne and Sergt Kelliher, are on the same supply pipe There is no effective way of increasing the supply except by having a separate supply pipe for each house

The Manager ordered that

notice be served on Miss Dunne and Sergt Kelliher that the by-laws must be complied with Sewer at rear of Sheare's St—Mr Ormond recommended that the interception trap be removed and the Manager ordered that the work be done

Co Secretaryship The Chairman referred to the non-appointment of Mr Tommy Boyle as Secretary of the Co Council Mr Boyle was an officer of proved ability and experience of over 25 years as well as having been Acting Secretary for 3 years Tommy Boyle gave good service to his country and he was an ideal man for the position and he could hardly believe the news when he heard it

He suggested that they should protest in the strongest possible manner to the authorities concerned

Mr Dahill—Everyone in the town and county were disappointed as Mr Boyle proved himself a most efficient and suitable man for the position

Mr Morrissey said that the County Council had already sent a resolution to the proper authorities on the matter They were all well aware of Tommy Boyle's efficiency and his National Service as well, and they were all very disappointed over the matter

Mr Kyne said that Tommy Boyle, as an efficient Waterford man was best entitled to the position and it was only his just right that he should have been appointed

After some further discussion the Chairman proposed, and Mr Dahill seconded the following resolution which was passed unanimously

"That we the members of the Dungarvan Urban District Council respectfully desire to point out to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health in connection with the appointment of the Secretary to the Waterford County Council that we consider that the present Acting Secretary Mr Thomas B Boyle, should be appointed to the position in view of his proved ability as a highly efficient Officer during his 25 years service with the County Council and whilst carrying out the duties of Acting Secretary during the past three years"

Price of Milk Mr Kyne stated that milk prices were at a maximum in the town and he heard that milk was being sold in the district from herds not registered in the district He referred to the dangers from TB cattle and asked that a report should be obtained from the Veterinary Inspector on the matter

Mr Morrissey said there was no milk from tested herds now At one time Glenmore Dairy had their herds tested but he understood that no herds were being tested now

Mr Kyne—said he thought the milk was coming from tested herds

After some further discussion Mr Kyne proposed and the Chairman seconded that a report be asked for from Mr Byrne, VS on the supply position generally and in particular with regard to milk from TB cattle
