INSPIRING MANIFESTATIONS

### DUNGARVAN'S IMPOSING TRIBUTE

ON Sunday last, September 17th, the people of Dun-  
garvan joined in paying tribute to the memory of  
Rev Brother Edmund Ignatius Rice, on the occasion  
of the first centenary of his death in 1844

The celebrations were in the main as befitted the occasion  
religious ceremonies beginning in the morning with Solemn  
High Mass at 11.30 a.m. at St Mary's Parish Church at which  
representatives of the Public Bodies L.D.F. L.S.F. Past and  
Present Pupils of the CBS and the general public attended

During the course of the  
High Mass a most inspiring and  
eloquent sermon was preached  
on the life and times of Rev  
Brother Rice by Rev Maurice  
O'Meara, C.C. Kilgobnet.  
The children's choir, under  
the direction of Rev Brother  
Hanratty sang the Mass beau-  
tifully. They were ably assisted  
by Miss Hannah Boyle, who pre-  
sided at the organ.

After the Mass the visiting  
Brothers and a big number of  
the general public were delight-  
fully entertained in the CBS  
grounds when the Dungarvan  
Brass and Reed Band under the  
baton of Mr. M. J. McHugh,  
Bandmaster rendered a grand  
selection of Irish airs.

In the evening a very inspir-  
ing procession of the Blessed  
Sacrament of very large dimen-  
sions took place from St. Mary's  
Parish Church to Shandon, the  
site of the first school founded  
in Dungarvan by the Christian  
Brothers. Arrived there the  
combined choirs again under  
Brother Hanratty's direction  
sang the Te Deum after which  
Benediction was given by Very  
Rev Canon O'Brien, assisted by  
Rev Fr. Pennell, and Rev D.  
McGrath.

Having re-formed the Proces-  
sion returned to the Parish  
Church where final Benediction  
was given. As the crowded  
Church stood singing 'Faith of  
Our Fathers,' it was evident  
that the people were indeed  
praising God for having raised  
so good an Irishman as Brother  
Rice when he was needed so  
badly need for the educational  
welfare of our people.

The townspeople are to be  
congratulated for the generous  
way in which they decorated  
the town with flags bunting  
and holy emblems for the occa-  
sion and the Superior and the  
other Brothers of the Dun-  
garvan Community, feel deeply  
grateful for the great manifest-  
ations and honour paid to their  
founder.

The celebrations concluded  
with a lecture by Rev Brother  
Fitzpatrick, Waterpark College.

New Munster Council Elected.

IMPORTANT CONVENTION IN CAPPOQUIN

(From Our Cappoquin Correspondent)

An important Convention of delegates from the various Camogie Co Boards in Munster was held in Conway's Hotel Cappoquin on last Sunday evening for the purpose of electing a new Munster Council to replace the old council, which had been dissolved by the Central Council

The meeting was to have been presided over by Professor Agnes O'Farrelly Chairman Central Council Camogie Board, but as she had to reside in Galway over a similar convention the same day the Central Council had sent Miss McHugh Belfast to preside over the Cappoquin Convention

Delegates were present from Waterford, Clare Tipperary and Cork including the Rev M Morrissey P.P. Clogheen Hon President late Munster Council, Mr Sean Gleeson Chairman, Dr Rev M Flynn, P.P. Knockanore President Waterford Co Board Miss Cait Flynn Dungarvan Chairman do and Miss M Montayne Knockanore, Hon Sec, do, Mr L Dynan, Organising Sec Cork was also present

Obstruction At The Start Miss McHugh Chairman having formally opened the proceedings, and explained how she had been ordered by the Central Council to preside over the early stages of this Convention Mr O'Shea Cork who said he was representing the Kerry Co Board, challenged Miss McHugh's right to preside and also wanted to know under whose authority this convention was being held

Mrs O'Shea (his wife) supported his point and Mr Sean Gleeson, Clogheen Chairman of the former Munster Council explained how the Cork Co Board had been suspended by him for including amongst its officers a prominent member of a Rugby club which was contrary to the rules which debared players of "foreign games" from being members of the Camogie Association

The Cork delegates were ordered to withdraw and the ordinary business was proceeded with

Mr Sean Gleeson Chairman of the former Munster Council was appointed Chairman of the meeting and the election of the new Munster Council was proceeded with

Election of Officers Chairman—Mr Sean Gleeson Hon Sec—Miss Sheila Hoigan Cork Hon Treas—Miss M Montayne, Knockanore President—Rev Morrissey P.P. Clogheen Vice-President—Rev Fr W Flynn, P.P. Knockanore Rev Fr Hamilton Clare and Mr A French Cork

The Officers having returned thanks for their election Mr Gleeson, in an address advocated the use of the Irish language on all occasions and also the practice of their Irish dances and Irish culture as being the backbone of their Association, as this would be a very important contributory factor to the cultural resurgence which was now awaking in the country They should all aim at unity of action and unity of purpose and always remember that the interests of the Association should be their primary consideration in all matters

He returned his best thanks to Miss McHugh for the able and fearless manner in which she had handled a very delicate and difficult situation at the opening of the Convention, and said they should feel proud to have such an able and experienced young lady amongst them, while they should feel equally proud and honoured to have two such fine sporting Priests as Father Morrissey and Father Flynn in their Association He specially thanked those silent and patient members of the Press for the able and consistent manner in which they had been supporting the Association and for the great publicity which they were giving to Camogie matches in the County Waterford He promised to do all in his power to forward the interests of the Camogie Association and again thanked them all very sincerely for the great honour which they had conferred on him by electing him as Chairman of the Munster Council (applause)

The Munster Championship Final Owing to Clare having previously defeated Cork, and Waterford having recently defeated Tipperary in the Munster Championships, it was pointed out that Clare and Waterford were the only teams now standing in for the final and the question of fixing a venue for this match was next discussed

Mr Dynan Cork, having explained the poor financial position of the Munster Council at present, said they had only a small balance to credit, while he owed Mr Gleeson £16 for attending various meetings of the Central Council

Mr Gleeson said they need not worry about the debt due to him as he was prepared to wait for payment until the Munster Council was in a more prosperous condition, (applause) Continuing, he said if they got a good day for the match between

Clare and Waterford he was sure they would be able to get a good "gate" which would wipe out all their debts

Father Flynn said he had an assurance from Mr Hennessy, Hon Sec Clare Co Board, that the Clare team would be agreeable to travel to the County Waterford for the final, and he therefore, proposed that the match be played in the Cappoquin Sportsfield, where they would be sure of getting a good "gate"

Father Morrissey and Mr Gleeson having also spoken in favour of the Cappoquin venue it was then unanimously decided that the match be played in the Cappoquin Sportsfield on Sunday, Oct 1st at 3.30 (S.T.) the referee to be Mr Sean Gleeson, Clogheen

The admission fee to the field was fixed at 1/- and 1/- extra for sideline seats and all the preliminary arrangements were left in the hands of the Co Waterford Sec and the Secretary of the Munster Council It was left to the referee to appoint the necessary umpires and linesmen, and Mr John F Ryan said that the Cappoquin Camogie Club and hurling club could be relied on to give the Council every possible assistance on the occasion for which the Chairman expressed his deep thanks

The question of trophies for the winners was next discussed and Father Morrissey promised to present a valuable cup for the winning team, which would be purchased at Egan's Jewellery Establishment Cork

This in addition to Father Morrissey's previous offer to present a set of medals for the winners of the Waterford County championship was indeed a very generous offer and on the motion of the Chairman seconded by Miss M Montayne, a very warm vote of thanks was passed to him for his great generosity and sportsmanship in the matter

Other matters having been dealt with Father Flynn proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Miss McHugh and Mr Gleeson for the able manner in which they had presided over the Convention, and this having been carried with the greatest enthusiasm, the proceedings ended

Tributes To The Memory Of Dr. W. H. Bowen

As a special tribute to the memory of the late Dr W H Bowen, Hillview House Ennis-corthy, the Co Wexford Medical Association of General Practitioners arranged for a Month's Mind Office and High Mass for the repose of his soul in the Cathedral on Thursday Sept 14th The Lord Bishop presided Rev J Ranson CC was the celebrant, Rev P Hutchinson, BA CC deacon and Rev J Wadding CC master of ceremonies The chanters were Rev F Quaid Adm and Rev R Brown BA CC Glenbrien

There were over 30 priests in the choir A large attendance of relatives and the general public were present—RIP

Co Council's Tribute At the Wexford Co Council meeting on Monday 11th Sept Mr T McCarthy, proposed a vote of sympathy to Dr Pauline Bowen and family Ennis-corthy on the death of her husband the late Dr W H Bowen

The late Dr Bowen was the first medical officer in the Co Home he said and from the Home he took up duty there until his recent death under very sad circumstances he took not only official but personal interest in the patients and, as members of the former Board of Health knew he did much towards their welfare and always interested himself in any improvements carried out there

He was sure that Mrs Bowen and family had the sympathy of every member of the Co Home in their bereavement Dr Bowen was a big loss not only to his family but to the community in general He was a very capable practitioner and was held in the highest esteem by everyone

Miss N O'Ryan said that as former Chairman of the Board of Health, she wished to second the vote and to bear out all that Mr McCarthy had said "There was never a more efficient officer in the Co Home when there was any difference of opinion, he always took the side of the patients Miss O'Ryan also dealt with the great interest taken by Dr Bowen in the improvements carried out in the Home

Aldr R Corish TD said he came in contact with Dr Bowen on several occasions and he was ever efficient and very courteous to those under his care He attended his duties very well and the poor and the people he laboured for in the Co Home would miss him

The Chairman (Mr D Allen, TD) said they were all very sorry for Dr Bowen's passing and his widow and family had the utmost sympathy of the members of the Council He was an efficient officer that gave great service to those under his care During the twenty-two years since the Board of Health came in, the County Home had been improved out of all recognition due mainly to the initiative of the late Dr Bowen

Messrs J Leary, T.D. J Gaull, T.A. Friezelle (Acting Co Sec), and John Elgee (Co Solicitor) also associated themselves with the resolution
