Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee

The regular monthly meeting of the County Waterford Vocational Education Committee was held at Scoil na gCeard, Dungarvan on Monday 16th, October 1944

Mr David Coughlan, Vice-Chairman, presided. Other members present were—Messrs M F Walsh, John McGrath, L A Veale, S Morris, M O'Hara, J Lanigan, C.E.O and E MacEoin, Clerk, were also present

Part-Time Teachers
The Department of Education wrote approving of the re-appointment of seven part-time teachers for the session 1944-45. Exceptional approval was also forwarded for the reappointment of four other part-time teachers of Irish for the current session in a temporary capacity only. The letters were noted

Teacher On Lease Lend
In connection with the recent appointment of two organising teachers of Irish the Department wrote stating that they are not satisfied that the committee can afford to add two additional permanent whole-time teachers of Irish to its staff without depleting the funds required for maintenance and progress of the County Scheme

A further letter from the Department sanctions the appointment of S O h-Obáin and S O Fathaigh as temporary whole-time teachers of Irish

The City of Waterford Vocational Committee requested that the part-time services of Sean O h-Obáin, recently appointed whole-time Irish teacher, be loaned to them during the school session

The C.E.O referred to the reduction made by the Department in the grants and the drop in the local contribution in the interests of economy

The committee agreed to lease the services of Sean O h-Obáin, payment of salary to be divided between the County and City committees

Conference of Rural Science Teachers

The Department notified the holding of a Conference of Science Instructors at Cork School of Commerce on 13th and 14th 1944

The committee arranged for the attendance of Mr Thomas Maher, B.Sc., Rural Science Instructor

Seed Testing
In connection with Seed Testing the C.E.O drew attention to the fact that in some other counties there was a small fee charged which went to the students engaged in the work. It was decided to make a decision re the fee if any, on hearing Mr Maher's report from the conference

Maps
The Department's Inspector M. O'Siúgh wrote requesting scale maps of County Waterford showing positions of Vocational Schools and classes, roads, rivers, etc

It was decided to obtain maps as requested

School-Garden Scholarship
The Department refused to approve of the Committee's proposal for the continuance of a further year of the Scholarship held by Thomas Foley, as student demonstrator in the School Garden, Dungarvan

Mr Veale—Before this man got the scholarship there was a man employed. The garden looks very presentable, and if the boy is not kept on we must pay a gardener to do the work

It was proposed by Mr Veale and seconded by Mr Walsh that the Minister be requested to reconsider his decision in the matter. Passed

Hotel Cooks Course Scholarship
Mary Fitzgerald who was awarded a Scholarship to St Mary's College of Domestic Science Cathal Brugha St, Dublin wrote to say that she had obtained a position as house-keeper and therefore cannot avail of the scholarship in the Hotel Cooks Course. The Scholarship lapses

Miscellaneous
Rev M Byrne, P.P., granted

the use of the National School at Grange for Irish Classes. Noted

Mrs P Ryan (nee Brody) requests the awards of a marriage gratuity. Proposed by Mr O'Hara and seconded by Mr Veale. Granted

Bonus Stabilisation
A resolution was received from the Co Tipperary Vocational Education Committee protesting against the stabilisation of the cost of living bonus and the withholding of the emergency bonus in certain cases. The official figure is 85

It was agreed to adopt the resolution.

Laboratory Equipment
In connection with the provision of chemical benches for Science Classes at Dungarvan the C.E.O stated that no tenders had been received in answer to the advertisement issued. Messrs. Hearne of Waterford had submitted a revised estimate of £275

This was accepted by the committee

Choral Classes
The Dungarvan Choral Society made application for the use of school rooms for Choral Classes on two nights per week

It was agreed to hold this class on two nights per week, if available

Miscellaneous.
Mr Halpin, Headmaster, Cappoquin Vocational School applied for permission to erect a shed to cover a pump in the yard. Granted

Requests were received for Woodwork and Domestic Economy Classes at Tramore. It was agreed that if suitable premises were available that Miss O'Neill give Domestic Economy classes at Tramore

The Irish Tourist Board wrote re a request for the use of premises at Ardmore.

A request was made for Woodwork classes from Portlaoise

Mr D S Doyle, Architect, wrote re schedule of Materials for Post-War Building

Death Of Mrs. Annie Fraher, Kereen, Cappoquin

Very deep and sincere regret has been caused throughout a wide area in West Waterford by the death of Mrs. Annie Fraher (nee Wall), which occurred at her residence at Kereen, Cappoquin, on Monday evening after a rather protracted illness.

Deceased was daughter of the late Mr J Wall and Mrs Wall, whose popular publichouse, "Wall's, Kereen," has long been a well known landmark on the main road between Dungarvan and Youghal

She was wife of Mr Richard A Fraher brother of the Misses Alice and Madge Fraher, newsagents Cappoquin, and Mrs. E J Fraher, do, and was a most refined and charming lady who was justly held in the highest esteem by all classes of the general public

She was cousin of Mr M J Keane bottling merchant, Dungarvan, and was connected with most of the leading families in the Kereen and Woodhouse districts and her death now, at a comparatively early age, has severed the last link which had so honourably bound the Wall family to Kereen for many generations past

Her bereaved husband, who belongs to one of the oldest and most respected families in Cappoquin, has now the deepest sympathy of all classes of the public in his sad bereavement

On Thursday afternoon her remains were removed from her late residence to Aglish Catholic Church where the coffin was received and blessed by the Rev D Power, C.C., Aglish, and the Rev J Murphy, C.C., Ballinacorney.

Several Requiem Masses for the repose of her soul were offered up on Wednesday morning, after which the interment took place in the adjoining cemetery, the last prayers at the graveside being read by Rev J Gleeson, P.P. Aglish, assisted by Rev D Power C.C., do, Rev J Murphy, C.C. Ballinacorney and Rev T J Murphy, C.C., Modeligo

Both at the removal of the remains on Tuesday evening, and the obsequies and interment on Wednesday morning, there was an extremely large and representative attendance of the general public from Kereen, Dungarvan, Aglish, Clashmore, Cappoquin, and many other districts in West Waterford, which proved a striking and touching tribute of respect to the memory of a lady who had been so greatly beloved by all.

The chief mourners included Richard A Fraher (husband), J and Miss A Crowley, Woodhouse, Mr Hally and family, do Mrs Queally and family, Cappagh M J Keane, Dungarvan Michael and Mrs Whelan O'Connell St, do E J Fraher, Cappoquin, (brother-in-law), the Misses Alice and Madge Fraher do (sisters-in-law), M and Mrs Veale, Kereen Mrs E J Fraher, Cappoquin, and many other cousins and relatives from various parts of West Waterford

GAELIC NOTES

SENIOR CLUBS

(By "TAOSHLINE")

The Waterford senior hurling team selected to represent the county in the Ignatius Rice hurling final at Waterford on Oct. 29th against the All-Ireland champions, is the chief topic in Gaelic circles. I, however, do not agree with some of the placings, but the selectors did a good job and the team should give a very good account of themselves when they line out against Cork on Sunday week. The inclusion of the Mt. St. Man John Keane in his usual position is hailed with general satisfaction and flanked by two club men in Fleming and Dowling the half-line of defence is well nigh impregnable and it is in this sector the thrills of the game may be expected from. There is no one could doubt the brilliance of Jim Ware between the sticks and his selection as goal-man was about the only unanimous choice. M Hayes is best at left half in the last line of defence and he improves with every outing. Sonny Curley is retained at full back where he will be flanked by the Army newcomers, Daly, on the right. This player starred in the recent senior hurling final and his selection in this important position completes a back line second to none. Barry (Army) and Mick Hickey are partners at centre field and should the Army man not be available it is expected that C Moylan will be moved from the full-forward position to partner Hickey at the halfway line

W Barron is retained on the right wing and I expect him to reproduce some of his past brilliance on Sunday week. Davy Power has been allotted the important position of centre forward and candidly I believe he is quite competent to hold his own in any company. Capt Vin Boston left-half will be playing in his favourite position and the Renmore man will complete the half-line of attack which has speed accuracy and hurling ability a plenty. Paddy Wade is in the right corner and his Clonmel experience should help him over the marking of Alan Lotty the Cork stalwart. Mickey Feeney will operate at left corner where his cleverness should be a decided asset to the team. The return of C Moylan as spear head of the attack definitely strengthens our attacking department, and he out hurried Thornhill in last year's Munster final and he is quite capable of doing the same on Sunday week. The game between Ballycoe and Fenor on Sunday next in the junior football final at Newtown is one of the chief games down for decision. A great match should be witnessed between these two teams who are proud and worthy representatives from the respective divisions. The game will be refereed by Sergt. P. Graham, Army, and is timed to start at 3 p.m. (S.T.)

Dungarvan and Stradbally are billed to meet on Sunday next in the senior football championship, but I am informed there is a difficulty about Dungarvan fielding out due to their contesting the minor football final against Dunhill at Leamybrien. At the time of writing there is nothing definite about the match but should same be postponed the latest news items should carry a postponement message. Dunhill O'Brien's making their first appearance in a minor final will meet Dungarvan on Sunday next in the final of the minor football championship at Leamybrien with Tom Veale the well-known Kilrossanty player as referee. This match should attract a good attendance and enthusiasts should not fail to see football played by the men of tomorrow

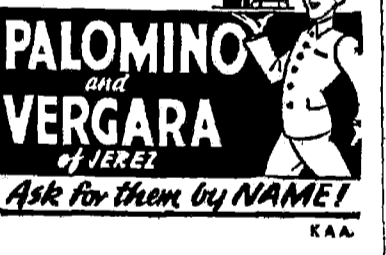

Co. Waterford Committee Of Agriculture

Annual Schemes Meeting

The Annual Schemes Meeting of the Waterford Co. Committee of Agriculture was held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Wednesday last (fair day), Mr P R Power, Chairman, presided and Messrs M F Walsh, J Fives, D Coghlan, Ml Keating, Ml Harty and Ml McGrath were present

Mr J J Brady, Department Inspector attended

Deficit This Year.

Mr Brady who was welcomed by the chairman addressing the meeting said that after going into the financial circumstances of the Committee he arrived at £1,390 as the sum that would be available at the end of March next to carry over. In addition to this £3,490 would be raised from the rates and the normal grant from the Department of £3,949 would be added which was a total of £8,764 and which was the sum estimated to be available for the various schemes

This figure the Inspector said was less than last year's amount which was £9,865 and the reason for the drop was that the unexpended balance at the end of the current year would be £1,100 less than last year This fact was an indication that all the schemes were fully availed of

Mr Brady then went on to deal with the suggested allocations for the coming year

Poultry Schemes—There was no material change but a reduction of £14 was suggested in the allocation for turkey cocks, and an increase of £50 for grants for the erection of poultry houses.

Cottages and Small Farms Prize Scheme—The same at £113

Live Stock Schemes—No change but in the Agricultural side it was suggested that the subsidies for shows be cut out as it was not utilised in the current year It was also suggested that the subsidy for ploughing matches be increased to £100

Agricultural Instruction—No change except an extra £20 towards Veterinary lectures at winter classes

Horticulture—No change

Scholarships—An increase of £23 was suggested

Potato Spraying—It was suggested that a sum of £60 be made available to subsidise the purchasing of horse spraying machines

Lime Subsidy Scheme—£400 which was the same as last year

Dealing with horticulture the Inspector said that there appeared to be a definite need for two instructors in the county which seemed to have a big horticultural future before it and he said that the temporary position should be made permanent

A Deficit.
The total of the suggested allocations came to £9,530 and the amount available was £8,764 leaving a deficit of £766 This would mean that the committee would have to consider approaching the Co. Council for an increase in the rate by 4d in the £ This would bring in a sum of £745 and the Department would grant a similar amount Any money left over could go to meet the big unsatisfied demand for lime in the county

Mr Coughlan—What is the present rate?
Secretary—3 139d in the £
Mr Coghlan—And what are we entitled to?
Inspector—4d in the £ is the maximum

The Committee then decided to pass the resolution requesting the Co Council to grant an extra 4d in the £ to meet the deficit

The Chairman asked if there was a need for the grant for spraying machines and several members said there was

It was stated that the cost of such a sprayer was £45, and it was decided to allow 5 grants of £12 each

Put On The Agenda
The consideration of appointing a second permanent Horticultural Instructor was, on Mr Harty's suggestion, put on the agenda for the next meeting

Allocation Adopted
On the Chairman's proposal, seconded by Mr Walsh, the provisional allocation for funds for the schemes as set out was adopted

Correspondence
The Department acknowledged receipt of the Committee's resolution concerning the changing of the date for commencing the Lime Subsidy Scheme

In reply to Mr McGrath, the Inspector said he knew nothing about the matter, but he said there were difficulties in it due

Lecture on The History of European Painting—The first of a series of six lectures on the History of European Painting was delivered by Mr. R.
