Mr L F Lanigan solr, applied for a renewal of certificate of registration of the Dungarvan Golf Club. The application was granted.

**School Attendance Act**  
Guard Farrell summoned Edmund Coleman Davis St, Dungarvan in respect of his child Declan Coleman for an offence under the above Act.

Thomas Power Cathal Brugha St was similarly charged in respect of his child John.

The cases were adjourned.

**Rationing Offences—£10 Fine**  
A trader from the district was summoned by the Minister for Supplies (1) for failing to fill in form T.15 (tea) correctly, (2) for failing to produce on June 26th for inspection the quantity of tea which should have been in stock.

Dr Counihan State Solicitor prosecuted and Messrs Farrell & Morrissey solrs defended.

Dr Counihan said that defendant got tea from several wholesalers amongst who was Jerome Coleman of Cork and the tea he got from the latter was not entered in the record. From April 5th 1941 to May 31st last there was a deficiency of 720 lbs.

Mr Farrell Solr pleading guilty on behalf of his client said that he had two regular tea suppliers—Garratt's of Dublin and McCarthy's of Cork. He had 100 registered customers. Just before the rationing scheme came into operation a traveller from Coleman's came to defendant and offered him all the tea he wanted on certain conditions. He got in a good supply then and when the rationing came in he continued to get so much per month. The deficiency arose as defendant gave his customers a double ration and he thought it was all right to enter up only the rationed tea given to the registered customers. There was no question of blackmarketing as the tea was sold at the permitted price.

Justice—The deficiency is a very big amount of tea?

Dr Counihan—It is probably the largest missing stock of tea since the Emergency Powers started.

In reply to the Justice Supt O'Mahony said that the defendant was not well-off.

Justice—If he were a well off man £100 is the very least he would get off with—it would be better for him to go to jail.

Mr Farrell—He is not fit physically for that.

Justice—He will probably lose his licence now, and I see no

reason why he shouldn't. I will mark the first charge proved and dealt with and impose a fine of £10 with 3 months to pay in the second. In doing so said the Justice, I'm taking into consideration his ill-health and the fact that he is not well-off.

**Extension Refused**  
Mr Williams solr, for Mrs B Quill Ballymacmague, made an application for another month's extension in the decree for possession granted to Mrs M. Moloney Durrow, some months ago, as she only got a permit to purchase cement to carry out the structural alterations at the Pike House a few days ago.

Mr Kenny solr, for Mrs Moloney, strongly opposed the application as his client was afraid the matter would drag on from month to month.

The Justice said that in the circumstances he could not grant the application.

**General Exemption**  
Mr Morrissey, solr, on behalf of Mr J Murray, Publican Helevick, was granted a general exemption for the fishing industry for November, December, and January.

**Suspensory Sentence of Two Months**  
A young girl from Kilmacthomas, was charged by the Attorney-General with stealing £3 in cash, the property of Elizabeth Doyle between September 11th and October 9th last, and a sum of £1 cash a jumper, value 10/-, and a frock value £1, the property of Margaret Sullivan.

Mr Kenny solr represented defendant and pleaded guilty.

The Supt said that the girl was a native of Kilmacthomas and she came to work at Lawlor's hotel Dungarvan, on September 11th last. She was not there very long when a fellow-employee missed £1, and later another missed £3. The employer then investigated the matter and as a result the defendant packed up and left for home.

When doing so she took the jumper and frock which were found on her when she was intercepted before reaching home. She made a statement then admitting taking £3 but since her father has refunded the full amount and no one is now at a loss.

Mr Kenny solr, appealed for leniency, saying that defendant's father was a most honest and industrious man who now undertakes to take the girl home and see to it that she gets into no further trouble.

Justice—I don't want to send this girl to jail, but it is a very low form of larceny to steal from her fellow-employees. Due to her previous good character and her father's honesty and undertaking I impose a suspensory sentence of two months with hard labour not to be enforced if she commits no offence within 12 months.

**Walsh v Trihy**  
James J Walsh Mary Street Dungarvan was again plaintiff in a civil bill claim for £9 against Maurice Trihy Prap Grange.

Messrs Farrell and Morrissey solrs were for plaintiff and Mr Kenny solr defended.

Plaintiff in evidence said that in Nov 1943 he made a contract with Trihy in which he sold him 5 tons of oaten straw and gave him 8 tons of wheat straw which would be used as bedding to winter Trihy's 16 heavy cattle in a yard on his lands. Plaintiff was then to get the manure. Only a couple of light loads were spread and the rest was allowed to rot away. As a result plaintiff claimed he lost 36 loads of manure which he valued at 5/- per load.

Mr Kenny—In the making of the bargain didn't Trihy pay you for the grazing of stubbles?

Yes.

How many tons of manure did you in fact draw from the yard?

About two.

If Trihy says you drew 30 tons would he be wrong?—I got nothing like that.

Justice—For how long was the grazing let?—Until I ploughed.

Mr Kenny—You never objected to the method in which the cattle were wintered until September which is the date of this Civil Bill although this business took place months and months ago. The claim was only an after-thought?

Defendant—It was not Maurice Trihy in evidence said that he took the stubble field from Walsh.

Justice—What for?

Witness—For the cattle.

Justice—I know it was not for yourself you took it although some should be put on grazing alright (laughter).

Witness—I took the field at £6 until he would plough it. I also got the use of the houses there for the cattle on bad nights. I fed them with the oaten straw and spread the wheat straw for bedding according as it was wanted and used about three or four tons. Walsh never objected to the way the cattle were wintered and when he started to plough the stubbles in February he told me I should take the cattle and I had to go to Davy Murray's. He had all the manure that was left.

The Justice stating that plaintiff let the stubble field to defendant until he wanted to plough it in February and could not expect Trihy to barricade his cattle into the yard, dismissed the application.

**Adjournments.**  
Two cases brought under the Rent Restrictions Act and in which Mr P Browne Sexton St, Abbeyside and Mrs Ellen Power, Main St, Dungarvan, were plaintiffs were adjourned.

**WATERFORD V. TIPPERARY  
THRILLING CHALLENGE  
MATCH IN CAPPOQUIN**

Waterford, 2-0; Tipperary, 1-1

(From Our Cappoquin Correspondent)

The Challenge Camogie match arranged between the counties of Waterford and Tipperary was played in the Cappoquin Sportsfield on last Sunday afternoon and was attended by a record crowd for a challenge match the gate receipts totalling £37 10s, or more than half the receipts taken at the important Munster Championship match between Waterford and Clare a few Sundays previously, when the record sum of £71 1s 6d was realised at the gate.

It will be remembered that when Waterford and Tipperary first met in the Munster Championship in Lismore nearly two months ago, Tipperary were able to field only a team of nine players, so that Waterford had to drop three of their team of twelve, but even so they then clearly demonstrated their superiority over the visitors, whom they defeated by six goals to three.

Tipperary, although out of the Munster Championship on this score, were not satisfied with the result, and asked Waterford to play a challenge match with them with full teams of 12 a side, to which Waterford readily agreed, and hence last Sunday's challenge match.

Tipperary had made a very expensive pick of the entire county for the occasion, as will be seen from the list of clubs represented on the team, while Waterford were handicapped by the fact that they had to confine their pick to portions of West Waterford only, as no Camogie Club exists below Dungarvan, the entire Camogie area being bounded by Dungarvan, Clashmore, Knockanore, Tallow and Ballyduff.

With only a few changes, Waterford relied on most of the team which had played against Clare a few Sundays previously, but despite the limitations of their selection, Sunday's team acquitted themselves brilliantly, and defeated a much stronger and heavier team on the score of 2 goals against 1 goal 1 point after a last and thrilling game which it was a treat to witness.

The Tipperary team and their numerous supporters travelled across the Knockmeakdown mountains in several cars, and were in charge of Rev. M. Morrissey, P.P., Clogheen, President of the Munster Council, Mr. F. Gleeson, P.C., Clogheen, Chairman, do., and Mr. Wm. Boyle, Hon. Sec. Tipperary County Board, who was mainly responsible for the selection of the Tipperary team.

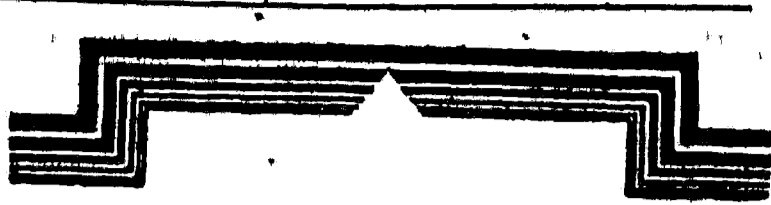

**AT** the last meeting of the Co. Waterford Libraries Committee the County Librarian Mr F MacMurchadha presented his Thirteenth Annual Report. This points out the causes which in five years of war have contributed to the deterioration of the Library position and it also draws attention once more to the urgent necessity for an adequate financial provision as otherwise the service will continue to be inferior.

We endorse this latter point as we think that there is great need for a better and more up-to-date service. Money spent in the provision of an excellent service may be deemed well-spent as everyone knows the delight and pleasure which comes from reading good books.

A case for the better development of the entire service may

be made from the position of Dungarvan, the largest centre in the county. There has been a 20% decline in issues here since last year, and this fact may be attributed mainly to insufficient hours of opening, inadequate staff, and shelves of books which have been there for years and years without change. Readers take the best available fiction and general works and the remainder, which contain many ancient volumes, are left untouched.

It is to be hoped that plans will be made soon to inaugurate a better service and so give the ratepayers some return for their money which could be spent in no better way.

26/10/44 Dear Sir.—Notwithstanding my recent letter there appears to be still some doubt as to the reason for the D.L.C. strike.

Let me make this clear (1) The Union does not demand any increase in wages, notwithstanding the fact that women-workers in Carrick get more wages than men in the D.L.C. Dungarvan for work of the same type and which is sold in the same market. The Union cannot under a Government Order strike for an increase in wages. So that clears that point. It is not a question of wages. (2) The Union does not want the Factory management or anyone else to collect contributions or arrears by deduction from wages or in any other way. That is now clear and cannot be contradicted.

(3) The Union does not ask for the right to decide who should be employed at the factory. They ask that when anyone gets work there he becomes a member and keeps up his membership. The Union does ask that an agreement be entered into that only Trade Union members be employed there. This is for the good of the Union and of the Factory as it will prevent unofficial strikes, disputes, and keep the men employed in a manner in keeping with the teaching of the Church.

We ask that and we will fight to get it to the last. Portlaoigh workers have this agreement and it works there for the good of all.
