Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee

Very Rev T Canon O'Brien P.P. V.F., Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the above held at Sgoll na gCeard, Dungarvan on last Monday evening. Messrs L. A. Veale, D. Coghlan, J. McGrath, M. H. O'Hara and M. Hart were present. Mr Jas Lanigan, C.E.O. and R. MacEoin, Clerk attended.

Correspondence
The Department of Education wrote stating that special courses of instruction for serving members of the Defence Forces are not now required as existing facilities can be availed of in off-duty hours.

The approval of the Minister of the award of the annual increment to R. MacEoin was also received as was the approval of the expenditure on the shed at Cappoquin school.

The Department of Industry and Commerce wrote stating that a permit for the purchase of teak for the chemistry desks at Sgoll na gCeard could not be granted but suggested that mahogany or other hard wood be used instead.

The C.E.O. said he had got a quotation for mahogany from Messrs Hearne & Co., Waterford.

A letter from Mr D. S. Doyle, Architect, estimated the cost of taking off quantities from his drawing for Kilmacthomas school as £1,000 on the cost of materials which was given as £1,750.

Mr McGrath stated that this was reasonable.

The resolution of the Kilkenny Co. Committee of Agriculture which stated that representatives of all public bodies be allowed 6d per mile each way to and from meetings with a subsistence allowance of 10/- per day was adopted.

Garden Scholarship
A letter from the Department stated that the Garden Scholarship to Mr Thomas Foley is exceptionally approved for another year.

Replying to Mr Veale the C.E.O. said that no increase in the scholarship had been sanctioned.

Mr Veale said that he wondered why the approval was made exceptional. When the resolution was passed that the scholarship be increased to £52 they had in mind the fact that if there was no scholarship a gardener would have to be employed to look after the garden which was very big and this would cost much more. He said that if the Department were not prepared to increase the scholarship, the committee should do something to make the continuance of the present scholarship worth while by awarding a scholarship to Pallaskeny Agricultural school.

The C.E.O. said that it was very difficult to get a vacancy at Pallaskeny.

Mr McGrath—There is a great scarcity of qualified gardeners around Dungarvan.

It was finally decided that the C.E.O. make inquiries about a vacancy at Pallaskeny.

Resignation

On the night of the 3rd Nov 1944, there passed from this unhappy world our local Bandmaster Mr M. J. McHugh. To all who knew him he was a fine gentleman and was one of Ireland's greatest musicians. He had been Conductor of the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band for the past 21 years and during that period he made it a great success.

How many of the townspeople remember the time when it was recognised as one of Ireland's greatest Brass and Reed Bands? I wonder do they also remember how it entertained the public in the park with its fine and beautiful selections, waltzes and marches. How well our band was appreciated in those days when the wireless was indeed a rare thing.

And who was the man responsible for this entertainment? The late Mr McHugh. He gave most of his time to training his men in music and as we all know he made a wonderful success of it. Some of his old pupils are still band members and can be proud of it. As you are all well aware he has trained a number of young boys who are today a credit to the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band. At the time of his death he was preparing another class of young boys to take their places in the band. Those boys will suffer the greatest loss in music and that is the loss of their great Bandmaster.

However the President now Acting Bandmaster Mr M. Clancy with the aid of the old members will endeavour to carry out what Mr McHugh was unable to do owing to the call which he received from the Heavenly Conductor.

Now that he has gone from us people are wondering whether or not the band will be kept on. Well I'm glad to say it will and it is hoped that in the near future it will win back once more the fine name which it held some years ago.

So here's wishing the Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band success.—T.T.

Dear Sir—The following is an excerpt from an article entitled "Join Your Unions" by Frank J. Doolin which appeared in a recent issue of the 'Catholic Standard'.

Strong criticism of the attitude of his fellow Catholics to "general trade union problems" was expressed to me at the close of the 76th annual Trades Union Congress by Mr T. O'Brien who has been re-elected to the General Council of the TUC and appointed a British trades union delegate to America. During his recent visit to Italy Mr. O'Brien had an audience with the Pope, who said that workers all over the world should join their unions for economic protection.

Much of the misunderstanding and indifference towards the Catholic point of view in trades union circles which was exemplified by the education controversy of last year is due to the obvious apathy of the Catholic press to general trades union problems in the past, declared Mr O'Brien.

In describing the outstanding event of his visit to Italy, Mr O'Brien said that his audience with the Pope was made in a private capacity. The Holy Father he said showed keen interest in our work and welcomed the effort to build a free independent trades union movement in Italy unfettered by party political influences. The workers all over the world, stated the Pope, should join their unions for economic protection.

There was complete lack of ceremony. The Pope's simplicity and informality his obvious sincerity and deep concern for the workers left a deep impression on us.

In view of the strike by my Branch to secure a written agreement for 100% trades union employees at the Dickens Leather Company Dungarvan the above is of special interest to workers and employers of the district. The union are attempting to put into practice the advice of Our Holy Father given to the workers of the world. The knowledge that our fight is a just one with the sanction of the Catholic Church will help us to win.—Yours fraternally

Camogie Final

A Chara—I wish you to publish in this week's issue of your paper the following in connection with Camogie Final Dungarvan v Knockanore.

On the occasion of the Camogie County Final Dungarvan v Knockanore the following incident happened during the course of play. The one and only Biddy McGrath lifted the ball with camog on to her hand and then proceeded about 15 yards on one of her usual solo runs, hopping the ball on her camog. She then caught the ball in her hand again before striking. I penalised her in accordance with Rule 10 page 57, lines 8 and 9 Official Camogie Guide. During the interval a few Dungarvan friends of mine informed me that my decision was incorrect. They said that there is a new Rule allowing the player to catch the ball twice before striking. As I would feel it an injustice to the Dungarvan team and especially to the player concerned if my decision was wrong, I wrote to the Chairman Munster Council Board on arrival home from the match asking him if the above quoted Rule was revised. Here is his answer.

Dear Sir—I have read the letters Mr Kyne wrote to the papers. I suppose he is right in all he has to say. He is out for the best bargain he can for the

workers, and God bless him for that. But I suppose there are two sides to every story. Dr Casey is very silent. Some of us would wish he would say something. But words and fine letters are very little good to a poor widow like myself.

Two of my sons are working in the factory for the best of six years. They sometimes complained that the work was hard but the pay was good, and we were very comfortable until the unfortunate strike came. They are now idle for six weeks. The union pays them less than half they were earning in the factory. When you think of the prices of everything now you will understand how hard it is for the mother of six to make ends meet.

What I have been saying to the boys is that they did very well before the union came and they had no strikes and we were all happy. If the union came any other time when food was cheap we could manage but with Xmas in sight things are looking very black. It is easy for Mr Kyne say we will fight to the end, but what about us running into debt. His last letter was very stiff. It reminded me of the black and tan times when Lloyd George told poor Michael Collins to sign or he'd declare immediate and terrible war.

What I would suggest is that Micky Morrissey, Mr Kyne, and Dr Casey meet and thrash out their differences before the factory falls to pieces. It is when this is gone we'll see what a help it was to us.

CAPPOQUIN NEWS

GREAT HURLING MATCH POSTPONED

The hurling match in the Eire Oge medal tournament, Lismore which was to have been played between Cappoquin and Lismore on the latter ground on last Sunday, had to be postponed owing to the unfavourable weather conditions which prevailed. This proved a great disappointment to Cappoquin, as all the members of the team which had won the Co Championship a few weeks ago were on the spot, and ready and eager to travel, even though Sunday morning was most inclement, but a short time before they had intended starting for Lismore, the rain came down with greater intensity, and there was no alternative than, but to notify Lismore that it was impossible to travel under such conditions, and the match had, accordingly, to be postponed to an indefinite date.

Patrick Barrett farm labourer, Kilmacahill, Cloyne, was charged on remand with house-breaking and the larceny of £50 the property of Mrs. Mary O'Brien Ballyregan, Cloyne.

Applying for a further remand to the first court in Middleton in December, Supt. Hughes stated that there may be other charges preferred against the accused than he said he did not object to accused being allowed out on bail.

The Justice (Mr. G. P. Farrell, J.) remanded the accused on his own bail of £100.

Youghal U.D.C. and Shipping—Mr. Bear P. Daly, B.E., V.C., presided. A letter was read from the Department of Supplies, in which the Minister stated that he could not accede to the U.D.C.'s request and allow ships to come direct to Youghal with coal. Correspondence on the subject was also read from local Deputies, Mr. Broderick, T.D., said they made an appointment with the Department, and an official said the Minister had to go to the Senate, and they asked if he would meet them after the Senate. The official said he did not know, as he might be late, and told them they were very disturbed about the Waterford agreement, and that they had very little hope for Youghal. He (Mr. Broderick) made a case that coal by rail to Youghal as compared with water-borne coal in a small ship would cost the Council about £340 more, and this was a serious matter for the Urban District Council. Mr. Lynch said the Cork Corporation and Chamber of Commerce protested against the action of the Government in not permitting cattle to be shipped from Cork. Cork was always a great shipping port, and thousands of men in the south got a living from this trade. In Dublin they wanted everything, but they should not forget that the people engaged in the cattle trade in Cork were entitled to ship their cattle from Cork. The Chairman said there was a terrible depression everywhere as men could not send their cattle to Dublin, they could not afford to do so. They should support the Cork Corporation and Cork Chamber of Commerce, and ask support of every public body in Eire. A resolution as suggested by Chairman was proposed by Mr. Lynch, and seconded by Mr. L. Daly, a copy to be sent to the appropriate Government Department.

The playing of the National Anthem at 3 a.m. brought a very enjoyable night's entertainment to a close.

Heavy Rain Brings Floods—The heavy rains which fell unceasingly during last week-end has caused all rivers and streams to overflow their banks causing much damage to property. The usually quiet and placid Blackwater became a raging torrent overflowing its banks and covering adjoining fields to a depth of six to seven feet. The Ow-na-shad which has its source in the Knockmeal-down mountains and joins the Blackwater below Lismore bridge rose to a height of ten feet above its normal depth, leaving a trail of devastation in its wake. In its downward rush it uprooted small trees and shrubs on its banks, and caused a breach in the wall on the Clogheen road, portion of the road also crumbling away. The damage here alone is estimated at over a £100. Nearer to the town it entered dwellings to a depth of five feet damaging food stuffs, wearing apparel, furniture etc. and in one instance breaking down a door and several windows. The prompt action of Mr. Patrick Dooley, in warning people living in the danger area, of the approaching flood saved much more damage to property as they were able to remove goods to places of com-

Children's Allowances Act 1944

The next Qualifying Date under the above Act in Region 2 (Province of Munster) will be 1st December, 1944. Persons residing in Region 2 who will be entitled to claim allowances on that date should note the following instructions—

RENEWALS If a Children's Allowance for the present payment period is being paid through a Post Office the Half-yearly Claim Form interleaved in the Allowance Book should be completed by the Head of the family. A person nominated to receive an allowance on behalf of the claimant must not complete the Half-yearly Claim Form. If payment is made through a Bank or the Post Office Savings Bank the Half-yearly Claim Form will be sent to the claimant.

If a claim is being made in respect of any children who were not eligible in the previous period Form AL 9 (obtainable at any Post Office) should be completed and should accompany the Half-yearly Claim Form.

NEW CLAIMS If you are not in receipt of an allowance for the current payment period you should obtain Explanatory Leaflet AL 1 at your local Post Office and apply to the Department of Industry and Commerce on the tear-off slip for Claim Form AL 2. The Claim Form, when completed should be forwarded to this Department together with the necessary birth or baptismal certificates.

Claim Forms (new or renewal) should be completed on or immediately after the 1st December. **THEY MUST NOT BE COMPLETED AND DATED BEFORE THAT DATE.**

Renewals claims must be made within fourteen days from the 1st December and new claims within a month from the 1st December. Claimants who fail to make their claims within these times are liable to lose the allowance for the next payment period.

Claimants who have not already obtained the necessary birth or baptismal certificates for any child are advised to do so at once in order that they may have them ready when making their claims.

Very deep regret has been caused in the Melleray and Cappoquin districts by the death of Mrs Catherine Walsh Boola Cappoquin which occurred at her residence after a brief illness on last Sunday night at an advanced age.

The late Mrs Walsh was Proprietress of the well known Licensed Establishment situated midway between Cappoquin and Mount Melleray which has been a popular landmark for tourists visiting Mount Melleray Abbey within the past 100 years. For fifty years or more deceased was well-known to all passers-by to Mount Melleray Abbey, all of whom always found her to be such a kind, genial and popular hostess that they were glad to renew her charming acquaintance on their return to Cappoquin, or the Co Tipperary, as the case may be, for the junction of the roads leading to West Waterford and Cork and the Co Tipperary, is practically opposite this famous licensed premises. She was known personally to the writer for a long number of years, and a more cheerful, generous and affable lady it would be impossible to find anywhere.

Despite her advanced age, she had retained all those lovable and attractive traits of character to the last and her death in the fullness of years, after such a long and honourable career has now severed an old and valuable link with the past and has created a void in the district which it will be difficult to fill.

She had reared a fine family whose records should be an enduring tribute to her memory for many years.

She was mother of the Rev Brother Lewis, M.A. Superior of the Presentation College Bray Co Wicklow who had been formerly Superior of the Presentation College in Cobh, and who is now recognised as one of the leading Educationists in the Presentation Order in this country. She was also mother of Mrs P Collender, Castle St, Cappoquin. Mr. Maurice Walsh Boola, and of the late Nan O'Keefe, Boola, while she was also connected with most of the oldest and most respected families in West Waterford.

She was regularly attended by Dr Wm White and Dr Winifred White during her illness, while as a devout and exemplary Catholic, she was also regularly attended by Rev Fr Dominic O'Clair, Mount Melleray, and the Rev T Dunphy C.C., Cappoquin so that her death, fully fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, was a most peaceful and happy one, as befitted a lady who had been such an exemplary Catholic throughout her long and honourable life.

On Monday evening her remains were removed from her late residence to St Mary's Parish Church Cappoquin, where the coffin was received by Rev T Dunphy, C.C.
