Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee

In the unavoidable absence of Very Rev T Canon O'Brien P.P. VF, Chairman Mr M F Walsh was moved to the chair at the monthly meeting of the above held at Sgoil na gCeard, Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs Michael Harty Michael McGrath and Michael O'Hara were present. Mr James Lanigan C.E.O. and R. McEoin clerk attended.

Successful Lectures
The C.E.O. reported that the R.D.S. extension lectures given recently at Dungarvan and Ballymacart had proved very successful especially in the latter centre where Fr McGrath P.P. presided and Mr Harty M.C.C. supported.

Mr Harty—it was a very successful lecture alright.
Appointments
The appointment of Michael O'Murchadha as part-time teacher of Irish at Modeligo for the remainder of the current session was approved of by the Minister.

The vacancies caused by the resignation of Padraig Ó Flannghusa part-time Irish teacher at Kilibrien and Ballymacart were filled by Mr Tom Wall Kilibrien and Mr J. Moloney, T. Nire, respectively.

Woodwork Class
The application of P. Hale Glendelish, Lismore for a Woodwork class for students at Glen-garra, was approved.

Irish Classes
Alltiri na h-Aisrioghe Dungarvan, submitted a request for Irish classes at Kilibrien, Kilibrien and Kilibrien and sent in lists of signatures from each centre.

The C.E.O. said he had written for further particulars and the matter was deferred.

Almost Wiped Out
A circular from the Department asked the opinion of the committee for the need of training young men as smiths in order to teach others and also asked if there were any young men in the county fit for such courses.

Mr Harty said that the arts of carpentry harness-making and horse-shoeing are almost wiped out and instanced the dearth of smiths in the surrounding areas. He said that apart from the high wages offered to men in other trades there was no vocation for these arts.

Great Loss To County
Mr McGrath said that since the last meeting of the committee the County had suffered a great loss in the death of Mr John Bowen County Surveyor and also in the death of Mr Cyril Hynes M.R.C.V.S. Lismore and he proposed votes of sympathy to the relatives of the deceased.

Mr Harty seconded said that both were very distinguished men, magnificent in their own professions who had left behind them records that would be very difficult to beat and for which the people of the county would be ever grateful.

The Chairman associating himself with the votes said there was no doubt but the deaths of Mr Bowen and Mr Hynes proved a great loss.

Mr Lanigan on behalf of the officials, joined and the votes were passed in silence.

Death Of Mr. Matthew Cummins, The Square, Dungarvan

The unexpected death of Mr Matthew Cummins which took place at his residence, The Square, Dungarvan on Tuesday last Dec 19th, caused a severe shock to his many friends and acquaintances throughout the county. The late Mr Cummins had been ill less than three weeks when he died despite the best of medical attention and his death is everywhere regretted.

He was a native of Carrigahilla, Stradbally, being son of the late Mr John Cummins and came to Dungarvan when still a boy where he worked at the hardware store of the late Mr Michael Healy to which he succeeded about 18 years ago. Since that time he has built up a flourishing trade by his own endeavours and great business acumen and had established himself as one of the leading citizens of Dungarvan.

At the removal of the remains to St Marys on Wednesday evening a very large and representative cortege attended. Rev D. Power, C.C. assisted by Very Rev T. Canon O'Brien P.P. VF and Rev J. Corbett C.C. received the coffin.

On Thursday morning at 11 o'clock Office and Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul. The celebrant was Rev D. Power C.C. assisted by Rev J. Corbett C.C. (deacon) and Rev M. Power C.C. (sub-deacon). In the choir were—Very Rev T. Canon O'Brien, P.P. VF, Rev P. Farrell C.C. Dungarvan, Rev P. F. Donegan, O.S.A., do Rev. J. Roche, P.P. Abbeyside, Rev Fr Power, P.P. Kilrossanty, Rev J. P. Walsh C.C. do Rev Fr English, P.P. Stradbally, Rev T. Draper C.C. do and Rev Fr Walsh C.C. do. Subsequently the remains were removed to Stradbally where the interment was made.

Annual Dinner Of Glue Factory Workers

The annual dinner of the workers of the Glue and Gelatine factory was held at Egan's Hotel Dungarvan on Saturday night the 18th instant to which the Directors and officials of the Company were invited as the guests of the evening.

The President of the Employees' Society (Mick Mansfield) presided at this very enjoyable function. Having proposed the toast of 'Eire' he followed with the toast of "Our Guests and speaking to this toast he referred to the progress of industrial revival in Dungarvan and paid tribute to the Directors for their efforts on behalf of the workers. He stated that he was glad that the goods produced at Ballinamuck were of such excellent quality that our English Technical Advisor had informed him that they were as good as is produced in England today. This, he considered was no mean achievement but it was only done through sheer hard work and especially through the interest that each employee gave his particular job. In fact he could state that the workers at Ballinamuck today have such a personal interest in carrying their duty as per instructions of the management that the work there is a pleasure. He thanked the Directors for the personal interest they have at all times given to the employees.

Dr Casey replying stated that the invitation here tonight to this happy function came to him as a complete but pleasant surprise and thanked the Society on his own and on behalf of his fellow Directors for their kind invitation. He appreciated everything said by the Chairman (M. Mansfield) but the work done by the workers at Ballinamuck is definitely something that they should all feel very proud of. It proves that an Irishman who is willing to give his best can in a very short period become more proficient than trained foreign workers of generations. "You are doing excellent work and I feel that you will not rest satisfied until all the gelatines you produce are colourless. My earnest hope is that this happy spirit will always exist not only here, but in industry generally throughout the country and if so Ireland will be famous for its products post war."

Mr Maher and Dr McCarthy also spoke in praise of the employees and their work.

The evening continued with the singing of parodies and popular ditties in which the names of various officials and employees of the Company figured prominently in the course of their daily duties.

Mr P. A. Casey, kept his audience in fits of laughter with a few tall yarns.

HIGH HONOUR FOR A

PRIEST

The Rev. Father Albert Besor of the Cistercian, New Mellerey, Dubuque, U.S.A., was elected last week to the exalted position of Abbot of New Mellerey, in succession to the late, Right Rev. Bruno Ryan, Abbot, who died some time ago.

Father Albert was born in the Parish of Aglish on Nov. 17th, 1880, and entered Mount Mellerey in June 1899. He received the Habit in August, 1899, and had his simple Profession on August 25th, 1901. He was solemnly Professed on Sept. 11th, 1904, and received Tonsure from the late Abbot Carthage, Mount Mellerey, on May 14th, 1905. He received Four Minor Orders on May 14th, 1905, was created Sub-Deacon by the late Dr. Sheehan, Bishop of Waterford, on June 27, 1905, being raised to Deacon on June 17th, 1906. He was ordained a Priest on June 16th 1907, and went to New Mellerey in November, 1920. He taught Classics and Philosophy in Mt. Mellerey Seminary for many years, and was a Sub-Prior of Mellerey for a short time before going to Dubuque. Since going to the latter place, he became Sacred Superior, and also held many other important Community Posts.

He was a student of Mount Mellerey Seminary, and a Graduate of the Old Royal University, Dublin, and was a most erudite and saintly Priest. He is a member of the well-known Boston family, Dromore, Aglish, and the people of this parish have now good reason to feel proud of the high honour conferred on their former Co-Parishioner, whom we heartily congratulate.

Before New Mellerey, Dubuque, was entitled to have an Abbot, the late Rev. Father Louis Carew, a distinguished Cappoquin man, and a Priest of great piety and learning, who was grand-uncle of the Rev. Stephen Brennan, had filled the exalted position of Superior there for many years, being later called back to fill a similar position in the Cistercian Monastery in Coalville Leicestershire, which he held until his health broke down and he had to return to Mount Mellerey, and his death in the Bon Secours Home, Cork, some time later, caused the deepest regret amongst the public in his native town of Cappoquin.

PUBLIC MEETING IN TOWN HALL

A Public meeting which was attended by a large and representative gathering was held on Sunday last at the Town Hall Dungarvan Very Rev T Canon O'Brien P.P. VF presided On the platform with Canon O'Brien were Mr Ml Morrissey TD and Mr Denis Heskin TD The meeting was called for the purpose of forming a small committee to endeavour to bring to an end the strike at the Dickens Leather Factory.

Addressing the meeting Canon O'Brien said they were all aware of the purpose of the meeting and hoped that the outcome of the meeting would be the fixing of the strike He said the strike had cast a damper over the town and it was really a shame that it should continue any longer It was now entering its eleventh week and he said that he felt it only right to say that during that long period the workers had acted as decent self-respecting men He paid a tribute to the manner in which they had conducted themselves during those trying eleven weeks and said great credit was due to them for conducting the strike in such a splendid manner

The strike said Canon O'Brien could be fixed in two ways—one was by victory for one side or the other—that would only leave behind a certain amount of bitterness and resentment which no one wished to see The other way would be by a spirit of goodwill and charity and a little bit of give-and-take which would mean that the men would go back to work happy and contented He spoke of the distress the strike had brought—in its trail into the homes of the workers and the hardships imposed on the mothers wives and children facing the holy season of Christmas

Concluding he said that at this period of the year charity should prevail and with the love of God and our neighbour in our hearts and minds he thought the strike could be brought to a speedy end (Loud applause)

Mr Morrissey said that everybody deplored the strike, and he hoped that as the result of the meeting something would be done to end it He said he fully concurred with what Canon O'Brien had said about the workers and said the town was suffering from the effects of the long strike He suggested a small committee be formed to meet both sides and try and bring about a settlement

Mr Heskin said that he had only a few words to add to what Canon O'Brien and Mr Morrissey had said It was a sad state of affairs to see this strike going on so long He had to join in with Canon O'Brien and Mr Morrissey concerning the tribute paid to the workers He said that if the dispute was met in an honest-to-God way he had every reason to believe the strike could be fixed and the men back at work before the end of the week

The following committee were then selected—Canon O'Brien Ml Morrissey TD D Heskin, TD E Maher, Manager, Dungarvan Co Op Creamery R Moloney (A Moloney & Sons) T McCarthy Chairman UDC and L A Veale, Bringing the meeting to a conclusion Canon O'Brien said that he hoped the blessings of God would attend the efforts of the committee and that the strike may be seen ended

NO SETTLEMENT IN D.L.C STRIKE

The special committee formed as a result of last Sunday's public meeting in the Town Hall discussed the Dickens Leather Factory strike situation with representatives of the Workers Union and interviewed the management of the factory on Monday last and later both sides met in the Town Hall and after a long discussion it was unanimously agreed that a secret ballot of the workers be taken on the question "Are you willing to concede the same right to the Dickens Leather Company with regard to confidential workers as obtains in Carrick-on-Suir Tannery the workers of which are members of your union?"

The ballot took place in the Town Hall on Thursday at which Canon O'Brien presided and Mr Ml O'Meara Acting Town Clerk acted as checker Prior to the ballot Mr Gilbert Lynch informed the workers on the point they were voting and said the position of Carrick-on-Suir was not the same as Dungarvan

When the workers had voted on the question the result was almost an unanimous refusal to accept 102 men voting "No" and 8 voting "Yes" In these circumstances therefore the strike continues
