West Waterford Divisional Board ANNUAL CONVENTION

The Sixteenth Annual Convention of the above Board was held in the Gaelic League Hall Tallow on Sunday last Jan 21st and despite very severe weather conditions traveling etc was attended by a good number of delegates from all over the division. The following clubs were represented—Stradbally—K Phelan M Veale Kinalebeg—M Connors Lismore—J Vaughan M Gough T O'Sullivan Tallow—W Henley J Cunningham M J Collins T McCarthy Ballyduff—J Quirke M Farrell Blackwater Rovers—P Morrissey Modeligo—J McGrath Ballycoe—H Foley E Foley M Fives M Flanagan St Michaels—M Hickey T Daly Tourin—J Fives M Fives Cappoquin—D Walsh, Shabh Gue—W Cotter Ardmore—J Foley T Connery Eire Oge—J Coughlan T Vaughan Mr M Connors outgoing chairman Mr D Sullivan vice-chairman Mr T O'Mahony hon treasurer Mr T A. Kyne hon secretary and registrar Messrs W Barron J Fives and P Ryan County Board representatives were also present.

Rev W Meehan CC President of the Tallow Club in opening the Convention welcomed all the officials and delegates and commented very favourably on the past season's work throughout the division and particularly on the spirit shown on the playing fields and he looked forward to seeing the same spirit prevailing during the present season as in the past.

Mr M Connors chairman, presided, and sincerely thanked Rev Fr Meehan for his very hearty welcome and for his good wishes. The first matter was the adoption of the Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet and discussions arose on the matter of some clubs not making the necessary gate returns but the hon secretary assured the delegates that all outstanding gates would be returned before the next meeting when the annual percentages to clubs will be paid out. It was decided to refuse affiliation to the clubs mentioned unless they clear up outstanding debts and if clubs do not affiliate Board to be responsible. It was proposed and seconded that the Co Board issue a copy of the Bye Laws to all clubs and to refuse to start championships until same are issued. Some more items on the balance sheet were discussed after which Mr W Barron proposed and N Walsn seconded that the balance sheet be adopted and was passed unanimously.

Mr M V O'Donoghue BE Chairman of the Waterford Co Board complimented the divisional officials especially the Secretary, Mr T A Kyne on the successful achievements of the past year and particularly the teams which won honours in the division.

Secretary's Report
The Secretary Mr T A Kyne then read the following report:
A Chairde—I submit herewith my report for the year 1944. The affiliations and entries were Clubs 52 Teams 66 as compared with last year's 57 clubs with 74 teams.

A number of clubs failed to fulfill their engagements and this led to some confusion in the carrying out of the championships.

The year can be considered a successful one from the point of propagation of our Gaelic games as almost every district in West Waterford had its football or hurling Cumann.

The number of objections lodged during the year was very high. Clubs are perfectly right to object to illegal teams in fact, it is their duty to do so, but I feel that many clubs try to get any excuse to object to the winning team with the hope of getting a replay.

The Division is just beginning to pay off the debts to the Co Board and others and I suggest things should be left as last year to give a chance for the Board to become clear. Motions requiring the Board to pay clubs

extra money if passed will be impossible to carry out.

The Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet show how we stand at the end of the year and I have nothing further to add to same.

The conduct of some few players was such that called for severe sentences, but on a whole our games were sportingly and cleanly conducted.

Our referees are to be complimented on their efficient service to the Board during the year. These officials deserve the support of the Board in their tasks and serious action should be taken against anyone who interferes with them in the discharge of their duties.

The Divisional Winners were JH Cappoquin JF Ballycoe MH Dungarvan MF Dungarvan. Our winners in JH JF and MH, went on to secure County Honours and I congratulate them on their achievements.

The attendance of our representatives at Co Board meetings for 1944 was—P Ryan 6 J W Barron 5 out of a total of 7 meetings. This attendance is very good.

In conclusion I wish to thank the officials of the Board who so ably helped me during the year. The Referees Club Secretaries and the local Press—who all helped to the utmost to make my work for the Association an easy task. May I specially thank the Gardal of the district who at anytime—day or night—were willing to convey notice of changes etc to all our clubs.

In connection with the Secretary's report a Tallow delegate referred to the part re objections and asked if anything could be done to cut down the number of objections lodged each year and asked would it be possible to grant a general amnesty to all players who have broken the rules (other than playing foreign games) and let them all start anew.

The Secretary in reply said it is impossible to cut out objections and that the delegates proposal was a good one, but was a matter for Congress.

Mr J Cunningham proposed the adoption of the Secretary's Report which was seconded by W Barron and passed.

The next matter was the election of Chairman and three candidates—Messrs P Ryan, J Ahearne and J F O'Donnell went forward for election. The first count resulted as follows—P Ryan 19 J F O'Donnell 13 J Ahearne 7. Mr Ahearne was then eliminated and the final count was P Ryan 26 J F O'Donnell 13 Mr O'Connor outgoing chairman, then vacated the chair which was taken by Mr P Ryan who thanked the delegates for his return and said he hoped he would give justice to all and would do his best to rule wisely and well. The election of Vice-Chairman was then proceeded with and the candidates were Messrs J Quirke D Sullivan and J McGrath. The first count resulted as follows—D O'Sullivan 16 Quirke 15 J McGrath 7. The latter was then eliminated and the final result was J Quirke 19 D O'Sullivan 17. Mr J Quirke returned sincere thanks to all the delegates for his election and Mr D Sullivan congratulated his opponent on his success.

The election of Hon Treasurer was the next business, two candidates being on the agenda—Mr T O'Mahony outgoing and Mr J Moloney the latter not being present. On a show of hands the outgoing Treasurer was unanimously re-elected.

The election of three Co Board representatives then took place, their being thirteen candidates for the three seats as follows—W Barron, J Fives, P Landers E Fitzgerald T Morrissey, K Whelan M Morrissey M Curran J McGrath, M McGrath M Fives, J F O'Donnell and Con Curley. On the fourth count Mr J Fives was elected and on the seventh Messrs J F O'Donnell and Con Curley.

During the meeting a delegate asked for a ruling on the attending of flapper sports meetings, which was referred to the Co Board.

Nominations

Motions from 1 to 9 were not considered as the clubs sponsoring them had no delegates present.

Motion 10 from the Lismore Club that the present system of election of 3 representatives of Division on the Co Board was amended to read election on the Proportional Representation System and passed.

Motions 11 and 12 sponsored by the Dungarvan club that a fixtures committee be set up in the Division and that an Objections Committee be set up in the Division were both passed.

Draws and Fixtures Meeting
The meeting for the Draws and Fixtures was fixed for Cappoquin on Sunday Feb 11th. The Chairman asked all clubs to have affiliations in before that date if possible.

Vote of Sympathy
Mr D O'Sullivan proposed a vote of sympathy to all Gaels who had been bereaved during the year and especially to the relatives of the late Mr P Malone who he said was a grand type of Gael and Irishman whose death was a big loss to the Association.

Mr J Cunningham seconded the vote which was passed in silence all the standing as a mark of respect.

Death Of Mr. William O'Donoghue, Crowhill, Cappoquin

REMARKABLE TRIBUTE BY OLD I.R.A. COMRADES

The premature and unexpected death of Mr. William O'Donoghue, Crowhill, Melleray, Cappoquin, which occurred in the Mercy Hospital, Cork, on last Friday, has caused the deepest regret amongst all classes of the public in the Melleray and Cappoquin districts, where he was so widely esteemed and so genuinely popular with all.

A comparatively young man, being only 46 years of age, he had enjoyed perfect health up to last Monday week, but on Tuesday morning he was suddenly seized with a painful internal complaint, and when examined at home shortly afterwards by Dr. Wm. White, M.O., Cappoquin, the latter found his condition so serious that he ordered his immediate removal to Dungarvan Hospital for the purpose of an operation.

Having been conveyed to Dungarvan hospital without delay he was examined by Dr. D. T. McCarthy, who ordered his removal to the Mercy Hospital, Cork, to where he was conveyed by ambulance, and operated on the same night but as his condition still remained critical, a further operation was deemed necessary on Friday morning, but the poor fellow never rallied from the effects of this and died about one o'clock on Friday, after a remarkably brief illness.

Deceased was a farmer in Crowhill and was a most industrious and hard-working man and never spared himself in looking after the interests and comfort of his wife and large family of ten children, who will now sorely miss the presence of such an honest and faithful bread-winner, and such an ideal and devoted husband and father, and they have now the deepest and most sincere sympathy of all classes in their sad and irreparable loss.

During several periods of acute fuel shortage in Cappoquin within recent years he supplied large quantities of turf and fire-blocks to many of the people at reasonable prices and was also a large supplier to the Cappoquin Co-operative Society and certain Dungarvan Fuel Merchants which eased the situation from time to time, for which everybody felt deeply grateful.

Last year he had the misfortune to have his comfortable residence completely destroyed by fire while he was in Dungarvan on business and a public fund was later started by a Committee of his friends in the Melleray and Cappoquin districts, with Mr. M. J. Sargent, P.O., Cappoquin, as one of the Hon. Secs., for the purpose of raising the necessary funds to enable him to build a new residence for himself and his family.

As this fund is still open, it is hoped that it will now be supported more generously than would otherwise have been the case, because with their chief provider now gone from them, his afflicted widow and family are more deserving of support than ever. Deceased was a grand social character, of a quiet, kindly and generous nature which made him popular with all. A great supporter of the G.A.A., he was a prominent player on the Melleray Faugha-Ballagh hurling team up to a few years ago, and set an example to the younger men when he had reached an age when he should have retired from active participation in such a strenuous game. He was also a gentleman of high musical accomplishments, and for years was a leading member of the Melleray Pipers' Band, while he was a splendid violinist, and always loved to play the rich and plaintive traditional airs of his native land.

He was, in addition, an expert and graceful Irish step-dancer, and taught the art to all his children, and this was proved at a concert in the Boathouse Hall, Cappoquin, last year when one of the most attractive features on the programme was a Four-Hand-Reel by two of his sons and his two daughters, and also a grand exhibition of Irish Jigs and Reels for which all the accompaniments were faultlessly played on the violin by their proud and delighted father.

But his love of Irish ideas was not confined to musical matters alone, because in his younger days he was a loyal and fearless member of the Waterford Brigade of the I.R.A., and took part in many important engagements in the cause of Irish independence, and was never afraid to risk his life with his brave comrades in this holy and patriotic cause.

He suffered various terms of imprisonment for his activities in this respect, and the hardships which he had endured, both on the bleak mountainside when on "active service" as a soldier of the Irish Republic, and also in prison, must, undoubtedly, have seriously impaired his once robust constitution and made him unable to successfully resist the serious attack which proved fatal to him last week.

He has now gone from amongst us, gone from this world of strife and sorrow, but gone to a more peaceful and happy region to enjoy the untold blessings of eternal peace and happiness "midst the mansions of the Blest" in heaven.

In addition to his widow and family, we wish to offer our sincere sympathy to his bereaved father, Mr. John O'Donoghue, his sisters Mrs. Flynn, Ballynoe, and Mrs. J. O'Meara, Knockanore, and also his two sisters in America, Mrs. Walsh and Mrs. Kieley, his uncle, Mr. Thomas O'Donoghue, Glenafalla, Melleray, Mrs. Josephine Mason, Cappoquin, and all other relatives, and pray that God 'who tempers the wind to the shorn lamb' will now grant them strength and fortitude to bear their heavy cross.

On Saturday evening the remains of deceased were conveyed by motor hearse from Cork to St. Mary's Catholic Church, Cappoquin, the funeral was met by a large number of his old comrades of the I.R.A., and the general public from Cappoquin, Melleray, Crowhill and other places, about a half mile outside the town where the coffin was taken from the hearse and borne on the shoulders of his friends the remainder of the journey to the Church, where it was received and blessed by the Rev. T. Dunphy C.E. and the Rev. Father S. Brennan.

On Sunday morning Requiem Mass was offered up for the repose of deceased's soul, and at two o'clock the funeral took place to St. Declan's Cemetery, Dromroe, where the interment took place.

A remarkable and impressive tribute of respect was paid to the memory of the deceased by his old comrades of the I.R.A. who draped the coffin in the Tricolour in the chapel yard, where a Guard of Honour of six men, in charge of Mr. Thomas Kelleher, Cappoquin, another old I.R.A. man, all armed with rifles, presented arms as the coffin passed out to the street and later reversed arms, and formed a Guard of Honour of three at each side of the coffin, with Mr. T. Kelleher marching behind.

The cortege was led by Rev. T. Dunphy, C.E. and Rev. S. Brennan, after whom came the empty hearse, while immediately in front of the coffin Mr. J. Connolly a member of the Melleray Pipers Band, slowly marched, playing the "Dead March in Saul" as a special tribute to the memory of one who had been such a valued member of the Pipers Band for several years.

The members of the Guard of Honour under Mr. T. Kelleher were—E. Lonergan, Cappoquin, J. Lynch, do., D. Cullinane Dromroe; J. Murphy, Ballynoe; Jerry O'Brien, Moonamoon, and Matt Purcell, Affane, and as the funeral procession marched slowly on its way around the town the mournful dirge of the Bagpipes and the slow, steady step of the Guard of Honour provided a scene of great impressiveness and solemnity.

Arrived at the cemetery, the Guard of Honour lined up at the graveside and presented arms as the coffin approached, and after the final prayers had been read by Father Dunphy, assisted by Father Brennan, and the grave finally covered, three volleys were fired over the grave, so that deceased was buried with full military honours, as befitting a brave and honourable member of the Old I.R.A.

Mr. Thos. Lincoln, N.T., Cappoquin, recited a decade of the Rosary, in Irish, and also delivered a short oration, in the course of which he paid high tributes to the great courage and patriotism of the deceased, which concluded one of the saddest and most impressive funeral ceremonies witnessed in the district for years.

The attendance of the general public at the funeral was so large that it would be impossible to give a list of names, beyond stating that Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., and Mr. Denis Heskin, T.D., were prominent amongst the mourners, while Messrs. Sheehan, Ryan, and Co., Dungarvan, were also represented.
