Waterford Board Of Public Assistance

Estimates Meeting.

Mr David Coghlan chairman presided at the above held on January 31st Messrs L A Veale T Lynch W Kenneally and P Caulfield attended. Mr S J Moynihan Co Manager and Mr Michael Flynn, Sec attended.

Manager's Report On Estimate

In submitting his Estimate the Manager reported as follows—

I beg to submit my estimate of Expenditure to be provided for in respect of year ending the 31st March 1946 the total amount being £92 440 or an increase of £9 694 over last year.

The increase arises under the heading of Assistance in District Institutions due to increased prices generally but principally for bread meat milk, butter clothing and bedding. Substantial increases in Emergency Bonuses to the lower paid officials had also to be met while repairs and improvements to the various Institutions are a constant source of expenditure. Provision is also made in my Estimate for an increase in the salaries of the Nursing Staffs of the Hospitals under your charge on the recommendation of the Local Government Department as well as for expenditure under the Children's Footwear Scheme. To all these items has to be added an estimated debit balance of £1 472 at the end of the current year.

It will be necessary in accordance with the terms of Section 25 of the County Management Act 1940 for the Board to pass a Resolution consenting to the excess expenditure in respect of District Institutions which will have to be met before the end of the current year.

The Manager concluded by paying high tribute to Mr Flynn for the able assistance he had given in preparing the estimates. The Estimated Expenditure under the various heads is as follows—

Assistance in District Institutions—£43 480
Assistance in Extern Institutions—£6 854
Home Assistance—£31 620
Medical Assistance otherwise than in institutions—£11 330
Other Expenses—£3 684
Total—£96 968
Estimated Receipts—£6 000
Estimated Expenditure—£96 968
Net Requirements—£90 968

Of this amount the county will provide £70 796 and Waterford city £21 644.

Having considered the Estimate the following resolutions were proposed by Mr Caulfield seconded by Mr Kenneally and passed unanimously.

1. That the Estimate of Expenditure as submitted by the Manager be adopted and that the sums set out be the sums to be demanded from the respective contributing Council for the financial year ending the 31st March 1946.

2. That the Waterford Board of Public Assistance hereby consent to any expenditure necessary during the current year under the head of Assistance in District Institutions in excess of that provided for in the Estimate.

Departure Of Rev. Stephen Brennan, Cappoquin

A WONDERFUL SEND-OFF FROM THE TOWNSPEOPLE

Rev Stephen Brennan who was ordained for the Australian Mission in All Hallows Dublin last June left Cappoquin for Dublin on the first stage of his long journey on last Monday morning and the sad scenes witnessed at his departure should long be remembered in his native town.

Son of Mrs Julia Brennan, Shopkeeper Upper Main Street, and of the late Mr J P Brennan Steve as he was affectionately called by all his friends received his early education in Mount Melleray Seminary where he had a brilliant Collegiate course and later went to All Hallows Dublin where he completed his studies in Theology and Philosophy with even greater brilliance and where he was ordained to the Priesthood last June.

Instead of being sent on the English Mission for some years before going to Australia, he was retained at home in the meantime and it was during this period that the people of Cappoquin were afforded an opportunity of realising his high qualities as a Priest.

Of a gentle saintly and retiring disposition he reproduced in many respects most of the outstanding saintly characteristics of his late grand-uncle, Rev Father Louis Carew O Cist who was one of the most beloved and distinguished members of the Mount Melleray Community of the Cistercian Order during his time.

An ardent and most enthusiastic Gael he took part in all the championship matches played by the Cappoquin hurling team last year, and was mainly instrumental in the successes achieved by the team throughout the season but he eclipsed all his previous performances by his marvellous play in the final of the junior hurling championship against Clonca-Power when his uperring markmanship in the forward line found the opponents' net almost every time he shot for it.

His brilliant play on this occasion undoubtedly helped the Cappoquin team to win the Co Championship for the first time ever in the history of the town and he became the hero of the hurling club as a result of this great victory.

Whether as a Priest a Gael or a private individual he had won a high place in the hearts and esteem of everybody in Cappoquin and deep regret was felt when he received a short notice on Thursday, 1st inst to the effect that he should leave Cappoquin for Dublin on last Monday morning, Feb 5th. The members of the hurling club hurriedly arranged to give him a farewell supper and make him some suitable presentation as a token of their esteem and gratitude for all his services to the club but with his usual modesty Father Brennan would not allow any public function to be held in his honour and insisted that whatever was to be done should be done in the most informal and unostentatious manner.

The general body of the townspeople got to work in the meantime and a small body of lady collectors quickly had raised sufficient funds to make him a suitable presentation while another committee of male collectors representing all interests in the town went even better and collected a more substantial sum a notable feature being the number of non-Catholics who so generously subscribed to the Fund, which proved the great respect and esteem in which Father Brennan was held by all sections in the Community.

Deprived of the opportunity of making him a Public Presentation, a deputation from the hurling Club comprising Messrs P McCarthy, President E Lonergan Chairman P Cunningham Treasurer and Hon Sec., P English, Captain, and John Greene, waited on Father Brennan at his residence on Sunday and presented him with a wallet of notes and four volumes of the

valuable work 'Moral Theology' by Rev Father David SJ which Father Brennan appreciated very highly.

On Sunday night a delegation representing all classes of the townspeople made a further presentation of another wallet of notes on behalf of the people of Cappoquin the delegation included Messrs M J Sargent P C F X O Leary NT T P Kelleher Stationmaster G P Hely E J Fraher George Russell J Brackett P Wall, and James Ahearne Tintur. The Presentation was formally made by Mr O Leary NT, who paid some glowing tributes to the high qualities of Father Brennan both as a Priest and a sportsman to which the Rev gentleman suitably replied.

In an interview at a later stage Father Brennan requested the writer on his behalf, to warmly thank both the hurling club and the townspeople in general for their kind and generous presentations to him which he would remember with gratitude as long as he lived.

A touching proof of the love which everybody had for Father Brennan was afforded by the fact that even the altar boys of St Mary's Catholic Church subscribed to a little Testimonial on their own behalf while the poorest of the poor in Cappoquin insisted on being included in the list of Subscribers to the general fund.

On Monday morning an extraordinary scene was witnessed at the Railway Station when Father Brennan was departing by the 9 45 a.m. train. Long before the hour of departure crowds of the townspeople had assembled on the platform to bid him adieu so that he received one of the most remarkable farewells ever known in Cappoquin.

The people surged around him for a final handshake and extended to him their best wishes while many an eye was dimmed with tears as the train finally steamed off and the Rev gentleman waved a grateful and fond farewell to the people of his native town who had shown their love and reverence for him in such a practical manner.

Father Brennan was accompanied by Rev M Foley son of Mr John Foley and Mrs Foley Knockalara who was ordained about five years ago but who had been on the English Mission in Bristol in the meantime.

Father Foley may also be described as a Cappoquin Priest as his father is a native of Cappoquin being brother of Mr Declan Foley and Miss Minnie Foley Barrack Street and Mr M Foley Lismore and although not being in such close touch with Cappoquin as Father Brennan he also received a very cordial send off on Monday morning.

Both young Priests are going to the Diocese of Armidale Australia whose Bishop is a distinguished Churchman from the Cappoquin Parish Most Rev Dr John Coleman son of the late Mr Wm Coleman and Mrs Coleman Melleray so that a cordial welcome awaits them there and we wish them both the best of health happiness and prosperity in their sacred calling in 'The Land of the Southern Cross'.

RIOTOUS SCENE NEAR CHURCH

Five Farmers Sent To Prison

A riotous scene, followed by an assault, in a remote district of the Co. Waterford, arising out of agrarian trouble, had a sequel at Waterford Circuit Court, on Monday when five farmers from the Nire Valley were charged with riot, assault and unlawful wounding. The accused were James Grady, John O'Donnell, James Coffey, John Coffey and Edmund Coffey. There were altogether eleven indictments against them, jointly and separately. They pleaded guilty only to riot. This plea was accepted by the State, and a nolle prosequi was entered in the other ten counts.

James Grady who was described by Judge Sealy as the ring-leader, was sentenced to six months' imprisonment with hard labour. O'Donnell, James and John Coffey received three months' each with hard labour and Edmund Coffey one month. Letters on behalf of the accused from Rev M J Phelan P.P., Touraneena and Rt. Rev Dean Byrne, P.P., V.F. Clonmel, to Dr. Counahan State Solicitor, prior to the District Court proceedings were handed in by Mr J I McGuire, who (instructed by Mr L Skinner solr. Clonmel) appeared for the defence.

In the course of his letter, Dean Byrne stated "I would feel greatly perturbed if the court proceedings resulted in any notable punishment of the accused, and I would have great apprehension of an outbreak of hostility and disorder in the district. The district is isolated and remote and soreness in connection with land would be very intense among a number of the inhabitants. I would most respectfully submit that the law proceedings should, in the interest of the peace of the district, take the most lenient course that may be possible in the circumstances."

Judge, Sealy asked if Dean Byrne expected that men who behaved in the manner in which the accused behaved, in attacking one single man outside his own church, should get no punishment.

Mr McGuire replied that the clergy were entitled to take a view which, perhaps, might not be accepted in law. There was peace at the moment in the district, and Dean Byrne, was anxious that it should be preserved.

History Of Trouble

Relating the facts of the case Mr. McGuire said that accused were only five of a very large number of people who extended their sympathy to a lady named Mary Coffey, who, with her brother, lived on a farm of 62 acres of land in the Nire Valley. He described how in 1916 the Coffey's mortgaged their farm as security for a loan from the London and General Insurance Co. During the next ten or fifteen years they paid back £45 but in 1944 they owed £135, composed of accumulated arrears and interest. Following proceedings winding up the London and General Insurance Co a motion was brought in the Dungarvan Circuit Court in connection with the sale of the Coffey farm. Hundreds of people in the district subscribed with the object of having the farm secured to Mary Coffey. The sale was closed in favour of a man named Tobin at £260. Tobin's bid was accepted, owing to the fact that the representative of the Coffey sympathisers had left the court at the time owing to a misunderstanding. Tobin was subsequently offered £260 to restore the farm to the Coffeys but he refused.

As a result a great agitation began in the district the people of which, as one man, rose up against Tobin to show they were serious about this matter. The next step was that Mary Coffey and her son were evicted on the roads by the sheriff. A meeting was held at which it was decided that further efforts should be made to persuade Tobin to go back on his purchase but apparently without success.

In the alleged riot outside the church at Knockabrandon, on September 24, counsel said there was no intention to do any serious injury to Tobin, but there was undoubtedly the intention of treating him roughly, to bring him to his senses, and make him see they were serious. Concluding, counsel said that if these men were sent to jail there was grave danger that intense feeling would be aroused in the whole district, and the whole thing might possibly be drawn out interminably.

Mr J Darcy (instructed by Dr. Counahan, State Solicitor) for the prosecution, said the Attorney General, after reading the

depositions and letters from the clergy, took the view that the law must be upheld. This particular type of rioting could not be justified or tolerated. He added that it was the brother of the actual purchaser who had been assaulted, and he revealed that the purchaser of the farm had offered Mrs Coffey the residence on the farm and a small garden in which she could live for the rest of her life.

Giving his decision, Judge Sealy said there might in the old days have been some sort of excuse for this class of thing, but now that people had their own Government they could adopt lawful means for achieving their ends without committing a barbarous assault outside a church on a Sunday on a man who had nobody to defend him. That sort of thing could not be done in Ireland at the present day without punishment, and the sooner people knew that the better.

Late Mrs. Mary Cliffe, Carrowgarra

Widespread and very genuine regret has been occasioned all over West Waterford by the death of Mrs Mary Cliffe which took place in the fullness of years and after a brief illness at her home at Carrowgarra on Sunday Jan 28th. The deceased lady was an esteemed and popular member of the farming community being relict of the late Mr Maurice Cliffe an extensive farmer. She was possessed of a most amiable character and her charity knew no bounds. Her death which has caused inexpressible grief to her family, relatives, and large circle of friends has removed from our midst a lady of many outstanding qualities.

The great respect and esteem in which deceased and her family are held was evidenced at the removal of the remains to Colligan Church on Monday, Jan 29th when despite the arctic weather conditions prevailing a very large number of mourners from many districts throughout the county attended. After the celebration of Requiem Mass by Rev Fr H Conway, P.P. Kilgobinet, assisted by Rev. Fr Mce O'Meara, C.C. do on the following Tuesday morning the interment was made in the family plot in Colligan graveyard in the presence of another large concourse of sympathisers who had come to pay their last respects to the late Mrs Cliffe. Rev Fr Conway, P.P. read the last prayers at the graveside.

We join in extending our sincere sympathy to the bereaved family and relatives in their loss.

Children's School Meals

At the quarterly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban Council held recently a report on the Children's School Meals was before the members. It dealt mainly with the financial side and showed that a deficit of £140 (estimated) would arise at the close of the 1944-45 season. As was pointed out by Mr Moynihan County Manager this will mean an increase in the rates unless the Children's Health Committee arranges to raise funds through voluntary sources. Opinion is divided as to whether this is the proper thing to do. Some maintain that the full cost of the meals should be borne by the ratepayers while others favour the low rate system and the balancing of the deficit through voluntary measures as at present. From what we have seen in past carnivals and functions held towards this end it is only robbing Peter to pay Paul as most of the support was given by the poorer classes for whose benefit the school meals function. At the same time no one likes to see an increase in the rates, so that the problem will continue to exist. If a fund was opened in conjunction with a carnival it might help towards even distribution of the burden as those who would not be inclined to spend money at a carnival would then have the option of sending a contribution.

The Free Meals Scheme undoubtedly merits the unanimous support of all sections of the community as it is one of our first charities to see that the unfortunate poor school children have at least the pleasure of a good meal during school hours. We trust that the Children's Health Committee will arrive at a solution to meet the estimated deficit and that plans will be made towards raising further funds for next winter. We hope although the last few attempts have proved abortive that the meeting to be called on Sunday next will be well attended and that work will at once commence towards this end.

INQUEST RESUMED—The adjourned inquest on the late Pte Charles Daly Clara O'cally which opened at the District Hospital on Sept 1st 1944 was resumed before Dr D T McCarthy Coroner for West Waterford sitting with a jury at the Courthouse Dungarvan on Friday last Feb 2nd. A verdict that death was due to shock and haemorrhage on the brain due to multiple fractures of the skull caused by three severe impacts was returned according to the evidence tendered. Inspector McGonigle G S and Sergt Teahan, represented the authorities.

GO COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1938

WHEREAS it is enacted by sub-section (2) of Section 2 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930), that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the application of the council of a county or a county borough extend or vary in such county or county borough the close time in respect of all wild birds or any particular kinds or kind of wild birds

AND WHEREAS the Council of the County of Waterford has applied to the said Minister to make an order under the said sub-section extending until the 1st day of December in every year the close time in the County of Waterford in respect of the kinds of wild birds hereinafter mentioned

NOW the Minister for Justice in exercise of the powers conferred on him by sub-section (2) of Section 2 of the Wild Birds Protection Act 1930 (No 16 of 1930) and of every and any other power him in this behalf enabling hereby orders as follows—

- 1 This Order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order 1938
- 2 The Interpretation Act 1937 (No 38 of 1937) applies to this Order
- 3 The close time in the County of Waterford in respect of the following kinds of wild birds that is to say—Owl (all species) kestrel goldfinch linnet redpoll siskin skylark Wag-tail (all species), chough, kingfisher hoopoe is hereby extended to the 1st day of December in the said county for the said kinds of wild birds shall be the period between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of December (both days inclusive) in every year.

Then I let my thoughts wander down memory's road I seemed to see "Ned" (as he will ever be remembered here) in the hurling field full of life and fleet of foot then in the camogie field trying to make hurlers out of the timid ladies no easy job, a stouter heart might have qualified but defeat was unknown to him.

Then sadly yet vividly I recalled the "troubled days" even this peaceful village did not escape "hell's angels." The military lorries of armed soldiers many of the village boys arrested. I thought God only knew where

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and what the end of them might have been. Then home again after a bitter period of imprisonment.
Then a period of peace when Ned could recall all his experiences. How he knew the history of every hurler how eagerly he followed the All-Ireland hurling championships. Then sickness laid its heavy hand on him but there was ever a ready smile, and never a complaint.
Men such as he, full of quick cheer and courage are an asset to any community and a gap has been caused by his early death that can never be filled.
I think a verse from the song "Who Fears To Speak Of '98" is a very fitting epitaph for him—
The dust of some in Irish earth
Among their own they rest
And that same land that gave them birth,
Has caught them to her breast
And we will pray that from their clay
A nobler race may start
Of true men like you men,
To act as brave a part
