In view of the many restrictions in food supplies already in force owing to emergency conditions I dispense the Diocese from the Lenten Fast and I confine abstinence from meat to Fridays during Lent thus allowing meat on Ash Wednesday and on the Wednesday and Saturday of Quarter Tense, 21st and 24th of February

#### The Work of the Church

Very Rev and Dear Fathers and Dear Brethren

When Our Lord Jesus Christ ascended into Heaven He left His visible representative on earth behind Him This was the Catholic Church which is His Mystical Body and Bride a Divine Institution the organ of the Holy Ghost until the end of time and the spiritual mother of us all The Church continues in our midst the visible mission of Jesus Christ who handed over to her on his Ascension, his own offices of Teaching, Sanctifying and Governing the Faithful

As the Father hath sent Me He says to the Apostles I also send you You have not chosen Me but I have chosen you

He that heareth you heareth Me and he that despiseth you despiseth Me

Whatever you shall bind on earth shall be bound in heaven and whatsoever you shall loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven

Go ye into the whole world and preach the Gospel to every creature He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved but he that believeth not shall be condemned

The Catholic religion is a revelation from God not a collection of doctrines and rites devised by human ingenuity

The Church might say to us what St Paul said to the Galatians I am an Apostle or Messenger not of men neither by man but by Jesus Christ and God the Father, who raised Him from the dead And I give you to understand that the doctrine which I preach is not according to man for neither did I receive it of man nor did I learn it but by the revelation of Jesus Christ (Gal 1)

The Church is thus the divinely appointed trustee of the legacy of divine truth and of the ministry of grace left by Jesus Christ and His Apostles

We read in the last verses of St Matthew's Gospel how before Our Lord ascended into heaven He called His Apostles together and addressed them in the most solemn language giving them His last and most special charge in the following words

All power is given to Me in heaven and on earth Go therefore teach ye all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you and behold I am with you all days even to the consummation of the world (Matth. 28 18)

We should consider the force of the expression "I, God, am with you," and then its bearing on the mission of the Apostles The invariable meaning in Scripture language of the phrase "I, God, am with you" is that it signifies a very special and divine assistance and, when a commission is given by God which appears of unusual difficulty or beyond human strength the words carry with them a divine promise of complete success

Now what was the commission which Christ entrusted to His Apostles and to which He subjoined the promises "And, behold I am with you"? The Evangelists tell us it was "Go, teach all nations preach the Gospel to every creature teach them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you"

Here surely is a commission of more than ordinary difficulty to teach all men all things whatsoever Christ had taught themselves They simple fishermen are to publish to the world the whole Revelation He had made known to them—not adding to it nor taking from it nor altering in any way the divine message And therefore He promises to be with them to watch over and specially assist them to secure the complete success of the Mission he had imposed on them Our Lord had said on another occasion "The Paraclete the Holy Ghost Whom the Father will send in My name He will teach you all things, and bring all things to your mind whatsoever I shall have said to you (John 14 26)

From this divine commission given by Our Lord after His Resurrection from the dead and from other texts of Scripture we gather that the work of the Catholic Church involves the following three main functions or offices

- (1) To teach the revealed doctrines of faith and morals which were entrusted to her by Jesus Christ and His Apostles
- (2) To sanctify the Faithful by the offering of the Sacrifice of the Mass and by the administration of the Sacraments instituted by Christ
- (3) To rule the Faithful and guide them on the road that leads to their supernatural destiny

#### 1 The Teaching Office of the Church

By our natural reason we know many wonderful things We have sciences inventions historical researches antiquities dug up from the earth knowledge of the stars etc but our natural reason tells us so little of the things of God and of the soul Hence if we are to know anything of God, it must be in quite a different way

It is necessary that God Himself should speak to us that God Himself should teach us and this information direct from the Infinite Mind of God to the finite Mind of Man is called Revelation or "taking off the veil" Faith or belief on our part is the acceptance of this information given from above Revelation and Faith are correlative terms like father and son

This teaching us on the part of God and this acceptance of the knowledge on our part are necessary on account of our ignorance of the things of God and of the soul And this ignorance is one of the wounds of human nature left from Original Sin

We are asked to believe that is to accept as true the heavenly information supplied by God's revelation because knowledge is the first condition of action for a reasonable being Man is primarily a Mind and without information he cannot carry on As the necessary knowledge cannot be discovered by ourselves it is necessary that God Himself should come to our rescue As a matter of fact so it is God became Man 1945 years ago that He might the more effectually teach us Men divine truth in what concerns God and the soul We read in St Paul's Epistle to the Hebrews God, who at various times and in divers manners spoke in times past to the fathers by the prophets last of all in these days hath spoken to us by His Son, whom he hath appointed heir of all things, by whom also He made the world (Heb 1)

And Our Lord says "To this end was I born and for this am I come into the world that I may bear witness to the truth Everyone that is of the truth listens to my voice" (John 19 37) "I am the light of the world the man who follows me walketh not in darkness, but shall have the light of life" (John 8 12) "No one knoweth the Son but the Father, neither doth anyone know the Father but the Son and he to whom it shall please the Son to reveal Him" (Matth. 11, 25) "We speak what we know and we bear witness to what we have seen" (John 3 11).

Although arrangements have not yet been completed for the shipment of the potatoes to the continent it has been decided in view of the delay to be anticipated in collection and transport from rural areas that we arrange immediately for their forwarding to and storage in Dublin

All growers are therefore kindly requested to get in touch with their local Red Cross Branch and give details of quantities and arrange for the delivery of the potatoes to the nearest Railway Goods Station for transport to Du lin

Potatoes will not be allowed to be exported by the Department of Agriculture unless they are of good table size sound and free from blight or soft rot They should be reasonably free from soil and they must not be injured or cut The containers (sacks) in which they are packed must be filled to capacity in all cases

MEETING OF DUNGARVAN TRANSPORT DRIVERS.

At the Town Hall Dungarvan, on last Wednesday evening Feb 14th, a meeting of over 50 drivers of transport lorries and vans from the Dungarvan district was held. Almost every firm and business in the area were represented. Mr T. A. Kyne, wholtime official of the Dungarvan Branch of the Amalgamated Transport and General Workers' Union, addressed the meeting at length. He spoke of the responsibilities placed on transport drivers by the nature of their work. The lives of themselves, their mates and the public at large, were in their hands during the entire day while at work. Further they had the responsibility of safeguarding their employers property and goods, often up to the value of £600 each day and of returning that property back each evening in good running condition. Every hour they had to be on the alert to prevent a crash that might involve them in a manslaughter charge or at the best police court proceedings. Very often they were left to take the rap for their employers neglect in providing proper lorries and vans or the equipment for same. Mr Kyne stressed the advantages of the Union, also the free legal advice and assistance which went with it. He also spoke of the workmen's compensation assistance and benefit supplied by the Union. The Union, he said, stood for a fair day's work for a fair day's pay, and anyone joining under the idea that the Union would uphold idleness, carelessness, or insouciance, would be advised to keep out of it. The Union would not uphold any but honest workmen (loud applause). All present enrolled in the

the darkness of our minds and to redeem us on the Cross is the Eternal Son of God made Man Jesus Christ. We ought to try to grasp and realise this tremendous fact of the Incarnation of the Eternal Son the truth expressed in the beginning of St John's Gospel. The Word was made Flesh and dwelt amongst us. For each one of us the Son of God was made man to enable us to reach the supernatural end for which we were made. For each one of us He was born and laboured and taught and died and for each one of us He had in store in the Catholic Church all that has been done by His Incarnation. Life, Death and Resurrection.

During the three years of his public life Jesus Christ was a Teacher. When Nicodemus came to Jesus by night he acknowledged Our Lord to be a Teacher and addressed Him with the recognised Jewish name of a Teacher Rabbi. Rabbi we know that thou art come a teacher from God for no man can do these signs which thou dost unless God be with him (John 3:2).

We read in St Mark's Gospel how some of the Pharisees and Herodians come to Jesus and say to Him: Master we know that thou art a true speaker and carest not for any man but teachest the way of God in truth. Tell us therefore what dost thou think is it lawful to give tribute to Cesar or not? (Mark 12:14).

Now Our Lord before His Ascension into heaven handed over this function of teaching His revealed doctrine of faith and morals to the Church when He said: Going therefore teach all nations (Matth 28:19). I will ask the Father and He shall give you another Paraclete that He may abide with you for ever the Spirit of Truth (John 14:16).

From the Holy Scriptures we learn then that Our Lord Jesus Christ did establish a teaching Church that He commanded all to hear and accept its doctrine that it will be always a truthful teacher because He Himself and the Holy Spirit of Truth will abide with it for ever.

And I hold in veneration for the love of Christ alone Holy Church as His creation. And her doctrine as His Own (Aubrey de Vere).

Towards the end of the Act of Faith which is recited before Mass there are indicated the general subject-matter and the motive of our belief when we say: I believe these and all other articles which the Holy Catholic Church proposes to our belief because Thou my God the infallible truth hast revealed them and Thou hast commanded us to hear the Church which is the pillar and ground of truth.

Our Catechism of Christian doctrine asks the question: Where shall we find the truths God has taught? The truths God has taught are chiefly contained in the Apostles' Creed and the moral duties which God has revealed and imposed on us are chiefly contained in the Ten Commandments of God. We have thus the revealed doctrines of faith and morals.

We ought to try to say the 'I believe in God' with reverence and with as full a realisation of the meaning of each article as is possible. When we recite the first article 'I believe in God' already we switch on before our minds and imagination the picture of an infinite reality. God is an Infinite and Eternal Person and a Spirit who through sheer intensity of Being must exist always and be everywhere. How different from you and me who are of yesterday and occupy such a tiny bit of space in this visible world! We are inclined to assume that the great fact is this visible universe which lies before us patent to the sight ready to the touch and appealing to the senses in so unmistakable a manner. But the Creed teaches us that the great original fact is God the Infinite and Eternal Spirit who called this world of ours into existence by his word of command. These twelve articles of the Creed contain the precious information sent us by God. This information came from the human lips of Jesus Christ but these lips are the lips belonging to the human nature of the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity.

As regards the Ten commandments of God we ought to regard them, not as mere prohibitions but as a beneficent revelation of the true means to complete and eternal success. These Commandments, therefore are not arbitrary nor hampering and obedience to them will ensure true liberty expansion and self-realization. You remember how Our Lord emphasised the

importance of observing the Commandments when the young man came and said to Him: "Master what good must I do that I may have life everlasting?" And Jesus said to the young man: "If you wish to possess life everlasting keep the Commandments" (Matth 19:16).

The punishment for defiance or neglect of the Commandments is the greatest imaginable that is exclusion from life everlasting.

In this department also we must bear in mind that these Commandments are revealed to us by God and not discovered or formulated by man though each Commandment on merit would be approved by human reason.

#### 2 The Sanctifying of the Church

Our Lord Jesus Christ came on earth not only to be our Teacher but also to be our Redeemer not only to reveal heavenly doctrine but also to restore to us the life of sanctifying grace. As our Redeemer on Calvary Our Lord made reparation for the sins of men and merited for us the restoration of the supernatural life of grace. All this He did as man and by means of His human nature.

The very name chosen by God Himself for the divine child indicates His mission as Redeemer. The Angel said to St Joseph: And thou shalt call his name Jesus. For he shall save his people from their sins (Matth 1:21). Besides we have other sayings of Our Lord which indicate the same Mission of Redeemer. I am the good shepherd the good shepherd giveth his life for his sheep (John 10:11). The Son of Man is come not to be waited on but to serve and to give his life a redemption for many (Mark 10:45). Behold we go up to Jerusalem and all things shall be accomplished which were written by the prophets concerning the Son of Man for he shall be mocked and scourged and spat upon and after they have scourged him they will put him to death and the third day he shall rise again (Luke 24:31).

And every day at Mass we have the continued reminder of Our Lord's office of Redeemer in the words of consecration of the wine in the chalice which are the same words as Our Lord used at the Last Supper. This is the chalice of my blood of the New and Eternal Testament which shall be shed for you and for many unto the remission of sins.

But though the Redemption of the human race was consummated on Calvary it does not follow that the fruits of Redemption are applied to each of us automatically and that each of us is now born into this world automatically endowed with sanctifying grace in his soul. Each of us now alive has to appropriate and make his own the fruits of Christ's death. These fruits are not forced on us. We are still born children of Adam and deprived of grace. We have to be made children of Jesus Christ by Baptism which is the means appointed by Our Lord to secure the benefits of redemption. He that believeth says Christ and is baptized shall be saved (Mark 16).

The chief purpose of Baptism and the other Sacraments is to bring to us individually the actual benefits of what Christ accomplished for us on Calvary. Jesus Christ no longer treads this earth. He has left it and sits now at the right hand of the Father. The Catholic Church now dispenses to the Faithful the sacraments of grace instituted by the Redeemer. The Sacrifice of the Mass is likewise handed over to the Church to be her sacrifice and to be offered up by her to worship God and to secure for all the children of the Church the fruits of the Sacrifice of the Cross.

The Catholic Church is the living Body of which Jesus Christ now glorious and immortal in Heaven is the Founder and the invisible Head. We the members of the Church are united to our glorified Lord by faith and sanctifying grace. Our mind is made like to Christ's Mind by the obedience of Faith and our whole being partakes of that same Sanctifying Grace which the Redeemer possesses in such fulness. "I" He says "am the vine you are the branches he that abideth in me and I in him the same beareth much fruit. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abide in the vine, so neither can you, unless you abide in me" (John 15:5).

All the sanctifying activity of the Church through the Sacraments is directed towards the obtaining, the fostering the restoration if by chance it be lost, and the triumph of the Life of Christ—which is the life of Sanctifying Grace—within each

one of us. Baptism infuses it. Confirmation strengthens it. Penance gives it back if we have lost it while the Eucharist nourishes that life of personal holiness without which no man shall see God.

#### 3 The Ruling Office of the Church

The Church has also received from her Founder the authority and the duty to lead and direct her members to their supernatural destiny which is that each one of us should see love and enjoy God for ever and ever in the Kingdom of His Glory. This authority implies that the Church is entitled to make rules and regulations directing the Faithful as to the means to be used and the dangers to be avoided. She has power to punish those who go against her orders and in extreme cases to exclude from her ranks members who are obstinate in their disobedience. The Church's usual method is that of persuasion and gentleness. She sometimes admonishes with severity she does not use violent constraint. The punishment of those who refuse her advances is to be left to themselves which is perhaps the greatest sanction of all. To be left to oneself means to be handed over to that nothingness which we are when we turn our backs on God and reject His redeeming hand.

Let us be proud and grateful to be members of the Catholic Church which has kept the Religion of Jesus Christ safe for nineteen hundred years and let us do our own part in our own day in helping her to transmit it to the generation that will come after us.

#### 4 Lent

If any man will come after me let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me (Luke 9:23).

These are the words of Jesus Christ the invisible Head of the Church of which you and I are members. In them is inculcated the principle of self-denial self-restraint or mortification which is so important for our supernatural life. Men in this world have always denied themselves to reach objectives on which they are keen. Consider the man of business the statesman the politician the artist the musician the journalist the financier the student the athlete all of these deny themselves overcome themselves endure hardship bear inconvenience and make sacrifices to attain the end which they have set themselves.

All those St Paul says who enter the arena to take part in the games deny themselves in many things and they indeed that they may receive a corruptible crown but we an incorruptible one (I Cor 9:25).

Our Lord has let us say canonized this principle of self-denial which already existed and incorporated it into the Catholic Religion. Those who mean to make good and to succeed in this world or in the next must train themselves to fast from many things to which 'soth' self-indulgence indifference or low standards of duty would attract them. Without self-denial we shall gradually lose control of ourselves and then anything may happen.

The glorified Head of our Church in Heaven to Whom we are united by faith and sanctifying grace as branches to the Vine would have reason to be ashamed of the members of His Church if they lacked in His service that conviction valour resolution and loyalty of which we hear so often these days in the records of soldiers in the armies of the world. St Paul writes in his letter to the Ephesians: Christ loved the Church and delivered Himself up for it that He might sanctify it by the bath of water in the word of life. That He might present it to Himself a glorious Church not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing but that it should be holy and without blemish (Ephes 5:25).

Our Lord endured the Passion and Death on the Cross that you and I should be without spot or wrinkle that we should be holy and without blemish. But this grand ideal of personal holiness interior and exterior in our thoughts, affections and desires cannot be realised without overcoming ourselves in many things. Lent is the call of God and of His Church to thought prayer repentance and self-denial.

I send a special message to the young men and young women to the grown up boys and the grown-up girls of the Diocese.

You, my dear young friends are our hope for the future our pride and our promise. You are now in your youth which is the spring-time of your lives. What does the farmer do in the spring-time? But, forewarned and forearmed against the scandal of apostasy by the splendour of His Transfiguration we must descend with Him and together with Him, the Victim the Church must bear the Cross up Calvary's slope. Nailed with Him to the Cross, the Church offers up the sacrifice of which we must be at one and the same time priest and victim so as to fill up our flesh what is wanting of the sufferings of Christ. Before our dullness and weakness He has these days uncovered the Scriptures and our heart, like those of the disciples of Emmaus burns within us. Profoundly enlightened by the Holy Spirit, we bow before the great mystery of sorrow and suffering remembering Christ's promise to remain with His Church until the consummation of the world. The Prophet said: 'Thy arrogance hath deceived thee and the pride of thy heart. Though thou shouldst make thy nest as high as an eagle's, I will bring thee down from thence said the Lord.'

'Undoubtedly great political and social upheavals usually leave a profound mark on the face of the Church but they cannot and never will affect its life. Up to now Divine Providence has kept its protecting hand over us and to it we serenely commit the future. Violent storms can make collapse temples of stone the exact the sacrifice of human life and certainly we should be ready with God Who wills to sacrifice life for our brethren. But for the Church and the Papacy there is the sure warrant of the Divine Founder that the Rock of Peter and the world institution built upon it will emerge from the tempest only with newly intensified vigour.

'Venerable Brethren and Beloved Sons let us work! Let us work for the Church and for souls! Let us tire ourselves, let us wear ourselves out never permitting ourselves to be discouraged. It has often been said that Faith and Christian Virtue have lost their worth and their salutary influence over souls. Certainly there is no one who does not appreciate the gravity of the religious situation. Let us not however be deceived by a false appearance of decadence. There is still in the world lively hope and splendid Christian heroism. Daily we may say we come to know—yes and see for ourselves—the confident proof of it. There are millions and millions of souls which anxiously wait which demand of the Church the Bread of Truth and the Bread of Life. And from many regions, far and near there reaches our ear the mounting echo of the Redeemer's summons: 'Lift up your eyes and see the countries, for they are white already to harvest.' For those souls, for such a harvest, let us work and sacrifice ourselves, together with Him Who is the Head and Heart, the Strength and Life of His Church.'
