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## DUNGARVAN POINT-TO-POINT RACES

### Record Attendance

What must be a record attendance for Point-to-Point Meetings was present at Killossera on Tuesday last for the first meeting of the Dungarvan Point-to-Point Races. The large bank which provided a natural grand stand viewing the entire course of 3½ miles was densely packed with racing fans from Dungarvan, and from all over Waterford East Cork and South Tipperary. Due to the untiring efforts of Mr J. Kenny so far who with Mr J. Wall were joint hon. secs. and Mr J. O'Donnell hon. treasurer the venture was an entire success. Had the weather been fine the crowd would have been trebled. Sidecars wagonettes common-cars traps and bicycles were used as conveyances to the course not to mention the many who walked there.

As the entries in some of the races were small the sport provided was not keen. The best race of the day being provided in the Dungarvan Blazers (Confined) race when thirteen horses faced the starter Mr Thomas Harty who did his job well. The Judges were—Mr R. J. Mulcahy Ardinnan Mr Ion H. Villiers Stuart Mr Arthur Hunt, and Mr Roger Shanahan.

### LATE MR ROBERT RANSON, DUNGARVAN

We regret to announce the death of Robert Ranson at an advanced age which sad event took place at the residence of his daughter Mrs Bransfield 71 O'Connell Street Dungarvan on Thursday night of last week March 22nd fortified by the rites of the Holy Church. The deceased was a member of a well-known and respected Wexford family who has given many of its sons and daughters to the Church. He was an upright and intelligent man well able to hold his own in any debate and will be remembered as such by his associates in life. He served for a number of years in the RIC from which force he retired in 1918. During his service he was for three periods stationed in Dungarvan and so well did he love it and its surroundings and inhabitants that on retiring on pension he returned to it to live in happiness and end his days amongst the acquaintances of his youth. He was attended during his illness with unfailing attention by the Rev. Fr. Corbett, C.C. who administered to him frequently. The remains were removed to the Parish Church on Friday evening last and were followed by a large concourse of people and were received at the Parish Church by the Rev. Fr. Farrell, C.C. Rev. Fr. Corbett, C.C. and Rev. J. Ranson, C.C. Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated at 10 o'clock on Saturday morning by the Rev. J. Ranson, C.C. nephew of the deceased.

The funeral left for Ballygunner at 1 p.m. in which participated many of his old friends and relatives. The chief mourners were Mrs Bransfield (daughter) Rev. J. Ranson Enniscorthy Rev. Bob Ranson D.D. St Peter's College Wexford (nephews) Mrs Ranson Kilmuckridge (sister-in-law) John Bransfield, and Denis Ryall (son-in-law) Garry and May Ryall (grandchildren). ### Knockboy Ogham Stones

The Ogham Stones built into the walls of the old church at Knockboy were recently made secure at the expense of the County-at-large. One of these tombstones, which may date from the fifth century, was in particular danger owing to the fall of some of the supporting masonry. The inscription of this stone reads: "Mac Raith macol Neta Segamonas," which means that the man's name was Mac Raith (in modern spelling) and that he belonged to a family or tribe which claimed descent from the Celtic war-god Segom. It is not just a coincidence that men of the same name are still being buried at Knockboy—for a good name wears well. On the other hand, tombstones require a little attention every 1500 years or so, and as these stones are the property

#### Request To Put Street Names In Irish

#### Abbeyside Plot Holders And Plots

Mr T McCarthy, Chairman, presided at a fortnightly meeting of the above held at the Town Hall, on last Friday night. Messrs J McGrath, T A Kyné, L A Veale, and J Dahill, were present.  
Mr M O'Meara Acting Town Clerk, attended.

**Turf Production**  
The Acting Clerk informed the members that Mr O'Leary, Turf Board Inspector, had called on him and said that he proposed holding a meeting in Dungarvan in the near future to help improve turf production.

**Repairs**  
Requests for repairs from M Attridge, Cathal Brugha Place, and from Mrs Daly, Loughmore (made by the Chairman) were referred to Mr Ormond Acting Borough Surveyor.

**Our English Heritage**  
A deputation from An Cumann Gaedhealach, Dungarban, consisting of Rev Bro Hanratty (who acted as spokesman), and Messrs L Comerford, and J J Moloney, came before the meeting to request the Council to take steps to put the names of the streets of Dungarvan in Irish.

Chairman—There was a similar request made in Cork City recently and from the reports my interpretation was that the people there could object. Of course the Council will only be too willing to meet the request.

Mr Comerford—The case in Cork was different to this as they wanted the street names changed. What we want is to have all the names in Irish only.

Mr McGrath—I think that request is very selfish as there are fully 50 per cent and maybe 75 per cent of the people in the town who have no Irish and can't read it.

Brother Hanratty—The reason why they can't read Irish is that it is the English form which is always before them. If the names were put in Irish everyone would be able to read them after a while. This system was left to us by the English for 600 years, and English was thrown down our throats. They changed the name of Dungarban to Dungarvan, they got English versions of all our names and as a result there is no meaning to them. I think the people are Irish at heart they know these things have been thrust on them and if the Irish names are used they will use them.

Mr McGrath—Those who don't know Irish will have it put down their throats so now I object to having the Irish form only and think English and Irish should go side by side.

Brother Hanratty—We must be prepared to make sacrifices if we want the Irish back. It's not asking too much to expect the people to learn the names of their own streets in Irish. It must be one thing or the other or else the language will die out. I was brought up in the North and I learned Irish, and I know it now as good as I know English, but there is a tendency always to lean towards using English rather than Irish as it is the easiest thing for us to do. As long as English and Irish go together we will not use Irish.

Chairman—We could not decide this matter tonight as all the members are not present.

Brother Hanratty—We don't want you to do that, but we just want to put our case clearly and to point out our arguments to any objections that may be raised. We have been playing with the language question for a long time, but nothing has been done and Dungarvan, in the heart of the Gaeltacht, should make a headline for the rest of the country. We are not going to stop at this request, but will try also to get the town shopkeepers to use their names in Irish. Young boys when in school are fluent Gaelic speakers but when they leave there is no Irish atmosphere to help them to use it, and so it fades from them. To create that atmosphere is the definite purpose of our request.

When the deputation withdrew the meeting decided to put the matter on the agenda for the next ordinary meeting.

**Abbeyside Plot Holders**  
A letter signed by 23 plot holders of unemployed plots at Abbeyside, stated that they refused to take over the plots provided by the Council at the field at Upper Knockatemore as they were too far away and so time would be lost after work in the evening to walk there. **OUR WATERFORD LETTER**

**Waterford's Outstanding Art Exhibition**—Last week I made a brief reference to the Art Exhibition in Newtown School which was opened by Monsieur Benziger Charge D'Affaires for Switzerland in Elre on March 22nd. The Waterford Exhibition is one of the oldest in the country outside Dublin, only Cork can boast of having run their exhibition longer. This year the show of 150 pictures in spite of all the difficulties which the war and the springing up of new exhibitions in other towns have brought in their trail is one of the finest yet held and certainly better than any I have viewed for the past three years.

**Local Artists Very High Standard**—It is noteworthy that the standard of the work of local artists is very high and shows a technical and intellectual cleverness quite beyond what is ordinarily expected in the provinces. Numerically too artists appear to abound now in this area and as many as fifty persons paint within a radius of 10 miles of the city of Waterford to a standard which they consider sufficiently high for public exhibitions. Waterford with its many cultural activities covering all the arts (of which this Exhibition is only one) is indeed experiencing a revival of interest in the Arts which if continued may become a renaissance.

**Some Interesting Pictures**—Mr Robert Burke in his picture 'A Song in Martin Drapers' has sketched a scene which will be well-known to all visitors to Ring. The popular hostelry crowded with men from the sea is one of the most picturesque sights of that neighbourhood. The same artist shows a spirited water-colour impression of a crowd outside church gates in 'After Mass'. Our talented local artist Betram Poole, has three pictures on view the most interesting of which is the one depicting Micheal the famous 'Seanachaidhe of Ring'. In my next letter I hope to give details of the pictures by local artists.

**Successful Cookery Class**—About twenty young men—members of the Maritime Inscription are attending a class on two nights weekly in the Central Technical Institute where they are studying cookery. I am informed that these students are very earnest and painstaking and are making rapid progress in acquiring a knowledge of the culinary art.

**Late Archbishop Sheehan**—At a meeting of the City of Waterford Vocational Education Committee held on Tuesday March 27th, a resolution of sympathy was passed to the relatives of the late Archbishop Sheehan. The resolution expressed appreciation of the great services which the late Archbishop rendered towards the resuscitation of the Irish language and his brilliant and successful efforts in the advancement of Gaelic scholarship. His life's work entitles him to rank as one of the greatest Irish patriots of his time and equal to the greatest of any time.

**Congratulations On Claiscedal Broadcast**—Amongst the many letters of congratulations received from several parts of Ireland regarding the local Claiscedal Broadcast from Radio Eireann on March 20th was a letter from Mrs Heffernan of Mountrath Leix who sent a request for the words of the spirited Irish melody 'A Mhaire Laogh' which was excellently rendered by our choir. The song is set to the same air as the popular Anglo-Irish song 'My Mary Of The Curling Hair'. I understand that there will be a further broadcast a few months hence.

**New Licenses For Clubs To Be Opposed**—The Waterford Licensed Vintners Association passed a resolution recently to the effect that the Association will oppose all applications for the granting of new licenses to clubs. I am informed that there will be two applications for licenses by newly-formed social clubs at the next Circuit Court in the City.

**LETTER TO JUDGE SEALY**

**Co Councillor And Editor In Sequel**

The publication in the 'Waterford Standard' of extracts from a letter written to Judge Sealy by Mr Michael O'Ryan, M.C.C. P.C. Knockalisheen Ballymacarby which was read by Mr O'Ryan at a meeting of the Waterford Co Council had a sequel in the High Court when Mr Justice Davitt granted conditional orders of attachment against Mr O'Ryan and Mr David Cuthbert Boyd Editor and Proprietor of the 'Waterford Standard'.

The matter arose out of a case heard by Judge Sealy at Waterford on February 5th in which five farmers from the Nire Valley district were charged with riot assault and unlawful wounding in the course of the hearing of which reference was made by the Judge to a letter written in connection with the case by Right Rev Dean Byrne D.D. P.P. V.G. Clonmel.

Mr O'Daly S.C. with whom was Mr J. Darcy (instructed by the Chief State Solicitor on behalf of the Attorney-General) who made the application for the orders read an affidavit by Judge Sealy which exhibited a letter which he said he received from Mr O'Ryan on Feb 9th.

Inspector P. McGonagle Garda Siochana in an affidavit said he took a statement from Mr Boyd in his statement Mr Boyd said with reference to the meeting at which the letter was read by Mr O'Ryan "This was a statutory meeting of a public body at which the Press are enabled by law to be present. As stated in my paper of 24th Feb 1945 parts of Michael O'Ryan's letter were deleted by me. My reasons for these deletions were that those portions were contrary to my recollections of the appointment of Judge Sealy. The publication of vituperative portions of the letter was to indicate to the public the kind of attack that was being made on the administration of the law and in the belief that it would receive the utmost condemnation in the public mind. My decision to publish it was not to lower the prestige of Judge Sealy but to bring into the light of publicity the kind of attack that was being made against him as I have the most profound respect for him as a judge."

Mr O'Daly said the proposition he put to the Court was that scandalous words spoken of a judge as a judge were a proper subject of a motion for contempt of Court.

**Popular Teacher And National Worker Honoured**—On the occasion of his retirement after 40 years service from Ballyneale Carrick-on-Suir National School Mr Joseph Manning was presented with an illuminated address and valuable gifts by the past and present pupils of the school the G.A. and the Gaelic League and the local Dramatic Society. Mr Manning was an excellent teacher and a strenuous worker in every phase of national life.

**To Help Franciscans**—A committee has been formed at Carrick-on-Suir to organise a 14 days carnival in aid of Franciscan Monastery and Church at Carrickbeg Carrick-on-Suir. The Carrickbeg Friary was founded in 1336 by Friar John Clyn who wrote the famous Clyn's Annals at Carrickbeg Convent.

**Successful Mission**—A fortnight's Mission that has just concluded in Carrick-on-Suir parish was the most successful held here for some years. The mission was conducted by Rev Fathers Shiel and Maguire of the Jesuit Order. Large numbers joined the Sacred Heart Confraternities and the Total Abstinence League at the close of the mission.
