MR T. McCarthy, Chairman, presided at the fortnightly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council, held on last Friday night at the Council Chambers, Town Hall. Messrs L. A. Veale, J. McGrath, M. Morrissey, T. D., and T. A. Kyne, were present. Mr. M. O'Meara, Acting Town Clerk attended.

The Chairman informed the meeting that it had been decided at a meeting of the Children's Health Bazaar Committee to run it possible with the co-operation of the various clubs in town a grand Civic Week during the summer. It was agreed that a meeting be held on Wednesday 23rd May at which delegates from the various clubs and organisations would attend to go further into the matter.

Would mean a lot to Dungarvan. The Acting Clerk read a letter from Messrs E. J. Keyes and J. J. Curran, both of the Children's Health Bazaar Committee in which they stated that as a result of the Bazaar raffles and dance run by the Committee a sum of £272 11s 6d would be lodged to the credit of the free school meals fund. It will be a great help to the Council that at a meeting of the Bazaar Committee held on Wednesday night it was decided to run on behalf of the Children's Health Fund a Civic Week in town sometime during the summer with the co-operation of all the clubs societies and organisations in Dungarvan. CAPPOQUIN PARISH COUNCIL Important Address On The Turf Problem

A public meeting organised by the Cappoquin Parish Council was held in the CYMS Hall Cappoquin on Wednesday night May 17th. The meeting was presided over by the Rev T Dunphy C.C. and introduced Mr J O'Leary of the Turf Development Board who delivered an important address on the Turf position in the course of which he said: "I have come to speak to you on the necessity for achieving the greatest production of turf during the present season and on the importance of removing turf from the bogs and socking it for winter use before the weather becomes too dry. It is essential to maintain or exceed last year's effort because as the Minister for Supplies stated in his recent broadcast address there is nothing whatever in the 1945 position to suggest that coal supplies will be any more plentiful this year than last and we will have to continue to rely on turf for domestic fuel. It is probable that the situation will be more serious next winter than at any time since the emergency began. Stocks of wood are becoming depleted and demand for turf is growing greater and greater. Sales last season were up 40 per cent at many centres. On the other hand the facilities for transporting the material particularly by rail have proved inadequate and there are many indications that matters will be worse next winter. In order therefore to safeguard their position consumers should where possible make direct arrangements for the production of their own requirements but in any event those with the necessary finance and storage space should take their turf into stock during the summer period. I know that a great many people live for the day and are not easily persuaded to take precautions in advance but I appeal to all heads of households to consider this matter very seriously. Supplies of fuel became temporarily exhausted at a few centres last winter. It is possible that this year the towns may run completely out of fuel supplies for considerable periods next winter and that houses may have to be left unheated. Stocks of turf are not accumulated in advance by retailers and consumers. If all those who have the facilities would do their duty in this respect demands made on retailers' stocks during the winter months would be so reduced that they could easily supply the requirements of people who are unable to provide in advance for themselves. It is the demands of those who can afford to stock turf and who are able to buy substantial quantities that are responsible for exhausting retailers' reserves at a period when the poorer sections of the community require them. A special meeting of the Parish Council was then held when the following officers were unanimously elected: President—Rev T Fitzgerald P.P. Vice-President—Rev T Dunphy C.C. Hon Sec—Mr F X O'Leary N.T. The following were elected on the Committee—Messrs M F Walsh P.C. M J Sargent P.C. J McCarthy A.A. O'Connor P. O'Shea J Flanagan, P. M. Sweeney H Connors, W. J. McCarthy, Dally J Curran F Anderson J Bell etc etc. An interesting discussion then took place about the carrying out of certain necessary improvements in the town as a result of which Mr F X O'Leary Hon Sec was instructed to write to the Board of Health re the following: (1) Improvement in the water supply (2) Provision of a public lavatory in the town. (3) Link up of houses at present without sanitary arrangements with the new sewerage scheme. He was also instructed to write to Senator Sir John Keane requesting that certain improvements be carried out to the Square and Courthouse and it was also decided to prepare a Memorial to be signed by the townspeople demanding that permanent Branches of the Banks be established by those Banks at present doing business in the town on only two days a

Every item on the agenda began lively discussions and unanimous decisions as to the various means to be adopted to better the conditions of those to whom—as Most Rev Dr Cohan said in 'Abbeyside'—everything is passed on except good salaries. At the end of the meeting the Chairman Tomás Breathnach proposed and Tomás O'Faolain seconded a sincere vote of sympathy to the widow family and relatives of the late Deugán Ó Cullillá Labhair an Cathaoirleach as Gaedhlig an Ceannasanna le Deugán is mhóil é. On the whole the people obeyed the neutrality laws and though short of many things they rejoiced in being spared the horrors of war and now all fervently pray and thank God it is all over.
