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## DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

Dungarvan District Court, was held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan on Tuesday last before Mr Sean Treo D J.

**Trespass of Cattle on Wheat**  
Michael Power, Killoressy, claimed £12 damage against Liam Morrissey, 88 O'Connell Street, Dungarvan, caused by the trespass of defendant's cattle on his crop of wheat in April last.

Mr P C Williams solr for plaintiff and Mr P J Morrissey solr defended.

A request to have the Civil Bill amended to include damage to apples—onions and parsnips was opposed by Mr Morrissey and the Justice refused the amendment.

Giving evidence plaintiff said that he was a farmer, located with a cottage and acre at Killoressy. His holding is surrounded on two sides by Mr Morrissey's land on which there were a big number of heavy cattle and on five different occasions from April 28th last the cattle trespassed on his holding in which he had set wheat.

After the first trespass witness said that he went to Mr Morrissey and told him and he came out to the place but he could not say what was done then. The cattle trespassed again and a few days later the defendant came and fenced the boundary fence. This stopped the trespass for a week when it occurred again but the fence was then fixed and no trespass has taken place since.

In reply to Mr Williams the plaintiff said that if the crop had not been interfered with he would expect to get nine barrels of wheat from it but now he only gets five or six barrels.

Cross-examined by Mr Morrissey witness said that the time was only a couple of inches high—it had been set seven weeks.

By the time you have the seed ploughing and threshing paid for the profit from this crop last year was very small—Yes.

Were you not offered three pounds for the damage?—I never heard of it.

John Hennessy a neighbouring farmer said that he saw the damage to the crop one evening. The wheat was about six or seven inches high and had been eaten here and there and as a result it will ripen unevenly and cause added trouble.

To Mr Morrissey he agreed that at the most three barrels would go to the defendant.

Mr Morrissey—Is it not usual during the early stages to allow sheep into wheat to crop it?—Yes, but then it is done evenly.

Patrick Moran in evidence said that on one occasion he helped to turn out eight cattle which were trespassing on the plot.

Patrick Landers gave similar evidence.

Liam Morrissey defendant giving evidence said that he admitted the trespass although he did not see any sheep on the plot. Power came to him about it he got the boundary fences fixed. At the time the corn was only five or six inches high and he estimated that the damage caused would only amount to about £2. He disagreed with the statement that the acre would produce 9 barrels of wheat.

To Mr Williams he said that he made every effort to have the fences repaired at once but unfortunately when Power reported the matter to him first it was late on Saturday evening and beyond a temporary repair nothing could be done until the following Monday.

Patrick Wynne another neighbouring farmer said that the front-fourteen acres took place over part of his land on which there was corn set and little damage was done.

Justice—The difference is this man is a sport and was prepared for a decree for £6 with 7/6 expenses was given.

**Ejectment Suit Fails**  
In the adjourned case of Michael Heeny, Ballymacnaghe, who sought an order for ejectment against Patrick Morgan Currah, a further evidence was given.

Mr P J Morrissey solr for plaintiff and Mr Williams solr defended.

The facts of the case were that Heeny owns a house and 12 acres at Currahah which he let four years ago to defendant who is still in possession of the house as weekly tenant at 2/- Plaintiff now requires the house for himself and although he got two other houses he defendant would not accept them.

Defendant's case was that the houses offered were unsuitable as one of them demanded that he work for the owner and the other was in bad repair if he got a good house he would go to it.

Mr Williams submitted that the greater hardship was on his client who was a married man with two children while plaintiff was a bachelor living with his brother and sister.

Justice—If I gave an order for possession the greater hardship would be on the defendant his wife and children therefore I dismiss the claim.

**Wholesale Beer Licenses**  
Applications for the renewal of Wholesale Beer Dealers licenses (Messrs Merry, Power

Whelan and Keane) were all granted.  
Messrs T C Williams solr and J F Kenny solr made the applications.

**Breach of Licensing Laws**  
Michael Walsh Publican Killoressy was charged with a breach of the licensing laws on March 17th last. A number of men found on the premises were also charged.

Mr Kenny solr, defending pleaded guilty and said that it was St Patrick's Day and the only wireless set in the locality was in Walsh's place and the men went there to listen to the broadcast of the Railway Cup matches and during the evening they asked for and were served with drink.

The house was searched and Supt O'Mahony did not press the case and the Justice imposed a fine of 10/- not to be recorded and 2/6 on each of the men charged on the premises.

**Mrs Bridget Quill** Pike was charged with a breach on June 30th at 145 a.m.

Two men found on the premises were also charged. Mr Williams solr, defending pleaded guilty to a technical offence.

Supt O'Mahony said that a Sgt Teahan and himself went to the place and found the two men and others who were invited guests on the premises. There was a big number around the house on the outside in a large hall and the defendant did not know where they had got the drink but if the house had been closed in time they would have gone home before that. There was a bad record on the house and the defendant was very serious if looked bad and as if there was no law or order in the district.

Mr Williams solr said that it was Thanksgiving Day and Mrs Quill had the greatest difficulty in clearing the house that night.

A fine of £2 with no record was placed on the publican and the defendant on the premises were each fined 2/6.

**"Wit' Teach Them Manners"**  
Dealing with a number of high prosecutions which occurred at Ballymacnaghe the Superintendent said that there was a half drunken mob there and one would think that there was no law or order. Some of them gave wrong names and were very troublesome but the Guards would teach them manners in future.

The Justice said that the fine for having no light could be £5 for each dog.

Patrick Connors, Billaheen Killoressy was summoned by Guard Ryan for allowing a donkey to wander on the public road.

Anne Broderick same address John Sheehan Davis St Dungarvan Patrick Moran do Edward Coleman do and John Wright Loughmore were summoned for being drunk.

Fines of 2/- were imposed in each case.

**Drunk**  
Patrick Landers Newtown Dungarvan was charged by Guard Begley with being drunk. Defendant was fined 2/6.

Mary Ellen O'Hare no fixed abode was similarly charged as was Pte Jas Looey 23 Brigids Terrace Dungarvan who was fined 20/-.

**Adjudged Larceny Case**  
In the adjourned larceny charge against Richard Carlton Bridget Street Dungarvan Wm Walsh Loughmore do and Patrick Drohan Davis Street do for stealing timber and nails from posts from Mr J Lynch Ballyduff and Mr C Dempsey Shandon it was stated that the £24 compensation had not been paid.

The Superintendent stated that since the last court Richard Carlton and William Walsh with James Downey 27 Loughmore had been summoned for the larceny of a number of larch poles the property of the Department of Lands, from Ballyconnery on June 19th.

Mr Morrissey solr, defending said that Drohan was trying to go to England.

The Supt said that these were exceptionally bad cases. Dro-

han's usual excuse was that he was going away and they would be glad to see him go and stay away.

Sergt Liddane said that Carlton's mother had told him that she would pay his part of the compensation when his father came from England on Saturday.

It was stated that a suspension sentence of two months had been passed on Walsh some months ago and the Justice now convicted him and ordered him to serve this sentence.

In the case of Drohan the Justice imposed a sentence of two months with hard labour warrant not to issue if the £4 compensation is paid by August 14th.

The other cases were adjourned.

**CHILDREN'S COURT**  
Joan Kenneally (15) and Ellen Costigan (13) were summoned for stealing a schoolbag containing school books, pot of jam scarf and gloves value £2 from a girl named Nora Murphy.

Joan Kenneally was also charged with the larceny of 8/6 cash from Miss Tobin's O'Connell St. Mary Costigan (12) was charged with the larceny of 1/1 and Christopher Burke (11) was charged with the larceny of a gold watch value £10.

The first two cases were allowed stand until the first court in September to allow defendants to pay back compensation and the cases against young Costigan and Burke were marked P.O.A.

## Co. Waterford Committee Of Agriculture

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN AND VICE CHAIRMAN

SHOWS SHOULD BE REVIVED

The Annual Meeting of the Co. Waterford Committee of Agriculture was held at the Courthouse, Dungarvan, on Saturday July 21st. Those present were—Messrs P R Power M McGrath M Hartly D Coghlan W Norris D Heskin D D O'Ryan E Morrissey T Morrissey J Quirk J Fives V Dover and J Mansfield.

Election of Chairman and Vice Chairman  
Mr Norris said it gave him great pleasure to propose the re-election of Mr P R Power who had acted as Chairman during the past 3 years.

Mr O'Ryan seconding said that they were all happy to see Mr Power as Chairman during the past three years had given his time and attention to the committee and had proved a fitting person for the position. He hoped that they would continue as a happy family.

Mr Heskin supported the proposition stating that Mr Power had always been an able and important chairman.

Other members also supported the proposal and Mr Power was declared re-elected unanimously.

Thanking thanks for his re-election Mr Power said that he especially wished to thank the committee for electing him unanimously.

For the position of vice-chairman Mr Morrissey proposed Mr Michael O'Ryan who he said was the senior member of the house being associated with the public life of the county for the past 35 years.

Mr Quirk seconded but Mr O'Ryan said that he would much prefer not to be elected to the position.

Mr O'Ryan appealed to Mr O'Ryan to allow his name to go forward as it was the unanimous wish of the meeting.

Mr Heskin and other members of the committee supported Mr O'Ryan's request and Mr O'Ryan finally agreed to accept the position.

The chairman then declared Mr O'Ryan elected vice-chairman and returning thanks Mr O'Ryan said that he would do his best to be worthy of his election.

**An Effort to Revive Shows**  
A letter from the Department pointed out that in recent years there was a falling off of the number of Educational Exhibits at Agricultural Shows and recommended that the committee should avail of every opportunity for such exhibits in future.

Dealing with this Mr Heskin said that the Dungarvan Show which he described as a right good show should be revived now that the emergency is over. The farmers of the county would be glad to avail of such opportunities to exhibit their stock and now was the time to jump in and start off. Being always such a good show he thought that the people should support it. He also said that a move was on foot to revive the Show at Lismore.

Mr Quirk—Gymkhanas are very successful now and they form a big part of a Show so I don't see why a Show would not be a success. He also said that Mr Heskin—They have become a good market too and if there were two Shows in the county it would encourage people to prepare exhibits.

Mr Hartly—I suggest that deputations from this Committee meet members of these Show Committees on the matter.

Mr Cogan said it would be well if something were done in the matter.

Mr Norris—It is up to the stockholders to bring their stock up to date for outside sales and they would get great help from Shows.

Mr O'Ryan—I wonder will the stock ever be as good again. Finally it was agreed to follow Mr Hartly's suggestion that a number of members of the committee interview the Dungarvan and Lismore Show Committees on the matter.

**Correspondence**  
Routine correspondence from the Department dealt with the 1946 Poultry Stations Scheme and grants for purchase of horse-drawn sprayers (which it was stated the meeting were not available).

**Wool Prices—A Racket**  
Concerning the resolution passed at the last meeting calling on the Department that the price for wool be paid to producers a letter from the Department of Agriculture stated that this was a matter for the Supplies Department and that the letter had been sent on to them.

The reply from the Department stated that there had been no reduction in the prices of the 1945 clip as compared with the 1944 clip as the maximum prices laid down had been paid.

Mr Heskin—Instead of a maximum there should be a minimum price fixed in order to safeguard the producer. I know that wool has been bought from

We are sure that the Western Divisional Board will take the necessary action in both cases at the next Board meeting.
