Death Of Cardinal MacRory

WHOLE COUNTRY PLUNGED INTO MOURNING

The death of his Eminence Cardinal MacRory Primate of All-Ireland and Archbishop of Armagh which occurred at his residence Ara Coeli Armagh on Saturday morning has plunged the country into deep mourning. He was aged 84.

On Friday afternoon the Cardinal was out for his usual walk and on Friday evening he attended the monthly meeting of the Mens Sacred Heart Sodality in the Cathedral. The first intimation of anything being wrong came when he summoned his personal staff to his bedside at approximately 5.10 on Saturday morning and to them he complained of a slight pain which gradually got worse. The priest and doctor were sent for and he passed peacefully away at 7.20 a.m. having received the Last Sacraments from Rev. John Quinn Adm. Armagh.

The sad news was first announced to the congregation gathered for 7.30 Mass in the Cathedral to whom Fr. Quinn simply said in a voice full of emotion: "We will offer up this Mass for the Cardinal who has just passed away."

It was a most remarkable coincidence that the Cardinal should have said his last Mass on Friday morning in his own private Oratory. When he arrived home to Ara Coeli in Dublin on Thursday evening he forgot to change his watch back to Northern time and so when he got up as usual to say Mass on Friday morning at 9 o'clock it was here only 8 o'clock. As the attendant who lives out had not yet arrived to serve his Mass Cardinal MacRory decided to go across to the Cathedral.

On Tuesday last he presided at the Votive Mass in connection with the celebration of the 150th anniversary of the establishment of Maynooth College. He had been Cardinal since 1929.

Just a month ago to the very day Cardinal MacRory celebrated the diamond jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood in the presence of a huge gathering of clergy which included members of the Hierarchy.

Speaking to his people of Armagh on that occasion his Eminence announced that he was thinking of retiring but did not know how to get out. He asked his people to think it over and to let him know their answer in a couple of years time.

By his death Ireland has not alone lost a most worthy successor to St. Patrick in the

Dr. McCarthy's Report Submitted For Sanction

The Secretary read an acknowledgment from Mr. M. Phelan S.A.O. to the resolution passed to him by the Board on his recent bereavement.

Sequel To Discussion On Dietary Scale

Before the business of the meeting started Mr. Kynne asked if a member had any right to ask a question or enter a discussion about matters which is the business of this Board. If so it was for him to read the following letter which he received from Messrs. Farrell & Morrissey solicitors as the result of a discussion on the dietary scale here held in the County Home.

Mr. Kynne then read the letter as follows:—

"Dear Sir—We have been consulted by Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. M.O.H. of County Waterford whose attention has been drawn to the reports in the public press of your remarks at the recent meeting of the Board of Public Assistance in which you stated that Dr. O'Farrell is responsible for the dietary of the 300 to 400 inmates of the County Home, Dungarvan, stated by you to be starving."

You persisted in placing this responsibility on Dr. O'Farrell even after the Secretary pointed out that this was no part of his duties.

This is a very objectionable slander on Dr. O'Farrell if you had made the slightest enquiry you would have ascertained that this was not within his jurisdiction and a matter in which he had no right whatever to enquire into or interfere in.

We must therefore ask you to make the necessary enquiries now and to have published in the National and Local Press a letter stating that you have now investigated the matter and are satisfied that Dr. O'Farrell is in no way responsible for the dietary of the inmates of the County Home or their physical well-being in any way and that you regret having made the statement in question without being fully informed of the facts. Such letter must be in terms to be drafted by us and the costs to us incurred by Dr. O'Farrell must be paid. Of course this letter is not to be taken as an admission by Dr. O'Farrell of the truth of the facts alleged by you to exist at the County Home, as he has no knowledge of them. Please let us hear from you on this matter within three days.

When Mr. Kynne finished reading the letter he asked if any member had any comments to make and said that he wanted clearly understood that he for one was not going to be muzzled by anyone and he would always do what he considered his duty regardless of cost. I hold said Mr. Kynne that this letter is a reflection on the members of the Board—Quite so.

Mr. Morrissey—I can't understand the attitude of Mr. Kynne. The statement I made did not warrant a reply from any solicitor. I made no reflection or slander on any official. But I object to Mr. Kynne's attitude in the matter.

Mr. Kynne—Are we entitled to ask a question or not?

Chairman—Yes.

After a discussion on the matter the members agreed that there was nothing slanderous in the statement made and the matter ended.

The meeting then proceeded with the business.

Heated Discussion Over Minutes

He asked that the minutes be amended and that a complete and accurate account be recorded."

CEO—It would be impossible to record everything said at the meetings.

Fear-Mor—A small paragraph mentioning this matter could be inserted in the minutes and that would do the matter.

Mr. Butler—I want it done now and until it is done I object to the signing of the minutes.

Mr. Clancy—I agree with Mr. Butler. This matter is a very important one and it is Mr. Lanigan's duty to furnish us with the names and he should have inserted this matter in the minutes.

CEO—All the students names are listed and many matters are brought up here but are not officially written out and are not therefore included in the minutes.

Mr. Walsh—This is a very important order and should be in the minutes.

CEO—There was no order made. I have no objection to putting this matter on the minutes but the matter should be put in writing if it is to be inserted in the minutes.

Mr. Butler—Why didn't you put it in when the order was made?

CEO—There was no order made that effect.

Chairman—I remember when Mr. Butler made the request Mr. Lanigan said he would have the names for the next meeting.

CEO—But that was not done. I want a complete and full record of what took place at the last meeting.

Mr. Lanigan then amended the minutes and the matter was agreed.

The Chairman then read over the minutes and Mr. Butler said that it was not correct.

Mr. Butler then read an extract from the Dungarvan Leader where he said was a correct statement of what happened at last meeting. I believe said Mr. Butler that the CEO deliberately omitted this matter.

Mr. Lanigan—With all due respect for the Press the reports are not always correct.

At this stage the discussion became heated and the Chairman asked some member to suggest a way out of the position.

Dr. Curtis said he remembered Mr. Lanigan saying that the lists were available to the members and that he would have them ready for next meeting.

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Mr. Butler—There is no misunderstanding but I want the minutes amended and this matter put in I am sorry to hold up the meeting so long but this was a very important matter and I do not want to be misunderstood.

The correct minute was then inserted and the Canon said he had great pleasure in signing the minutes now as they deserved to be signed.

SUNDAY'S GREAT HURLING COUNTY FINAL

DUNGARVAN OR MOUNT SION

WILL DUNGARVAN REPEAT 1926 ACHIEVEMENT

Dungarvan scene of many a thrilling hurling encounter will be the mecca of all Gaiels on Sunday next where will be staged the Waterford Senior Hurling County Final between Dungarvan Blues and Mount Sion. The teams need no introduction to the Gaelic world as both are well-known exponents of our National pastime.

As the date draws near excitement is mounting to fever pitch and it is expected a record crowd will patronise the fixture to see the stalwarts of Waterford battle for the Blue Riband of Dece hurling.

A feature of Sunday's game should be the individual clashes between our Inter-County Stars and hurling of a high order is expected. Mount Sion claim they are capable of beating Dungarvan even though the locals have the advantage on the home pitch. I cannot give my views on the Mount Sion team as I have not seen them in action this year but their displays in the past is in keeping with their proud club tradition. Dungarvan would want to show improvement if they are to win on Sunday next and I understand a few changes are likely in the attacking department. The Blues however have already won the first leg of the double and their victory over Strabally in the senior football final has left them in confident mood and they make no secret of the fact that they will take the hurling honours on Sunday next.

The greatest game of hurling which I ever witnessed in County Waterford was the one between Dungarvan and Mount Sion some years ago at Lismore and the memories of that thrilling display are still with me. Dungarvan and Mount Sion are quite capable of repeating this form on Sunday next and if so Sunday's final should go down in hurling history.

The respective merits of the teams are the chief topic throughout the county. Mount Sion pride of the City are strongly backed to take the title whilst Dungarvan are supported in the Western area to bring off the double.

Dungarvan won well from Irish Tanners in the first round and this victory I admit was a surprise. Mount Sion were reckoned likely candidates for County honours by more than one shrewd judge. Then they went down to Cappoquin in the second round and this set back only spurred them on to greater efforts. Shortly after their Cappoquin defeat they returned to their native town at Lismore and there they met the Blues. Their most important engagement was the second meeting with Cappoquin and the Blues reversed the previous result by a ten point margin.

Mount Sion had an easy victory in their first engagement in which they defeated P. H. Pearce at Waterford but they were considered lucky when they came up against De la Salle in the second round and it was only in the closing stages that they won by a two points margin. The Army were not at their full strength in the third series and Mount Sion had no trouble in disposing of them. Then came a clash between the veterans Erins Own and Mount Sion which was won by the former but the match was awarded to Mount Sion on the grounds of an illegally constituted Erins Own team.

Mount Sion will be led by John Keane who is recognized as one of the greatest centre field backs in the game and it is likely he will be flanked by the versatile Andy Fleming with Paddy Dowling left half. I have heard a good deal lately of the Mount Sion full back Larry Fanning who is gradually making a name for himself and Mount Sion will not be found wanting in this department. Veteran Paddy O'Connor retains his place at full and John Gallagher a newcomer will likely field out be-

Cul Bairre and it is here Dungarvan may expect stern opposition from Jim O'Meara and Jimmy O'Dea will likely figure at centre field the former is a product of Kilkenny hurling and an artist at ball control. O'Dea is a coming youngster with Colles inter-pro experience and he makes an ideal partner for his club mate Jim O'Meara. Pakey Flynn who already has a brace of championship medals with Mount Sion is a strong candidate for the left half position and the other two positions in the half line of attack may be filled by Dick Cooper and Donal Fitzgerald. Both young players who have gained their spurs by outstanding displays. Pat Fanning will feature at spear head of the attack and he will have consistent wingers along side him in T. Keane and Mickey Fealy both are opportunists of a high order.

The Cusham youngster Mick Moloney will guard the Bearnas Baghill for the Blues and he is playing great hurling this year. Paddy Nagle, Tom Sheridan and Paddy Neville seem an automatic choice for the full back line. I favour M. Landers in his own position at centre half and this line will take some beating. If Jackie Good and Jimmy Mountain fill the remain-

ing berths Paddy Daly and Christy Moynlan will in all probability be around the half way mark and Dungarvan should have a slight pull hereabouts. The Dungarvan selectors I wrote sometime ago had difficulties when they were selecting the team for the Co Senior Final and I can see them having similar trouble when they are selecting six forwards for the hurling final. There is an abundance of material available for the six positions and likely candidates are Paul Lannen, Percy Dillon, Tom Curran, Jim Lyons, P. Stack, P. Butler, W. Barron, P. Moloney, T. Murphy and D. Good. All those mentioned are well known exponents of the game and I am looking forward to see the six best in action for Dungarvan.

Mount Sion are making the journey with an air of confidence and despite the fact that Dungarvan are on the home pitch Dungarvan are a formidable combination and are quite capable of rising to great heights and backed by local enthusiasm they will not readily bow to defeat. Mt Sion however throw down the challenge and Dungarvan accept it for the honour of the Old Boro.

Dungarvan first won the senior hurling championship in 1908 and again they were champion.

The Emergency Powers (No 368) Order, 1945 made by the Government on the 9th October 1945 provides for compulsory tillage and the same extent as in 1946. Subject to certain exceptions every occupier of a holding of 5 or more statute acres of land which was cultivated in 1945 and which is to be required to cultivate in 1946 three-eighths of such land and sown with wheat thereon a specified minimum area equal to one-tenth of the total area or one-twenty-fifth of the arable area according to the district in which the holding is situated.

Land which was cultivated with a tillage crop in 1945 and has been laid down in first year grass will be allowed to count as cultivation in 1946 to the extent of not more than one-quarter of the total area.

Provision similar to 1945 is made for exceptions in specified cases provided application is made for exemption to the Agricultural Department not later than the 15th November 1945.

The Minister may retain or take possession of a holding for the purpose of allowing cultivation carried out on the holding.

A person who fails to carry out his obligations under the Order may be liable on conviction to a heavy fine or imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

Dungarvan U.D.C. Complainants from Residents Of Cathal Brugha Place

The fortnightly meeting of above was held in the Council Chambers Town Hall on Friday night last Oct 12th Mr T McCarthy chairman presided and other members present were Messrs L A Veale J McGrath Senator J Butler and M Clancy.

Mr Michael O'Meara Acting Town Clerk attended. Manager's Orders. In connection with resolution passed at quarterly meeting authorising the manager to apply to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health for sanction of an overdraft on Harbour account of £300 the manager ordered that application be made for sanction of same.

Drainage At Rice's Street. The Acting Borough Surveyor reported on this matter and stated that the position was that there was some 12 houses without WCs or water supply. A small drain from each discharges on the street channel and is objectionable. Notices were served on the owner to carry out partial abatement of nuisance at her own expense.

Cheap Fuel Scheme. The Department wrote in regard to above scheme for winter of 1945-46 and requested a scheme be submitted and stating that the scheme would operate as from week beginning 5th November to 31st March 1946.

On the Managers order the Acting Clerk submitted a draft scheme and estimate of cost on the same lines as last year's. The Manager approved of the scheme subject to sanction of the Dungarvan and District Nursing Association.

A letter was read from Mrs H Cusack on behalf of the above Association thanking the members for the resolution passed at a recent meeting. The letter stated that the resolution was appreciated by the members and gives them great encouragement to continue to work in this necessary and very charitable work.

Turf For Sale. A letter was read from Mr Joseph Ryan, Ahernaveen, Co Kerry stating he had 1,000 tons of good quality dry turf for sale at 32/- a ton F.O.R. and asking the co-operation of the Council in disposing of same.

Summer Or Winter Time? Mr Veale proposed and Mr McCarthy seconded the following resolution—That we urge the Government to discontinue summer time and implement the recommendation of the summer time commission by establishing an Irish Standard time.

Mr Veale supporting the resolution said that he had been asked by several people to bring this matter up and complained that it was very hard on children having to get up so early in the bad winter mornings. There was no reason why they should not have our own time—the natural time fixed as it would be better for everyone.

Mr Butler—This matter has more or less to do only with the urban area as it doesn't interest the people in the rural areas. From what he could gather he thought that the majority of the people in Dungarvan were in favour of the present arrangement for the whole year. As far as the rural areas were concerned that was a matter for the Co Council.

Mr Clancy—I was always in favour of summer time as the extra hour makes the night shorter and if it is interfering with schoolchildren why not alter the hours in which they should be in from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. That would meet the needs of the children.

Chairman—I seconded this resolution because all the people with whom I come in contact are all in favour of the old time. It is definitely a hardship on the young children and especially on bad winter mornings.

Mr McGrath—All the people I spoke to in respect to the workers favour summer time and I see no reason why it should be changed.

After some more discussion it was decided to adopt the matter for a more general discussion at the next meeting.

Complaints About Footpaths. A letter signed by thirty-two tenants of Cathal Brugha Place was read. The letter stated that the tenants protested strongly against the awful conditions of the roads and footpaths in the district.

Mr Butler—When the housing schemes are being planned paths should be included for all houses. That is the proper time to do the work.

Mr Veale—We were told that those paths were repaired and chips put down but I believe it was not of much use. We might be able to do something for these tenants out of the forthcoming grants.

Mr Butler—Some of the grants promised this year should be set aside for this work and I suggest that the attention of the County Manager be brought to the letter and that portion of the grants be made available for this work.

Chairman—In future all matters of this kind should be put before us as we are likely to forget some items at the annual estimates meeting and if we were reminded of these matters allowance could be made for this class of work.

Mr Clancy—Could this work be done out of the road grants? Clerk—The upkeep of the roads is in the hands of the Co Council.

Chairman—We are all very anxious to do our best for the tenants and we should have this work attended to as soon as possible.

On Mr Butler's suggestion the Clerk was instructed to send a copy of the tenants letter to the Manager and to ask him to have the work done out of portion of the forthcoming grants.

were not grown. Mr Butler—But that was not sufficient reason why there was no vegetables grown. There was fish on the dietary scale. Did the inmates get any fish? This was agreed.

Arising out of the payments Mr Walsh asked why Mrs Bonner Cappoquin did not get her bonus. He said that woman was deprived of her unemployment money as her cards were not stamped.

CEO—This woman made various applications this year and the Department has not got whatever she was allowed. Mr Butler—Are her unemployment cards stamped? CEO—I don't think she is entitled to have cards stamped as the committee have certain exemptions.

Mr Butler—Am I right in assuming that something was passed by this committee and sent to the Department for sanction—what was the reply from the Department? CEO—There was no proposition to that effect by the committee. This application is only made today.

Mr Walsh—I don't agree this woman has made several applications. Mr Kyne proposed and Mr Butler seconded that an extra 1/6 per week bonus be granted to all part-time employees of the committee and that same be made retrospective from the date on which the hote-time employees received same. This resolution was passed unanimously.

Royal Dublin Society Lectures. It was decided to fix the dates for the lectures for January 1946. Water Cistern. A letter was read from the Waterford Co Council offering the water cistern which was lying in the yard of the Technical School at a rent of 1/- per week.

After some discussion the Committee decided to purchase a new asbestos tank. Two tenders were received for the supply of 65 tons of turf from Messrs. A. Moloney & Sons Ltd and K. Williams & Co at 20/- per ton. Mr Walsh—42/- per ton and 38/- per ton.

After a long discussion Mr McGrath said he got turf from Glenageary, Co Kerry at 48/3 which included carriage to the mill. The committee decided to get in touch with this man and order a couple of waggon loads from him as soon as possible.

Mr McGrath said that in connection with his request for an Irish Class at Kilsheel he had a signed application from 20 pupils. The committee decided to see if a teacher could be got conveniently to conduct the class.

Scheme Of Apprenticeships For Boys. Mr Kyne referred to a scheme of apprenticeships for boys which he brought up two months ago and asked if any progress had been made.

Mr Butler—What about the soup where does that come from? I would like to get an explanation of that. Mr Butler—From the meat and stock at the hospital and there is also meat got for making soup.

Mr McGrath—There is also bread 1/2 oz butter and egg or porridge and oatmeal. Dinner—2 lbs potatoes 4 ozs meat 1 lb vegetables 1 pint milk or soup every day except Friday when fish (8 ozs) is to be substituted for meat as already provided for in existing dietary scale.

Supper—1 pint tea 8 ozs bread 1/2 oz butter or margarine. Mr Butler—A new dietary scale is now put before us doesn't that in itself prove that something was wrong. I hope the new scale will be given.

After some further discussion Mr Kyne proposed and Mr Dugan seconded that two members be appointed by the Board at each meeting to visit and report on conditions at the County Home. This was passed unanimously and Senator Butler and Mr Kyne were the members appointed for the coming month.

A DISTINGUISHED CAPPOQUIN OFFICER.—During the past week Mr M Walsh PC Auctioneer has received a very interesting letter from Major Walter J Cullinane Longview Texas U.S.A. who is shortly retiring from the Medical Service of the United States Army after a brilliant and distinguished service of 24 years.

Major Cullinane as we are known at home before emigrating to the States between 25 and 30 years ago is the only son of the late Mr James Cullinane and Mrs M Cullinane who had conducted a most extensive and successful wine and spirit business in Lower Main Street Cappoquin for many years in the premises now occupied by Mr P and Mrs Morrissey. Mr Cullinane was a noted all-round sportsman but he excelled particularly in coursing and kept a number of valuable and well-bred greyhounds which were unbeatable in Munster at the time.

As "Walt" grew up he showed that he had fully inherited all his father's great sporting qualities as well as the many fine and generous traits of character possessed by him and both father and son became extremely popular in sporting and social circles in Cappoquin and all the surrounding districts.

Having in due course passed his final examination as a fully-qualified Chemist "Walt" soon afterwards went to the United States where he married a pretty Lismore lady a sister of Mr John F O'Donnell the well-known Lismore Gael. He later joined the Medical Service of the U.S. Army where his great intelligence and administrative ability brought him quick promotion so that he is now retiring on November 30th after 24 years service with the rank of Major who has won all his old friends in Cappoquin prouder than ever of their distinguished fellow-townsmen.

In the course of his letter to Mr Walsh he said that after a certain period and when the preliminary requirements had been complied with he and his wife intend to return to Ireland and take up their residence in his native town of Cappoquin so that he can spend the years of his retirement amongst the scenes of old friends of his happy boyhood days.

On a matter of fact he recalled the names of several of those old friends in his letter as he asked Mr Walsh to specially remember him to Mick and Mrs Sargent Jimmy Lacey John Ryan George Healy Jack Walsh (the Banker) and John Sweeney Tourin while he conveyed his kindest regards to Mr and Mrs M Walsh and their charming daughters. He has been invited by Colonel G V Emerson to personally take the Review of troops on Friday."

Major Cullinane served as Adjutant for over twenty months then as Executive Officer and more recently as Director of Personnel Division. He was among the first officers to report for duty here after the hospital was opened.

Seven of his twenty-four years service were spent in the Zone from 1922 to 1925 since when he has been in the Eighth Service Command. Both Major and Mrs Cullinane (the latter has been a very active worker as Red Cross Gray Lady) have endeared themselves to everyone at Harmon.

They will remain in Longview for a few months and sometime in the near future when conditions warrant they plan to return to their home in Cappoquin Co Waterford Ireland.
