Mount Sion Double in Senior and Minor Hurling Finals

SENIOR CLASH PROVIDES GREAT GAME

SH—MOUNT SION 3-8, DUNGARVAN 2-5
MH—MOUNT SION 4-5, CAPPOQUIN 4-2

At the Gaelic Field Dungarvan on Sunday last Mount Sion (City) senior and minor hurlers brought off a great double when they won their respective county finals defeating Dungarvan in the senior game and Cappoquin in the minor match.

The senior clash provided thrilling hurling which delighted the large crowd and it was one of the best county hurling matches played at the Dungarvan venue for many years. From the start a lightning pace was set and a very high standard of play was witnessed. The initial placings of the Mount Sion men saw John Keane figures being advanced but a short time had only elapsed when a switch was noticed Keane going to centre field and O'Meara going to the pivotal position. This change made a remarkable difference and ultimately was the deciding factor in the city team's great victory.

The hurling of the Mount Sion men was a real treat to watch. Keane was reminiscent of the great John Keane of a few years back and showed that this magnificent player had lost none of the prowess which has earned him the reputation of being the styled one of the best hurlers in Ireland. His stick work and anticipation on Sunday last earned rounds of applause even from staunch supporters of the Old Boro team and he was indeed the inspiration of his team.

A young player on the Dungarvan side who definitely caught the eye all through the hour's play was Jackie Good who as right half-back played a faultless match. As a result of his outstanding play we saw no reason why this player should not figure on next year's county team.

In the minor game Cappoquin taking for most of the hour could not stand up to the great rally put in by the Mount Sion boys in the closing stages and although they failed to annex the laurels they were unlucky to lose.

Conditions during the evening were ideal except for the slanting evening rain which did not seem to blind the players at times. There was no breeze to interfere with ball control.

The senior teams were played on the field at Dungarvan. Egan and Band under Mr M. Clancy Bandmaster and prior to the start of the game the crowd stood to attention while the band played "Station Street" and "Amhrán Na bhFiann".

THE SENIOR GAME
From the throw-in Dungarvan pressed and the ball was driven into the field in five minutes. From the puck-out the ball went to Neville (Dungarvan) who was fouled and the free taken by Landers was nicely caught by the man who sent the ball over the bar from the right wing to give Dungarvan their opening point. Keeping up the pressure, Dungarvan kept play at the Mount Sion end but the forwards were dominated by a sound city defence and the ball was driven wide on three successive occasions. Play was then returned to centre-field and after five minutes the Mount Sion goal was just barely wide when taken by John Keane. Dungarvan went into the attack again from the goal-puck and when a Dungarvan forward was fouled on the right wing Moylan made no mistake when he shot a point from the resultant free. Within a few minutes John Keane opened the Mount Sion score sheet with a goal.

The Mount Sion switch already mentioned then took place and was immediately effective as the city men took up the offensive at once and forced a free (foul) to centre-back broke up any promising Mount Sion move and some minutes later a grand centre by Geoghegan was sent down the field. Roche at centre-forward goal to which a point was added from a free which resulted in a foul. At this stage it was all Cappoquin and their followers were in a jubilant mood.

After twenty minutes play Mount Sion broke through the Cappoquin defence to goal but Loneragan stretched the Western champions lead with a point from a 21 yards free. Within three minutes of the opening of the second half Mount Sion gained the lead with a goal and continued to keep Cappoquin at bay. The opening play from a goal puck the Cornerstone boys went into the attack and forced a 70 which was sent wide but continued to be a threat. Two major scores per Barry who went on as a sub to give them a five points lead. Another goal for Cappoquin was disallowed because of a foul. Mount Sion then took up the challenge and had two points in a row and keeping up the pressure the city boys added a further point from a 70. GIVING MEDICINE TO PIGS. The necessity for giving purgative medicine to pigs is usually indicative that there is something wrong in system and composition of their feeding. Where pigs are regularly fed on suitable rations and get daily exercise purgatives are not required. A change of food which should be of a mildly laxative nature with a liberal supply of fluid for drinking is very often all that is necessary. Epsom and Glauber salts are commonly given in regulated doses according to the age and size of the animal but their action is rather drastic and besides the animals often refuse the food or water containing the salts owing to the nauseating taste. If the animals are disposed to be constipated then occasionally add to the mash a tablespoonful of castor oil. Liquid paraffin is also a convenient laxative and may be mixed in the food in doses of from a dessertspoonful to a full tablespoonful. Attention however to the feeding and exercise and nature will do all that is required.—P.K. in the "Farmers Gazette".
