seconded by Mr Clancy and passed. A scheme to offer seven apprenticeship scholarships in various branches of Technical Instruction drawn up by a special sub-committee came before the meeting for adoption.

Mr Butler—When passed this will become a demand on the County Council and I see there is a difference of receipts over expenditure of £1891.

Mr Clancy—We won't be able to provide any school within 12 months so you could eliminate that.

CEO—There might be a possibility and we must budget for that. We are on a priority list.

Mr Hart—The ratepayers already regard the rates as enormous.

CEO—As far as school buildings go we are the Cinderella of the 26 counties.

Mr Kyne—There is an item of £40 for scholarship for the boy in school yesterday.

CEO—It has not been a good year for gardening.

Mr Kyne—Didn't the Inspectors even comment on it? CEO—They had a look around yes.

Mr Kyne—A part-time man should be employed to do the heavy work.

Chairman—Yes the garden should be a model.

Mr Butler—Could not the demand be reduced as there is nearly £2000 credit balance.

CEO—A decrease would mean a loss on the Department grants.

Mr Butler—I am not insistent on the point, I just drew it up for the Committee's views.

CEO—The opinion of the people is that there is no demand for Vocational Education but there is a demand for lower rates.

Mr Hart—I must agree with Mr Butler that we should reduce the demand. We must have health and happiness first and then education.

The Chairman disagreed with Mr Hart and said that money spent on education was spent best.

The "Desmond Cinema," Cappoquin Formal Opening Of The New Picture Palace On December 5th

(From Our Cappoquin Correspondent) The new Cinema in Cappoquin has been named the "Desmond Cinema" and no more appropriate title could have been selected for the town.

The new cinema which has been in course of construction throughout the summer months and which is now in the final stages of completion is a beautiful building in every sense of the word.

Its internal dimensions are 100 feet long by 40 feet wide and it is made to accommodate 500 persons at each sitting.

A large boiler-house has been fitted behind the stage which will provide a grand central heating system and the various pipes and radiators fitted throughout the main hall will ensure a warm and even temperature throughout the coldest nights of winter.

Plush-coloured tip-up seats have been provided for the higher-priced parts of the cinema while very cosy seats have also been fixed for the cheaper seats.

The latest and most perfect sound apparatus has been installed so that every word spoken or sung will be heard to be distinctly enunciated.

In addition to the usual up-to-date fittings a modern cinema splendid stage has also been provided and the room is comfortable and well-equipped.

Laundry accommodation has been applied provided for throughout the building while a very up-to-date and modern boiler-house has been found at the entrance to the hall.

The Cinema will be formally opened in its new and improved state in Cappoquin on next Wednesday night.

In the store room we saw a good supply of tea cocoa and sugar and in an outhouse potatoes parsnips and carrots.
