DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

The Dungarvan District Court held before Mr Sean Treo D.J. at the Court House, Dungarvan on Tuesday last was the lightest held for some time lasting but fifteen minutes.

Occasional Licenses
Mr T C Williams Solr on behalf of Mr P J Power was granted occasional licenses for a dance in January for the Lifeboat Institute and for the Annual Coursing meet at Tallacole on December 27th.

Mr P J Power Solr on behalf of Mr M J Keane was granted a similar license for a dance at the Town Hall on Dec 23rd run by Abbeyside Boy Scouts.

TOWARDS MUSIC

By ADELIO VIANI
A beautiful and non-technical book on music and the great Composers for all music lovers. (Tralee The Kerryman 8/6 Post free 9/-)

TOWARDS MUSIC is a charming and valuable contribution to the literature of music from the pen of the Senior Professor of Singing at the Royal Irish Academy of Music, Maestro Viani. He holds the highest musical degree obtainable in Italy the Diploma of Composition of the Royal Conservatorio di Milano. He also holds from the same Conservatorio the Diploma of Professor of Singing and the Diploma of Professor of Flute and Organ. Certificates for Declamation Poetical and Dramatic Literature and the Physiology of the Voice. He is a member of the Board of Examiners and taught singing in the Conservatorio and was one of the Directors of the Madrigal Society. Outside the Conservatorio he holds the position of professor of Piano in the Calchi-Targioli the chief educational institution in Milan. He was Musical Director of the Oratorio of the Conservatorio di Milano. He has composed a number of operas and a number of operas from its beginning until the present day with a special emphasis on the period of Rossini-Wagner and the period after Wagner an essay on Milan musical capital of Italy.

Superb Production Of "Autumn Fire"

The presentation of T C Murray's three-act play Autumn Fire by the Dungarvan Dramatic Club on Friday Saturday and Sunday nights last was easily the best production which the talented members of this club have so far given us. This is the tenth play which the club has staged and with each production the members have gone on from success to success reflecting meritorious credit on themselves their producers and the club generally.

The general public seldom reflects on the great trouble and inconvenience attached to the production of a play but the reward is sufficient for the Drama Club members who have gone on from success to success reflecting meritorious credit on themselves their producers and the club generally.

The orchestral items given by the Dungarvan Orchestral Society under the baton of Mr Michael Clancy before the play and again during the intervals which included Dear Erin (Bucalossi) Vienna City Of My Dreams (Sieczynski) Down The Mall (Benatzky and Stolz) Shamrock Leaves and Maritana (Wallace) helped greatly to round off a grand programme.

In the original casting of the play Mr John O'Connell was cast for the principle part and had gone through rehearsals but was taken ill a week before the production date and his inability to go on would have probably meant a cancellation of the performance had not the services of Mr Sean Traynor of the Dese Players Waterford who had previously played the part in Waterford been secured.

The play deals with Irish country life and the problems of a simple family who find themselves caught up in many troubles when the father (a widower) decides to marry again. The young girl of the neighbourhood who has her heart set on a young man whose father also places amatorial interest.

As Owen Keegan (the widower) was brought to a really grand performance by the services of Mr who brought a deep understanding to the part and his fine dramatic ability and stage sense found distinct favour with the audience.

Playing the part of Ellen Keegan (his daughter) Mrs R Fetherston gave an able and realistic portrayal and this was easily the best part which we have seen her play so far. She certainly excelled in her part.

Taking the part of Michael Keegan (Owen Keegan's son) were Michael Cullinan and a part which was a big departure from the parts usually played by this talented player who usually excels in heavier parts but he proved his great versatility by giving an outstanding performance.

As Mrs Desmond (a neighbour) we had Jessie Sim playing the part on Friday and Saturday nights with Betty O'Neill playing the part on Sunday night and both players filled the role in a most admirable manner.

Nelke Power as Nance (Mrs Desmond's daughter) gave a most excellent portrayal of a very exacting part especially in the closing stages of the last act when she showed great acting ability.

Brickey Rangers Bring Off Double

JUNIOR FOOTBALL TITLE ADDED TO JUNIOR HURLING TITLE IN REPLAY
Newtown 1-3
Brickey Rangers 0-3

On Sunday last Brickey Rangers and Newtown met again at the Field, Dungarvan, to decide who would be Junior Football Champions for 1945. Having failed to do so at the same venue on the previous Sunday the conditions prevailing were not conducive to good football but the spectators were treated to a good robust match which reached exciting pitches here and there throughout the hour. The evening was fine but heavy rain the night before and continuing dampness left the field in a very sodden condition and the surface was soon cut to pieces which made the going very heavy and hard on the players.

Again lack of stewarding resulted in many encroachments from the side-line on to the pitch. In the opening stages of the game the Newtown forwards played the golden opportunities of scoring fritter away and though they lead at half-time by the odd point in 5 it was evident that the Brickey men were the better team. The winning score came when Cunningham sent in a grand ball from the right wing which hit the top of the upright and rebounded into the hands of the Newtown forwards. Securing sent to the Newtown net for a goal which was met by a tremendous cheer from the large Brickey following a rally in the closing stages. From the Easter champions was well held by the Brickey backline in which Ahearn McCarthy and Curran starred.

The Game
Mr Dec Good the referee set the teams in motion at five past three and from the throw in the Brickey pressed but the ball was sent wide. From the kick-out the Newtown men transferred to send wide in turn. This was followed by two further points for Newtown in almost point blank range. Keeping up the pressure the Eastern men had the Brickey backs on the defensive and a 14 yards free to Newtown saw first blood. When then Larry Veale pointed, but this was negated within a few minutes when Da Whelan secured in a Brickey attack and sent over the equaliser. From the kick-out Newtown brought the ball up the field but the effort was wasted by faulty finishing. The goal delivery was returned again and the Newtown men were after another score and when Veale centred another Newtown free, Stephen Curran in the Brickey goal saved his net at the expense of a 50. The resultant free was cleared out but Fitzgerald securing made no mistake when he gave Newtown another point. A series of frees to the backs relieved pressure on back-line and brought play to Newtown's territory where Nicholas McGrath who always proved dangerous secured and equalised with a grand kick.

The Newtown men then had another innings when they forced a fifty but the free kick was cleared and a very robust and hard bout of play ensued. Hard knocks and no quarter from either side were the order and the individual clashes were cheered excitedly by the followers of both sides. Mansfield (Newtown) was fouled in possession and Veale sent in a nice ball to Shanahan but it was sent wide by the latter. Brickey Rangers then forced play back to Newtown and when Curran a long shot was just wide for a goal and another Brickey wide resulted before Newtown come back again and a dangerous situation for Brickets was saved.

On resuming Newtown broke away from the throw-in but again it was evident that Newtown forwards had left their shooting boots at home when two wides in succession resulted. Accident To Kilmactomas Man Proves Fatal

INQUEST PROCEEDINGS

The death occurred at the District Hospital Dungarvan on Tuesday last Dec 11th of Mr Martin Keane Fahafela Kilmactomas a well-known member of the farming community who sustained serious head injuries when he fell from his bicycle when returning from Dungarvan where he had attended the annual football county final on December 2nd.

The Inquest Mr T C Williams Deputy Coroner held an inquest into the circumstances surrounding the death of Mr Keane at the District Hospital, Dungarvan on Tuesday night last. The jury consisted of Messrs M J Keane (foreman) Jas O'Donovan Joseph Foley John Fulton Michael Walsh Anthony Lavin Daniel McGrath and Michael Fives.

Giving evidence Thomas Gough Fahafela said that he met the deceased in Dungarvan after the football match on December 2nd and they cycled from Dungarvan together. When approaching Curraheen Cross witness who was cycling in front heard a thud behind. He got off and went back and found the deceased lying on the road with his left foot still on the pedal of the bicycle. He immediately summoned help and a Guard from Leamybrien and a Doctor from Kilmactomas arrived in a short time and then the deceased was removed to the District Hospital Dungarvan.

In Collapsed Condition
Nurse Linn said she was on duty at the hospital and received deceased at about midnight on Sunday Dec 2nd. He was in a collapsed condition and was attended immediately by Dr D T McCarthy.

Skull Fractured
Dr M K Cusack Dungarvan stated that he had been in attendance on deceased since Dec 8th when he was taken to hospital in a coma and deceased remained so until he died on Dec 11th. He also said that deceased had a wound about 1 1/2 inches long on the right side of his head and a number of abrasions on the backs of both hands. He stated that the cause of death was fracture of the skull which caused cerebral hemorrhage.

Pool Of Blood On Road
Guard O'Malley Leamybrien said that he visited the scene of the accident at about 8 p.m. on Dec 2nd and he found the deceased on the road. There was a pool of blood about six feet from the left edge of the road as you go to Waterford. He examined the bicycle and found it in good condition.

Verdict
The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical evidence that deceased died from fracture of the skull and cerebral hemorrhage due to an accidental fall.

Sympathy
The Deputy Coroner tendered sympathy to the relatives of the deceased and Sergeant M Teahan GS who represented the authorities and Mr M J Keane on behalf of the jury also joined in expressing their sympathy.
