WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Estimate Of £66,658 For Roads Recommended
Cappoquin Needs Water And Sewerage Schemes

Mr D Heskin TD Chairman presided at a special meeting of the Waterford County Council held at Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs M O Ryan F Roche T A Kyne M Morrissey TD J Ormond W Norris M F Walsh T Morrissey J Quirk J Mansfield R Barron M Hartly W Dower Sennott W Butler J Meade T Power P Butler and M McGrath were present. Messrs S J Moynihan Co Manager of Moyahilly B A Co Manager of Moyahilly B A Co Assistant D S Doyle B E Do T B Boyle Accountant and J G Dowling County Secretary attended.

Manager said that there was a post-war water scheme being planned for Cappoquin and Lisimore.

The Acting County Surveyor said that the preliminaries had been gone into regarding a joint water scheme for these two towns which will meet all requirements.

Manager—As soon as we get the report from the Consulting Engineer a plan can be drawn up. Lack of water is the whole trouble I think.

Mr O Ryan—There was mention made about obtaining sites for houses and this is becoming a big problem. Land near a town now like an El Dorado and black-market prices are charged. We are going back to landlording again in this respect. I think that where big pieces of land are available should be taxed heavily. In Clonmel ground rent is valued at £150 an acre. I don't think that landowners should be allowed to fleece the people like this. Manager—In the 1935 scheme applications for houses were invited and on these the number of houses was based. If there had been more applications from Cappoquin they would have got more houses.

Late Mr John Dahill, Mary St., Dungarvan

It is with deep regret that we record the death of one of Dungarvan's most sterling inhabitants in the person of Mr John Dahill, who passed away at his residence in Mary Street late on Thursday night January 10th at the fine age of 77 years. Mr John Dahill, who was a native of Colligan, came to Dungarvan as a young man and figured prominently in the public life of the town all during his long life. He was a member of the Urban District Council for many years where he always put the interests of the ratepayers above all other considerations. In all discussions on the numerous matters dealt with by the Council he was marked with sincerity and straightforwardness and if any scheme justified criticism he did not fail to point out faults and how they could be rectified. He acted on the Council until failing health forced him not to seek re-election.

An honest and upright man in business and a true-hearted Irishman he was adverse to any compromising policies. He was father of Rev John Dahill Morrissey New South Wales to whom as well as to the other members of the family sincere sympathy is now extended in their sad bereavement. At the removal of the remains to St. Mary's Parish Church on last Friday evening a large and sincere number of mourners gathered in the presence of Rev J Corbett CC and Rev J Power received and blessed the coffin.

On Saturday morning Very Rev T O'Connell B.C. and Very Rev P O'Connell and Solemn Requiem High Mass celebrated by Rev J Corbett CC assisted by Rev D McGrath (deacon) and Rev J Power (sub-deacon). A large number of mourning relatives and a representative gathering of the general public. HIGH HONOUR FOR A MELLERAY PRIEST
The Rev. Father Canice O'Connell Prior of Mount Melleray Abbey was elected first Abbot of the Cistercian Monastery New Mellifont Colton Co Louth on last Tuesday 15th inst. and was the most surprised member of the Mount Melleray Community when the news reached him by telegram on Tuesday evening shortly after he had officiated at an important lay funeral in Mount Melleray cemetery.

Father Canice had been Deacon of Mount Melleray Seminary for many years but on the same day that the Rev. Canon O'Connell was elected Lord Abbot of Mount Melleray in 1933 he was also elected Prior of Mount Melleray and for the past 13 years had discharged the duties of his office with great dignity and efficiency especially when he had to assume complete management of the Community on the frequent occasions when the Lord Abbot was absent on other important duties in France, England and America.

A most zealous and saintly priest and a sound and wise Administrator he was noted for his great kindness and charity and was beloved by all the members of the Mount Melleray Community who now deeply regret his departure from them but who at the same time heartily congratulate him on his elevation to the more important and exalted position of being made the first Abbot of New Mellifont Abbey which was only entitled to have a Prior up to this position has been fully filled by Rev. Father Benignus O'Connell formerly of Mount Melleray since New Mellifont Abbey was opened several years ago. Rev. Father Canice on this proud but well-deserved distinction and we know that he will fill his new office with the same fervour devotion and ability as he displayed in the office of Prior in Mount Melleray during the past 13 years.

LISMORE ITEMS

Death of Mr G. Quirk—It is with deep regret we record the death of Mr G. Quirk, Ballysheehy which sad event occurred on Friday 12th inst. after a prolonged illness and at an advanced age. Deceased was an industrious and progressive member of the farming community and possessed an amiable and courteous manner which endeared him to a wide circle of friends. His remains were removed to Kilmurry cemetery on Thursday last for interment there, being a large gathering of mourners and sympathisers present.

Death of Mr William O'Brien—The death took place in Dun garvan Hospital on Friday 4th Jan of Mr William O'Brien, the great regret of his numerous acquaintances. Deceased was for many years domiciled in Cappoquin where he enjoyed the respect and esteem of the towns people. The funeral arrived in Lismore on Saturday evening where it was met and accompanied to the Church by a large cortege. Requiem Mass was offered up on Sunday for the eternal repose of his soul and the interment took place in the Council cemetery at 11 am in the presence of a large concourse of sympathisers. Rev Fr McGlath CC officiated at the graveside.

Waterford Farmers' Association Dance—All patrons of the night fantastic are eagerly looking forward to the all-night dance under the auspices of the Waterford Farmers' Association which will be held at the Happydrome on next Sunday night. The organising committee can be relied upon to have all arrangements perfect and an added attraction will be the Bride-side Serenaders Band which has been specially engaged for the occasion. Clearing arrangements will be in the capable and efficient hands of Mrs Kelly who can be relied upon to provide her usual appetising repast. Lismore Gammage Club—All arrangements are now complete for the Lismore Camogie Club's Whist Drive to be held at the Courthouse on Tuesday 22nd January and as Whist has now become very popular here a large crowd is expected to be present.

'FLU EPIDEMIC IN WATERFORD
Depleted staffs a big falling off in school attendances and a prohibition on visitors to local hospitals illustrate the severity of the prevailing flu epidemic in Waterford City. The epidemic is the most widespread experienced in the Waterford district for some considerable time past.

Water Supply

The first point stated Mr McCarthy is the water supply in the town which is only capable of serving the population of Cappoquin and as a result the people are forced to use water from wells in the town which is condemned. There are no lavatories of any kind in many of the houses and it is only a miracle that the town has been saved from an epidemic. More than half of the houses are not connected with the sewerage and in Barrack Street extensive flooding is caused after heavy rain as the one trap there is unable to take the water away.

Deputations Call for Road Repairs

Mr Dower said that a deputation from Clashmore was present asking for repairs to the road from Dr Hally's Bridge to Mountstuart which should be in the present scheme. It was impossible at present for farmers from Clashmore and adjoining areas who use it. Mr Ormond pointed out that this road was included in the present roads scheme. Mr Harty asked that this road be not tarred as cattle travelling over it suffered from foot soreness. A deputation did not address the meeting as the spokesman stated that Mr Dower had made their case. Mr J Butler said that there was another deputation present concerning the road from the road off the Dungarvan-Clonmel road leading to the Old Barrack at Colligan. Mr Ormond stated that nothing had been done about this road as it was not under the County Council. Mr O Ryan—That would be regarded as a public utility road and under the Rural Improvements Scheme the Department would put up 85 per cent of the cost of repairing it and the additional cost would not be too great for the farmers interested in it. Mr Mansfield said that there was a road at Prap Grange which was to be repaired under the Rural Improvements Scheme and everything had been completed for 12 months but nothing had been done yet. Mr Dunne—We have been notified about that but the difficulty is to get men to start the job. Mr Kyne—Could Mr Dunne hazard an idea why he thinks he had difficulty in getting men to start the job? Water Supplies

Mr T Morrissey also referred to the water which runs down from Belmont on wet days describing it as a veritable stream through which people have to walk ankle deep and which has cut up the roadway there. Mr Quirk—That is worse than a tractor on the road (laughter). The Chairman informed the deputation that when the post war schemes were being discussed Cappoquin got full consideration and he said that the Cappoquin Parish Council were to be congratulated in taking such interest in these matters. Having thanked the members of the deputation they withdrew. **Kilrossanty and Ballinacourty Water Supplies**

Water Supplies

Mr T Morrissey said that he had received complaints from Kilrossanty concerning the water supply. For generations about 10 families drew water from a well there which became a public nuisance. A full analysis from the water was found contaminated and the well had to be abandoned. The people are now encroaching on the land which was reserved for the well and the water diviner he employed and an artisan well bored in the village. The water supply was directed to get the local M.O. to report on the matter and the Chairman said that all these schemes would get prior consideration when facilities became available. Mr Morrissey said that the water supply at Ballyclumper Ballinacourty was bad due to corroded pipes and 12 families were affected. It was stated that this matter could be dealt with when the priority schemes were being considered.

Estimate of £103,670 For Roads Cut to £66,658

The following report was given by the Acting County Surveyor which had been circulated— I have pleasure in submitting the Provisional Road Works Estimate for the year ending 31st March 1947 together with estimate of Costs of Works proposed to be done in the year. The total expenditure proposed is as follows: £29,850 County Roads—£82,620 Urban Roads—£1,200 Grass total—£103,670. This shows an increase of nearly £12,000 over last year's estimate but it is still far short of what would be required to restore the roads of the county to a proper condition. The provision for main roads includes a sum of £14,740 to be obtained as maintenance grant £2,500 for steam rolling £500 for contingencies and £22,110 for maintenance works. This shows an increase of approximately £15,000 over last year's estimate. The following works are essential tarring works and steamrolling which have been omitted for a number of years. The importance of the main roads cannot be over-estimated and when a portion of our mileage is still in reasonably good condition serious deterioration has set in in many sections. No improvement grants have been provided for these roads and no improvement works have been done out of Council's funds. Except for the minimum of tar patching nothing has been done for six years by way of resurfacing. Fortunately all roads were originally well made and in consequence stood up very satisfactorily to the reduced traffic. Traffic however is increasing daily and I feel sure before a year will at least be back to pre-war level. Some of your main roads are not in a condition to meet this increased traffic unless provision for resurfacing is made in the coming year's estimate. In consequence I have included for tarring the most essential sections only and trust that the full amount of estimate for this work will be provided. The estimate for County Roads includes a sum of £800 to supplement Relief Grants £700 for Contingencies £6,300 for steamrolling £1,500 for tarring £650 for other improvements £11,415 for Councilors' proposals and £41,255 for ordinary maintenance.

UDC Meeting Adjourned as Mark of Respect

Mr T McCarthy Chairman presided at the fortnightly meeting of the Dungarvan Urban District Council held on last Friday night Messrs Veale Kyne Clancy and Kelly were also present. Mr M O'Meara Acting Town Clerk attended. **Meeting Adjourns**
Mr Veale said that as all members were aware Mr John Dahill who was an ex-member of the Council had passed away on the previous day and as a tribute and mark of respect to his memory he proposed that the meeting stand adjourned. Mr Clancy seconded the following resolution of sympathy—"That we the members of the Dungarvan Urban District Council express our sympathy to the relatives of the late John Dahill who was a member of this Council for eight years and that we adjourn this meeting as a mark of respect." The Chairman said that Mr Dahill had been a member of the Council for a long time and it was only right to adjourn the meeting. He said he was sure that all the members were very sorry the occasion had arisen. The meeting then adjourned.
