WHEAT

I. Wheat growing is still compulsory because the need exists for the maximum production at home

II Winter wheat should be sown at every opportunity. It is most inadvisable to rely entirely on Spring sowings. Seed of Winter varieties is plentiful.

POTATOES

III Potatoes are most important after wheat. Higher yields can be obtained if the potato seed is sprouted before planting

IV Any farmer who has not already put tubers to sprout should do so at once. Sprouted seed should be carefully protected from frost
