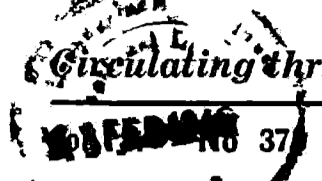

Christmas Day Visiting At Co. Hospital, Waterford

Mr P Caulfield Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the County Waterford Board of Public Assistance held at Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs G Torpey, M J McGeehan, W Kennedy, T A Kyne, W Fady Brown and J Butler were present.

Mr M O Flinn and Mr M Phelan Superintending Assistance Officer attended. The Secretary stated that the Board would be required to pass a resolution covering the borrowing of £100 from the National Bank to carry out the improvement work at the Co. Home Dungarvan.

Mr Butler—What repairs does that cover? Secretary—These were the improvements decided by you before. Mr Butler—It has nothing to do with the Co. Home. Secretary—No. On the proposition of Mr Butler seconded by Mr Kyne the resolution was passed.

Xmas Day Visiting At County Hospital, Waterford
The Secretary said that in reply to a query made by Mr Kyne at the last meeting concerning visiting facilities at the County Hospital, Waterford, on Christmas Day the Manager reported that it has been the custom for 30 years not to allow visitors unless sent for in serious cases. The reason for this was the grave misuse of the privilege by giving excessive stimulants to patients on Christmas Day.

Mr Kyne—That might be alright but I don't think that it justifies the denial of a visit to their relatives on Xmas Day above any other day. There could be supervision to counter the giving of stimulants and those people who cannot be blamed for this procedure should be stopped. Why should a family be refused a visit to their mother just because some blackguard comes along and gives out whiskey inducements? I don't think the decision is harsh and wrong.

Mr Butler—In the cases of children and mothers there is no question of whiskey and I think discretion should be used in various cases. There should be no hard and fast rule. Chairman—No I'd say not. Secretary—Well you would have to have either one thing or another. Stop all or else leave in everybody's hands.

Mr Butler—In most hospitals visitors from different societies visit on Christmas Day and bring presents. Secretary—But there would be no danger of abuse from that source. Mr Kyne—Even if Santa Claus came to the Co. Hospital the gates would be locked against him. My personal opinion is that visitors should be allowed on that day under supervision. Mr Kenneally—Such supervision would be hard to carry out. Mr Butler—The only thing against a visitor could be stopped and no one could be blamed but himself.

Mr Kenneally—I think that even with supervision there is always a little trouble there because of the patients there do not drink. Mr Kenneally—That is right. Mr Kenneally—When I was on Christmas Day falls on a visiting day I think visitors are allowed in but I will find out definitely. It was decided to leave the matter to the City members to report and make recommendations.

Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee
Irish Teacher's Appointment Not Sanctioned
"Government Must Be Crazy"

Very Rev T Canon O'Brien P.O. Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Co. Waterford Vocational Education Committee held in Dungarvan on Monday last. Messrs M J Clancy, J McGrath, D Coghlan, M J McGrath, J Butler, J Mansfield, L A Veale, M F Walsh, M J Hart, T A Kyne and M O'Hara were present. Mr J Lanigan, CEO, attended.

Retired Teacher's Superannuation
A letter from the Department of Education stated that the Minister for Local Government and Public Health would be prepared to approve of a maximum superannuation allowance to Mr P O'Milleadhá retired Irish teacher of £98 18s 6d per annum with cost-of-living bonus calculated on £91 13s 4d. The proposal to add ten years to his actual service cannot be approved.

A letter from Mr O'Milleadhá stated that the Minister should reconsider his decision. In reply to the Chairman the CEO said that Mr O'Milleadhá had 22 years service and his pension would be 22/60ths of the basic allowance the total coming to £199 15s 2d per annum. Mr Butler said that the main point was the Minister's letter to add ten years and the question was whether or not it would be any use going further in the case. Chairman—I don't think there is.

Mr Veale—Were the reasons for such an addition put to the Department? CEO—Yes fully. Mr Clancy—I will do no harm to ask the Department to reconsider the matter. When Mr O'Milleadhá returned this Committee expressed the desire to do something possible for him and now the Minister's request is made and I think we should send a letter to the Minister. CEO—All I have to say is that if letters go back and forth for this it might be twelve months before he gets his pension. Mr Butler—Why not ask them to add five years instead of ten by way of a compromise. Finally it was decided to agree with Mr Butler's suggestion and a resolution was passed to this effect.

Appointment of Irish Teacher
The Department of Education was informing the Committee that the Minister regretted that as Mr M S Cullen Grange was not qualified in accordance with the terms of the advertisement for the position of whole time teacher of Irish and English subjects approval could not be given for his appointment. The Minister would however be prepared to approve the appointment of one of the other six candidates any of whom appeared to have the necessary qualifications.

To the Chairman the CEO said that the Teastas Timshire instituted three years ago. Chairman—Wasn't Mr Cullen in the Army then? CEO—Yes I understand so. Chairman—Young men were asked to join then and now could Mr Cullen have taken out this qualification? Mr Kyne—It is a peculiarity to see men who served in the Army getting this treatment. I think we would force the hand of the Department by not appointing anyone and see what happens. Mr Mansfield—We should ask the Minister to reconsider the matter. Chairman—Why not appoint him temporarily until he qualifies? CEO—That was in the minutes of the last meeting which went to the Department. Mr Butler—Would they sanction him in a temporary capacity in view of the fact that his Army service is prohibited from taking this qualification? CEO—I don't know what views the Department take in the matter of military service but I think there would be a possibility of his appointment in a temporary capacity.

Mr J McGrath—Hadm't teachers to be actually teaching at the time they took out this qualification. Of these details he felt that the case referred to should be re-investigated as the applicant was in dire need of assistance. The Superintendent Assistance Officer said that the income in this case was from Old Age Pension and wages of a County Council worker. Mr Kyne said that there was also a dependent and pointed out that the wages of a County Council worker are not enough. Mr Phelan, S.A.O.—It is not the job of this Board to subsidise the wages of County Council workers. Mr Kyne—I feel that any case where there is a dependent is entitled to assistance but I am afraid the views of councillors get little consideration.

Tragic Death Of Master Pat Begley, Dungarvan

THIRD ARTICLE
Extracts from special Correspondent of the Cork Examiner dated 3rd May 1847 Concerning his visit to the Ballysaggart Estate.

He wrote "A short time after leaving Lismore I met groups of intelligent and apparently well-to-do people who were the holders of land coming into town for the purpose of procuring a little meal to support their starving families. From these I learned that the work of extermination was proceeding a short distance further on and that the demolition of houses was daily occurring. Some of these women told me with tears in their eyes that their houses had been razed to the ground and themselves and their families compelled to sleep during the night under the open sky. Others mentioned that they had been induced by the promise of a few pounds to assist in the work of demolition, and when the money had been destroyed the money was withheld. Arriving at Ballysaggart more an awful sight was before my eyes. I found twelve foreign houses standing on the ground. The walls of a few were still standing but the roofs were torn off the windows broken in and the doors removed. Groups of famished women and crying children strolled round the place of their birth. Endeavouring to find shelter from the piercing cold of the mountain blast covering near by I entered a small refuge beneath the chimneys."

I entered the dismantled house of a man named John Walsh, a man who farmed 32 acres of land. He had been ejected for arrears of rent. About three weeks since the steward of Mr Usher demanded rent but through the late famine years he was unable to meet the demand. He begged for a little time but the agent was inexorable and down the house must come. Walsh told me the agent promised him £5 for the unroofed house and he assisted in the removal of the walls. Neither submission nor entreaty could avert the decree of the landlord and the poor farmer at last consented to despoil the only shelter that his family possessed and the only refuge in the neighbourhood they could hope to obtain for the landlord. I was informed that he had threatened his heaviest displeasure on any other shelter being gathered for one night to any family evicted from their own homes. Driven by cold and hunger this poor family consisting of Walsh and his sister and ten children had been ejected from their home and were now in the neighbourhood they could hope to obtain for the landlord. During the extent of my journey taking in over twenty miles the principal portion of which lay through Ballysaggart and adjoining districts all the land was entirely deserted by its inhabitants. As far as the eye could reach there was no sign of activity neither man nor horse, neither sowing nor reaping preparatory work to be observed. The only life to be seen were famished children and women around the ruins of their cabins and men wending their lonely way through the roads. They were more seeking what food they could get for their dependents. I inquired of a man who was leaning idly against a hedge how it happened that he was surrounded by the ruins. He had a few fields cultivated but could get no seed. He had applied to the landlord to help him to get seed but the answer he received was to give up the land and go about your business.

"Such is the case with hundreds of tenants on the mountain lands of Ballysaggart and adjoining districts at the present time. If the poor farmers could be supplied with seed oats, wheat or rye were they able to keep a cow or horse or some sheep they would be able to meet the demand for rent and support their families. But now all are gone. The cow the horse the wearing apparel the furniture and the bed-clothes were pawned to support existence. Fifteen or sixteen once fairly comfortable homes have been levelled and while the writing is being done the steward and his bailiffs are on Monday next preparing the same fate for all tenants unable to meet the demand for rent."

"As I have been informed the whole tenantry, amounting with their families to over 700 persons on the Ballysaggart Estate were prevented from selling their tenants' goods when it was not worth taking when according
