Waterford Board Of Public Assistance

Public Inquiry Into Administration of Co. Home Suggested By Mr Kyne

Case Of Man Who Was Refused Admission.

Mr P Caulfield Chairman presided at the monthly meeting of the Co Waterford Board of Public Assistance at Dungarvan on Tuesday last.

Messrs W Kennelly MI McGrath T A Kyne T Duggan J Butler and Mr M Morrissey TD were present.

Mr S J Moylan Co Manager and Mr M Flynn Secretary attended.

Information Required

Arising out of the minutes Mr Kyne said he would like to have information firstly concerning the suggested report of the city members on the visiting days at the Co Hospital and secondly on the case which was refused home assistance referred to at the last meeting and finally about the provision of an Aga Cooker at the Co Home Dungarvan.

The Manager Stated

that the question of the Aga Cooker had been referred to the County Surveyor and report on the total cost including installation which facts will be placed before the members when available.

A report from Mr M Pheasant Supt Assistant Officer on the case referred to by Mr Kyne from the Lismore area who was refused home assistance stated that such refusal was made as there was no sign of destitution and the income to the house was £2 14s 6d.

Mr Kyne said that

did not agree and the Manager pointed out that there were other very large families with an income of £2 14s 6d.

Mr O'Connor said that he was surprised that the Manager should take as an example the small wages paid to agricultural workers and being stuck to beat down the present rate.

After further discussion

on the full aspects of the case the Manager stated that he would have the case re-investigated.

Mr O'Connor dealing with the report made by the Matron of the Co Hospital Waterford concerning the refusal to admit visitors on Christmas day said that the excuse given that there was a grave abuse of privileges by giving excessive stimulants to patients was entirely untrue.

Mr Pheasant—It could happen

Mr Kyne—Is there anything we could do to help the position of Mr Pheasant? There was a Local Government Inspector here recently and he discussed this problem with him.

Mr Morrissey—I wonder how many pairs were short in Dungarvan?

Mr Kyne—I have a case of a family of five.

Mr Morrissey—I wonder

would it be possible to exchange the vouchers for other articles that could not be done.

In reply to a further question on the matter by Mr Butler the Secretary stated that he felt sure that those with vouchers at present were all right.

Call For Public Inquiry

Mr Kyne—About three weeks ago an inmate of the Co Hospital Waterford was transferred to the Co Home at Dungarvan but on arrival there he was refused admission. This man came to me and I sent him to the Relieving Officer who gave him a ticket of admission. He went to the Co Home with this but was again refused. He came back and met Mr Butler who wrote something on the back of the ticket and he again went to the Co Home but was again refused admission. This man had slept out for 2 nights and then he came to me on the following Friday when after seeing the Manager and phoning Mr Flynn and others I succeeded in getting him in at 6 o'clock in the evening. I did like to know why the man was refused admission in the first instance and then admitted.

Manager—Mr Kyne came

to me and I told him I would look into the matter and later the man was admitted. The matron has made a report on the matter.

The Secretary then read the matron's report which stated that the man in question whose name was Lonergan was an able-bodied man who had been an inmate of the Co Home for over 12 years. She wanted to discourage these types as inmates and that was the reason for the action taken by her. She stated that due to laziness this man will not work although offered work as attendant at Lismore and Waterford Hospitals. As a result of the action taken by her he now works on the farm although before he would not think of catching any kind of farm implement in his hand.

Mr Kyne—Is the matron the responsible person to be admitted to the Co Home?

Secretary—Well she is on the spot there.

Mr Kyne—That does not bear out the instructions on the ticket (Continued on Page Four)

Secretary—The driver gets

15/- and he is supposed to look after all and provide lunch for them.

Mr Duggan—There were five in the ambulance that day.

Mr O'Connor—15/- among five is not much.

Mr Kyne—The driver gets 15/- irrespective of the number?

Secretary—Yes.

Mr Butler—What happens about lunch when patients go to Waterford?

Secretary—They get something to eat there.

Mr Butler—I'm afraid they don't.

Secretary—Well it's their own fault and don't it offered to them?

Mr Butler—Is it offered to them?

Secretary—Yes, the matron told me so but some prefer to go down the town shopping.

Mr O'Connor—Are they told before leaving that a meal is available?

Secretary—They are all aware of it.

Mr Kyne—I know of a case of two young boys of less than ten years who were sent to Waterford for examination for suspected TB and their mother was refused permission to travel with them. There was no provision made for a meal for them and there was no one there to help to cook and dress them and they had to stand in a draughty passage for an hour!

Secretary—These boys were only away 2 or 3 hours.

Mr Kyne—They were little more than infants and there was no one to look after them.

Co Manager—A boy of ten should be able to dress himself.

Mr Kyne—I doubt it. The thing is that supervision is lax. Mr Duggan has made a statement today which is not believable.

Manager—It was the first we heard of it and we must investigate it.

Mr Kyne—A lot of things have been happening and these are only following on the trail of other things that have happened before.

Attendant At Co Home

Mr Duggan asked for an attendant who had worked for the past 30 or 40 years at the Co Home Co-Operative Ltd. Dungarvan was entitled to any pension.

Secretary—These are only temporary positions and are not pensionable.

Mr Kyne—Having worked for 40 years and still being only temporary! This is a terrible state of affairs.

After further discussion it was decided to commend to the Manager that all such appointments should in future be made permanent.

FATAL ACCIDENT WHILE UNLOADING BOAT

Inquest Proceedings

On Monday last March 18th a fatal accident occurred when Patrick Keohan (42) married labourer of Abbeyside who was employed with a number of men discharging a cargo of slag from the Mr Harry Smeenge for the Co-Op Creamery Ltd. Dungarvan fell from the Quay into the water below. The injuries which he received in the fall later proved fatal.

Evidence of Identification

William Keohan, Cathal Brugha Place brother of the deceased gave evidence of identification and said that deceased was aged 42 years married and had one child. He lived alone at Abbeyside with his wife and child in England.

Medical Evidence

Dr M Casey stated "I examined Patrick Keohan at about 12.10 p.m. on Monday 18th March. He was bleeding from the right nostril and ear and had an incised wound of the scalp above the right ear. He had difficulty in breathing. I performed a post mortem examination and found a longitudinal fracture about 2 long in the middle cranial fossa of the right side. He had a T shaped incised wound in the scalp and the lungs contained water. In my opinion death was due to shock and partial asphyxia. The shock was in part due to fracture of the skull and hemorrhage of the brain and the temporary emersion in the sea.

PARISH OF LISMORE AND BALLYDUFF

Graphic Story Of Famine Period

CAPTAIN BARRY'S ESTATE

On the property of Captain Barry the same poverty and destitution prevail as that among the tenants of Mr Ussher. It is true no houses have been tumbled down but a system instituted by the Captain nearly as bad has been put into operation. The difficulties and losses of his tenants specially of late months made them part with their stock house-hold furniture and everything that could be converted into money in order to buy food for their households. Many finding themselves unable to buy seed for the land they had prepared applied to the Captain for assistance. He gave each a trifling sum in compensation for giving possession of their land to them. They were obliged to accept to supply the present cravings of their hungry families. Numbers are being quietly got rid of in this way with nothing before them later but beggary and destitution.

MR WOOD'S BALLYDUFF

The tenantry of Benjamin Wood and Brothers of Cork City who own some 5,000 acres which include the village of Ballyduff are in no better or worse state than those on the Ballysagartmore Estate. Not prevented by the destitution and absolute hunger of many poor tenants on his estate Mr Wood sent his agent about fortnight since when the relief act came into operation to ask the Lismore-Ballyduff Committee that they should not afford relief to any of his tenants who had possession of houses and land. This suggestion was scouted by the kind-hearted Chairman Sir Richard Musgrave who said it would directly contravene the Act of Parliament and effectually annihilate these poor people. Such a system if carried out would undoubtedly be an excellent plan for Mr Ussher and similarly disposed landlords to get rid of their tenants who are now considered but as mere incumbrances. Mr Wood was understood Mr Chanley who came before Sir Richard Musgrave and the Very Rev Parish Priest at the Ballyduff Committee Board.

The Chanley Estate—The report continues

There is another landlord in this neighbourhood Mr Chanley whose conduct of his estate deserves the highest praise. Besides giving land on his mountain property free of rent for the first twenty years of the lease he has this year supplied several hundred barrels of oats and barley to all whose poverty prevented them from purchasing seed. What a contrast this is to the conduct of other landlords of which I have already given the generosity and kindly charity of Mr Chanley is here recorded and should be remembered.

Chairman—Will he be eligible

for the position of C.E.O.—I don't know.

Fear Mor—I think he will and I second Mr Butler's proposal. I am very disappointed Mr Cullen has not been appointed as chairman and I think that a temporary chairman should be appointed to believe the qualifications held by Mr Cullen—native Irish speaker, University graduate and member of the Defence Forces.

Mr Butler—When I called on them I was given no hope but was told that a very hope he would be appointed to the temporary position.

Mr Kyne held that as Mr Cullen's appointment had been turned down the Committee should not appoint anyone and force the Department's hand. He wondered if they were really serious about what they said about giving jobs to members of the Defence Forces.

Mr Chanley—We have done everything possible.

Mr Kyne—We need not appoint anyone.

Finally the proposition appointing Mr Chanley to the permanent position and Mr Cullen to the temporary position was passed. Mr Kyne dissenting.

Caretaker's Wages

After a discussion on the wages of the caretaker it was agreed to have Mr P Lynch Dungarvan and Mr T Fives Cappoquin put on the scale instead of paying them a stablised wage.

It was also decided on Mr Kyne's suggestion to award a 5% increase to Mrs Bonner.

I V E A Congress

Mechanical Training

Mr Morrissey said that he understood that the engine used for teaching pupils in the Engineering Department was obsolete and suggested the purchase of a modern Ford engine.

Scholarships in Farmery

The C.E.O informed the members that concerning the scholarships in Farmery and Smithwork two applicants had submitted to the practical examination at the National Ballinacorney and Patrick Vaughan Lismore. Both had been passed by the Department.

As arranged the applicants then appeared before the meeting for interview and the members expressed themselves as thoroughly satisfied with the candidates who were described as ideal types for the scholarship. It was decided to award two scholarships subject to the Department's approval.

Correspondence

A letter from the Department dealing with the question of the confirmation of the appointment of Miss C O Gorman Domestic Economy II student and the award of her first increment stated that the Minister regretted he was unable to alter his decision already given.

Another letter notified the Committee that Miss Maureen Tobin Ballymacorney and Miss Mary Reilly Currannean Stradbally had been selected for training in Hotel work at Courtown House Co Wexford.

Local Government and Public Health stated that he was not prepared to approve of the addition of years for superannuation purposes in the case of Mr P O Muladh.

Appointment of Irish Teacher

A further letter from the Department stated that the Minister was unable to alter his decision and that the appointment of Mr M S Cullen as whole-time Irish teacher. The latter requested the Committee to proceed with the appointment from the list of qualified candidates.

Mr Butler—This is the second time that the appointment has been refused and I feel that another effort will be a waste of time and I think that we should proceed with the appointment of a qualified man. One of the remaining applicants is a member of our county and a local man who is an excellent teacher. Mr Fahy and I propose him. If his appointment is sanctioned which it should be automatically a county wide position for a temporary or short-time position. I think we should appoint Mr Cullen to that.
