DEATH OF MR JEROME GUIRY It is with very sincere regret that we announce the death of Mr Jerome Guiry Park Terrace Dungarvan which occurred at the District Hospital Dungarvan on Thursday evening last April 25th.

OUR WATERFORD LETTER Visit Of Mr Sean Lemass—Mr Sean Lemass, Minister for Industry and Commerce arrived in Waterford at 4 p.m on Wednesday April 24th, when he was received by the Directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their headquarters in O'Connell St. After a brief address of welcome by Mr S Morris President Mr Lemass was conducted on a tour of inspection of the Chamber of Commerce Buildings. Subsequently he motored to Tramore where he was entertained to dinner in the Grand Hotel. The members of the Chamber of Commerce and Harbour Board numbering one hundred attended the function. Aid Kennedy Mayor was also one of the guests.

OUR WATERFORD LETTER (Continued) No Deputation Received—The visit of Mr Lemass had no party significance. He came to Waterford at the invitation of the local Chamber of Commerce to talk on purely trade and industrial concerns. It was understood that some leading city firms were anxious to have deputations wait on the Minister regarding the removal of certain restrictions on their industries but an intimation was given to intend to meet any deputations while in Waterford. This Minster's visit on April 24th and 25th was a very important one. An Old Established Premises Demolished—I noticed this week that the tradesman employed by Mr Michael Hayes Contractor Scotch Quay were engaged pulling down the old-established premises of Fahey's Patrick Street, where tallow-dip candles and clay pipes were manufactured for over a century. The premises had got into such a dilapidated condition that the re-construction was out of the question hence the need for demolition. The premises were purchased by Messrs O'Brien The Model Bakeries Patrick Street and that well-known firm intend to build an elaborate addition to their establishment. The Tallow Dip Had Great Curative Properties—The tallow-dips which were made by Fahey's of Patrick Street recall the old times before gas electricity or even paraffin oil were used for illuminating the homes of the people. Our great-grandfathers lighted their dwellings with the dimly burning tallow dip or rush candles. I think that Fahey's were the last firm in Ireland to manufacture the dip candles. The tallow dip has great curative properties for eye troubles and chest ailments. A few applications of the tallow dip (when slightly heated) removed the most stubborn sty from the eyelashes. Waterford Greyhound Racing Track—The Management of The Waterford Greyhound Racing Track are offering The May Stakes for 24 greyhounds at £2 each that have raced on the Waterford Track during the 1946 season and that have not recorded under 31.00. The winner will be awarded £50 the second £15 and the third £25. The first three in each heat qualify for succeeding rounds.

It is understood amongst members of public bodies in Enniscorthy that a councillor dies who belongs to a particular party, the course followed is to co-opt the same party. I am informed that a representative of the Fine Gael Party of which the late Mr Cunningham was a member will be co-opted to the vacant seat.

CARRICK NEWS Bonus For Carrick Workers—The activities of Carrick-on-Suir Branch A & G.W.U. and their officials Messrs Gilbert Lynch, Dublin and J Norris Carrick-on-Suir local Secretary have secured the full bonus 15/- a week for members in Carrick-on-Suir. The local U.D. workers have been given a further 5/- a week bringing their wages to 58/- a week. The local Tannery (Plunder & Pollock) have provided a social service scheme from which male workers when ill get 25/- a week and female workers £1 per week with medicine and medical treatment. This is in addition to National Health Insurance benefits.
