SUMMER GRASS IN WINTER During the Emergency years the production of milk and butter decreased, largely because of the lack of protein in winter feeding. Protein, which is an essential food constituent for milk production and for healthy growth of young stock, is usually associated in farmers' minds with imported oil cakes. This is a mistaken idea. Of the home-produced foods grass is the chief source of protein and summer grazing provides a complete food for dairy cows and young stock. If grass is cut when young and made into silage it suffers no loss in feeding value. Silage fed in winter replaces oilcakes as a source of protein and gives increased winter milk production. A properly constructed silo is necessary to get the best results from the production of silage. Full information is available in the Department's Leaflet No 105.
