Local Publican Fined

Assault At Plots.

Plaintiff Was Aggressor Says DJ

Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr Eamonn O'Riain DJ on Tuesday last. Wholesale Beer Licenses Renewals of above were granted to Messrs P Power, R. Merry and M J Keane and to Mr M Whelan. Publican Fined Supt. P O Mahony charged Mrs Briquet Green Publican The Square with breach of the licensing laws at 11.15 p.m. on Saturday night March 30th. Three local men found on the premises were also summoned. Mr Kenny Solr for defendant admitted the offence. The Superintendent said that on March 30th at 11.15 p.m. Sergt Liddane with Guards Begley and Straine visited Green's public house and found three local men there having a drink. Mr Kenny Solr said that the premises were look-up premises and the owner was not there at the time. The men found there were personal friends of the publican and had come in earlier for a drink and as the assistant was cleaning up after the week they stayed on chatting to her and were there when the Guards came in. The house he said had a great record. The Superintendent said that what Mr Kenny said was quite correct but the Guards do not visit these houses by chance and he said that Mrs Green would be well advised to pay more attention to closing hours or else they would pay more attention to her. The Justice imposed a fine of £1 on the publican and 5/- on each of the three men. Unlicensed Dog The adjoining case of John Dujopy, Killyrosser who was summoned by Guard Farrell for having an unlicensed dog was marked P O A when Mr Morrissey Solr for defendant produced a license which had been taken out since last Court. Unlicensed Cycles Guard M. Cowan v Martin Browne Ballyvoile fined 2/6 Do v Kevin Egan Ballymacmague fined 2/6 and 1/- Guard Straine v Thos Kiely Kilbrien Ballinamulh fined 5/- Motoring Offence James Wherry Curragh Ballylunan Athy was summoned by Guard Curtin for driving a motor car at Dungarvan without rear lights or for which there was no insurance in force. Mr Morrissey Solr defended. Guard Curtin admitted to Mr Morrissey that the defendant said he thought the lights were lighted as they were when he started. Dealing with the question of the insurance Mr Morrissey said that the defendant had bought the car before he had an insurance in his name which was not officially transferred but which he thought covered him. Justice—If an accident occurred he would not be covered and it is only Providence that it did not. Mr Morrissey said that the insurance had now been officially transferred. The Justice gave the defendant the benefit of the P O A in the lights summons and fined him £1 in the case of insurance. Larceny Of Timber Thomas Flynn Coolnagour summoned William Byrne 68 Loughmore for cutting and growing trees on his land on May 21st. Mr Williams Solr for plaintiff said that Mr Flynn had been very good to the poor of Dungarvan all during the emergency by allowing them to take timber from his land, but on this occasion he found Byrne cutting the timber in front of the house and taking the beauty of the lawn. He did not want any damages but only wanted to have this thing stopped. Mr Morrissey Solr for defendant admitted the offence and gave an undertaking that his client would not do so again. The Justice imposed a fine of 1/- and allowed 15/- costs. P O A The adjourned cases against Michael Dunne Walsh, Tone Road and Francis Walsh, 22 Loughmore for the larceny of a number of oranges from Mr J Lynch's Store at the Quay were marked P O A when it was stated that defendants had paid compensation. A similar summons against Patrick O'Brien Loughmore was adjourned to the next court to allow him to pay compensation. Larceny Of Timber from Carriglea Convent on May 21st. Defendants pleaded guilty. Superintendent said that these two boys had been found in Carriglea taking firewood. He said that the nuns were anxious to keep trespassers off the grounds as patients use them. out permission. Having warned the parents of the boys to keep them away from these lands in future and stating that substantial fines would be imposed in all future cases as pliers of this type must be stopped the Justice applied the P O A.

A Fracas At The Plots
Thomas Egan 45 Loughmore summoned 16 year old William CroTTY 40 Loughmore for unlawfully assaulting and beating him on the head and shoulder with a shovel at Killyrosser on April 22nd.

Mr J F Kenny Solr was for plaintiff and Mr P J Morrissey Solr defended.

Thomas Egan plaintiff said that he was in the plot at 22nd He had 1/2 cwt of artificial manure and divided it into two bags. He left about two stone in a bag at the end and went down to the other end and when he came back he could not find it. He inquired from those in the field if they saw it but no one could tell him. He saw CroTTY and Jones there and CroTTY went away for a while.

"When he came back" said witness I asked him why he took the super and he said he did not and I said I could not repeat here. I said you did you little tipper, and he said you can not prove it. He had some in his hand and rose to hit me but I struck him a box in the ear and when he rose it again I hit him a second time. Young Egan then ran up to CroTTY and said "wig don't you knock the heat off him" and then CroTTY hit me as hard as he could in the back and the side of the head. I made a drive at him but my son who had some in the meadow stopped me. I made a complaint to the Guards later.

Replying to further questions witness said that he is always trouble at the plots with young CroTTY. Witness grows potatoes and vegetables in his plot but they only grow weeds. Morrissey—You accused CroTTY of hitting you?—Yes. And he denied it?—Yes. Didn't anyone else deny it too?—Yes.

Wasn't it mere chance you picked on CroTTY?—No. You were in a violent temper at the time?—I was not I never lose my temper. Didn't you strike him?—Yes. Were you abusive and threatening?—No. Wasn't CroTTY crying when you hit him?—I don't know. Didn't you hear him bring your father out and I'll do the same to him?—No.

Haven't you great enmity for the CroTTYs?—No. He struck me because you beat him and kicked him?—No. Didn't your son come up to you and say—leave him alone and that you should be ashamed of your son today?—He is gone away.

Isn't your son Billie working in the Leather factory?—Oh he is but he didn't see it.

Didn't he have a great sympathy for CroTTY?—No. Aren't you very troublesome?—No.

When you employed as a chucker by the G.A.A. at the Gaelic field?—Yes. Because you're cross?—No. They only employ honest people. CroTTY stole your manure why didn't you report it to the Guards?—I couldn't at the time sir it was two miles out.

Guard Begley gave evidence of receiving a complaint from Lee on April 22nd and it was the same story as he heard in court. Lee showed him a bump at the back of the left ear which was the right shoulder at the back of the head. Lee understood from Lee on that occasion that another part of the field and had not been stolen.

Liam Jones giving evidence for the defence said that he was working at his plot in the same field as the one in which Lee and CroTTY was helping him. Lee went up to the headland and said witness and when he came back he said "did you take my super and I said no" and he said "I'll give you a kick in the back—if you touch it again."

Later Lee came over and hit CroTTY three slaps. He hurt CroTTY with the shovel he had to keep Lee away and when Lee took the shovel CroTTY ran and hit him by the heel and then kicked him in the back and hit him with his fists. Lee's son Billie came along and lifted young CroTTY up from the ground and carried him up the field. When Lee came back he came over and said to me "you wouldn't come over and separate us you humpy."

Replying to Mr Kenny who cross-examined witness said he saw everything that happened. He did not see who moved the super.

The Justice Jones said that CroTTY went to the plot with him and was not away at any time.

Patrick Flynn who was also in the field at the time said that he saw no one take the super. When Lee asked him he told him he saw it near Jones' bag of spuds and he went down and got it. CroTTY was not there then and when he came back Lee accused him of taking the super and there was a squabble. He saw Lee attack CroTTY who ran into a thick hedge of briars

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Views Of Our Readers

(To the Editor)

A CHALLENGE

To Declan M Goode, Esq Secretary Waterford County Board G A A Dungarvan

A Chara—I have been instructed by the members of the Erin's Own Club to issue to you, and through you to the County Board and Selection Committee an OPEN CHALLENGE to the Waterford County Senior Hurling team as at present constituted to meet our Club senior team (with E Carew B Hoban T Treacy and J Murphy) at the Waterford Gaelic Field on a date to be arranged the proceeds of the match to be devoted to that very deserving object—The Ballybricken New Church Building Fund.

My Club's decision to issue this challenge has been influenced to a very great extent by the exceptionally poor display given by the Waterford Junior Hurling team in their game against Limerick at Tipperary. The mediocrity of that display is further reflected in the fact that as we are now informed Limerick have decided to drop out of Tipperary by 2-1 to 1-1 and another match against their County on that occasion. What chance then it may well be asked did Waterford have? There are also present to our minds the equally unimpressive if not lamentable exhibitions of the hurling code provided by our senior county sides in their recent matches against Limerick and Cork. The standard set up on all three occasions certainly does little to bring credit to our native county and my club feels that if drastic and effective steps are not taken immediately to pick a selection truly representative of Waterford for the forthcoming Munster Senior Hurling Championship the same sad story will have to be told.

Why should this be so? My Club's contention is that the remedy lies in our own hands and its members are of the unanimous opinion that in the acceptance by you of the Challenge now that we have a safe and sound means of drawing attention to the important position of the hurling code in the present deplorable position of our county in the hurling sphere. The Club's members are of the simple opinion that they propose that at the conclusion of the Challenge game (to which of course the members of the Selection Committee will be invited) the team to represent the County in senior ranks should be selected from the players on view. The Committee my Club is constituted to choose from the material to choose from and the experiment it is felt would more than justify itself in every particular.

In an event they would like to take this opportunity of demanding to know what is wrong with Erin's Own or why there should be such bitterness against the Club? Why they should be asked to bring our players who have proved their worth in many a hard-fought struggle and who have kept the flag of hurling proudly aloft for the past years to be constantly ignored? They have set a headline for the game which has won them the unbounded admiration of all true lovers of our national pastime and yet recognition is denied them. Again they ask—why? Is it not about time they say that for the betterment of the game and the honour of the County petty differences should be cast aside and that the game and those who play it should be the first consideration? If the County Board and Selection Committee are of the opinion that a position to field at the moment was considered good enough to give the Wexford County selection to meet Kilkenny in the Leinster Championship and Dicksboro' which defeated Eire Oge the Kilkenny County champions recent successful try-outs surely they should be considered good enough to meet the present Waterford selection?

Is it not time that Waterford woke up? Away with favouritism and all that that obnoxious term connotes? Select the best side to represent Waterford from ALL the material available and make the name of the Suirside County ring throughout the Four Provinces.

You have our challenge.

An now Mr O'Donoghue County Board delegates and members of the Selection Committee what do you intend to do about it?
