- Cutting at the right time i.e. when the hay is in full flower but still in a green sappy state When cut at a later stage the hay contains a high percentage of indigestible woody fibre giving greater bulk but less feeding value
- 2 Avoiding unnecessary handling and exposure to weather in saving. These result in loss of protein and vitamins which are associated with well-made hay in which the green colouring matter is preserved
- 3 Removing to the haggard as soon as the hay is fit for storing and thatching the rick if a hay barn is not available. Exposure to wet weather causes loss during storage
