WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL ANNUAL MEETING

Chairman And Vice-Chairman Re-elected Unanimously.

The Annual Meeting of the County Council of Waterford was held in the Town Clerk's Office, Dungarvan, on Tuesday last, 25th of June.

The Minutes

Arising out of the minutes of the last meeting, Mr. Kyne asked if he would be in order to ask some questions.

Election Of Chairman And Vice-Chairman

Mr. Norris proposed that the outgoing Chairman and Vice-Chairman be re-elected and the proposition was seconded by Mr. M. O'Riordan and passed unanimously.

Fixation Of Dates Of Quarterly Meetings

The quarterly meetings were fixed as follows:—1st meeting—12th August 1946; 2nd meeting—11th November 1946; 3rd meeting—10th February 1947; 4th meeting—12th May, 1947.

Do Councils' General Council

Arising out of the items for the agenda of the annual meeting of the above, the Chairman said something should be done as regards by-roads, cul-de-sacs and boherens which were causing a lot of hardship and expense to farmers in various districts in the county.

After a long discussion on

the matter the Chairman stated that it was impossible to get men to work on the Rural Improvement schemes as the wages offered by the Board of Works for work done under such schemes was only 3s. per week.

not be got to do any of the necessary work under this heading.

The Secretary informed Mr. O'Riordan that the Department have given very generous grants for County Roads and had substantially increased the grants for this purpose.

Mr. O'Riordan raised the matter of the Labour Courts in the recent white paper issued by the Government which puts Council workers on a different category from the ordinary worker.

Mr. O'Riordan mentioned the number of by-roads due for repair and asked was there going to be anything done about them.

The Chairman said that the Minister is not prepared to give any compulsory powers to carry out repairs on by-roads and cul-de-sacs but the farmers concerned should come to some agreement whereby by-roads and places could be put into a fair state of repair.

Mr. O'Riordan said it was very hard on those people who were anxious to repair by-roads and something should be done about the matter.

Mr. Morrissey said they should ask for compulsory powers to carry out repairs to by-roads.

After some further discussion an order was made asking the Minister to grant compulsory powers to carry out repairs to cul-de-sacs and roads where reasonable objections from residents exist.

Labourers' Cottages Plots

The Secretary gave a full return of the cottages with half-acre plots in the County.

Mr. Barron—How many cottages are there in the County altogether?

Mr. Flynn—About 2,500.

Mr. O'Riordan said that some of the cottages were in a very bad state of repair and are very badly kept.

Mr. Walsh proposed that where application is made for an extra half-acre for a cottage that it be granted.

Mr. Butler suggested striking out a general scheme for the whole county regarding the extra half-acre.

Mr. O'Riordan said that some of the small farms and it would be unjust to take any further land from these farmers and this is a matter that should be carefully considered before any scheme is decided on.

The Council after further discussion decided to grant the additional half-acre to those who applied for it.

Mr. Morrissey asked how many cottages were tenanted but not occupied.

Mr. Flynn said it would be difficult to answer that question as the Board has always had a certain amount of difficulty in proving this matter.

Mr. Kyne said that some rents are sent by post but from local knowledge the collectors should be in a position to find out the number of cottages not occupied.

Mr. O'Riordan said that it was a matter for the County Council officials and not for the members of the Council.

The Chairman agreed with Mr. Flynn that it was a very difficult matter to find out when cottages are tenanted and unoccupied.

Mr. Kyne said he knew of an instance where two cottages were held by one person.

Mr. Flynn—That is not possible.



CORPUS CHRISTI PROCESSION Dungarvan Pays Homage To King Of Kings

The Annual Eucharistic Procession took place through the streets of Dungarvan on Sunday last under ideal weather conditions.

Facilities Already Adequate

A letter from the Department of Agriculture has been received stating that the facilities already being afforded to residents in the mountainous areas of the county under the Committee's Lime Schemes are adequate and that he could not see his way to agree to those Schemes being modified, and also stating that the Committee's resolution regarding the provision of a subsidy towards the purchase of mountain and other poor land had been noted.

Lime Burning

The Department's letter states that representation has been made to the Department of Industry and Commerce in the matter of granting increased allowances of culm to the Knockaloe Co-Operative Creamery Ltd for the purpose of lime burning.

Appointment Approved

A letter was read intimating the approval of the proposed appointment of the committee of Miss Mary Mullins M.D. to the position of temporary instructor in Poultry-keeping and Butter-making.

Farm Scholarship Awarded

The Department has announced the proposal of the Committee to award a fourth scholarship in the boys section and also approving of the proposal to de-fray the cost of an additional scholarship from the funds provided for Scholarships for Girls for which only three candidates competed and qualified.

Potato Sprayers

Messrs. Philip Greer & Co. Ltd and The Wexford Engineering Co. Ltd wrote referring to the resolution of the Committee adopted at their last meeting regarding the purchase of a portable horse-drawn Potato Sprayer on an equitable basis.

No Funds

Waterford City Guild Muintir na Tire wrote enquiring whether a grant could be made by the committee towards the expenses of the Horticultural and Farm Produce Show which is proposed to be held at Waterford on the 5th September 1946.

Scholarships

Patrick J. O'Conner Faha-keela Kilmacthomas who qualified for one of the committee's scholarships wrote stating that he was not prepared to avail of the scholarship.

Wheat Prices

The following resolution was proposed by Mr Heskin and seconded by Mr Fives: That we the members of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture strongly protest against the policy of the Department of Industry and Commerce in compelling wheat growers to dispose of wheat not of milling quality to millers at a price of 27/- per barrel when growers can dispose of same wheat at current prices for feeding.

Loans To Farmers

Mr Barron moved and Mr Fives seconded the following resolution which was also passed unanimously: That we the members of the Waterford County Committee of Agriculture urge the Board of the Agricultural Credit Corporation to extend the repayment period on loans for the purchase of Farm Machinery and Tractors. We recommend that the repayment period be extended from five years as at present to ten years in order to encourage farmers to procure up-to-date machinery.

Grants for Potato Sprayers

Mr John Barron Knockeen Tramore a selected applicant in connection with the Committee's Scheme of Grants towards the purchase of horse-drawn Potato Sprayers wrote stating that he had purchased a portable barrel-type sprayer at a cost of £15 5s 0d and stating that this was the only type of sprayer available to him.

Other Resolutions

The following resolutions received from the County Carlow Committee of Agriculture were adopted: That for the purpose of raising Agricultural Wages to a level more comparable with Great Britain all tax on the raw material of the agricultural industry (i.e. raw wool) should be removed.

"That we strongly protest against the system which permits such a low price as from 1/2 to 1/4 for raw wool to Irish wool producers and finished articles manufactured from wool are commanding such exorbitant prices.

The following resolution from the County Wick Committee of Agriculture was also adopted: That we the Members of the County Wick Committee of Agriculture urge the Minister for Agriculture to reduce this year and we also ask the Minister to receive a deputation to discuss the matter."

Alleged Fraud On Co Council

SEQUEL TO SPECIAL SEEDS SCHEME

Although this is a small case it is a fairly important one in an agricultural community said Mr J A D Arcy, B.L., when (instructed by Mr D R Counahan State Solicitor), he opened the case for the prosecution at the Waterford Circuit Court before Judge Sealy, on Monday last in which a farmer named Thomas Molumphy, who was stated to ordinarily reside at Raspberry Hill Ballyduff Upper was charged on two counts with alleged forgery and false pretences.

The particulars of the offences as set out in the indictment were—

(1) Uttering a forged document contrary to the Forgery Act 1913 in that the accused on a date unknown in April 1943 uttered a certain forged guarantee purporting to be a joint guarantee by one James McCarthy and another for the payment of money to the Waterford Co Council knowing that the said guarantee insofar as it purported to be a guarantee by the said James McCarthy to be forged and with intent to defraud.

(2) Alleged obtaining of credit contrary to the Debtors Act 1869 in that the accused by incurring a debt or liability to the Waterford Co Council obtained credit from the said Council by false pretences or means of fraud other than by false pretences.

The accused who was defended by Mr G Clarke (instructed by Messrs Farrell & Morrissey Dungarvan) pleaded not guilty to both counts and a jury was sworn to try the issue.

Acquitted

By direction of His Lordship on the first count and by the jury on the second the accused was found not guilty and was discharged.

Special Seeds Scheme

Outlining the facts Mr Darcy said that both charges arose out of the same set of circumstances. In the year 1943 the Waterford Co Council operated a scheme in regard to seeds and fertilisers about which some of the farmers on the jury would know more than he did. The general purport of the scheme was that the Council helped farmers to buy seeds and the way the scheme operated was that if the farmer required the money to do so he applied to the Co Council for a certain amount of seeds in the early spring and the Council issued to him a form under which he undertook to pay back the money so advanced when the harvest had been saved and sold.

Two Sureties

The undertaking counsel went on to explain had to be signed by two sureties as a guarantee that the money would be repaid. In the present case Molumphy applied to the Co Council in the ordinary way for his facility in March 1943 and he subsequently procured from a seed merchant named Mr Barry of Mitchelstown 80 stones of seed wheat 98 stones of seed oats and 32 stones of seed barley.

Rate Collector's Approval

The form when received by Molumphy had Mr D Arcy said to be filled in by himself and two sureties of which the rate collector approved. The accused did sign the form himself and he made one of his sureties a man named Edmund Joyce who also signed it. The other name which appeared on the guarantee was that of James McCarthy and the State case was that the latter never signed it and that the accused must have known that the signature was a forgery.

Counsel continuing said the amount involved was £30 11s which sum was paid to Mr Barry for the seeds. The entire amount would at the end of the harvest have to be repaid by the accused to the Co Council but he only paid back about £20 leaving the balance outstanding.

Mr D Arcy emphasised that the scheme was intended by the Council only as a help for farmers and it was not intended to give them a present of the money. For that reason he said the Council issued civil proceedings against James McCarthy for the recovery of the balance outstanding and the latter would tell them that the receipt by him of the civil bill was the first he had ever heard that he had signed his name to the guarantee. As a result of a complaint the matter was investigated and it was then discovered that quite obviously the signature appearing on the guarantee and purporting to be that of

James McCarthy, was not his signature and McCarthy himself would tell them in evidence that he never signed or knew anything about the guarantee.

Assistant Secretary's Evidence
Detailed particulars of the seed and fertiliser scheme was given by Mr T B Boyle, Assistant Secretary Waterford Co Council who also bore out counsel's statement in regard to the accused's application to benefit thereunder.

Cross-examined by Mr G Clarke B.L. (instructed by Mr P J Morrissey Solicitor, Dungarvan) witness said that the accused had got money under the scheme in 1941 and 1942. It was granted on these occasions without any undertaking for security by any guarantor in the 1942 application.

Denial Of Signature

Mr James McCarthy in evidence stated that the signature on the guarantee was not his and denied having seen the form until March of this year. Molumphy told him that he had sent his name to the County Council and that if he got letters from the County Council not to take any notice of them. In July last he received a letter from the County Council informing him that he was responsible for the bill. He told the County Council he knew nothing about the seeds. He got another letter in September and sent that back again. He got a civil bill about two months ago for £11 9s 0d. He met Molumphy before the Cappoquin District Court and Molumphy wanted him to act in Court as if he was absent minded. He (Molumphy) said it would be too bad if he were the cause of sending him to Limerick Prison. He (witness) told him he had made a statement in the presence of the superintendent and two Garda Sergeants and that he had nothing further to say.

Witness denied in cross-examination that he met Molumphy in Fermoy in 1943 and that they went into Murphy's stores. He also denied that he got a document from him and that he signed his name to it or instructed someone else to do so.

Garda Sergeant's Evidence

Sergeant T J Ryan Ballyduff gave evidence of having shown Molumphy the original guarantee. Molumphy stated that he took the guarantee to James McCarthy who signed it in Murphy's stores in Fermoy. An assistant was in the shop at the time. He (witness) arrested the accused on May 17th and he stated that McCarthy signed the form across a stamp in Murphy's stores in his presence.

Golden Jubilee Of Very Rev D. Canon Dinneen, P.P., D.D., Youghal.

To mark the occasion of the Golden Jubilee of Very Rev D. Canon Dinneen P.P. D.D., Youghal, a Solemn High Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated in the Parish Church Youghal of which the Jubilarian Canon Dinneen was celebrant, Rev R. Thornhill, C.C., deacon Rev P. O'Hanlon C.C. sub-deacon and Rev E. O'Callaghan C.C. master of ceremonies. Present in the Sanctuary were His Lordship Most Rev Dr J. Roche Bishop of Cloyne presiding Very Rev E. Garde O.P. (Rome) Rev N. Carey P.P. Killeagh Rev St. J. Thornhill, C.C. Rev J. F. Murphy C.C. Rev P. O'Carroll C.C. Rev D. Dwane P.P. Milford Rev A. Supple C.C. Rev D. Supple C.C. Also present were Rev Mother Peter Loretto Convent and Community Mother Mellitus and Community of the Poor Servants of the Mother of God.

The Church was packed with devout worshippers. In a brief address His Lordship Most Rev Dr J. Roche said—My dear brethren I have come here today to join with you and your esteemed Pastor in this great Act of Thanksgiving for the wonderful privilege that I in common with you share in thanksgiving to God on the attainment of his Golden Jubilee of Very Rev D. Canon Dinneen P.P. D.D. 50 golden years ago he was ordained a priest of the Lord in the college in Maynooth he received the wonderful power the greatest power conferred on man the power of consecration in the Mass. He received also the power to forgive sin and preaching the gospel of the Lord. This power carries with it the most serious responsibilities that in all circumstances he shall show himself a faithful follower of the Lord and a fearless exponent of his doctrines. Your venerable Pastor has lived up to all these high responsibilities. For 50 years he has lived as a priest of the highest character and it gives me more pleasure than I can tell to be present here in Youghal today and to see the friend of my boyhood offer the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. No one knows the character of a priest unless one has been associated with him from earliest years and my knowledge of Canon Dinneen goes back over 60 years to 1886 at St. Coleman's Fermoy he was then a splendid type of athletic youth. In due time he went to Maynooth where he won the high honour of D.D. the first time that this Degree was conferred on any student of the College. Since then he has laboured as a priest in many parishes. A man of the deepest culture and notwithstanding all his talents a man of humility. A kindly honest pastor with a heart so kind that no one knows how kind a heart he has and how generous his spirit is. To me when we were boys he was a great friend and when we became priests the friendship of earlier years remained there was no change over the lapse of years. Our late Bishop promoted him to the pastorate of Youghal and it is not necessary for me to tell you of his high character in your midst. He has left a lasting memorial with your generosity in the Strand Church and as Bishop I join with you in tendering to the Jubilarian our warmest wishes that the Lord may spare him for many years more to continue God's work in this Catholic Parish.

After the Mass the Canon was the recipient of numerous congratulations from his parishioners and was deeply touched by the many manifestations of genuine affection. Later he was presented with a beautiful Chalice and Paton on behalf of the people and Mr P. J. O'Gorman P.C. Chairman U.D.C. read a short address.

Dear Canon Dinneen—We the undersigned wish to convey to you the warm and affectionate congratulations of the Catholic Community on the attainment of the fiftieth year of your sacred calling. In a Parish celebrated in Irish Ecclesiastical History and in ancient times so distinguished as a great centre of learning and piety you have expended the greater part of your life in selfless devotion to the arduous duties which were imposed on you first as Chaplain and later as Curate and Parish Priest. The beautiful Church of Our Lady of Lourdes conceived designed and erected during your Pastorate will stand as a noble monument to your grand work for the Glory of God and the spiritual welfare of your flock. We think it fitting to assure you on this happy anniversary of the deep respect, esteem and affection of your grate-

ful parishioners and pray your acceptance of this Chalice and Paton of Cork workmanship. We are asked to convey also their most earnest wishes and prayers—that you may be granted many long years of health peace and happiness among us. In offering you our respectful devotion and willing co-operation in performing the manifold duties of your sacred calling we very confidently ask for your prayers for our beloved country our town and people and for a continuance of the blessings and bounties which the Providence of Almighty God has been graciously pleased to bestow on us. On behalf of the Catholic Community of the United Parishes of Youghal and Gortroe we beg to subscribe our names: P. J. O'Gorman John L. Keane W. J. Biddick E. F. Riordan L. Clancy T. P. Walsh and J. C. Condon Hon. Treasurers and M. H. Walsh Hon. Secretary 21st June 1946.

In reply the Canon thanked the people of Youghal through the Committee appointed to make the presentation. He loved Youghal and the people and he added that he would not give the parish of Youghal or its people for any parish or people in the world. He had a particular word of praise for the children of the town with their winning ways and he added that in all his Masses he would remember always the people of Youghal.

Canon Dinneen was born at Curragheen, Conna in the County of Cork and went to Knockanore National Schools late to St. Coleman's Fermoy and St. Patrick's College Maynooth in the year 1889 and remained there until 1896.

His first chaplaincy was at Presentation Convent Midleton and his first curacy was at Blarney Co. Cork. Later he became curate in Charleville and later in Youghal, where he remained for some time. From Youghal he went as P.P. to Ballyhea and after about five months in Ballyhea he returned to Youghal as P.P. in June 1932. He was first D.D. of Maynooth receiving this high degree in the year 1898. Canon Dinneen is a man of wide sympathies not alone religious but cultural as well. He is outstanding as a priest and a scholar and the affection with which he is held by his people was fully demonstrated on the 21st June when he celebrated his 50th year in the priesthood when all classes joined in congratulating him.
