### DUNGARVAN DISTRICT COURT

The fortnightly District Court held before Mr Eamonn O'Riain DJ at Dungarvan on Tuesday last was of short duration.

**Sean Condon (18) Kiladangan** Dungarvan was summoned by Supt P O'Mahoney for using a shotgun on May 7th last without being in possession of a firearms certificate for the purpose of enabling him to shoot rabbits to get some money. A dispute arose between young Condon and his grand-mother with whom he was living and she was being grand-mothered made a complaint Detective-Officer Gordon investigated the case and found the shotgun and some cartridges.

The Inspector said that young Condon was a young fellow of 13 years and it was a reckless act for Power to have given the shotgun to Condon. He said that it was a case for forfeiture but he left that decision in his Worship's hands.

Mr Williams solicitor for the defence said that the facts were as stated by the Inspector. Sean Condon lives with his grand-parents John and Mrs Beresford as his mother was in New Zealand. John Power gave the gun to the boy to shoot crows and rabbits. He thought that a small fine would meet the case instead of the forfeiture of the gun.

Justice—If he would give an undertaking not to lend the gun to anyone.

Mr Williams then called John Beresford father-in-law of John Power.

Witness said that Condon lived with him at Kiladangan. His daughter was married to Power and lives quite near them. Condon was a good boy and they got on well together. He gave an undertaking on behalf of Power that the gun would not be given to anyone.

Justice imposed a fine of 10/- on Sean Condon and 10/- on John Power who was careless in lending a weapon to a young boy especially when it was a shotgun. He was fined 10/- for the undertaking given. I will make no order for forfeiture.

**Drunk and Disorderly**  
Guard Deasy summoned John Deary Cahill Brugha Street for being drunk on the public street and a fine of 5/- was imposed.

The same complainant summoned John Crotty Loughmore Dungarvan for being drunk and disorderly and for fighting. He was fined 10/- and 10/- for the same offence.

To Mr Morrissey who defended the Guard said that the defendant went home alright afterwards. He looked for the trouble he got.

Mr Morrissey said that Crotty went up to a fellow and said 'you got drunk very quick and was immediately flattened.'

The Guard said that there were two or three fights against defendant the last one about two months ago.

Justice—How much was he fined then?

Justice—Well it will be 10/- this time with a month to pay.

**Ball Playing on Street**  
Michael Drohan and John Sheehan both of Davis Street, Dungarvan were summoned by Guard Cahill for playing ball on the public street on June 12th.

The Guard in evidence said that there were many people passing up and down the street at the time and they were obstructed by the defendants. He said that such practices are very prevalent in town at present.

Patrick Drohan a brother of one of the defendants who appeared on behalf of his brother said that it was usual to play such games at the spot. They did not know that they would be summoned for it.

Mrs Sheehan mother of the other defendant said that they were just throwing the ball against the wall on behalf of both defendants having been given leave not to play again in this place the Justice applied the P.O.A.

**Disturbing Offence**  
A summons against Michael Harty Hackettstown Ring for having no license displayed and for using an uninsured car was adjourned on an application by Mr Morrissey solicitor for defendant.

**Alleged Larceny**  
Nicholas Beresford Glendine was charged by Supt P O'Mahoney with the larceny of 2 cattle value £32 at Glendine on June 19th the property of Edward Doherty Ballyduff.

Defendant who had been remanded on bail from a special court was further remanded when Inspector McGonigle who

prosecuted, stated that inquiries had not yet been completed in the case.

### CAMOGIE—Waterford Very Unlucky

Cork Wins By Smallest Margin

Cork, 2-0, Waterford, 1-2

At the Gaelic field Dungarvan on Sunday last before a grand crowd and in atrocious weather Cork defeated Waterford last year's Munster Champions and All-Ireland finalists in the first round of the Munster Camogie Championship. Cork's victory was a lucky one as Waterford had most of the play and towards the closing stages of the game the Cork backs were sorely pressed but the Waterford forwards lost many opportunities of scoring.

The stewarding arrangements on the field set a headline to our G.A.A. clubs and resulted in one man alone deserving to be highly commended and shows what can be done when a job is tackled in an enthusiastic and thorough manner. The result was that the field and the spectators were given every facility to see the match from all angles.

The Dungarvan Brass and Reed Band in charge of Mr T. Costin played the teams around the pitch and also played selections during the interval which was greatly appreciated.

Rev Fr. Wynne P.E. Clashmore threw in the ball.

**THE GAME**  
Waterford pressed from the start but failed to score and Cork took advantage of an opening but failed to score. From the puck-out Waterford pressed and were inches wide of the posts from a very nice piece of overhead play. Returning to the attack again Waterford pressed and their forwards made good when a nice pass was trapped by A. Spencer to open the score for Waterford with a grand goal. Waterford were now playing very well and had much the better of the ensuing exchanges but their forwards at this period of the game lost some grand chances of scoring and wide after wide was the order.

O'Sullivan opened with a beauty to give Waterford a good lead and continuing the pressure the Waterford forwards again lost numerous chances when they were wide three or four times. The Cork backs were holding up well under the repeated attacks of the Waterford forwards but to concede another point when the Corks got the ball and drove over the bar for Waterford's second point.

Cork next attacked but their forwards were wide of the mark and the half-time whistle left the score 1-2 to Cork.

Cork were away from the start of the second half but their forwards were wide in succession and the Corks second goal was not to be. The Corks gave Cork their first goal. This score put new life into the Cork girls and they were playing well. The Corks were now pressing and defended gallantly and when play was transferred to the Cork territory the Waterford forwards had very hard luck for wide were the ball going inches wide.

Cork were now going all for the winning goal and combined nicely. M. Hogan pulled on a grinner and the green flag was up. The Corks second goal which gave them a point lead. Play became very exciting at this stage of the game and Waterford pressed hard for another score, and although forcing 3-25 towards the closing stages the Cork defence held and when the final whistle went Cork were the victors by the narrow margin of one point and on the final score 2-0 to Cork.

Then followed a period of Cappoquin pressure during which the "Village" custodian was tested several times, but he earned the admiration of the spectators by bringing off some spectacular saves and from a very close range he returned and shortly after a free in a favourable position was sent wide. From the puck-out Beecher got the ball and sent towards goal where McCarthy trapped his shot was however, blocked down and from the ensuing melee the ball was shot to the net by the same player.

Ballyduff again came back to the attack but a free to Cappoquin relieved the pressure. The "Village" lads were not to be demoralized and McCarthy struck a lovely shot over the bar to further increase their lead. Then came the best score of the game. McCarthy sent a high lobbing ball which appeared to be going wide but Curly contrived to take the ball and from an acute angle sent over the bar. Cappoquin broke away from the puck-out and Loneragan from a lengthy shot by Lacey sent to the net for Cappoquin's only score. Both sides had some narrow escapes before the half-time whistle which found Ballyduff leading on the scores—2-2.

That a rather depleted Kerry team after a journey of well over 100 miles should trounce the home team to the tune of three goals and twelve points to two points speaks for itself.

It had been hoped that after their display at Dungarvan against the senior footballers selected to represent the County in the Munster Final on the previous Tuesday evening that our juniors would put up a good show and it was thought that a win might even be anticipated. But the hopeful ones were once more doomed to disappointment and again the blame points to the selectors and the Co. Board.

The Kerry fifteen gave a lesson in the art of football to the Waterford men at out-paced, out-kicked and out-maneuvred the homesters in all departments and in all phases of the game.

This superiority even of a Kingdom team should not have been so evident in physique and general fitness the Waterford team were very small in numbers and who can blame them.

A few more displays of this kind and I feel sure that the supporters that Waterford will enjoy will be very small in numbers and who can blame them.

The rout of the seniors (not the full county selection) by a scratch team at the same venue does not augur well for their next outing. Unless a miracle happens in the meantime I cannot see them posing a great danger to Kerry at Tralee on the 1st inst.

A new method of selecting and training our inter-county teams should be devised. Surely it cannot be fruitfully done in Waterford just lacks the talent to win such matches. If for one do not believe it anyway!

The Department of Agriculture offers a bonus of £5 to the owner of every non-pedigree Dairy Shorthorn bull calving in the last six months of 1945 which is passed for licensing at the forthcoming Autumn Bull Inspections. Provided the animal is the progeny of—

(a) a Registered Non-Pedigree Dairy Shorthorn cow having a certified milk yield of not less than 7500 lb and butter-fat of not less than 280 lb and

(b) a Registered Dairy Short horn bull (pedigree or non-pedigree) whose dam has a certified milk yield and butter-fat yield of 7500 lb and 280 lb respectively.

Application forms which give further particulars of the scheme may be obtained from the local Cow Testing Associations or from the Department of Agriculture.
