Dungarvan District Court was held before Mr Eamonn O'Riain DJ at the Courthouse Dungarvan on Tuesday last

Extending 2 Hours

Mr L F Lanigan solr applied on behalf of the Dungarvan Golf Club for an extension of hours for a dance at the Clubhouse, Ballinacourty on Sunday Sept 15th

There was no objection and the application was granted

Drunk

Guard McNighton summoned Thomas Costigan, Cathal Brugha Place for being drunk on the public street on August 10th

This case was adjourned James Wright Fitzgerald Terrace was summoned by Guard Burke for being drunk on the public street on Aug 14th and the same defendant was summoned by Guard Farrell for being drunk on August 26th

The defendant was fined 5/- in the first summons and the same amount on the second summons

Breach of Licensing Laws

Martin Draper, publican at Ballinagoul Ring was summoned by the Attorney-General at the suit of Supt P O Mahony with a breach of the licensing laws on 11 p.m. on Friday June 28th last

Fifteen men found on the premises were also summoned

Mr Williams, solr for the defendant, pleaded guilty

Supt O Mahony stating the case said that on June 28th two Guards visited the premises and found 15 men in the bar. There were signs of drink about each of the men

His client was the owner of the premises for over 25 years and in all that time he was only in court once and this was more than 11 years ago when he was fined 10/-

The men found on the premises were all fishermen who had been out fishing most of the previous day and night and this premises is a great resort of theirs

They had been in there for some hours but no drink had been served after hours and the men just stayed finishing off their drinks and chatting. They were all sober and he asked the Justice to take the excellent record of the house into consideration and also the fact that the Guards were admitted without delay

The Supt said that he was not pressing the case

Mr Williams—Your Worship might possibly adjourn the case for three months

The Supt opposed this stating that he had got complaints from the area and while there was no one found on that particular premises before the case was overdone in the locality

The Justice said he would take the good record of the house into consideration and would only impose a fine of £1 and 2/6 on each of the men

Hannah Cooney, Publican Grattan Square was summoned for a breach of the Licensing laws at 3.30 a.m. on Monday August 13th

Seven men found on the premises were also summoned

Mr Kenny solr for the defendant admitted the case

The Supt said that on the night in question Deputy Deasy heard talk there and knocked and was admitted after a time

He found seven men there with drink Mrs Cooney said that there had been up to 20 men in the bar but she stated that the men on the premises were adherents of both sides and were discussing the match. He added that the men were not actually in the bar but were up to the door

Mr Kenny—The defendant is a great supporter of the Brickey Rangers and they had played Dungarvan in Cappoquin that night

She was at the match which was hotly contested, in fact too hotly contested and it finished up with some ugly incidents during which several got black eyes. She with another man tried to make peace between the teams in Cappoquin and eventually the party returned to Dungarvan to settle the matter. Some of them were footballers. The argument waxed hot and they were hard at it when the Guard came. Finally a peaceable agreement was reached

Mr Kenny asked for leniency for his client in view of the circumstances

Supt—There was some confusion in Cappoquin and there were arguments in town but there was enough noise in the premises to be heard on the street

The record of the house showed three convictions since 1943

The Supt said that there were no complaints since the last conviction in 1944 and he suggested adjourning the case

The Justice accordingly adjourned the case for 3 months

Alleged Larceny of Bicycle

Patrick McGrath, Ballynemeela Cappagh was summoned by Supt P O Mahony for taking a bicycle without the consent of the owner—John O'Connor, Abbeyside, on July 28th

Mr P J Morrissey solr who defended admitted that his client took the bicycle from near a local church to go on a journey on the country. When he came back he left it outside another church and when inquiries were made about the case the defendant admitted them. He said that the boy was indispensable to his employe Mr Ryan—a threshing mill owner for the harvest

The Supt said that the boy was just home after doing nine months in the same prison and only reason why he did not press for another term was that it would be a hardship on Ryan. As the defendant did not show any sign of being a repentant thief that the case might be met by a substantial fine

The Justice said that people like defendant must realise that they cannot take bicycles without consent. If he sent defendant to jail farmers expecting Ryan for the harvest would suffer and for that reason he would give defendant a last chance and impose a fine of £2 with 3 months to pay or in default 2 months in jail
